

Mid-Year Deposits Set Record Here

By now, many residents of the Friona area have either traded in full books of "Yes" Stamps for merchandise or have opened savings accounts with the stamps at Friona State Bank. Shoppers are thus finding it convenient to redeem the stamps without leaving Friona. And -- if they want the money in savings, they get a bonus of 50 cents per book -- almost a 10 per cent bonus. Those starting savings accounts are thinking of all sorts of ways to use the accounts as they grow through the years -- all the way from Christmas gifts to education funds.

When the program was first started, we urged both the shoppers and the merchants giving the stamps to give the program a fair trial.

We have visited with several who are pleased with the Yes stamps, and who appreciate the program instigated by the nine Friona merchants.

However, some of the merchants apparently are holding back the program by still offering two kinds of stamps, rather than "phasing out" their old stamps. As of this writing, only one of the stores which was giving another stamp, Allen's Jewelry, has stopped giving his former stamp.

This is the commendable and forward-thinking approach, we believe. It really is the only fair approach, as concerns the businesses which were not giving stamps at all prior to taking the "Yes" program.

"Yes" Stamps will pump back some \$20,000 into the local economy for every \$1,000,000 given in stamps. The amount could even be more, due to double-stamp days at grocery stores giving the stamps.

However, it will require the interest of cooperating merchants as well as shoppers so that the community will get the full benefit from the stamps.

A good feature of "Yes" stamps is the fact that the stamps are redeemed locally.

This addition to the local economy is just like having additional payroll in the amount of money redeemed. Since every dollar spent locally changes hands an average of six times, this could be a big boon to the local economy.

As stated, a good feature of "Yes" stamps is the fact that the stamps are redeemed locally. When you consider that when a shopper makes a trip to a stamp redemption store, she usually combines it with additional shopping, this is even more important to local businesses.

Someone said that even the merchants not giving Yes Stamps should appreciate this aspect of the program -- more money for spending locally.

The program really has a lot of merit, and we hope that those shoppers who have started saving the Yes Stamps will continue with it, to have the thrill of spending them as money, or depositing them in the bank.

Deposits at Friona State Bank were at an all-time high for mid-year, according to the June 30 report issued the past week by the bank.

The bank's deposits on June 30 stood at \$7,818,933.51, which was an increase of 24.2 per cent over the \$6,293,161.48 figure which it reported for the same date in 1967. Assets at the bank were listed

at \$8,553,148.62, an increase of 22.8 per cent over the \$6,967,972.65 for the comparable date a year earlier.

Charles E. Allen, bank vice president, credited the many phases of the cattle industry with the good showing of the mid-year statement. "Then, too, the addition of several new accounts brought about by these cattle-oriented industries haven't hurt the totals," Allen

said. It was the first time for a mid-year statement to top the eight-million-dollar mark in total assets.

All departments which fluctuate showed nice gains over the statement of a year earlier. Loans were up \$424,221.96, from \$5,026,759.66 to \$5,450,981.62. Demand deposits were up,

from \$4,021,081.72 to \$5,237,266.64. Time and savings deposits increased, from \$1,812,369.31 to \$2,139,020.21.

The average of total deposits for the 15 calendar days ending with the call date stood at \$7,712,409.85, up from \$6,083,273.36 for the same period in 1967.

This good bank report speaks well for the general condition of the Friona area.

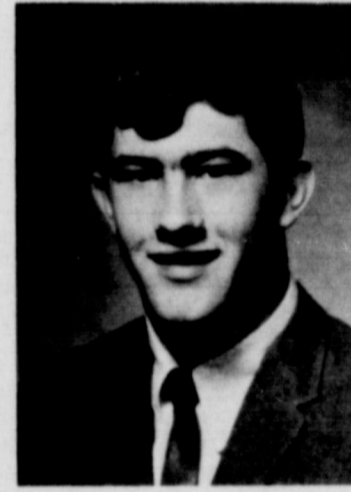

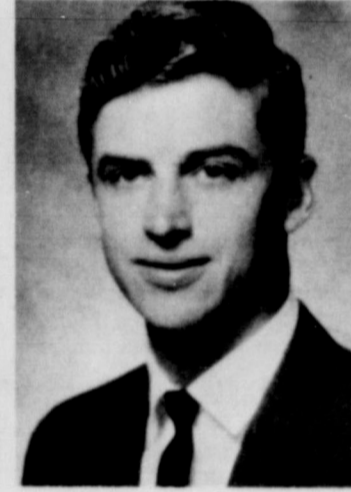

Merchants Adopt Two New Projects

The Friona Association of Retail Merchants adopted two new projects, and elected new officers during its meeting last Thursday at the Farmer House Restaurant.

