Yes, it's school time once again, and this time it hits us a little more "in person" than in other recent years. Laura, our oldest child, became a Friona first-grader, an achievement that she has desired almost as much as most people want college degrees.

The past week or 10 days developed into a "countdown" situation, finally culminating with the "blast off" day of this Tuesday.

Kinda reminds us of the "countdowns" we used to make while in school. However, seems like we were always marking time toward the end of school, rather than the beginning.

Other signs of the changing of seasons include our first norther, which rolled in a couple of weeks back; the opening of football season Friday night, and the community's Maize Days celebration, which is coming up next week.

For those of us who had big ideas about "things to do this summer" it's kinda hard to realize that all of this has gone up in smoke, just like the Fourth of July firecracker; and that we'll just have to put them off until next time around.

Coaches Don Light, Bob Owen and Cecil Maddox are very hopeful about the 1967 edition of the Friona Chieftains. Pre-season prognostications give the Chiefs little chance of battling the 4-5-1 record the team compiled in 1966.

However, you have to remember that Coach Light is the one who likes to reverse trends such as losing traditions, and pre-season rankings, etc.

Most pre-season polls have picked Friona to come out about fifth in District 3-AA competition -- something which could very well happen, even with a good team, since most district teams seem to be improved this year.

However, we think that the 1967 season will be one where given the proper breaks, Friona will be back battling for a top spot on the district ladder.

Coach Light would like nothing better than to start off with a win in the season opener Friday night. Farwell is one of only three teams to beat his teams in two consecutive years. The other two are Dalhart and Hale Center.

Coach Light holds a personal 2-2 record against the Steers, and could become the first Friona coach to beat the county rivals three times if the Chieftains could come through Friday.

Added incentive for the Chieftains is the memory of the last meeting in Friona between the two teams. That was the game which christened the new Chieftain Field. Farwell overcame a 7-0 Friona lead with a touchdown and a two-point conversion for an 8-7 victory.

In spite of daylight savings time, the busy season and all, we expect a good crowd to be on hand Friday to see if Friona can snap a two-year losing streak which Farwell has pinned on them.

Judging from the scrimmage session we saw we'd say that the 1967 Chieftains should prove to be an interesting team -- one that can be explosive at times on offense.

If the team can gird up its defensive weaknesses, then it might become more of a threat than the previously mentioned fifth-place prediction in District 3-AA.

Other areas apparently share our area's need for many more good hot days for maturing of farm plants. We were awakened by our clock radio one morning this week by the announcer saying something like this: "It's foggy, but we're hoping the sun will come out and help our corn mature." Turned out to be a station in Iowa which helped us start our day.

# Star's Football Contest Begins

The Friona Star's annual football contest begins this week, with readers of the Star getting the chance to become "armchair quarterbacks."

For the third consecutive year, the Star is offering three grand prizes for contestants who excel over the course of the 13-week contest, and come out at the top of the standings.

Once again, the grand prize will be two free tickets to the Cotton Bowl football game on New Year's Day in Dallas, along with \$40 expense money and two night's hotel reservations.

# Chieftains Host Steers To Kick Off '67 Season

The Friona High School Chieftains, with new faces filling slightly over one-half of the starting positions, will face the Farwell Steers in the opening football game of 1967 for both teams Friday at 8 p.m. at Chieftain Field.

The Chiefs who have looked good in two scrimmage sessions, will be out to snap a two-game losing streak to their county rivals, who have taken the last two contests, 8-7 and 20-7.

Friona last beat Farwell 34-7 at Farwell in 1964. The last time the two teams met in Friona was in 1965 when Farwell

spoiled the dedication game for the new Chieftain Field with the 8-7 win.

Both teams are out to improve on last season's record. Friona was 4-5-1, the worst season slate for Coach Don Light, while the Steers were 2-7, beating only Friona and Bovina.

Following Friona's scrimmage with Springlake last Friday, Coach Light said he was very pleased with the team's offense, but felt the defense needed a little polishing up.

The Chieftains have an experienced backfield, but just two of the linemen, center Ric-

key Hurst and left guard Joe Moet, were starters last year.

The starting lineup goes like this: right end - Jim Schlenker; right tackle -- Gary Shirley; right guard -- Ruben DeLeon; center -- Hurst; left guard -- Moet; left tackle -- Ronnie Stevick and left end -- Charles Hamilton.

