Two Get FFA's State Degree At Convention

The Morton Chapter of Future Farmers of America had two members who received the Lone Star Farmer degree in Vocational Agriculture.

Three applications were made to the state association but only two were accepted. The members included Paul Zuber, Gary Middleton, and Don Gandy.

Don Gandy's application was rejected because of an error, but he will be eligible for application in the coming year's quota.

The Lone Star Farmer Degree is the highest degree that the State can confer upon a member of the FFA organization. The degree is conferred on the basis of money earned from farming or other agriculture work and he must have deposited in the bank or otherwise positively invested at least \$500. In addition, the applicant must have outstanding ability as evidenced by his leadership and cooperation in student, chapter and community activity, and have a satisfactory scholarship record.

The Lone Star Farmer degree is conferred each year and is based on the total membership of the state association. The number conferred cannot exceed 2 percent of the total state membership.

These young men are to be commended for their fine work in the FFA organization.

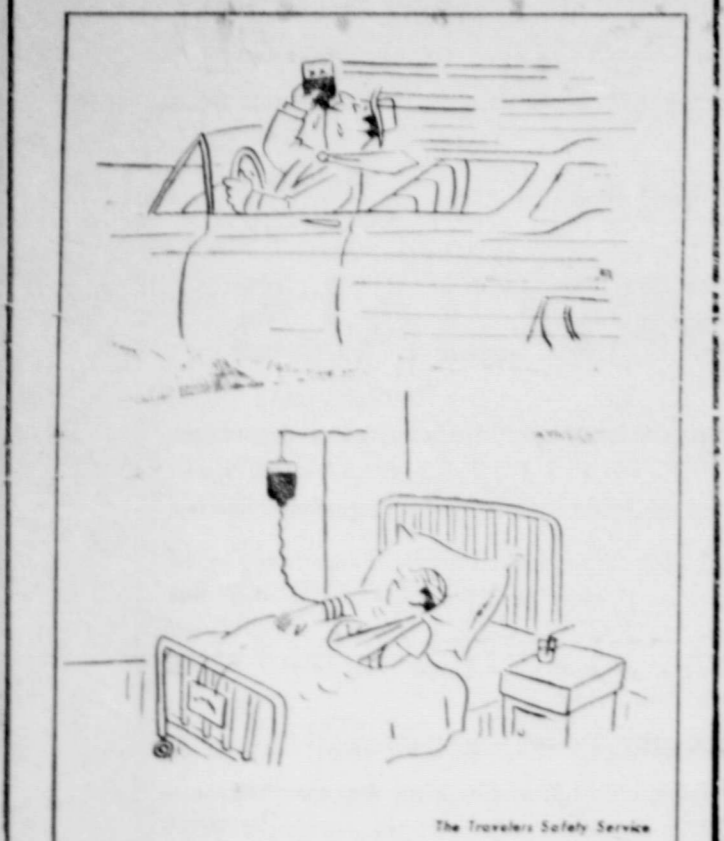

The American Statesman DOCUMENTARY PROOF Big Unions Give Generous Funds To Yarborough!

WASHINGTON— Ralph W. Yarborough's 1957 election to the United States Senate was financed in part by money from six of the most powerful labor union organizations in America. Affidavits on file here with the clerk of the US House of Representatives, in compliance with the federal corrupt practices act, show that Yarborough's campaign in the special race for the US Senate last spring drew \$28,143 from labor groups headquartered in Detroit, New York, Cleveland, Washington and Pittsburgh. The federal records are the first documentary proof of a charge hurled at Yarborough in past and present statewide political races that he had the financial backing of the nation's biggest labor bosses.

Washington, D.C., to Robert Bryant, 100 West 15th St., Austin, Texas, \$2,000 contributed for "General Activity." (All political contributions of Railway Labor's Political League appear on the reports as for "general activity." The same designation is used in contributions to the organization to the "Morse Deficit" fund and to the Proxmire for Senate campaign in Wisconsin.) March 14, 1957; Railway Labor's Political League, Washington, D.C., to Robert Bryant, 100 West 15th St., Austin, Texas, \$2,000 contributed for "General Activity." Railway Labor's Political League reports were signed by C. T. Anderson, Secretary-Treasurer, before notary public Margaret E. Murphy. March 15, 1957; United Steel Workers, 1500 Commonwealth Building, Pittsburgh 22, Pennsylvania, \$5,000 "to Harris County Democrats." The report did not show the name of the individual receiving the money for the "Harris County Democrats." The report was signed by I. W. Abel, Secretary-Treasurer, before notary public Edward G. Nassar, Allegheny County, Pennsylvania. March 5, 1957; Amalgamated Political Education Committee, 16 Union Square, New York 5, N.Y., to Fred Schmidt, Secretary, 1011 San Jacinto (spelling not corrected) Austin, Texas, as "Campaign Contribution, Ralph Yarborough for US Senate," \$1,000. The report was signed by Frank Rosenblum, Treasurer, before notary Valentin J. T. Wertheimer, New York. March 19, 1957; Textile Workers Union of America, New York, to Texas State Industrial Council, 310 East 14th Street, Austin, Texas, "Contributed to Senator's Campaign in Texas for Ralph Yarborough," \$1,000. Report signed by John Chupka, Secretary-Treasurer, notarized by Wilbur R. Samuels, notary public. Records of the Trainmen's Political League of Cleveland, Ohio, dated February 13, 1957, show a notation: "\$250 to W. P. Kennedy, 1379 Ontario Street, Cleveland (official address of the organization) as reimbursement for donation in behalf of Judge Ralph Yarborough, Austin, Texas, candidate for US Senate." The report was signed by W. K. Sallinger, Secretary-Treasurer, and notarized by Roy H. Neville, notary public. Texas Fund a Record March 21, 1957, committee on

