After Unusually Quiet Campaigning, County, State Races Begin To Stir Interest; Heavy Vote Turnout, Good Participation in Precinct Conventions Is Foreseen; Polls Open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Saturday will be the big day for Democratic candidates and voters.

And in Cochran County more than 2,300 voters are ready to "have their say."

#### Statement of — J. C. Shelton

To The Voters Of Precinct One Of Cochran County:

I would like to take this means of calling your attention to my candidacy for Justice of Peace of Precinct One. I regret that I have missed seeing some of you when I called at your home and wish to take this opportunity of soliciting your vote and influence.

#### Vote First, Then Take Part In Precinct Convention

Democratic voters, Saturday, who plan to take part in the precinct conventions must have already voted in the Democratic Primary, the Texas Democratic Executive Committee warned this week.

After persons vote Saturday in the First Democratic Primary they will have their poll tax, exemption, or other form stamped "Democratic" by the presiding election judge.

This will be proof of the voters' privilege to participate in the precinct convention in their voting precinct at 2:30 p. m.

The proof is expected to also be needed by delegates taking part in the county convention Saturday, May 14.

To the fact that I do not deputy, secretary or assistant, I could not make a household canvass of the voters without closing up my office.

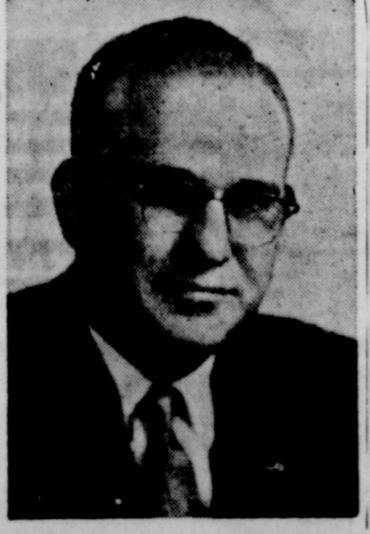

**WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"**  
By C. WILSON HARDER

Almost 100% of the nation's independent businessmen, 96% to be exact, voting through the National Federation of Independent Business, have asked Congress to assure business freedom in hiring policies.

This is a significant vote at this time. As is well known, this is an election year, and with an eye on sizeable blocs of racial minority votes, there could be more shouting in Congress this C. W. Harder year on the nebulous subject of Civil Rights than anything else.

This is not only a Federal trend. Politicians at the state and city level where there are large concentrations of racial minorities, also let their hearts bleed publicly for the strengthening of Civil Rights.

There is a strong drive to make this type of legislation universal. In California, for example, if an employer seeking a receptionist from a state employment office dares to specify what color the girl that meets callers at his office should be, he is in for a lot of bureaucratic yammer.

Now no American with a background of respect for the U. S. Constitution has any deep racial bias.

But most Americans also resent having a gun stuck to their head.

But as officialdom has already stuck its nose into the operation of business to further schemes of socialism, control

of labor relations, et al, there is perhaps enough precedent for laws that would tell each and every employer what percentage of his employees can be white, tan, brown, black, pink, green, and so on.

And it is not without logic that these self-appointed Messiahs of equality in political life, unable to accomplish anything with the public at large, will seek to make business the fall guy again.

In those industries where government has permitted Big Labor to move in with full force, as many employers know, they have very little say left as to just who they will hire, whom they will not hire. The union bosses, backed up by the fellow travelers that permeate the National Labor Relations Board see to that.


And it is significant if the employees forced on an employer do not produce efficiently, the NLRB does not volunteer to make up the losses.

Thus, if in all this political maneuvering over Civil Rights should result in still another agency to enforce some screwball employment regulations employers might have little if any time left to make a profit.

Actually, the American Constitution promises protection to all minorities. But there is nothing in this document which gives any minority priority.

But issue is even deeper.

It is high time that the American business structure quit being the brunt of all the crackpot socialist or do-good schemes dreamed up either for reasons of vote getting, or through just plain ordinary softheadedness.