The backfield is made up of Johnny Barker, quarterback; Tony Perea, left halfback, Eddie Barker, Larry Graves and Lowery Harper are battling for the other backfields.

On defense, the starters are DeLeon, middle guard, Shirley, or Stevick and Jay Potts, tackles; Hurst, Hamilton, ends, Moet and Perea, linebackers; corner backs - Graves and Schlenker; halfbacks - Eddie Barker and Lowery Harper, Randy Ellis will see action as a linebacker and defensive end.

The game is the 33rd meeting for the two teams since 1928, and the 19th consecutive year for Farwell and Friona to meet on the gridiron.

## Farm Tour Tuesday Kicks Off Week

The first annual Farmer County Farm tour will be held next Tuesday, beginning at 9:15 a.m. at the Friona High School Cafeteria.

Sponsors of the tour include the Friona Young Farmers Association, the Farmer County Extension Service and the Farmer County Soil Conservation Service.

The tour will be conducted on farms throughout the Farmer County area.

Persons wishing to participate in the tour are asked to meet at the Friona High School Cafeteria no later than 9:15 a.m. Tuesday.

The tour will progress as

far as Farwell by 12 noon, and will recess for lunch until 1:30 p.m.

After the noon lunch break, the tour group will meet at the Farmer County Courthouse to resume the tour. Those who cannot make the morning portion of the tour but can join the group after lunch may meet them at the Courthouse.

Included in the tour will be certified seed plots, tailwater systems, the Hi-Plains Feed Yard, Missouri Beef Packers' plant under construction, five-year fertilization plots, Farmer County Cattle Co., at Bovina and test plots on varieties of grain sorghum, soybeans and sugar beets.

## Enrollment Tops '66 Figure, Nears Record

Enrollment in Friona schools as of the first day of school on Tuesday stood at 1285 pupils, an increase of 16 over the first day's total last year, but still down slightly from the record enrollment of 1320 in 1965.

Largest increase was in high school, where 332 students enrolled. This is a record for high school, surpassing the 320 which was an all-time high last year.

Otherwise, there were 439 students enrolled in grades five through eight (junior high), compared to 435 last year. The number enrolled in the first four grades, 514, was the exact number that enrolled the first day of school last year.

"We'll pick up a few more as we go along" predicted Superintendent of Schools Alton Farr, hinting the total enrollment should surpass the 1300 figure without much trouble.

The enrollment usually grows some from the first day's registration.

