Farm Tour Today Will Cut Wide Swath in Viewing Cotton, Grain, Grass and Conservation Practices

A County-wide farm tour with a free hamburger lunch has been offered as an inducement today for attendance at a farm tour to begin at 10:30 a.m.

Though this is a busy season of the year for farmers, it is also the only season when they can see, in full production, the various crops that are being included on the tour.

The tour will assemble, according to County Agent Homer Thompson at 10:30 on the north edge of Morton on the J. W. McDermitt farm to first have a look at cotton fertilization. The group will drive to the Willard Cox farm east of Morton to see the Johnsons' farm. At the W. L. Faust farm they will see fertilization of cotton and will see the same at J. D. Hawthorne's farm just before they go to the Country Club, 5 miles east of Morton and be served hamburgers at the Club House, Courtesy of the First State Bank of Morton.

At 1:00 p.m. the group will be at the Earl Pichardo place, southeast of the club house one mile and will see how he has exploited nematode control in cotton. From there they will travel to Bob Burns to have a look at his dairy farm. This should be one of the highlights of the tour in view of recently published stories in the Tribune and in the Lubbock Avalanche, about the operation.

At Ed Weston's place, one mile west of Whiteface, they'll inspect Martin maize and RS-610 hybrid

grain sorghum. At Hubert Taylor's, a mile south of Whiteface, they'll witness feed and cotton. They'll later look at Don Stanford's native grasses, Indian, sand blue stem, sidon's grama and green spangle-top. At Charles Tower's they will see close spaced grain sorghum and alfalfa and at Tom Daugan's they'll see a bench leveling operation.

Frank Bennett's place will offer a look at Shinnery control and range deferment and T. K. Williamson and Bob Dunham will show a variety of interesting crops including perennial sweet sudan, mung beans, purple hull peas, weeping love grass and a grass test plot. At T. A. Gresham's they will take a gander at Blightmaster Cotton.

Farmer's Urged to Be On Hand for Cotton Defoliation Meeting Tonight

A Cotton Defoliation meeting is to be held tonight (Thursday), at 8:00 o'clock in the County Auditorium, according to County Agent Homer E. Thompson.

A representative from the State Experiment Station will be here to discuss this timely and important subject, Cotton Defoliation.

Agent Thompson urges all farmers with cotton, to make this important meeting, especially those who are unable to attend the farm tour, today.

Thompson said many farmers have been in the office requesting information on cotton defoliation. He said that in the past farmers have made many and lost it by defoliation of cotton. In view of the increased interest in this subject, the agent requested Charlie Fischer, State Experiment Station, Lubbock, to send a representative who is very familiar with cot-

ton defoliation to discuss this matter more fully with Cochran County farmers.

Cotton defoliation guide leaflets are available at the Agent's office.

The Morton Band Boosters voted Monday night to order 50 new band uniforms for the Morton School Band.

Monday and white uniforms were selected. Later the group changed their minds and phoned the factory to have a black uniform with red trim designed. It is slated to be shown to the group on Monday night, Sept. 29, for final okay.

Some 30 members were in attendance at the meeting in the Band Hall.

The uniforms will cost \$77.80 each, and the group will be required to make the first payment in six months.

Other action Monday night included the appointing by Lloyd Miller, president, of Mrs. M. C. Ledbetter as chairman of the Band Calendar committee, and Mrs. J. N. Burnett as chairman of the rummage sale committee.

John Brown, director of the Morton Band announced at the meeting that a sixth grade band will be organized and practiced at 5 p.m. twice each week.

RAIN SLOWS HARVEST

Heavy rains in some sectors of the County, considerably lighter in others, delayed the cotton and grain harvest from a day or two to a week or two, in Cochran County.

Rains which measured up to 3.5 inches in the far west portion of the County on the Bill Wood place, fell Monday night, from about 8:00 to 11:00 p.m. and scattered showers continuing throughout the night.

As is nearly always the case the rains caused considerable damage to grades of some cotton, while they were hailed as highly beneficial to stands of grass.