The group discussed plans for a "Visit Friona Stores" promotion, outlined by Chamber of Commerce Manager Ted Weaver, whereby Friona shoppers can become eligible for nice, free prizes, at no cost or obligation, simply by visiting Friona stores. Details of this promotion are being worked out, and will be announced in the near future.

Object of the promotion is to get Friona residents and shoppers to visit all, or as many,

establishments in Friona as possible, to acquaint them with the many services available locally, some of which they may not be aware of.

Secondly, the group voted to sponsor a "most courteous employee of the month" award, to be given monthly to the Friona employee judged most courteous by a secret committee.

Monthly award winners could serve as nominees for the Chamber of Commerce's annual "most courteous employee" award, should the chamber desire to use them as such.

A travelling plaque was at first proposed, but members voted to award a permanent-

engraved plaque to each monthly winner.

Chuck Everitt, manager of Pantera Tire & Supply, was elected president of the organization, replacing Bill Ellis, editor of the Friona Star. Kenneth Williams, owner of Friona's new Ben Franklin store, was elected vice-president, replacing Leland Hutson of White Auto, and Wesley Foster, owner of Foster's Dry Goods, was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

The group sponsors several shopper appreciation events each year, including the annual Christmas drawings in December.

Tax Rate Announced, Teachers Employed

The tax rate for the Friona Independent School District was kept at \$1.50 per \$100.00 valuation at the annual board meeting with the equalization board last Saturday.

The rate has been in effect the past three years. The tax roll for 1968-69 will amount to \$27,491,202, an increase of \$934,755 over the 1967-68 roll. A tentative budget of \$805,268.00 for the 1968-69 school year was adopted. This is an increase of \$27,178.00 over the past year's budget.

Five new teachers were hired by the board, leaving two positions unfilled at the present time. Needed are two teachers in high school, for science and Spanish.

Employed were Don L. Phillips, distributive education and Industrial Cooperative Training; Mrs. Glenn Phillips, high school English; Mrs. Steve Bavousett, special education; Mrs. Barbara Barnes and Mrs. Jeanne Moseley, elementary school. Phillips comes to Friona from Hereford, where he taught

the past five years. Mrs. Phillips previously taught in Glasscock County. Mrs. Bavousett taught in Hereford. Mrs. Moseley taught in Happy, and Mrs. Barnes is from Westboro, Mo.

In other action, substitute teacher pay was increased from \$10 to \$15 per day. Superintendent Farr reported that the boiler in the junior high building has been repaired as recommended by the boiler inspector.

Farr announced that school will start on August 28, with enrollment of high school and junior high pupils on August 27. Labor Day will be a school holiday.

Chamber Reports Slow Reaction To Request

Chamber of Commerce president Charles Allen reports only scattered reaction to his letter of last week soliciting additional dues to underwrite the Chamber's program of work.

"I've had only about six replies to the letter. I had hoped for a greater expression of interest. Chamber members need to realize that it takes money to carry on a full-scale program of work, including a chamber manager," Allen said. The chamber president pointed out that it had been a more costly year than usual to this point, partly because of expenses surrounding the openhouse for Missouri Beef Packers in April.

"Any kind of program costs money. However, it takes other type of support as well as financial," Allen added.

The chamber was without a manager this week as Ted Weaver moved to Slaton over the weekend. Beginning this week, the Chamber office at 111 Sixth Street was being manned by the office secretary, Mrs. Glenn Gipson.

The Friona Chamber of Commerce hopes to hire a manager in the near future, but in order to do so, members will need to respond by paying additional dues. In his letter, Allen pointed out that the chamber needed about double the amount of money which it had been receiving each year in order to carry on its program.

Allen pointed out that in 1952 the chamber hired a manager

for \$250 per month. "However, living expenses have increased since then, and it takes more money to operate. Some of our dues have not increased proportionately," he concluded.

TEC Office To Open Earlier

Fred Jackson, manager of Friona's Texas Employment Commission office, announced this week that the office would begin opening at 6 a.m. in order to better serve farmers needing farm hands.

The TEC office, which opened here in mid-March, has continually been among the top offices in the Amarillo district each month for agricultural placements, referrals and interviews.

The service is a free one to farmers and merchants alike, and Jackson urges Friona area residents to call or visit his office.

Pause And Reflect

TOPEKA, KAN. . . Perhaps this should be entitled "Notes from the Prairie Frowler."