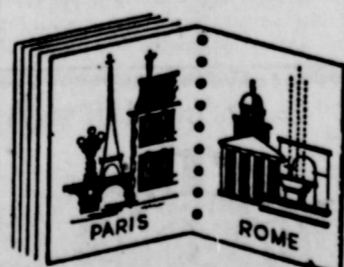

**SENATOR YARBOROUGH'S REPORT**

The Youth Conservation Corps Bill, which I am co-sponsoring, is an important step toward meeting three basic problems of our times — juvenile delinquency, conservation of our natural resources and unemployment.  
 This proposal passed the Senate last year and is now under consideration by the House Education and Labor Committee. It basically provides:  
 (1) Establishment of a work force of young men, ages 16 to 21, to perform conservation and improvement work in our forests and parks.  
 (2) Affording many thousands of our young men, many of whom need a new purpose and interest in life, a chance to leave the circumstances which have led to delinquency and take a new start and fresh outlook.  
 It seems to me that few things are more important to Americans as a free people, and to this nation, as a free country, than proper preservation of our natural resources. The Youth Conservation Corps Bill will improve two of the most important resources our nation possesses — many of our young men and many acres of our national park and wilderness areas.  
 Patterned after the original Civilian Conservation Corps, the proposed YCC provides for the employment of 50,000 young men the first year who are paid \$60 monthly plus food and shelter.  
 To see how this program benefited America in the past, one needs only look at the park improvements, the countless other public works projects still in use to see that the CCC made its worthwhile lasting mark on America. What isn't so easily seen, but is many times more important, is the beneficial result it had on the lives of many Americans.  
 To see how this new YCC program will benefit America in the future, one needs only to consider the tragically high rate of juvenile delinquency and the mass of work needed to put our national parks and our forests in good condition.  
 This program represents an investment in America's future which will be more than paid out in better citizens and improved parks and forests within a few years.

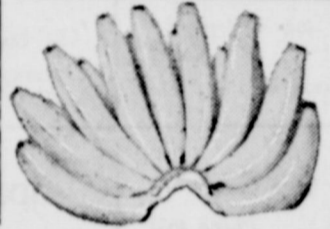

#### FREEZING ASPARAGUS

Discard woody and blemished stalks. Wash in running cold water. Sort according to size. Trim stalks by removing scales with a sharp knife. Cut in lengths to fit the package.

Heat in boiling water:  
Small stalks: 2 minutes  
Medium stalks: 3 minutes  
Large stalks: 4 minutes

Cool, drain package and freeze immediately.

#### FREEZING RHUBARB

Preparation - Use only tender, crisp stalks. Wash and cut into 2-inch pieces. Heat in boiling water - 1 minute.

Cool, drain package and freeze immediately.

Heating helps retain color and flavor; however, rhubarb may be packed raw without sugar, or cover with cold syrup made from 3 cups of sugar to 4 cups of water.

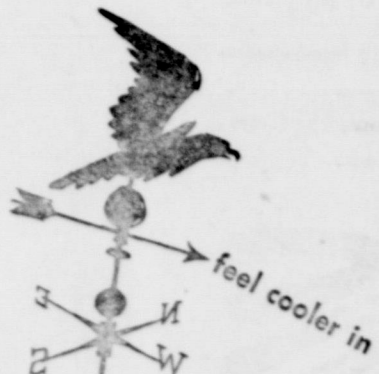

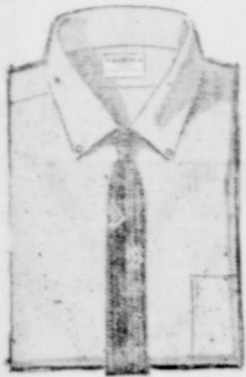

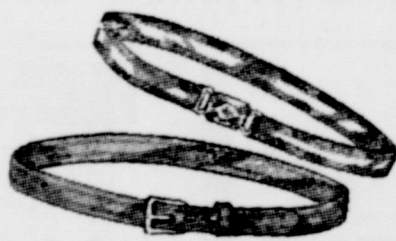

### Johnson Says Legislative BA Is Increasing

Senate Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson said Sunday that the "batting average" of Congress is better than usual this session.