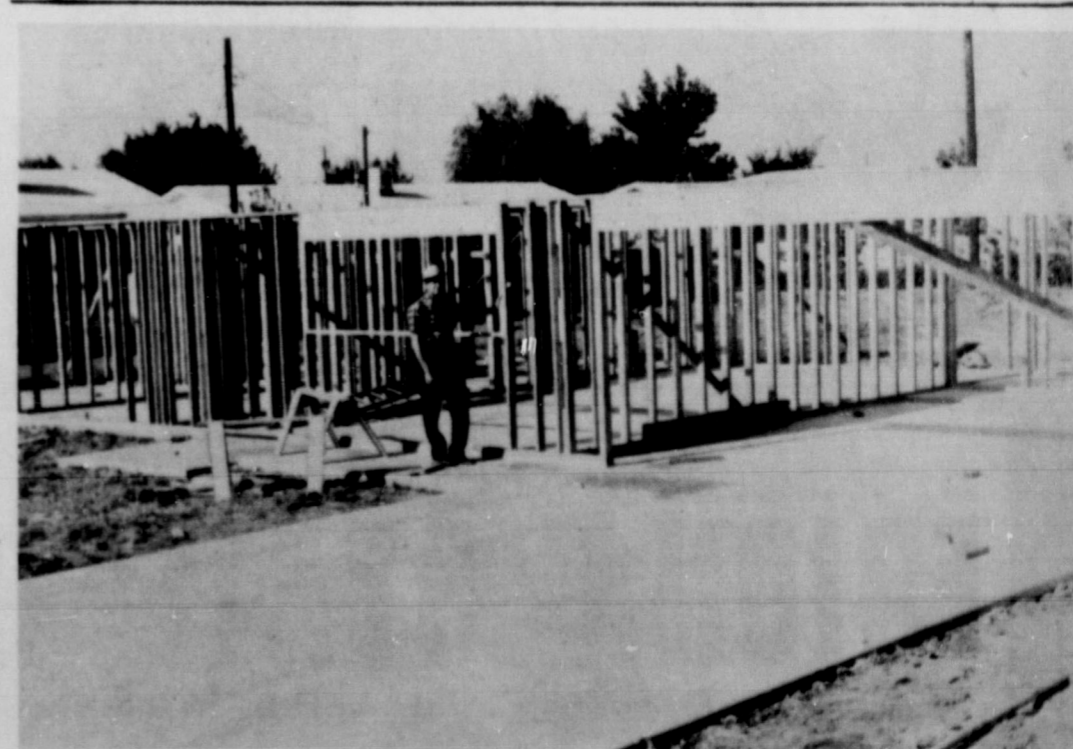

## Pause And Reflect

Sometimes we history hobbyists are teased about living in the past. One very dear friend expressed it thusly, "The reason old Nelson is so interested in rocks is because he is still living in the Stone Age!"

We know it's all in fun and are not offended. Every man to his own taste" said the old fellow as he kissed a pig. In trying to explain his interest in history, one fellow we know, put this way, "How can one tell where one is going, unless he knows where he has been?"

Historically speaking, where have we been? Part of the answer was found over Labor Day weekend in Santa Fe, New Mexico. The occasion was the 255th consecutive celebration of what the natives call "our fiesta".

Francisco Vasquez Coronado traversed the area in 1540-42 and established a headquarters just south of Santa Fe where the town of Bernalillo is now located.

Santa Fe was founded in 1609 and all went reasonably well until 1680 when the Indians revolted and drove the Spanish out. In 1692 the Spanish king, Charles, second, decided that once again Spain should rule that part of the kingdom of New Spain that we know as New Mexico. On Sept. 14 of that year Don Diego De Vargas appeared at Santa Fe to reconquer the territory.

"Our fiesta" is based on incidents relative to the return of the Spanish army.

At this point some will ask, what does all this history have to do with modern American thoughts and actions? A good question and if one will bother to look beneath the surface glitter of the pagentry, a valuable lesson can be learned.

De Vargas was more than an ordinary soldier, he was a diplomat as well. After holding a pow-wow with the Indian Chief he removed his armour and, accompanied by a priest, walked into the pueblo to prove that he came in peace.

There is fairy story ending, the did not live happily ever after, but the fact remains that men of good will can meet and settle their differences without bloodshed, arson, and pillage.

Today we live in a world aflame, our cities suffer riots, our forests burn, our water and even the very air we breathe become polluted. The entire earth is pockmarked with the scars of past and present strife.

Regardless of our personal feelings, be we Democrat, Republican, Hawk, Dove, or Eagle we should heed our Presidents Labor Day speech in which he said, "Today it is good to pause and reflect about the course we are taking; about what it means to live and work in this rich nation -- and about where we are going from this critical moment in our history."

Burial was in Friona Cemetery.

