LABOR VOTE GAINING STRENGTH IN TEXAS LEGISLATURE, REP. BOWERS POINTS OUT

Rep. Bob Bowers, Brownfield, spoke to the members and guests of the Morton Lions Club Wednesday noon at their regular weekly luncheon, listing what the state AFL - CIO organization considers the most pertinent issues to come before the recent session of the state legislature.

Bowers, admitting that he secured only three of what the labor group termed "good" or "right" votes on their major issues, and remarking that Sen. Preston Smith's record was similar, said he felt the growing strength of the group bears close watching.

He said the group gained some 15 members of the House when the session opened this year and numbers some 50 to 60 votes.

"We have a tendency in West Texas," he said, "where the labor movement is not so strong, to underestimate the power of this group."

He noted that Michigan's Governor G. Mennen "Soapy" Williams is to be the speaker to the AFL - CIO meeting in Texas.

The major pieces of the legislation which the AFL - CIO deemed so important, most of which were roundly defeated, included:

An employment insurance bill, a bill seeking more freedom of expression for employees; a minimum wage law for Texas; fireman and policeman's wage and hour bill; a bill on bus drivers' rights; a workman's compensation bill; a state employee's pay raise bill; several tax issues; and the party registration bill which was passed and goes into effect this coming election year.

Rep. Bowers answered questions from the floor, and both he and Sen. Preston Smith, who was also a club guest, said if a tax bill were needed, they favor a sales tax as the fairest tax.

Quizzed about the holdup on Hale - Aiken legislation for teachers benefits and education improvement; Bowers said he thought the major holdup was lack of funds. He said he felt the legislation would not have passed if it had been voted on during the last session, but he felt that it would pass in a special session, if one were called.

He said about 1,300 bills were introduced at the legislative session.

Other guests at the luncheon included men associated with Shell Oil Company, guests of G. D. Edgar and Bill Glassford, Morton. One new member, A. A. Fralin, was recognized.

It was announced the Lions director's meeting, slated for next Tuesday morning, would instead be held Wednesday morning, during the American Legion Veterans' Day breakfast.

GUILTY PLEAS DRAW 2 YEARS PROBATION

Two pleas of guilty were heard in 121st District Court here Monday, as two men charged with saddle-theft were placed on probation.

District Attorney Morgan Copeland said Monday, Danny Michael Sealey and Kenneth Earl Myers, both of O'Donnell, were placed on probation for two years after entering guilty pleas.

They stole a saddle from the Middleton Ranch, 10 miles south of Whiteface, on Wednesday, August 5th.

Texas Rangers arrested the pair in Lubbock the following Saturday. The saddle belonged to Garden Swanner, foreman of the ranch.

Is Injured In Lubbock Mishap

45 PERCENT OF CROP IS OPEN 13,300 Bales Ginned, Is TEC Report

Crop ginning in Cochran County, listed at 22 per cent harvested and 45 per cent open, was listed at 13,302 bales, as of the latest Texas Employment Commission ginning report released this week and received at the Tribune office Wednesday.

The report runs about a week to 10 days behind the actual figures. About 17,000 bales would be a close up to date estimate of bales ginned.

The total crop estimate is still 60,000 bales and crop condition is listed as good.

BARGAIN SALES HELP BUDGET

Sociologists have a kind word for the homemaker who hunts carefully for bargains.

In many cases, they claim, she can save her family as much money as the wife with an outside job can earn.

Working wives don't have time to hunt bargains. Their net earnings are cut sharply by taxes, transportation costs, meals in restaurants, and clothing upkeep.

MONEY SAVING TIPS

The winner will probably play Dimmitt, and if they get through that bi-district game, they would in all likelihood meet Floydada (a team already ticketed for District 2-AA next year).

Both of these 1-AA and 3-AA powers have played Olton and the Mustangs were roundly defeated in these games. And, as you'll recall, Olton whitewashed Morton, 26 to 0.

REMOVE WHITE SPOTS ON FURNITURE

Moisture, heat and alcohol, (from perfume, of course) often leaves ugly white spots on finished surfaces of furniture. These can be quickly and easily removed, according to our Home Management Specialists.

Supplies are simple... you will need a pad of 3/0 steel wool, a lightweight oil, such as mineral oil, lemon or paraffin oil and FFFF powdered pumice.

Sprinkle or dust the powdered pumice lightly over the white spot. Dip the steel wool pad into the oil. Rub lightly with grain of wood until the spot disappears. Repeat process if necessary.

Dust the entire surface with the pumice and rub with the oiled steel wool pad to prevent a spotty appearance. If the surface feels gritty, add a few drops of oil to a dry cloth and go over the surface.