Johnson in a report prepared for Texas newspapers, in association with Senator Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.), discussed achievements of the Congress and briefly outlined major work still to be done.

"We have come to expect each year about this time, some change year about this time some change that Congress has done too much or not done enough ..." Johnson said.

Looking to the immediate future, Johnson predicted that before the session is over "we will pass an amendment to the Social Security Act, we will have some form of medical care bill for the aged and aging that will protect the doctor-patient relationship. We'll pass a minimum wage bill."

The Senate Majority Leader also predicted the Congress will enact space legislation as recommended by the President.

"In addition," he said, "I think that we will pass a good bill through both houses in connection with mutual aid that will be an improvement over any other bill passed."

### Calvert Is Only Candidate With Court Experience

One of the important races to be decided in Saturday's election will be for Chief Justice of the Texas Supreme Court.

Associate Justice Robert W. Calvert of Hill County is one of the two candidates for this position. Judge Calvert has been on the Supreme Court since 1950, and is the only member of the court who is a candidate to succeed the present chief justice, who is retiring, and is the only candidate for chief justice with Supreme Court experience.

"Judge Calvert has served with great distinction as associate justice for almost ten years," Gaynor Kendall of Austin, state campaign manager, said. "He therefore knows from actual experience the additional administrative duties which he must assume as chief justice, and he has demonstrated by his service with the other judges his ability to furnish the leadership the court requires."

# J. R. FANNING IS AWARDED COUNTY'S ROADS PAVING CONTRACT

J. R. Fanning, Lubbock contractor who is at the present conducting Morton's paving program, submitted the low bid accepted last Friday by the Cochran County Commissioners' Court on some 14 miles of resurfacing and paving in Cochran County.

The Lubbock firm bidding against three other firms, also all from Lubbock, submitted a bid approximately \$7,500 under their nearest competitor. A large factor in the bidding was the fact that Fanning's equipment was already in the county and the cost of moving

equipment and getting ready for work was far less. Fanning's bid was \$27,428.25. The next lowest bid was submitted by R. L. Garrett, \$33,535.00. Henry Stafford and W. A. McNally also bid on the project. The construction consists of re-

pairing and resurfacing the County Road from a point just west of the Famuliner Community House, north to Star Route Grocery and north of the Grocery to where it curves to the right and intersects the Muleshoe highway.

The road, built in 1948, when Glenn Thompson was first serving as County Judge, was actually "built a little too light", Thompson said this week. The new surface will be stronger. It was originally built when the county, like counties all over the state, had funds with which to build county roads and the county was trying to stretch the funds out and build as many miles of road as possible. Thompson said.

On that original bid, J. R. Fanning was also a bidder, but his bid was the highest one received at that time.

Also included in the project are a block of street in front of the Bledsoe School House which is badly in need of resurfacing, and approximately a half mile of dirt road, to be paved, which would connect a Cochran County FTM Road with one coming across from Hockley County, several miles below Whiteface on the eastern county line.

The bids were opened Friday morning by Commissioners' Court and on the original bid it was found that due to the wording of the legal, each of the firms bid on just half enough surface. Therefore they had to resubmit a price doubling the amount of surface cost.

## TEXAS SLIPPING IN TEACHER RATING IN ELEM. SCHOOLS

In five years Texas has dropped from second to fifth place in the percentage of college trained teachers in its elementary schools, latest national rankings show.

Oklahoma now leads the nation with 99.6 of its elementary teach-

ers having four or more years of college. Arizona, Florida, and New Mexico also lead Texas, which is fifth with 95.6 percent.

Both the border states of Oklahoma and New Mexico, as well as nearby Arizona, have higher average teacher salaries than Texas.

