






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

Based on the average speed of a burcau employee with work speed of a man who has to meet a payroll and also pay taxes, it seems logical to assume his 70 day of work is matched by at least 140 days of work in government bureaus.

Thus, it seems logical that some 210 days of what should be productive work is tied up in forms.

It seems impossible to estimate the value of these hours in productive work. But 210 days is productive work. But 210 days is about the number of school days in a year. Now if a competent dairy hand spent those 210 taking care of cows, he would produce about 378,000 gallons of milk.

This would give over 6,000,000 school children a bottle of milk every day at lunch for a year.