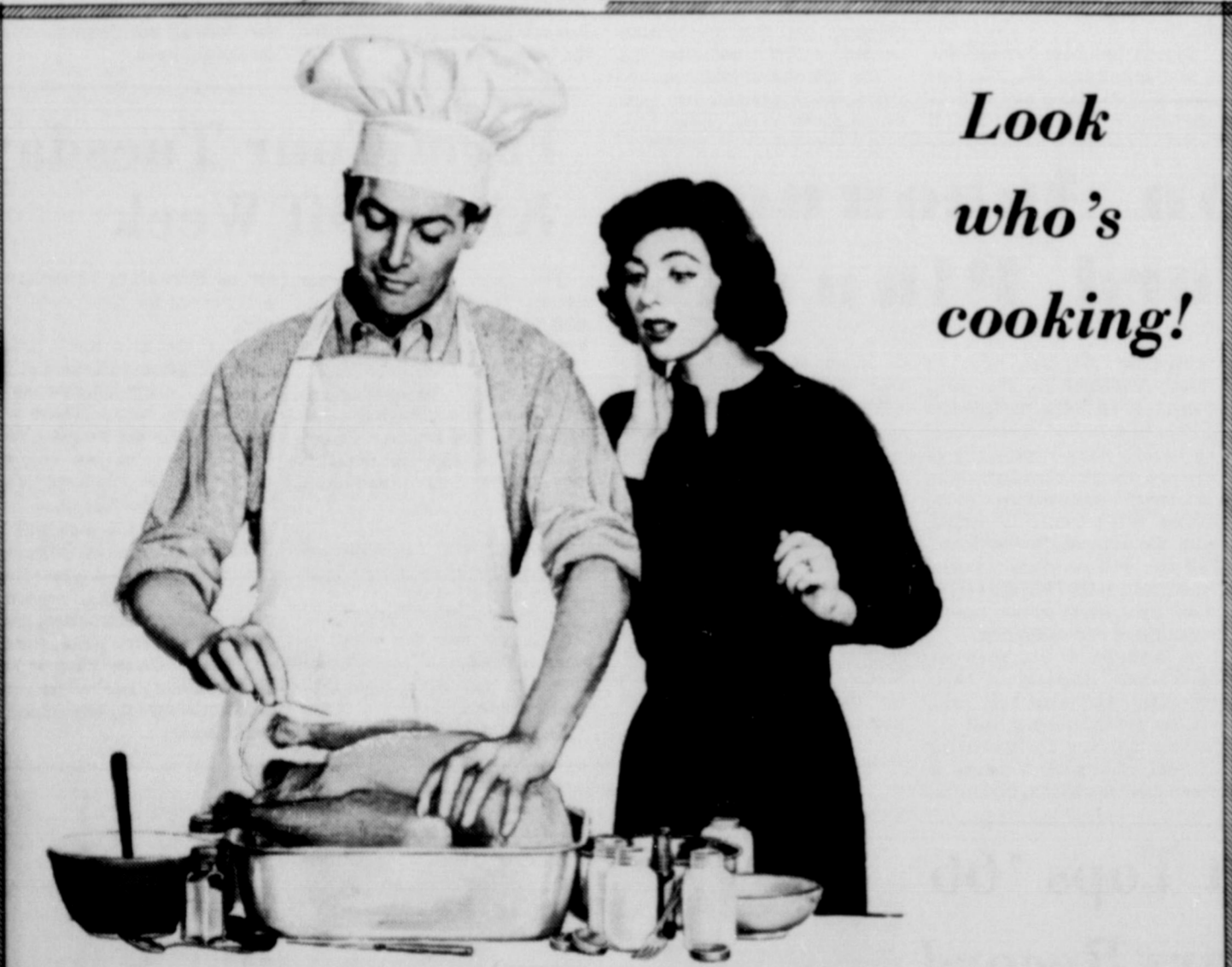

Burial was in Lovington cemetery.

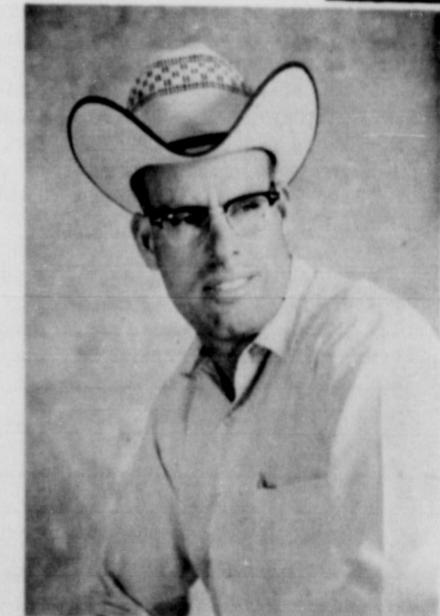

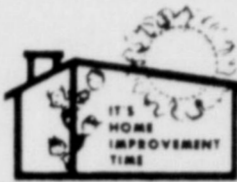

**RARE WIN SOUGHT**

**Coach Light Seeks  
Third Farwell Win**

Coach Don Light will be out to get his personal ledger against Farwell back in the "black" when his Friona High School Chieftains clash with the Farwell Steers here Friday night at Chieftain Field.

Light's four-year record against Friona's Farmer County rivals stands even at 2-2. His first two teams at FHS scored 26-13 and 34-7 victories over the Steers, but Farwell came back the past two years to win, 8-7 and 20-7.