In 1953-54 Texas was in second place. At that time, Arizona was first and Oklahoma was down

in seventh position. By 1958-59, the latest figures available, Oklahoma had vaulted to first place on the strength of higher requirements and better salaries. Only 80 of Oklahoma's 21,400 teachers do not have at least a bachelor's degree.

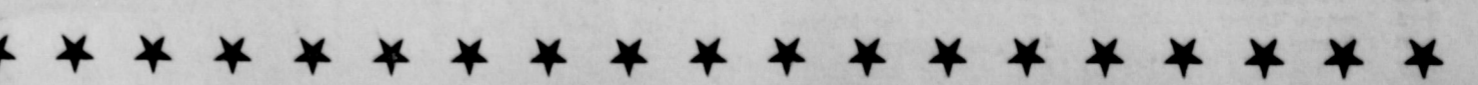

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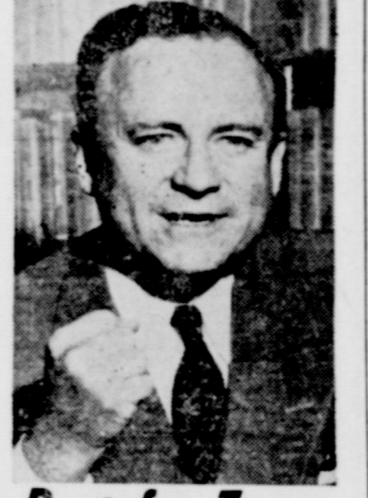

It creates a protected zone in the furrow around the seed and allows the tender seedling to develop normally in spite of cold, wet, infected soil. The early maturity and better stands which result can bring greater profits from higher yields of top grade cotton.

### 4-H RIFLE SAFETY MEETINGS

Safety was the order of the day in training for both groups, with more emphasis on safety for the younger group. Visual aid charts and enumeration of a list of "Don'ts" in handling a rifle were given to the boys as their safety training. Demonstrations on handling a rifle while hunting and at the range were given by the instructors. The boys were called on individually to demonstrate their teachings. Corrections were made on the sp-

ot. Many of the dads and mothers spoke of this as some of the best training the boys need and can get at this age.

### 4-H SEARS SWINE PROGRAM IN COCHRAN COUNTY

4-H Sears Swine Program Committee of Cochran County met on Saturday, April 30, with 28 4-H members and parents who met with them. The purpose of this meeting was to teach the boys how to do Swine Management, by keeping records, vaccination, and registration of pigs, cutting needle teeth, and things to do when a gilt is farrowing pigs.

Mr. Raymond Lewis, a committeeman, gave a good demonstration with necessary forms on how to register pigs and notch the pigs ear according to litter number. The County Agent discussed swine care and management, and passed out literature on the subject.

The Committee is looking for new Hampshire gilts to purchase so they can be given to new club members selected by the committee to receive the gilts this year. This is due to the fact that some of the gilts have not farrowed to date. It is hoped that all gilts can be in the hands of these boys selected by not later than June this year.

Some of the gilts have farrowed and have nice litters. One gilt will be selected from each litter by the Co. Agent to be given to another club member, when they reach weaning age.

The new members selected to receive these gilts provided they meet the standards of requirements and agreement when interviewed by the Committee are: Randall Gandy, Arlan Haralson, Clem Kuehler, Raymond Guarado, Joey Newsome, Mike and Ronald Hale.

The following boys received the registered Hampshire Sears gilts in 1959: Dub Waltrip, Dennis Lemons, Lester Dupler, David Haralson, Stanley Cunningham, Leon Jeffcoat, Terry Anglin, and Dicky Walker.

Dub Waltrip's gilt farrowed 9 and saved 7 on April 29, 1960. Leon Jeffcoat saved 4, farrowed on a cold night in February and Terry Anglin saved 8 pigs. Leon's 4 averaged 40 pounds each at 56 days of age. Terry's will be 56 days old May 9.

