time to clear out. When he got away from the fumes he notified the Sheriff's Department and in turn the Fire Truck was called out.
Firemen, fearing at first a repetition of the butane explosion at Brownfield a week earlier, drove to the scene but stopped a block away. However, before they knew what had happened, Herb Hillman and Sammy Leveritt riding in the cab of the truck found it filled with the choking ammonia fumes.
Hillman leaped out and began to run from the scene, stopped and returned to make sure Leveritt was able to get out of the truck, and the two men ran from the contaminated area.

Meanwhile, before police could set up a road block, a Latin American family drove through the fumes being spread over a large area by a strong wind, and the seven persons in the car were panic stricken not knowing what had happened. They managed to get out of the car and were taken to the Cochran County Hospital where two of the victims, Josephine Lopez & Anna Maria Lopez were kept hospitalized overnight.
After the road block was set up, a Denver City man, Clayton Caston, 22, happened along and was in a hurry to get past the road block. He was cautioned to drive around the fumes, but even a block away, he ran into the wind-whipped fumes, and he too was hospitalized.

When the gas had all escaped, and fumes had cleared enough to permit probing the truck, firemen cautiously approached the cab of the truck, fearing they might find the driver trapped inside. But L. C. Roddam, the truck driver, appeared back on the scene a little later, easing the anxiety of the firemen who had looked for him and were about to conclude he had been overcome by fumes.

One of the fortunate things about the near tragedy was that it occurred in a sparsely populated area, as far as homes are concerned. Firemen who used a gas mask to search three homes in the path of the fumes, found all three families happened to be away from home.

Aside from some mighty anxious moments, violent vomiting by the victims of the gas, and the loss of the ammonia gas the incident caused little damage. But the persons involved got a good lesson on just how potent ammonia fumes can be.

Firemen had two other calls over the past week, one to a house in southwest Morton where a basket of clothes caught fire, and the other was to a Manly gun where a burr pile threatened to get out of control.
Damage was negligible in both instances, though firemen had a lot of anxious moments, having to thaw out water frozen in the pump of the fire truck, by the sudden cold spell.

County's Rainfall for 1958 Totals 19.69 Inches; Biggest In Many Years

The most total rainfall received in many a year in Cochran County was the number one reason for an excellent cotton crop recently harvested.

The Cochran County Soil Conservation Office, which keeps the official rainfall figures for the county, which they gauge, showed the official rainfall was 19.69 inches of moisture.
This is 1.69 inches above the listed annual rainfall of 18 inches in the Texas Almanac, which is based on a 29 year average. However, it is considerably heavier than any year since 1949.

The total for 1958 was an even four inches more than was gauged last year and more than double the amount of rain received here in 1956.

The 1958 rains were pretty well spread out through the entire year, a fact that in some ways minimized the amount of good that was imparted to the crops. For instance, the 7.99 inches received in 1956 came at a time when it proved highly beneficial to the crop, even though there were several dry months. And in 1957, Cochran County had two dry months, December & January.

Monday's snowfall was the only thing that kept December from being a dry month here. Only .62 to .83 was received during the full month. But the rest of this past year has seen pretty good rainfall

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MAX BOWER'S SUCCESS
WITH VARIOUS GRASSES

Max Bower, Rt. 1, Morton, Tex-
as, planted 34 acres Indian grass
in 1954. The second year, 1955, he
harvested 20,000 worth of seed of
this grass.

On his home place, Max has har-
vested 20 acres of grass in 1957.
He planted the grass sorghum in
1947 and 70 acres of cotton grassed
\$17,200.00 while his 20 acres of
grass returned a gross income of
\$1,000. That's about \$50 per acre
for cotton and \$25 per acre for
grasses. Grass production expen-

ses are much less per acre than
cotton, Max said.

In 1958 Max added more grasses
to the farm that he and his brother
in law, Don Bower, work jointly.
On these two places Max has a
joint interest in 120 acres of grass
and acres of prairie. Last year
he harvested 20,000 worth of seed.

Some of these grasses are estab-
lished on his worst land. Max is
improving his land by adding hu-
mus on top and in the soil root
zone, besides a good cash crop. He
expects to explore grazing and green
crop possibilities next year.

Max says, "We haven't been uti-
lizing these grasses the way we
could. We could have been getting
lots of grazing hay off them. In
addition to our seed crop with good
monoculture." He believes that
the grasses will sustain 2 to 4 head
of cows per acre for several weeks,
which are then to be taken off in time
to prepare the seed crop.

In 1958 Max harvested 1400 bush-
els of sorghum off of 22 acres after
harvesting the sorghum.

Max has not sold any of the
grass seed this year. He estimates
a yield of over 500 lbs. Indian
grass seed per acre. (He hasn't
weighed his seeds yet.)

PRY LAND COTTON VARIETY FIELD

Ken Coffman, Morton, Texas has
a dry land farm in Leifman Com-
munity 1954 was a good year for
him on a non-irrigated farm. Ken
remembers better than 30 inches of
rainfall in late in 1954.

"I had some mighty good main
sorghum yields too. Most of my
main sorghum land was planted to
P-5 500 hybrid I planted in June 30.
I had some yields as high as 4,000
lb. per acre but my grass aver-
age was over 2500 lb. per acre on
this dry land farm. It was my first
time to plant P-5 500, but it was
recommended by the county ap-
pet."

"I think this is the best dry land
variety grain sorghum to plant &
I will stay with it next year."

IRRIGATED COTTON VARIETY

T. E. Goodham, Morton, reported
a one variety test on his farm in
1954. He planted all his allotment
to Elchmaster cotton. His report is
this:

"I planted 128 acres to Elch-
master cotton, and I produced 179
bushels of cotton averaging 500 lb.
per acre. It brought me a good
price — close to 30 cents per lb.
average."

"My machine stripped all of the
cotton except 5 bales which were
pulled by hand. My machine strip-
ped had a better turn out than my
hand pulled cotton. I planted all
my place to Elchmaster cotton-
seed in 1954 because in 1957 (not
a good year) this variety made me
more money than any other vari-
ety." The cotton was irrigated
twice.

Mr. Goodham averaged 2500 lb.
per acre of main sorghum P-5 500
hybrid planted on 40 acres.