Our journey up the Santa Fe trail led us into the lovely little city of Lyons Kansas. Here we had an enjoyable visit with Mr. Horace Jones. We have been corresponding with Mr. Jones for about a year but had never met him.

He and his wife made us welcome and we learned that his latest book on Kansas history, that of Rice County in particular, will be off the presses this fall.

Mr. Jones, until his retirement, was editor of the Lyons Daily News, a position he held for many years.

He has for more than forty years fought for civil improvement and is gratified to see many of his theories put into practice. Not the least of his crusades was for the establishment of a local museum.

We visited this museum which is housed on the first floor of the county courthouse.

Today it is an object of pride to the entire community and in the tomorrows it will bring pleasure and provide education to the future citizens of Lyons and vicinity.

From Lyons to Topeka we pass through the area known as the Flint Hills.

This is a land of high rolling prairie with a natural stand of two varieties of blue stem grass.

In general this "pasture" is 60 miles wide and runs from northern Kansas into Oklahoma. More than a million cattle graze it every year.

The Santa Fe trail runs eastward through this area and to the pioneers must have looked like the promised land.

Scouts and professional wagon masters knew when they were nearing the present site of Topeka.

At the southwestern edge of town a high lonely hill stands sentinel.

For centuries this place was used as a ceremonial meeting place for the Kansa, or Kaw, Indians.

Up its steep side a long stairway of huge stones slabs had been built.

The top was at one time laid smooth with sand stone flags, but lack of care and the ravages of time have reduced them to an uneven rubble.

This hill, known today as Burnett's Mound, played a very important role in Topeka's recent history -- that is, if you believe in Indian legends.

Years ago the Indians gave up the area to the palefaces with the understanding that the sacred hill would not be commercialized.

For more than 100 years the agreement was honored -- then the white man's greed overcame his caution.

Bulldozers leveled a spot on the northeast shoulder, just below the crest, and a low profile steel water tank was built.

About the time it was completed, the Gods of the ancient Indians became angry and to show their displeasure at the white man's action they made good the threat that if the treaty was ever broken a mighty storm would destroy the paleface treaty.

At 7:02 p.m., June 8, 1966, the residents of Topeka Kansas were alerted to a tornado.

At 7:15 the twister roared over Burnett's Mound and entered the city.

A few minutes later a swath 4 blocks wide and 8 miles long lay almost completely devastated in the city alone. Altogether the path of destruction ran 22 miles.

Damage was in excess of 100 million dollars, 17 persons lost their lives, 550 were injured and hundreds of homes were destroyed.

The ratio of killed and injured to the vast financial damage was very low and credit for this is given to a sound plan of warning and to the public's knowledge of just what to do and where to go in case of a tornado.

We know of no threat of Indian curses hanging over Friona but the fact remains that we are subject to twisters during certain seasons.

Several weeks ago we advocated a plan of "share a shelter-- save a life."

Texas DPS Needs More Young Men

The Texas Department of Public Safety is trying to recruit 200 men for patrolmen. Men need to be between the ages of 20 and 25, at least 5 ft, 8 in. tall, in good physical condition and with a good background.

Men selected will be sent four months to training school at Austin Law Enforcement Academy beginning July 30. Salary while in school will be \$500 per month and upon graduation will be raised to \$500 per month.