NEW WAYS WITH VEGETABLE OIL

Place ten - ounce package of frozen asparagus in a 1 - quart baking dish. Add 2 tablespoons of butter or margarine, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/8 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon celery seeds and 1 tablespoon lemon juice. Cover and bake at 350 degrees F. for one hour.

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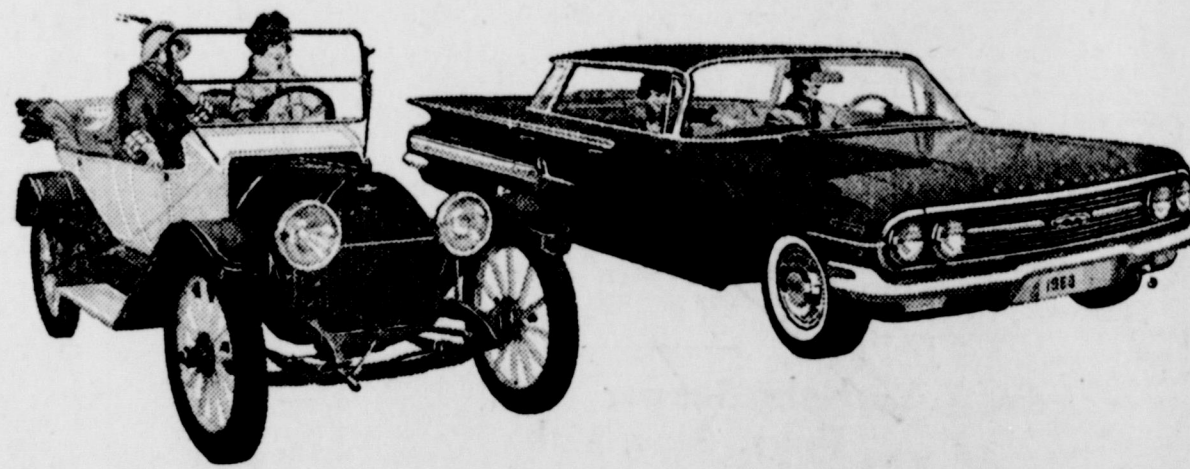

SENATOR ☆☆☆ Yarborough's Report

Word from the Presidents and other administrators of some 20 Texas colleges indicates the new National Defense Education Act student loan program is helping hundreds of Texas boys and girls attend college.

As a member of the U. S. Senate Education subcommittee and a co author of this law, it is naturally gratifying to me that the program is sound and workable.

It is the program passed during 1958 to help assure that a higher number of our deserving and qualified students, particularly those with science aptitudes, can complete their college training.

At this time, some 50 Texas colleges and universities are participating in the loan plan, and Texas students have already been loaned more than \$3 million to help them attend college.

Let me quote you excerpts from some of the letters leading Texas college officials have written about the student loan plan.

One said: " . . . I think this program is the best yet devised to help meet a serious problem facing our young people who are seeking higher education."

Another administrator wrote: " . . . the loans are definitely of great value to our students, particularly since they have been faced this year by a necessary one third raise in tuition . . . The demand for loans became so great that we asked for (and received) an additional allocation.

One educator described the program as "a great blessing . . . to worthy students who would not be able to continue their education without such assistance . . ."

Some of the institutions participating and their loan allocation for the current school term

include: Howard Payne College at Brownwood, \$42,500; University of Houston, \$205,000; Lamar State College of Technology at Beaumont, \$14,515; Prairieview Agricultural and Mechanical College, \$17,433; University of Texas, \$174,600; Texas A & M College, \$90,600; St. Mary's University, San Antonio, \$26,300; Tarleton State College at Stephenville, \$8,500; Mid Western University at Wichita Falls, \$14,400; Texas Christian University, \$84,000; Sacred Heart Dominican College at Houston, \$9,400; Texas Tech, \$135,000; Abilene Christian College, \$55,300; Arlington State College, \$24,370; and Baylor University, \$174,100.

The only major disappointment I have with the program is that the Board of Regents of Texas State Teachers Colleges have not yet voted to let students in their schools participate. This, despite the fact that a total student loan need of \$140,923 was shown in state teachers colleges last year.

The students being denied this educational loan help are those at East Texas State College of Commerce, Sam Houston State Teachers College at Huntsville, Sul Ross State Teachers College at Alpine, Southwest State Teachers College at San Marcos, and Stephen F. Austin State College at Nacogdoches.

It is my hope that the State Teachers College Board of Regents soon will recognize that the student loan is a sound program, and that they vote to let their students participate.

THINK SAFETY DURING HUNTING SEASON
