



The result will also give a greater yield per acre than the straight row system of farming. Not only will crop yields be increased but precious top soil will be retained in its proper pla-

by the rain water to low places and lakes. Terraces will also prevent gully erosion.

For a terrace system to do the ob right it must be well planned and all terraces must be properly spaced according to the slope of the land. Terraces spaced oo wide apart will have too much water standing against them and will result in water running over the top as well as being unable o sufficiently stop sheet erosion.

Terraces must also be built wide enough so that present day farm equipment can be used to