AUSTIN Tex. — Saturday is "spcak now or forever hold your peace" day in Texas.

Or, to say the least, the voter who does not express an opinion at the polls and precinct conventions this week should hold his peace about what happens in Texas during the next two years.

A number of important decisions as to office holders will be made Saturday. Once made, they're final — for two years or even four years.

At this point in the campaigns, almost all candidates and their supporters believe that if there is a big enough turnout Saturday, their side will win handily. And those who aren't pleased with the way things turn out likely will blame it on those who don't bother to show up.

Equally as important as the primaries are the precinct conventions to be held the same day. This is the only means by which the individual voter can participate in the selection of the presidential nominee.

spending more than doubled — from \$156,000,000 to \$322,000,000 — to keep pace with a 51 percent increase in students and 49 percent increase in teachers. But spending for other purposes increased faster.

Gov. Price Daniel again has said that he would like to call a special session after the elections to erase the deficit and raise teachers' pay. But he also said it would depend on getting agreement from legislators.

**PROFIT PREDICTED** — When everything is finally cleared up, the state will come out with a profit of \$50,000 — perhaps more — on land involved in the Veteran's Land Board scandals.

This prediction was made by Land Commissioner Bill Allcorn who called \$50,000 a "conservative figure."

He said that \$1,725,000 has already been recovered from fraudulent land deals and that \$1,679,000 more is outstanding but fully secured.

When the entire \$3,404,000 is recovered, said Allcorn, the state will have a comfortable margin above what was involved in the original transactions.

**COSTLY ERROR** — Texas Supreme Court has returned to district court for re-trial a case involving \$100,000 mistake in arithmetic.

An employe of an Arlington contractor made the error in submitting a bid of \$534,175 instead of \$634,226 to the local school board for a school building job. After the bid was accepted by the board, the contractor discovered the error and refused to carry out the contract.

Board then awarded the bid to the second low bidder and sued the first contractor for the \$36,278 difference between the second low bid and the bid they had first

accepted.

Supreme Court members disagreed on the case, wrote three different opinions, but all agreed it should be re-tried.

**HOW BIG THE GROUNDS** — State Building Commission is awaiting an attorney general's opinion before putting in sidewalks to the new state buildings.

Reason for the precaution is that the Legislature passed a bill in 1957 stating that nothing — absolutely nothing — could be built on the Capitol grounds without specific permission from the Legislature. And the Legislature did not provide for sidewalks.

**WHO OWNS THE OIL?** — Another question under consideration by the attorney general's office is "who owns rights to the minerals under county roads."

Request for an opinion was submitted by Jack Cook, county attorney of Kleberg County.

Ultimately to be decided is whether state and local government can claim the right to mineral development of the right of way of some 228,000 miles of streets and highways in Texas.

**SCHOOL FUND ADVISORS** — A 19 members advisory committee of prominent business and professional men is helping the State Board of Education develop investment policies for the \$415,000,000 permanent school fund. Committee members are C. D. Aker, Jacksonville; Walter Lacy and H. M. Fentress, Waco; J. Ralph Wood and A. H. McCulloch, Dallas; Hines Baker, Houston; Joe B. McNiel, Wichita Falls; Frank

**NEW HIGHWAY SIGNS DUE** — New highway signs, bigger and more colorful than any used before, will begin appearing soon on the interstate highways in Texas.

Highway Commission has ordered the posting of route markers and guide signs on 707 miles of interstate highway now completed or under construction in the state.

Conspicuously absent in this marking system will be stop signs. Completion of the 41,000 mile system of controlled access roads will make possible coast-to-coast and border-to-border driving without a stop sign or traffic light.

Motorists soon will become familiar with the interstate marker — a red, white and blue shield. Texas Highway Department designed the shield which later was adopted for the entire national system.

All markers and guide signs will be larger than usual. Advance exit signs will be placed about two miles ahead of interchanges to give motorists plenty of time to plan their next move.

