

Public Buying More Medical Care



Spending for medical care is now a more important part of the average American family's budget than ever before, Health Information Foundation reports.

Last year, for instance, 5.3 oper cent of the public's consumer-expenditure dollar went for hospital care, physicians' nervices, and other health items—a 40 per cent increase over the 1929 figure of 3.7 per cent.

As the chart shows, private spending for medical care is today at an all-time high. The total outlay last year (not counting government, philan-thropic, and business expenditures) came to about \$15 bil-lion, five times the total for 1929.

For this stepped-up outlay, the Foundation points out, Americans are receiving a greater quantity and variety of services, as well as vastly improved quality. From 1935 to 1956, for example, the average annual number of patient-days in general and special hospitals in the United States rose from 0.88 to 1.25. During that time the number of births that time the number of births in hospitals increased from just under 800,000 to about 3.8 mil-

lion a year.
The use of physicians' serv

ices is also on the upswing. Ir 1928-31 an annual average of 2.6 out-of-hospital doctor visits was reported by white persons in this country, against a figure of 4.8 in 1957 for the entire population. In the same period the proportion of persons see-ing a physician at least once a year climbed from 48 to 63 per cent.

"In the past," says the Foundation, "pain, disability, and serious illness could be faced at relatively little expense simply because there was rela-tively little that could be done for a sick person. Now pain and disability can often be avoided and death greatly post-poned—but at the cost of more

poned—but at the cost of more visits to physicians, more admissions to hospitals, more use of drugs and other treatments."

Medical care, H.I.F. adds, "is now becoming a more important part of the American standard of living, while as an 'industry' it is becoming a more important part of the American economy."

New Hospital For Southwest ls Announced

modern combined diagnostic clinic and hospital, this \$10,000,-600 building project has been announced by the board of the Scott and White Memorial Hospital of Temple, Texas, It will provide 279 beds and facilities for 50,000 clinic and hospital patients annually. An innovation for care of the critically ill will be a special observation unit on each hospital floor. A nursing station will be surrounded by a circle of 12 private rooms, where all patients will be under constant observation within a few steps of the nurses. This, it was said, will improve service for many of the critically

Four hospital bed floors in the shape of a cross (A) and two clinic floors (B) rise above the first two floors and basement, which contain diagnostic and research laboratories, surgical and therapies and other jointly used facilities. A Nurses Residence (C) will help meet the shortage of nurses in the Southwest by increasing student nurse enrollment from 60 to 85. The structure marked (D) is a future building for educational purposes.

The consulting architects, Ellerbe and Company of St. Paul, Minnesota, designed the new Mayo Clinic and specialize in planning combined diagnostic clinic and hospital facilities. Architectural working plans will be prepared by Wyatt C. Hedrick of Fort Worth.

Jay A. Phillips, of Houston, Chairman of the Scott and White Board of Trustees, said that the target date for starting construction is June 1, 1960. "We already have upward of \$1,000,000 and are aiming at raising the balance over the next year and a half. As a non-profit institution Scott and White serves patients from all parts of the Southwest. This new center will be of tremendous benefit in providing people of moderate means throughout our region with a high quality of diagnosis and treatment at a reasonable cost "
