

According to figures of the Department of Public Safety, 57.1 per cent of all Behind '58 Crop drivers will fall in that group. But when you get your first licket, then the penalty starts. You lose all your credit with one ticket. A second ticket, or one accident without any tickets, brings 20 per cent penalty.