The Friona Coach also has another opportunity to become the first FHS coach to record three victories over the Steers. At least four other men coached teams to two wins over Farwell. They are Colie Huffman, Raymond Cook, Russell Stroud and Eddie Williams.

Stroud had a 2-0 record in his two meetings with Farwell. Williams was 2-0-1. Huffman was 2-1 and Cook was 2-4.

It's the 33rd meeting between the two teams in games since 1928. It's also the 19th consecutive year the teams have met on the gridiron, and the ninth straight year they have met in the season opener.

In the 32 previous meetings Farwell holds a series edge of 12-19-1, counting two games as Texico - Farwell in 1928 and 1929.

Friona holds the biggest single-game scoring advantage in the rivalry, a whopping 81-0 win by the Chieftains in 1934. Farwell's largest margin of vic-

tory was 43-0 in 1939. Seventeen of the previous games have resulted in one team blanking the other. Another time, in 1941, the teams played to a 0-0 tie.

There are not been a shut-out in the series since Coach Light has been at FHS, however. The last ones were produced by Farwell, when they blanked Friona 20-0 in 1961 and 39-0 in 1962, both of which were winless seasons for Friona.

## At Home In Parmer County

Now that school is here again mothers find themselves starting the day a little easier. Breakfast for the school children at an earlier hour does mean a special effort on her part. Is it worth it or should they just go away with empty stomachs?

After a night of "fasting" it's time to break the fast. An adequate breakfast is needed for all ages. The body needs refueling regularly and breakfast is the meal that follows the longest stretch of non-eating. Research has shown that without an adequate breakfast, work output is reduced and all reactions time slows down. So, provide an attractive, tasty and adequate first meal of the day.

This does not have to fit standard breakfast patterns. Try something new to tempt appetites on cool mornings. It does not have to be conventional, but nutritious, particularly, when it means the difference between eating or skipping this important meal.

If you know your children aren't interested in breakfast, plan a menu to appeal to them. Maybe they'd like their favorite fresh fruit on cereal - or maybe a hot dog suits their fancy. Just try to see that fruit, cereal and/or bread and milk - with hearty food like meat, eggs, fish or cheese are included in some form.

## NELSON SAYS

# Farmers Should Get Top Milo Prices

"The 1967 Grain Sorghum crop, predicted to be the largest on record at 821 million bushels, can also reap the producer record prices and income if he will do as an astute job of studying market information and will respond with orderly marketing plans." This statement was evoked from Bill Nelson, Executive Vice President of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, in response to anxiety currently being expressed by many area farmers at declining grain sorghum prices being quoted as harvest approaches.

Nelson, a nationally recognized agricultural economist and member of the Grain Advisory Committee to the Secretary of Agriculture, said that close analysis indicate that the price slump is an apparent "over reaction of the market" to recent crop report releases which point to record feed grain production nationally.

These raw statistical production figures do not reflect the whole story about the individual grains such as corn and sorghum and how their carryover, stocks, export and domestic situations differ, nor do they indicate what grain sorghum has "going for it" in the High Plains area. In itemizing these facts that point to a strong demand and price situation for sorghum during the coming year, if farmers will watch and act, Nelson drew the following contrasts:

Total supply for 1968 -- corn, up 11 per cent; sorghum, down 6 per cent; 1967 production -- corn up 13 per cent -- sorghum up 14 per cent; Carry over -- corn, same -- sorghum, down over 50 per cent; Domestic use -- corn, down 2 per cent --

sorghum, up 8 per cent; Exports -- corn, down 28 per cent -- sorghum, up 5 per cent; 1967 season price rise -- corn, none -- sorghum, 36¢ (highest in 5 years); Grain consuming animal units for 1968 -- nationally, lower -- sorghum area, higher; Total use -- feed-grass, down 5 per cent -- sorghum, up 8 per cent.

