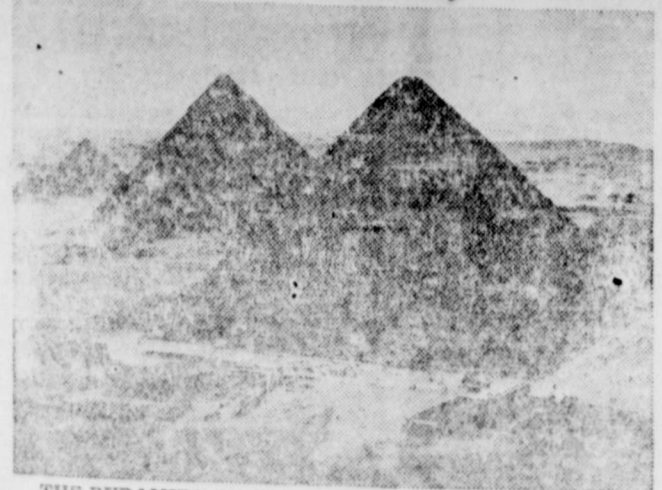

Nov. Stock Prices Are Discussed

NOVEMBER LIVESTOCK R.P.T.
Many farmers have contacted the County Agent about buying feeder beef cattle, etc. Here is a rule of thumb which is the thinking of farmers in beef cattle states.

HOW MUCH TO PAY FOR FEEDER CALVES
How much drop in price can we take between feeder calves and finished beef and still make a profit out of a cattle feeding operation? This is a question that is being asked over and over during this period of high feeder cattle prices. Midwestern cattle feeders have used as a rule of thumb the following guide: If slaughter beef prices are \$28 per hundred, then you can afford to pay \$30 per hundred for feeder calves weighing 500 pounds or less and expect to make a reasonable profit. If slaughter prices are \$28 per hundred, you cannot pay more than \$28 per hundred for feeder steers weighing 500 pounds and up. This rule of thumb is used during years when feed prices are about normal in relation to meat prices. During periods like the present when feed prices are relatively low in relation to meat prices, then you can afford to pay a little more for the feeder animal. However, the feeder who pays \$34 per hundred for feeder calves, 500 pounds and under, and has to sell them when they are finished at \$28 per hundred is going to have to buy his grain cheap and do an extra good job of feeding in order to realize a profit.

SPREAD BETWEEN FEEDER CALVES AND FEEDER STEERS
The spread between feeder calves and feeder steers, 500 lbs. and up, is extremely wide at the present time. On several of our markets feeder steers have been selling for \$26 and \$27 per hundred. At the same time feeder calves of like grades have been selling for \$34 and \$35 per hundred. When this situation exists, feeder steers look like the better buy, if they are available.

SHEEP OUTLOOK
Sheep numbers are expected to be up about two million head on January 1, 1959 over January 1, 1958. By January sheep and lamb numbers are likely to total about 37 1/2 million head. This will be our largest inventory since 1949. Texas alone will account for over one third of this increase. This increase is due primarily to two reasons: The 1958 lamb crop showed about a four per cent increase over 1957 or an addition of almost one million head, whereas, the number slaughtered in 1958 was down about one million over the previous year. Lamb prices are expected to hold up well for the next few months. However, the impact of larger supplies of meat, especially pork, will likely cause a decline in lamb prices during the second half of 1959.