Guide signs will have white letters and symbols on a green background, and signs for rest and service areas will have green letters on a reflectorized white background. Warning and yield signs will remain in the familiar yellow and black but will grow in dimensions.

Texas leads the nation in the number of miles of interstate highways completed or underway. Texas' allotment is 3,033 miles of which 697 are finished and 259 are in some stage of progress.

**SCHOOLS' SHARE DOWN** — Texas is enjoying a smaller proportion of its tax revenue for education now than it did 10 years ago.

This statement was issued by the Texas State Teachers Association in support of its drive for enactment of the Hale-Aikin program for school improvement.

In 1958 - 59, says the report Texas spent 29.6 cents of each tax dollar for public school education. In the last completed school year the percentage was 27.68 cents of each dollar.

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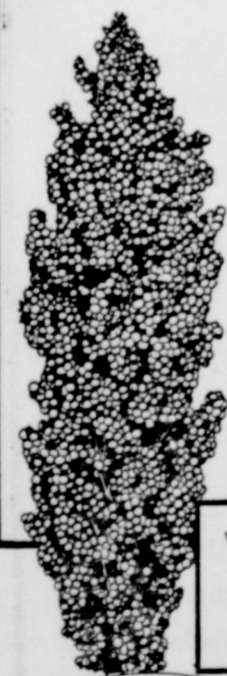

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## Texans Try to Place Native Son In Race For Nation's Top Office

(The following is taken from an article which appeared last Sunday in the Houston Chronicle.) Texas has been trying to nominate one of its citizens for President of the United States in a Democratic national convention at intervals for 112 years and will try it again this year.

On May 12, 1848, a Texas delegation of nine men, headed by Sen. Thomas J. Rusk, sat down in a Democratic national convention for the first time. One delegate was late in arriving, but before the day was out, that delegate, Sen. Sam Houston, came into the hall.

No one could doubt the identity of the imposing figure who made his way toward the seats assigned to the Texas delegation. And there was an identifying habit. Every delegate and spectator had heard of the gay attire the hero of San Jacinto preferred, especially the bright-colored blankets he wore as cloaks.

Immediately the convention was in the midst of a wild demonstration. Men threw their hats into the air and raised their voices in a great welcome. State standards were held high, then massed around the standard of Texas. It was a dramatic moment, one of the thrills that come every four years when the major parties gather to nominate candidates for the greatest office on earth — President of the United States.

Louder and louder grew the demonstration, wilder and wilder the dance of the standards — the dance of the standards that is always the symbol of the big moment of a national convention.

Before Col. James G. Bryce of Louisiana, the convention chairman, had gavelled the demonstrations to order, it was evident that a Houston presidential boom was underway. He had been congressman and governor of Tennessee, and President of Texas and a United States Senator from Texas, why not make him President of the United States?

But the Houston boom cooled off. Why? A little matter of the United States Constitution which provides that no person shall be eligible for President of the United States unless he shall have "been 14 years a resident within the United States".

Houston had given up the office of governor of Tennessee, became a citizen of Texas, which was at that time a part of Mexico, and later had been president of Texas, Houston himself had a part in squelching the Houston boom by announcing firmly that he was for Lewis Cass of Michigan, who had been Jackson's Secretary of War. Cass won the nomination, but was defeated by Gen. Zachary Taylor, the Whig candidate, and himself a hero of the Mexican war.

The Texas delegation went to the 1852 national convention at

Baltimore ready to challenge the contention that Houston was ineligible to be President of the United States. Sen. Thomas J. Rusk insisted that Houston was not barred.

In the 1852 apportionment, Texas had only four convention delegates. Those votes were cast for Houston from the first to the 48th ballot, but Houston in this convention received only a few votes from other states. Texas switched to Franklin Pierce on the 49th ballot.

Texas never quite gave up on Sam Houston. As late as April 21, 1860, the 24th anniversary of the Battle of San Jacinto, a group of his supporters met at San Jacinto Battlefield and called for his nomination for President.

