Joe Seagler to announce summer vater rates for Morton, "as long as is economically feasible."

The summer rate, which goes into effect immediately with the April 15 to May 15 billing, will be in effect only if the water user calls at the City Hall and asks to be placed on the summer rates. The summer rate will be \$350 minimum on up to 10,000 gallons

It compares with the regular rate of \$2.00 for the first 3,000 gallons; 60 cents per thousand for the next 2,000; 40 cents per thousand for the nejt 5,000 (which s \$5.20 for 10,000 gallons) and 35 cents per thousand for the next 10,000.

2. Test the pavement for slip eriness when no other cars are lose, by tapping on the brakes. 3. Stay far enough behind the ar in front so it won't spray oad grime on the windshield.

4 Make sure that tires have

plenty of tread, especiall for oper ighway driving. You might get away with fairly old tires on a dry pavement, but not when it's wet and traffic film might be present A companion hazard of rain and wet roads is fog. The fact that fog reduces visibility so drastically emphasipes the importance of practicing the following ways to combat it:

1. Slow down, keep to the righ and use the right edge of the road as a guide line.

2. Turn your headligths on dur ing the day as well as night and keep them on low beam. Since fog reflects light, this will reduce glare for you and other drivers. 3. Use your wipers to keep your windshield clear of condensation aused by a fog. A misty wind-
