





In three Kennedy states the enate majority leader has stong potential support from colagues in the Senate. They are Montana, with Sen. Mike Mansfield; Indiana, with Sen. Vance Sen. Thomas Dodd.

In fact, it is Johson's friendships in the Senate that give him intimate political contacts all acoss the country.

The outlook for Kennedy at pr esent is that he will have in the neighborhood of 400 to 500 sure delegates on the first ballot.



Campaigning, Ramsey makes what appears to be a leisurely tour of Texas. To many, it may be at a leisurely pace, but not to Ramsey. He is up early and goes about his work without fanfare. 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




