New Mexico Approves Road

County Judge Glenn Thompson said this week, in addition to the highway projects slated for Cochran County, which includes paving from the state line 1.8 miles west of Bledsoe to Bledsoe, a new paved road, that the State of New Mexico Highway Department had approved paving for a road in New Mexico that will connect with the Texas road.

The project, worked out in a meeting of county officials and officials from the two highway departments, was planned last spring. Construction is to start soon on both roads.

Garden Club Announces Rules for Annual Christmas Lighting Contest

Members of the Cochran County Garden Club, who again this year are sponsoring the Christmas Lighting and Decorating Contest, are urging everyone who plans to enter, to turn in their entries as soon as possible.

The only change in this year's plans, over those of last year, is the special award for the Christmas, religious theme.

There will be an entry fee of 50 cents for each division in the home lighting contest and \$1 for each business location entry. All entries should be turned in by Friday, December 18 and the judging is to be held in the early evening of Monday, December 21.

Plaques will be awarded for first place in each division. There are six divisions in the judging which is open to anyone interested, though Garden Club members enter in the contest as part of their year's Garden Club work.

The best business decoration is for overall Christmas decoration of any separate business establishment, all entered in one division.

For the homes, these contests are available: Most beautiful window decoration; most beautiful door decoration; most beautiful overall decoration of the home (must cover at least two-thirds of the front of the house); most unusual decoration; and for the theme of Christ in Christmas (a religious theme) there will be a special division and award.

Those interested in entering the contest should turn in their entries to Mrs. R. J. Hill, or any member of the Garden Club. The club urges everyone to enter, and urges folks planning to enter to let the club know as soon as possible so they can have an idea of the number of entries to expect.

With Your... COUNTY AGENT

During the year 1959 the following work was done by the County Agricultural Agent of Cochran County: Eight hundred and sixteen farm and home visits were made. There were 1224 office calls and 952 telephone calls requesting information. The agent prepared 91 news columns and appeared on a television station in Amarillo once and had 9 radio programs over a Lubbock station. A total of 3029 Extension bulletins were distributed by the Agricultural Agent.

Thirty five adult result demonstrations were conducted.

Ten training meetings were held with adult attendance of 248. These meetings were on cotton production, rat control, County Program Building, Soil conservation and management, Johnson grass control, swine, beef cattle, and tax management including labor problems and social security. The agent held 33 training meetings for 4-H members and 4-H adult leaders with attendance of 842. These meetings were on entomology training, rifle safety, farm and home safety, tractor maintenance, leadership, swine production and recreation training.

Local leaders held 20 other meetings with adult attendance of 360; and 4-H leaders held 44 other 4-H Club meetings with attendance of 710.

The agent attended 57 other adult meetings with attendance of 3821 and 53 other 4-H members. During the year there were 251 boys enrolled in 4-H Clubs and of this number 245 completed demonstrations.

To get a brief picture of their activities, 15 members were enrolled in grain sorghum, 24 in cotton, 22 in gardening and vegetables, 2 in range, 31 in soil and water conservation, 8 in nature and wildlife, 15 in poultry, 21 in dairy and beef cattle, 2 in lambs, 45 in swine, 89 in entomology, 82 in tractor maintenance, and safety, 24 in electricity, 80 in safety and first aid, and 72 in 4-H Rifle safety and shooting.

These programs are selected by the boys, parents and leaders. What makes a most worthwhile program is the local leadership. Many of these programs would have been much less effective, had it not been for the interest and drive of local leaders. The Extension Agent, boys and parents give a big thanks to the 4-H

Costly Fire Levels Seed House of County Line Gin, Friday Afternoon

A costly seed house fire, which came only a few days before the ginning season would have been completed, brought the heaviest fire loss of the season to the County Line Gin, northeast of Morton, Friday afternoon.

The blaze, at the gin owned by Leo Ruzicka, destroyed the seed house completely with an estimated several thousand pounds of seed.

It also completely destroyed a large trailer loaded with bales of cotton, but no overall estimate of the loss was available.

The wind whipped fire, which was believed to have started from the burr pit, also burned cottonseed all around the seedhouse, and, for a time, threatened to destroy the gin, according to local firemen who went to help battle the blaze.

blaze with the aid of two pump-trucks, several hoses from city hydrants, and several boxes in the gin. The loss was considered light.

A group of some 30 - 40 trailers in the gin yard was moved twice to escape possibility of being a target for the blowing trash.

CHRISTMAS GIFTS FROM YOUR KITCHEN

Homemade fruit cakes, cookies, candies and other food items make Christmas gifts with a "built in" personal touch that's always appreciated.

Start now to check your Christmas list and make plans to include some gifts from your kitchen. Here are some suggestions from our Extension Foods and Nutrition Specialists of Texas, A & M College:

One pound fruit cakes and larger decorated cakes with candied fruits and nuts — wrapped in cellophane.

A box of homemade jams, preserves or jellies put in uniform jars and wrapped in holiday attire.

Special yeast breads — tea rings, Jule Kaza and loaves of bread attractively wrapped.

Loaf of banana nut bread. Cookies or candy packed in decorative tins or gaily wrapped boxes.

Bottles of homemade salad dressing.

Gala popcorn balls, wrapped in bright cellophane and tied

with ribbon for children. Wooden bowls with Texas pecans and a nut cracker.

A Mexican basket filled with colorful fruits.

Canned chicken or other meats from your pantry shelf — homemade sandwich spreads in little pottery jars.

