Sweeping Post Office Improvements
Promise Better Mail Service to Morton

Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield today announced sweeping improvements in mail transportation that will mean better mail service for Morton and 124 other communities in the Amarillo and Lubbock metropolitan areas, covering over 37,000 square miles. Discussing the program at a meeting of postmasters in Amarillo, George A. Gray, Regional Operations Director, said that 900,000 people in the 40 Texas counties would benefit by better mail service. Barring infrequent delays in media of transportation and occasional distribution errors, first class letters mailed at designated collection boxes or in the post office before 5 p. m. on a business day will be delivered on the first delivery at any office in the areas on the following business day. "Tests just concluded," Mr. Gray said, "proved the mail pattern to be highly successful. Approximately 600,000 first class letters originate on an average business day in post offices within these two metropolitan areas. Approximately 66 percent of this mail is destined for points within the area. We have tested our newly changed operations with highly

gratifying results." He pointed out that mail for and from offices outside the area, all over the United States, will be expedited by the new arrangement. Post offices near one of four sectional centers will send their mail to that point for processing. Fast non-stop service over the highway then will carry the mail to Amarillo and Lubbock for dispatch to destination. Special connections have been established via fast truck service north of Amarillo.

Some towns could not be brought within the plan because of the distance involved; however, slightly earlier mailing would assure the mailer the benefit of metropolitan area service.

Judge McDonald
Seeks Election In
2nd Primary, Sat.

More than sixty percent of the Texans voting in the May 7th Democratic Primary voted against legislative hair-splitting which is making a mockery of our criminal courts and flaunting justice, says District Judge W. T. McDonald of Bryan, runoff candidate for judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals.

"By casting their vote for a candidate other than the incumbent Judge Lloyd Davidson, a large majority of the voters of Texas have expressed their disapproval of Criminal Court reversals which have delighted defense attorneys and permitted criminals to laugh in the face of the law," asserts Judge McDonald.

Confident of victory in the June 4th Primary, Judge McDonald has been gathering the kind of support in his runoff campaign which indicates the majority of voters in the second primary will again vote for a change.

Already in the McDonald camp is Temple attorney John B. Daniel first primary campaign manager for Jim Bowmer of Temple who was the third candidate in the race. Judge McDonald has also collected the combined support of most members of the Cameron, Milam County Bar, the endorsement of the Bryan Jaycees, and the active support of many Texas' most highly respected District Judges and attorneys.

"As the only candidate in the race with experience as a District Judge trying criminal cases, I am proud to have the endorsement of my fellow jurists," Judge McDonald says.

Judge McDonald is 48 years old and has had 24 years of experience in legal and judicial affairs. From 1937 to 1945 he served in the Texas Legislature. He holds bachelor and master degrees from the Texas A & M and a degree from the University of Texas Law School.

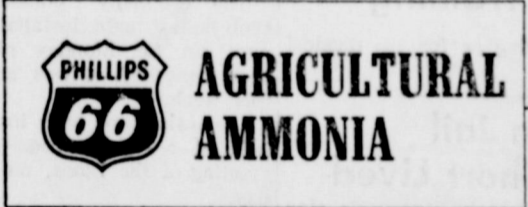

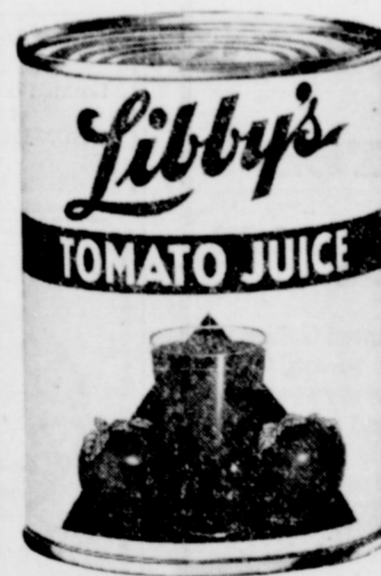

With Your... COUNTY AGENT

On May 13, 1960 there were three small control demonstrations applied to mesquite in the Alvie Harris pasture, 7 miles west of Lehman on the Bledsoe Highway. The three chemicals used were URAB, UROX and Fenuron (FW). The quantity of each chemical used was 1 tablespoon full per square foot around the base of each mesquite. Traveling west from Lehman, the first demonstration covered 10 mesquite with FW pellets; the second treatment UROX was applied to 3 mesquite, and the third treatment was the application of URAB to 9 mesquite.

Three small plots of shinnery were treated with these same chemicals on the J. E. Arms ranch on highway 214, three miles south of the Sandover cut off road. About ½ teaspoon of the chemical was applied per square foot. The distance between two fence posts designates the treated area, alternated with treated plot and control plot. The areas are marked in this order, traveling from north to south - URAB, control, UROX, control, and FW, control.

When you are traveling these roads you are invited to stop and observe these areas advises the county agent.

Hub Cadenhead is cooperating with the Experiment Station this year with a cotton fertilizer test plot. The station representatives have already applied the fertilizer to the land. There will be four replicas of each treatment using 20 treatments. These fertilizer