John Crowder gauged better than two inches and Lloyd Miller, only about a mile south of Morton, got

a .95 inch reading. E. C. Wynn, also in the far west of the county, tipped the 3 inch mark while down toward Bledsoe the gauge read around two inches to slightly over.

In Morton .82 inches was gauged on the official weather station gauge kept by the Soil Conservation office. It brought the total in Morton to nearly 1.5 inches since Sept. 11. Other rains gauged at the station were on the 11th, 47, and on the 12th, .09.

At their regular noon meeting on Wednesday, the Lions entertained the Morton coaches as their guests and then heard from two of them as the program for the week.

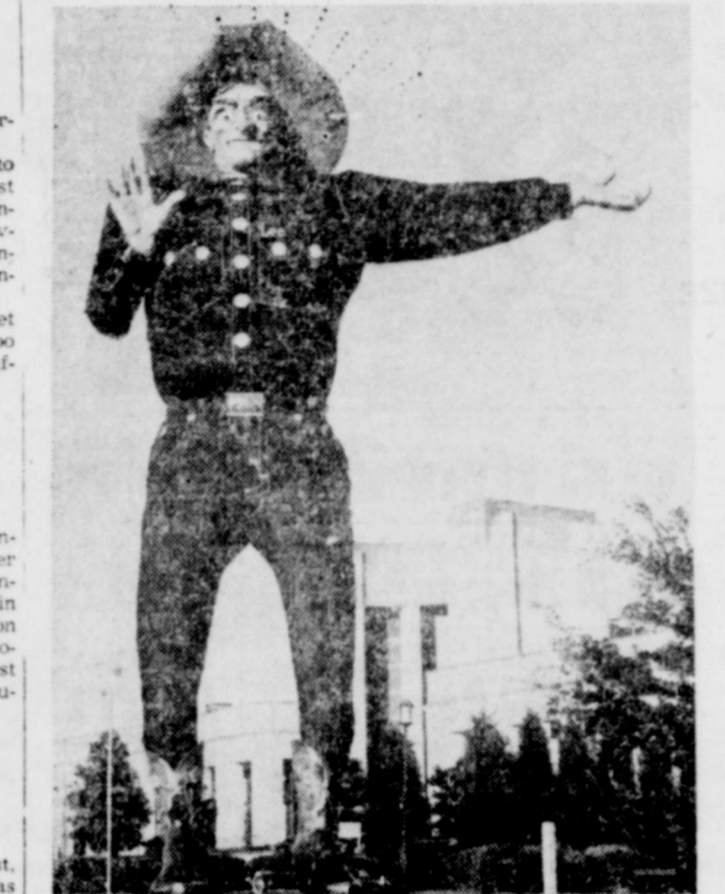
Approximately 35 members attended the meeting and heard Coach Vernard Alexander explain the football program and Coach Bob Travis tell of the basketball plans.

Morton Travels to Farwell, Friday For Crack at Undefeated Steers

Crippled Morton, listing one of their few seniors, halfback Perry Don Seney as a doubtful starter, and possibly without the services of Butch Nairn, faces a bleak Friday at Farwell where the score crazy Steers will be thirsting for revenge against the team that made a shambles of their good season last year.

Coaches expect the fight that has been generated by Morton thus far to be a big factor in the drive of the game, but admit, without the two backfield men, chances would be slim. Morton is already down to about 17 players on the roster, not counting any injured men.

Farwell comes back with their tall and talented quarterback, Love Lane, and has run up topheavy scores against weak opposition thus far. Their early season record is much the same as Plains had posted and they must be figured to be as potent. Their attack hasn't even been unveiled because they have won so easily, they haven't had to "give away any clues as to

what they could do under stress.

Nevertheless the Indians hope to end and expect to provide that stress. They must go into the game as confident underdogs because of pre-played games. However, the staff is not expecting Farwell to be quite as strong as Plains.

Other players appear to be in good shape and the injuries to Seney and Nairn caused the coaches to shuffle the other players a bit in practice, but there was no hint as to chances in the lineup.

Farwell is a top rated Class A team, like Plains, and Morton has two more weeks of non conference play before stepping into the competition for a 2-A Title for the first time.