political education, Washington, D.C., to Texas State Industrial Council "R. Yarborough," \$663. June 18, 1957; Texas COPE "fund of expenses" by committee on political education, Washington, D. C., \$1,230.06. (Other reports by COPE to Texas COPE totaling \$3,988.46 are not counted in the total of funds clearly earmarked for the Yarborough special Senate election campaign.) Sworn reports of the national labor organizations on file in the clerk's office of the House of Representatives show numerous contributions in other sections of the nation for political campaigns, including members of legislatures, and in some instances candidates for city offices. Large contributions were made to the "Wayne Morse deficit" and to "Proxmire (Wisconsin) senator" fund. An accounting of COPE political contributions for the year 1956, preceding the 1957 special Senate election in Texas, shows the Texas AFL-CIO joint committee received \$10,000 earmarked for "congressional campaigns." Of 339 separate listings of political contributions by COPE in 1956, except for one donation, the \$10,000 fund sent to Texas AFL-CIO joint committee was the largest. One other \$10,000 contribution that year went to Michigan political action committee. Labor funds sent to Texas for use in the 1957 special Senate election in behalf of Yarborough, as shown by the sworn reports, were directed to principal leaders of the splinter "Democrats of Texas" organization. Bryant, who received the money from the railroad labor's league, is legislative representative of Austin of the railroad firemen and engineers, and is a member of the executive committee of DOT. Schmidt is state executive secretary of AFL-CIO and is a member of the DOT executive committee. Jerry Holleman of Austin is AFL-CIO president, and heads the joint AFL-CIO committee which received the political money from

whenever practicable the party machinery. A long discussion in the Congressional Record includes an analysis of Michigan PAC activity. (As noted earlier in this article, Michigan PAC and Texas AFL-CIO joint committee each received \$10,000 in 1956 from COPE, the two largest single political contributions from national COPE to local groups.) The Michigan PAC analysis is from an article written by Miss Fay Calkins of the University of Chicago on a research project on the political activities of labor organizations. She said "in Michigan PAC formed a liberal coalition with the Michigan Democratic Club, reform Democrats, A.F. and L., and a few patronage interest groups. By entering precinct captains in the primaries, especially in Wayne County, the coalition was able to control a number of district Democratic conventions and send a majority of delegates to the state convention. From this position the liberal coalition was able to determine the composition of the Democratic state executive committee, PAC was the strongest single interest group in the coalition." The contributions from national labor organizations to state labor leaders in Texas for political activity, and the coalition between the "Democrats of Texas" liberal group headed by Mrs. Randolph, follows exactly the Michigan pattern. Texas labor leaders, Holleman, Schmidt and Bryant, to whom the contributions for political activity were sent, hold executive positions with DOT. They represent the strongest single interest group in the DOT coalition. In Texas, Harris County and its strong liberal organization, is the counterpart of the key Wayne County organization in Michigan. In Texas, as in Michigan, the avowed purpose of DOT is the same — to capture the precinct conventions and control the State Democratic Executive Committee. Second quarter (1958 reports) of the national labor organizations, when they are filed with Congress in compliance with the Federal Corrupt Practices Act, will reflect their contributions, if any, to current political campaigns and political activity in Texas. Quoted from the Congressional Record, Senate, June 16, 1958, Page 10214: "COPE—While it is by far the most highly organized and most richly endowed political machine controlled exclusively by the labor bosses—is not the only political action group of organized labor. Actually, there are some 40 separate outfits which, under federal law, have reported spending millions of dollars for direct political action. "Besides COPE some of the larger ones are: United Auto Workers PAC, International Ladies Garment Workers Campaign Committee, Machinists Non-Partisan Political League, Amalgamated Clothing Workers PAC, Railway Labor's Political League and Trainmen's Political Education League, United Steel Worker PAC. Six of the above were sources of what appears to be a separate fund sent into Texas to back Ralph Yarborough's special Senate campaign in April 1957—The national labor contribution for that campaign, as shown by their sworn reports to Congress, totaling approximately one-half of the amount of contributions from individual Texas backers of the candidate, as shown by his personal campaign contribution list. National labor organizations backed Yarborough with \$28,143 clearly earmarked, plus other amount of contributions from individual Texas backers of the candidate. For these there is not public accounting at state level. Texas individual supporters of Yarborough contributed in his behalf a total of \$56,312.58.

SPRAY OR DUST ROSES

According to recent research by Dr. E. W. Lyle, Plant Pathologist, with the Texas Rose Research Foundation, Inc., spraying gives better control than dusting for rose disease control. In 1957 one block of roses were sprayed and a second block was dusted. This past spring the roses were examined. All the roses in the sprayed block were alive and healthy. In the dusted block, three were dead, four showing signs of black spot and 14 roses, although lacking signs of black spot, were weaker than those in the sprayed block.