Nelson said that all of the above are "plus" factors pointing to a strong position for grain sorghum as well as is the 9¢ higher than last year average loan rate. He hastened to point out that sorghum will have some "minus" factors, too. Corn will be closer to sorghum than last year in price which at one time was a 23 per cent price spread, but currently is narrowed to 10 per cent. In some areas, both export and domestic users will switch some sorghum demand to corn. Sorghum, like all U.S. feed grains, will be faced with more competition, producers should also look at the price pattern this past year. It will certainly not repeat itself exactly, but can be a tool in price forecasting. The season low grain sorghum price in the High Plains area was hit in the mid-two week period in October, but in just two months had climbed 20 cents, and in five months reached the season high of 36 cents over the October low.

The Association official urged farmers to consider these factors as they plan their sales as well as to be alert to possible USDA announcements such as possible resale of the 1967 crop in commercial storage and by indication that 1968 acreage might be lower under government programs.

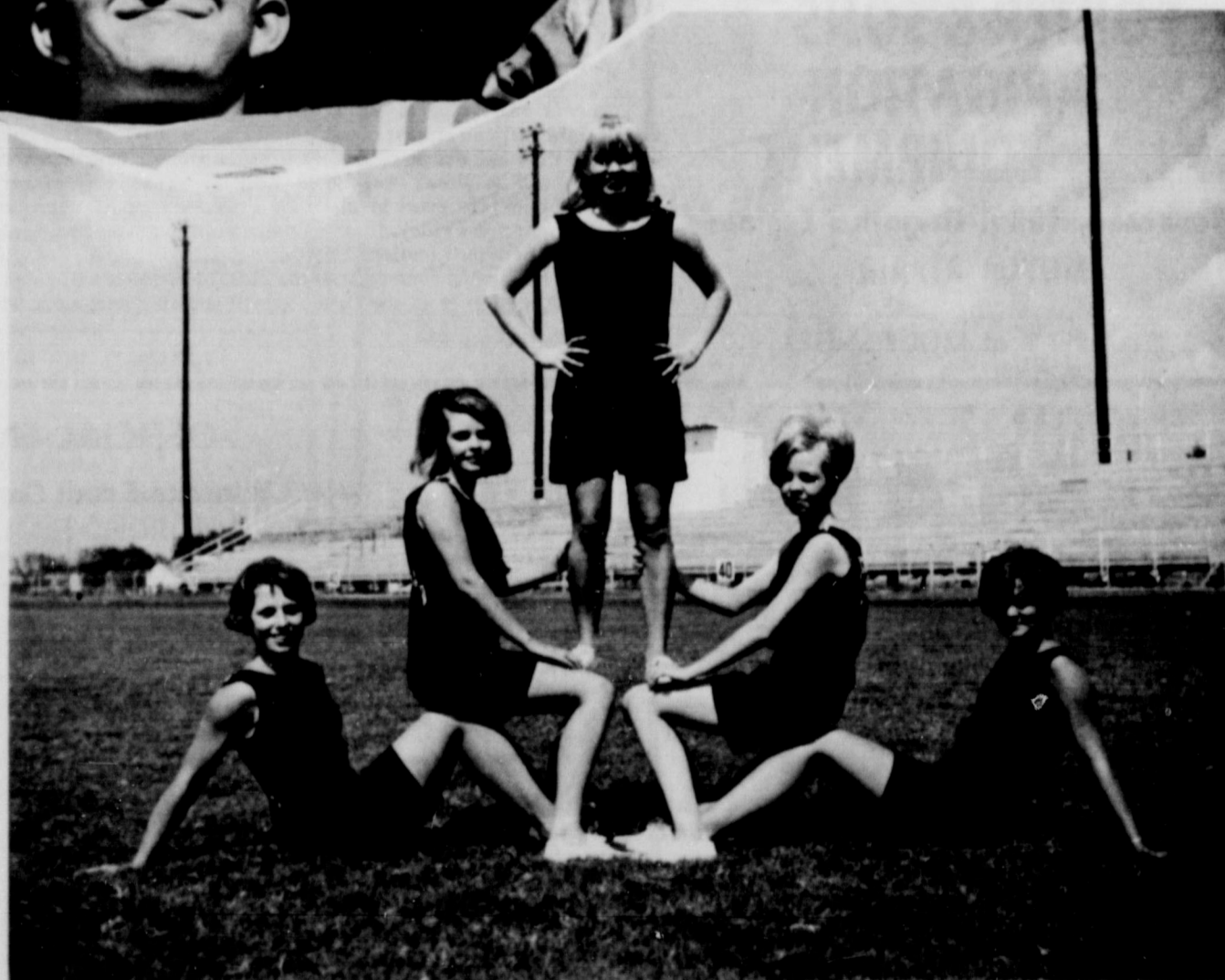

**MITE INFESTATIONS**  
Extremely heavy mite populations are present on grain sorghum in several South Plains counties. To date heavy infestations are reported in portions of Hale, Floyd, Swisher and Briscoe counties.

