Pumpkins keep quite well ored in a cool dry place. It ich storage is lacking pumpkin be canned or frozen. Pumpkin pics freeze quite sucessfully. Use your favorite re ipe, but use spices lightly, es pecially cloves, because they may bitter and discolor frozen filling

Do not freeze lattice top pies. Do not cut steam vents in top crust of unbaked pies until pies are removed from freezer. Cut steam vents just before baking. When freezing baked pies, precare as usual and cool thoroughly before wrapping. Wrap pies in moisture - vapor proof material and seal. Cover with a paper plate and place in stockinette of pa per box for added protection. Aliminum foil plates are cellent for freezing pies. BAKED PUMPKIN