In later years Texas talked of (See Johnson, Page four)

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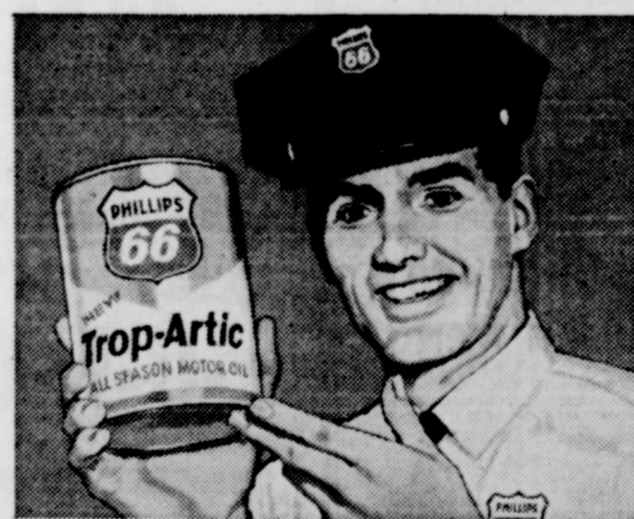
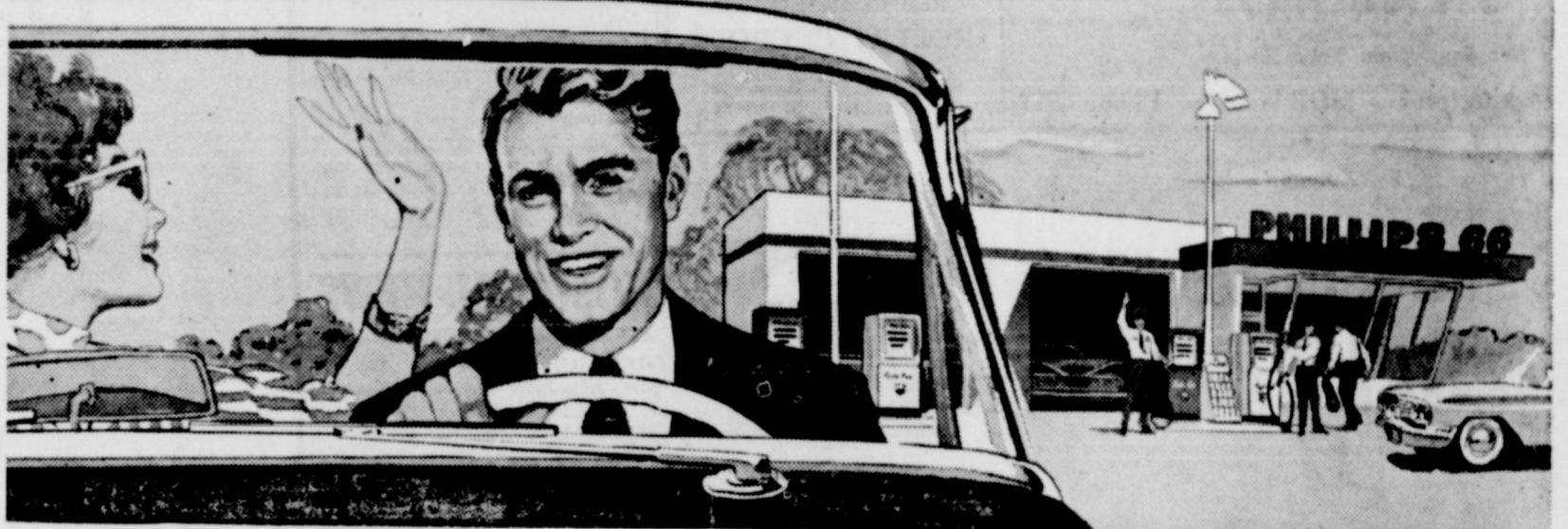