BANANA NUT BREAD

1/2 cup shortening
1 cup corn syrup
2 eggs, beaten
2 cups sifted enriched flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup mashed bananas
1 cup chopped nuts

Cream together shortening and corn syrup. Add eggs, beat until light and fluffy. Sift together flour, baking powder, and salt, add to creamed mixture alternately with bananas. Mix well. Add nuts. Pour into greased loaf pan, 4 1/2 x 9 1/2 inches. Bake in moderate oven 350 degrees F., 1 hour and 15 minutes. Yield: 1 loaf.

TWO MILLION TEXANS AMONG THOSE MAKING PLANS FOR WHITE HOUSE YOUTH CONFERENCE NEXT YEAR

Nearly 2,000,000 Texans — old and young alike — have joined in preparation for the 1960 White House Conference on Children and Youth.

Every decade, during this century, a White House Conference has been called in behalf of the nation's young people. The first one was called by President Theodore Roosevelt and resulted in the enactment of child welfare legislation. In each decade that followed, a White House Conference on children and youth left its mark in meeting problems of young people.

Purpose of the 1960 Conference, called by President Eisenhower, is "to promote opportunities for children and youth to realize their full potential for a creative life in freedom and dignity."

The Golden Anniversary Conference will concern itself with the effects of our rapidly changing world on the development of youth, and studying the factors that influence individual fulfillment.

A committee of 154 persons was named by Governor Price Daniel to coordinate local-level organizations and studies leading up to the White House Conference. Dr. Guy D. Newman, President of Howard Payne College in Brownwood, is chairman. The 116 delegates named by the Governor Committee include 100 adults and 16 youths representing various school organizations of 300,000 young people. The Texas Report to the 1960 White House Conference will result of a "clover leaf approach" through state and county committees, a special program involving junior and senior high schools, national and state organizations, and special activities and research groups. Some 181 Texas counties have participated in the preparation for the conference. These active counties have 87 per cent of the child population in the State. Dr. Newman explains that the Committee's studies were directed toward values and ideals of our society, research on changes affecting young people, and determining the availability and adequacy of educational, health, welfare and court services. Delegates to the conference will carry with them a wealth of material compiled and tabulated from state wide polls, questionnaires, research and "grass root" discussions related to problems facing Texas children and youth. Results of the extensive studies inspired the Governor's Committee to make this comment: "The ground on which the free world of democracy and the totalitarian world of communism must wage their conflict is the moral struggle in fundamentally ground of values and ideas. This a moral struggle. The free world will not win it permanently except by moral and spiritual superiority."

A. Griffin, San Angelo, member of the State Democratic Executive Committee and long time friend and supporter of Senator Lyndon Johnson.

The statewide office will be located in Austin in the Littlefield Building and will be opened in a few days.

All twenty-one of the Democratic members of the Texas House of Representatives have endorsed the Johnson for President movement. The Executive Committee will urge the formation of additional "Johnson for President" Clubs in the twenty-two Congressional Districts of Texas.

Representative George Nelson in a telegram to Speaker Rayburn, said: "Lyndon Johnson. He's my man for president."

Connally and Skelton said that Speaker Rayburn and Governor Daniel had approved the appointment of the Committee and agreed to serve as honorary co-chairmen. They said they felt the Executive Committee representatives of the unit of Texas Democrats behind Senator Lyndon B. Johnson.

"In accordance with the statements which have been made by Speaker Rayburn and Governor Daniel and the official action of the State Democratic Convention in San Antonio, we felt that we should receive solid support of Texas Democrats for the Presidential nomination, Chairman of the Democratic nominee was delegation, and the choice would be the Democratic nominee in Los Angeles and the choice of the American people for President," Skelton and Connally said in a joint statement.

"The Executive Committee presents this viewpoint and has been selected on that basis," Connally and Skelton have been assisting in the formation of Johnson for President Clubs throughout Texas.

Special Courses Available in Army For Reg. Nurses

Registered professional nurses who enter the U. S. Army Corps may take advantage of long term professional specialty courses for as long as two years duration at Army hospitals in the United States.

Professional specialty courses are available in anesthesiology, maternal and advanced operating room nursing, child health nursing, and basic nursing.

The anesthesiology course, of 32 weeks duration, is followed by a year of clinical training as a staff anesthesiologist. This course covers all aspects of anesthesiology and qualifies graduates for examination by the American Association of Nurses Anesthesiologists.

A 36 week course in advanced operating room nursing is designed to qualify nurses as operating room supervisors.

Maternal and child health nursing is a course which lasts 22 weeks. It prepares junior Army Nurse Corps officers for beginning staff duty in obstetric, pediatric or related clinics.

Basic operating room nursing prepares officers for operating room and central material ser-vices. This is 22 weeks.

Some spaces are also available in 12 professional short courses. The short courses cover such subjects as management of radio - isotope clinics, surgical nursing, and advanced orientation on medical aspects of chemical warfare.

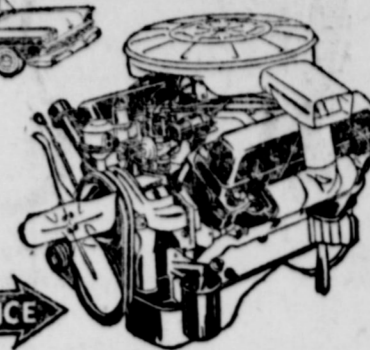