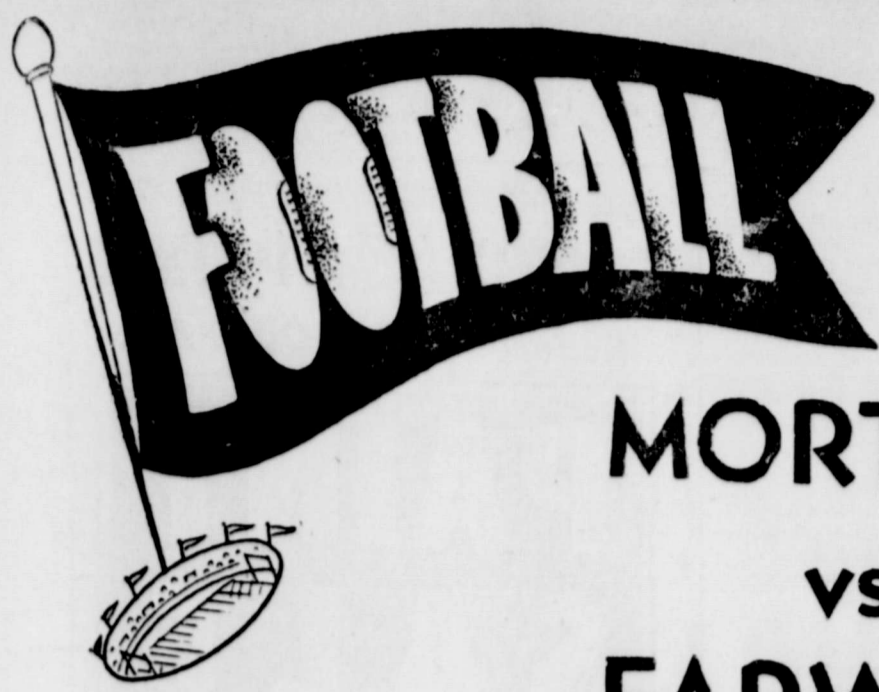

Tips for Gardeners Hoping To Enter Specimen in the Horticultural Division of Cochran Garden Club Show

(Editor's Note: This article is another in a series prepared for the Cochran County Garden Club in order to better acquaint gardeners with the club and its methods, ideas, and rules that prevail in judging of garden club shows.)

At least the flower growers are coming into their own at shows and shows. Their shows are being judged by competent judges. Most of the shows are now judged by fully accredited judges — either national judges or student judges who have spent at least ten days on a course of study and work plus many hours of reading. The reading of 25 or 30 books is required for a national certificate. All of that plus years of experience in judging, arranging, and practical judging and rigid examinations are required to make a competent judge.

Some judges are excellent, some are fair. Most judges are less interested in popularity than honest judging and constructive criticism. In the Horticulture division, judges look for well grown flowers with good color, size, texture, and

substance. In the arrangement classes, they look for well arranged arrangements with no visible damage which meets certain requirements.

Remember that the two divisions are considered separately. **Arrangement** — How are a lot of items used frequently in the arrangements with which the amateur is unfamiliar.

Specimen — The price of the show is a horticultural division section which deals with growth, condition, size, texture, and color of plants.

Arrangement Division — a planned display of flowers in attractive manner to fit certain requirements as specified by schedule.

Specimen — a single bloom (dahlia), a single spike (gladiolus), a single stalk (canna).

Preparation for the horticulture exhibit begins NOW. If you are growing large dahlias, roses, or chrysanthemum for specimen blooms, remember that they are grown disbudded.

An experienced dahlia grower with a vine residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol building.

occasional bud can be carefully cut out with a razor blade in such a way as to look as if the plant were grown disbudded. (A specimen bloom must not carry an extra bud.) Petals can be carefully trimmed also. Quite often dahlia petals are on the back. If the blossom is not too old, a few petals can be pulled out. If too many are pulled out,

the whole flower shatters. Any of those tricks you use, do well enough that the judges will never see the scars — they are perfectly legitimate if they are inconspicuous. But in a number, the judge can pick up and examine all horticultural specimens. Give him your best and you will bring home blue ribbons.

