

Very few indepen-dent dairy distributors any long-er exist, with the bulk of the dairy product distribution fall-ing into the clutches of two or three huge corporations who even own, or have an interest in, big food chains, merely to blank out competition from distribution in these stores

Obviously, the dairy producers need protection from the preda-tors in the dairy distribution bus-iness. It is difficult to tell what is the best form of operation in a free market, when a free market does not exist.

Destruction of dairy coopera tives is not the answer. For in addition, even with their tax favoritism, cooperatives have not been able to stop the march of monopoly in milk.

The problem is grave. On one

side is the welfare of the infants. On another sid middle, and threatening combines. And while infi

But undoubtedly, the only prac-tical solution to entire problem would be for the anti trust laws to be so rigidly enforced in the dairy industry that a free and open market would exist. As it stands now, milk distribution is a national disgrace.

Recommendations of varieties for he area are based on results of several years of testing plus the quality characteristics of the varieties. The highest yields under ir-rigation in the Panhandle have be-en produced by Concho, Crockett, Ponca and Cheyenne. Dryland tests show Concho, Crockett, Westar, Bi-son and Comanche to be among the most satisfactory. Early varieties such as Wichita, Early Blackhull and Triumph, have averaged less than mid-season varieties.

Fall sown oat tests at Bushland and Floydada, for 1958 and also over a period of years, show that Mustang, Bronco, and Wintok have produced the best yields and are he most winter hardy. Spring seedling tests show Alamo and Mustang to be the best varieties for a

spring planting. Fall sown barley tests were also conducted at Bushland and Floydada. Cordova ranked first with a yield of 42.3 bushels per acre with Wintex, Cidktoo, Rogers and Kearney following in that order. Kearney has been found to be the most winter hardy and also to have considerable resistance to greenbugs. Spring seeding of barley has not been very successful in the area. Over a period of years, Cordova and Wintex have made the best yields for Spring seeding.