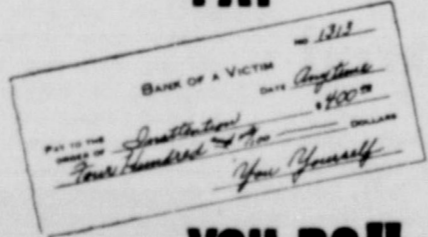



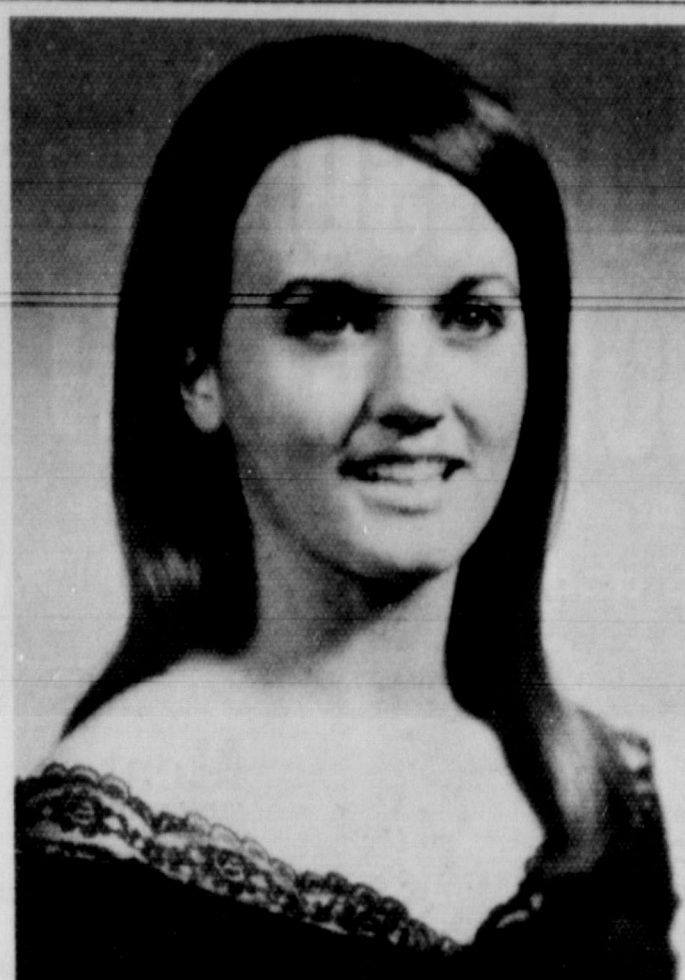

Gains already made in the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program are in jeopardy each day unless every producer checks his livestock every day, and treats all wounds, man-made or otherwise. Larvae of all sizes should be collected from wounds and sent to the Mission, Texas, screwworm laboratory for positive identification. Vials for mailing may be secured from the County Agent's office in Farwell.

Livestock producers, wildlife enthusiasts and owners of household pets should give the program their full support in the critical summer and fall months.

Program officials think the situation is worse than in 1963, a high case year when the program was a year old. They believe the infestation is at least four times as great as reported cases indicate, and they are concerned about second and third generation fertile screwworm flies in counties that have not yet reported a 1968 screwworm case.

This is no time for complacency or indifference. Texas has had 823 confirmed cases this year, and additional cases are expected.

Producers can help halt the screwworm outbreaks by observing good management practices, such as treating all wounds on animals particularly in shearing, castrating and

dehorning with materials recommended for screwworms on the label; and by following routine livestock spraying programs, again using materials that are recommended.

In case of screwworm outbreaks, all producers of the area are encouraged to spray their herds, inspect, and if possible, spray all animals prior to movement. Be sure and remove any wounded animals from the shipment.

MIDGE SURVEY -- Norris Daniels, entomologist with the Bushland Experiment Station, was through Parmer County last Friday making his first midge survey for this year. Daniels collected Johnson-grass heads from various locations in the County. These heads will be observed closely for midge hatching.

Daniels also observed two or three fields for the corn leaf aphid and greenbug infestation. Most fields in the county have these insects present but Daniels did not recommend a spray program.

DIAGNOSTIC WORKSHOP A diagnostic workshop will be held at the South Plains Reserve and Extension Center in Lubbock, August 1.

The purpose of this workshop is primarily to permit visual observation of symptoms caused by nutrient deficiencies, herbicides, physical conditions, diseases and nematodes.

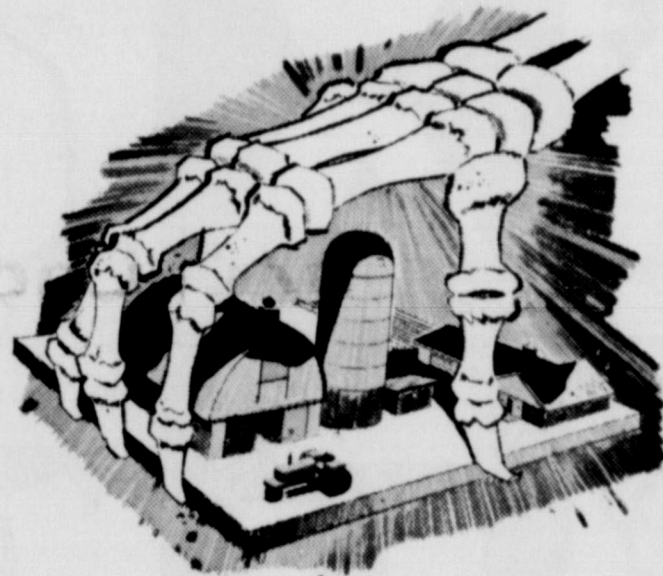