Watch carefully also the time to feed your plants which you expect to use for your show material. It is better to give a small amount of fertilizer and use it more often, than to give an overdose. It reacts on plants just as an over-stimulant does on the human being.

If you have disbudded and fertilized carefully you will probably be able to give them exactly what you plan to enter. If you are unsure of your plans, take your fair book to the yard with you and make notes if you plan several entries. Remember that all horticultural entries must be shown by the exhibitor and that only one entry can be made in each class.

Please be honest enough with yourself to see that on other systems in your family, unless he has had the entire responsibility of growing, makes a second entry from your garden. Please do not allow your plants to be over-fertilized.

It is wise to plan a way of carrying the specimen blooms because of the danger of their spoiling and losing the water. Soft drink bottles serve as containers for small stemmed specimens. They can be carried easily in the wooden box or cardboard boxes in which they come. The quart and half gallon milk bottles and fruit jars serve admirably as containers for the large blossoms of the dahlia and exhibition chrysanthemums. They can be packed lightly in boxes for transportation.

When grooming or preparing the flowers for the containers, choose specimens with good stems and reasonably straight stems. Choose flowers which are at their peak — not too tight a bud and not too old. Roses should be picked when the bud has about the same firmness as the finger tip. They may be stored for several days in a jar with water in a refrigerator or a short time at ordinary temperature. Wash any spray residue from the leaves. The leaves count on the score, but not as much as the blossom.

Plains 'Do'od It', 20 to 0; But Outmanned Indians Don't Give Up Without Forcing A Tough Battle, All the Way

A rugged band of Plains cowboys used their extra manpower, added weight, and some rangy height to great advantage as they rolled to an impressive 20 to 0 victory over a stubborn, but crippled Indian team.

The valiant Indians held the vaunted cowboys at bay for the first 15 minutes of the game, and then saw a touchdown scored on a routine short pass in which the defender actually let the receiver catch a 10-yard pass, which was the best defense, and then was shaken off in his attempt to tackle the receiver, and the Cowboys had an 18 yard scoring play.

Then the second half comeback the Indians are noted for failed to materialize as first string offensive and defensive men Perry Seamey and Bath Nairn were crippled and could play no more.

On the first play after Nairn, a

startout on defense, was led off the field. Plains had a fourth down situation on their own 29 yard line with two yards to go. They chose to gamble, and Joe D. Morrow, the same hefty back who previously caught the pass for a touchdown, broke through the line, went right over the spot Nairn ordinarily would guard, and romped 71 yards for the first break-away touchdown of the season against the slow Indians.

The other tally came on a two yard pass over center for Morrow in the third period and the extra points, all attempted on passes, were dropped by the intended receivers except for one grabbed by Jim Williams.

Plains showed Morton a rugged passing attack and a stout line.

In 131 lbs. Cowboy Quarterback Cardell Huddleston, the Indians found a man who got the pass away in a hurry. Most of his tosses, long or short, were received by end Walter Coffman and back Jim Williams, at least 6 feet off the ground. On several occasions these men, both well over six foot three inches tall, grabbed the ball on the jump and Morton's only defense was to tackle the receiver as soon as he had the pigskin.

Morrow, and Don Williams, were the only Plains backs who gained any sizable yardage on the ground.

With a fourth quarter spurt, Morton finally caught Plains in total first downs, but in total yardage the Cowboys had a healthy edge.

Morton twice penetrated the Plains 20, and once got as deep as the 11 yard line with a first down. Then a mixed signal in the backfield lost two yards. Brown was sniped nine yards back trying to get a pass, and Morton failed to make an yardage in the next two downs.

There were two great breaks in the game. One came when a Brown punt over the safety man bounced into Morrow's hands as he ran backward and the steamrollerman pounded his way back 27 yards.

The other break, also on a good

punt, came when Brown's 27 yard punt hit on the Plains 15 yard line near the side lines, bounced back in bounds and over the goal line for an automatic touchback. If it had continued out of bounds, where it hit, it would have been at least a 37 to 42 yard punt.
