When wheat marketing quotas are in effect, farmers who comply with their individual farm wheat acreage allotments may market their entire wheat crop without penalty and are eligible for price support of at least 75 per cent of parity. A grower who exceeds his allotment will be subject to marketing quota penalties on his excess wheat except that any grower may produce up to 15 acres for harvest as grain without penalty.

If more than one-third of the voters cast a ballot for no quota controls, they do not take effect and there are no restrictions on wheat marketings. Price support is available at 50 percent of parity to farmers who comply with their acreage allotments.

Any farmer is eligible to vote who expects to produce more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain in 1960.

Voting will be at the County ASC Office, and polls will be open from 8:00 A.M. until 6 P.M.



COLLEGE STATION - Mark ting quotas for the 1960 wheat rop were proclaimed on June 1 by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson, This seventh sucressive proclaimation of whea marketing quotas is required by a wheat supply that is 99.6 per-cent above the normal supply

The Texas share of the 1960 lotment will be 4,092,251 acres, thich is nearly 7,000 acres less han the 1959 allotment of 4,099,

Benson proclaimed a national theat acrease allotment of 55 million acres, the mnimum perlitted by law, announced State shares of the national allotment. He also set July 23rd 1959 as mine producer approval or dis pproval of quotas and annour ed a 89 state commercial and 10 state non commercial wheat roducing area for 1959.

ng quotas, under the proclaim tion announced June 1, the nat nal average support price avan the basis of the present sup ly of wheat and present legis ation, the legal minimum wheat upport price for the 1960 crop rould be at 75 per cent of parity. Individual farm mark eting quotas will be the norma production or the actual produc ion from the farm acreage alotment, which is even larger.

The 1960 national wieat acreage allotment of 55 million acres is the minimum fixed by the law and is the same as for the 1958 crop. If the allotments had been determined soley on the basis of the law's supply formula, the 1960 allotment would have been

WHEREAS, The figricultural ndustry, which includes both fa most important single industry in tire economy of this State; and-

WHEREAS, There is within Texas a real and a constant shortge of domestic labor required perform the work incident to gricultural production and reruitment of labor, both from other areas within the United! States and from Mexico is required to secure the production that our State is capable of and which is essential not only to all of the United States and to the people of the world; and ---

WHEREAS, The State has by law established and maintained a State agency for the purpose of assisting agricultural producers to recruit such labor, and such agency is not only capable but actually has done a most effective and helpful service through out the years; and -

WHEREAS, The Federal Govrnment, through the United States Department of Labor has ssummed complete control over ill problems relating to the re-

WHEREAS, The Federal Govind, in doing so, has virtually strpped the State of Texas and all other individual States of all authority in such recruitment and said Department of Labor is now proposing new regulations that would further weaken and subjugate the State agencies and add to the already too great powers of the Federal Government, and -

WHEREAS, The policies and egulations of the Department of Labor, dealing with recruited labor have practically extinguished the individual and personal rights of employers and employees to mutually agree upon the terms of employment which result is most undemocratic and un-Amercan; and

WHEREAS, The Federal Gornment, through the United States Department of Labor, has o conducted the matter of utilizing foreign labor from Mexico that it has become impractical and uneconomical for Texas agricultural employers to avail themselves of this source of willing labor that desires and always has desired to work in Texas; and .

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

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