Heavy leaf damage has been observed in a number of fields with 30 to 90% of the leaves killed. In heavy infested fields stalks appear to be drying out and dying. Some shrinkage has been noted in grain that was damaged during the milk to soft dough stage. After a plant is past soft dough it will probably not be necessary to spray it. According to entomologist the mite is cream colored. A magnifying glass is necessary to see the mite. They are normally found near the midrib of a leaf.

Reports indicate that both Parathion and Systox are controlling the mites satisfactorily.

As of Thursday, August 30 no reports of mites in Parmer County have been received.

**LIVESTOCK SPECIALISTS & ENTOMOLOGIST JOINS EXTENSION STAFF**  
Officials of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service here have announced the appointment of a new livestock specialist to serve the High and Rolling Plains of Texas.

The new specialist, Dr. Lowell Schake, assumed the duties of the position August 28 at the

South Plains Research and Extension Center, according to Extension Director John E. Hutchison.

He succeeds Dr. Dixon Hubbard who joined the Federal Extension Service at the beginning of the year.

Schake will work closely with cattle feeders and producers in the West Texas area and will cooperate closely with county agricultural agents in conducting educational programs and meetings dealing with various phases of the livestock industry.

Lyndon K. Almand will assume the duties of area entomologist with The Texas Agricultural Extension Service effective September 9. The new entomologist will be working closely with county extension agents in the area on educational programs dealing with insects attacking crops and livestock. Major emphasis, of course, will be placed on cotton and grain sorghum insects and on helping producers adopt economical and safe insect control methods to their individual situations.

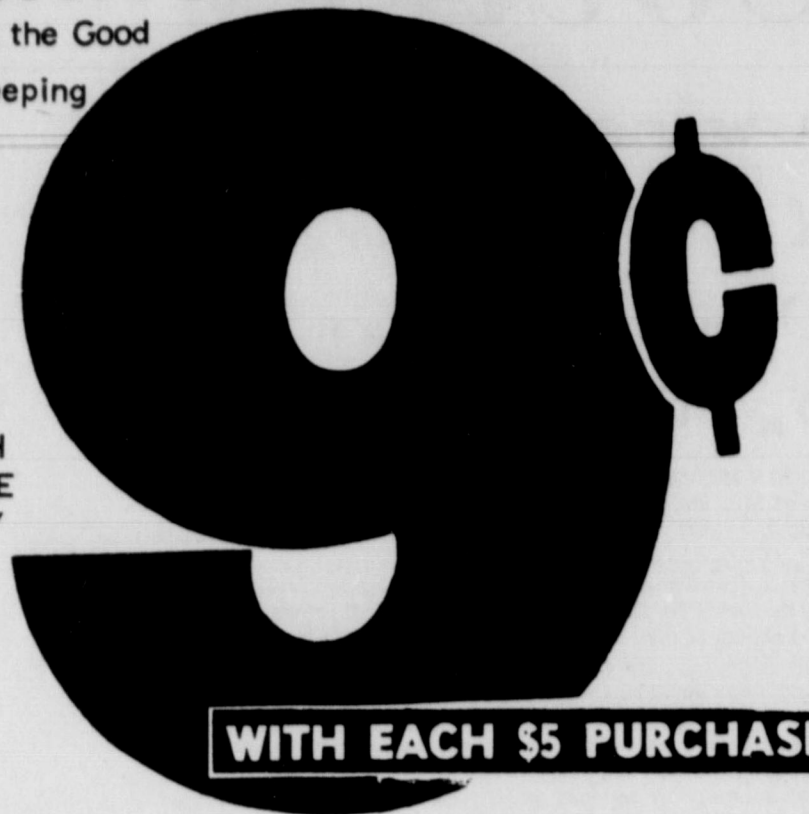
