> The most pressing need, of any program of this type, is adult le-adership. Usually the financial support can be obtained much easier than adult leadership. Because, the leadership takes time . . something adults are often prone to decide they don't have.

The coaches and managers, positions that take the most time. can be secured. But the most important needed position, is the game of the season. person who will "ram-rod" the program . . . the overall leader o will tend to the important aperwork details of league regstration, seeing that proper equipment is ordered, lining up impires, seeing that schedules are made up, and later, when it is necessary, changed to fit the situation. And this is a big job. The person who would lead can get quite a bit of help . . . but the help available, does not feel capable of leading.

Also needed, in places that really do not require as much time as one might think, but which people have a tendency to be afraid of for fear that they will take too much time, are league

For example, the league president often attends only a few me etings each year, sees that certain complaints are properly considered, signs official papers, etc. The treasurer accounts for the

money, handles the bank account, sees that bills are paid, etc. But still someone needs to take these jobs and see that they are taken care of.
