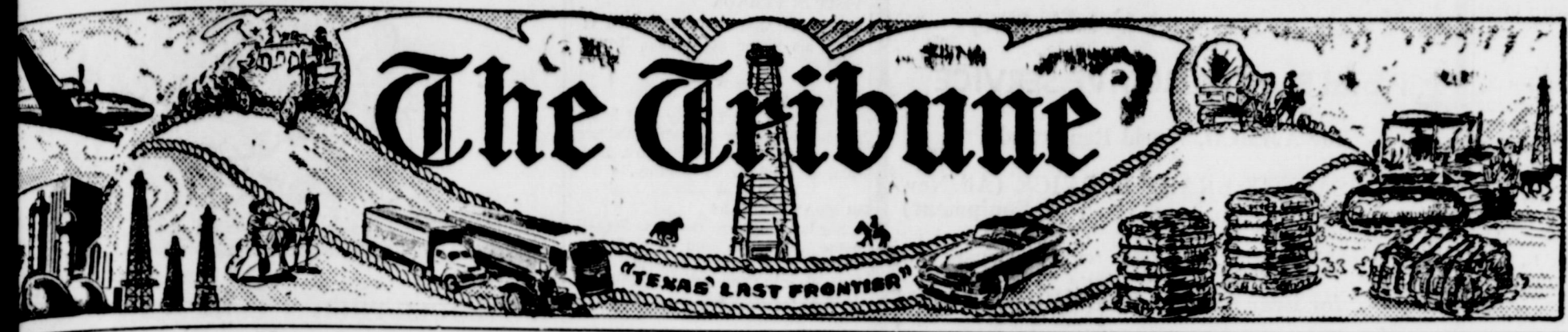

Lions View Film On Hybrid Grains

Maby Pool, with Texas Associated Seed Growers, presented a film entitled "The Development of Hybrid Sorghums, to the Lions Club, Wednesday noon. Pool, a guest of Lion J. W. McDermott, reported that the development of hybrid sorghums has already meant \$35 million increased income to the South Plains, and better than \$1,250,000 to Cochran County farmers. He estimated that nearly 50 percent of farmers planting sorghums are now planting hybrids. Lion McDermott also had three other guests at the meeting.

COUNTY SWIMMING POOL MAY OPEN FOR SUMMER THIS WEEKEND

After nearly two weeks of work on the pool and repairing it, Bill Burkett, manager of Cochran County Swimming Pool, said the pool is in operation this weekend. Mrs. Iva Williams, local teacher has been employed to operate the concession stand and she will be assisted by Zelda Snodgrass of Whiteface. Regular hours for the pool will be from 1:00 p. m. until 8:00 p. m. on week days and Saturday, and on Sunday, the pool will open at 2:00 and remain open until 6:00 p. m. Admission will be 50 cents for adults (over 14) and 25 cents for students (7 to 14). Swim tickets will be available offering a reduction in swimming price, 30 swims for \$4.00 for the youngsters and 20 swims for \$6.00 for adults. Burkett also said the pool will probably be available for renting for private swimming parties by organizations and individuals during non-regular hours.

CONSTRUCTION WAY CLEARED FOR BLEDSOE to MILNESAND PAVING

After considerable delay before final agreements could be reached on easements for right of way, the Cochran County Commissioners' Court this week, has made a settlement on the 1.5 miles of paving leading from Bledsoe to the New Mexico line. The road, planned several months ago, will link Bledsoe with Milnesand, N. M. It will require 18 miles of road paving in New Mexico, but that has already been cleared by the state of New Mexico. The State Highway Department had appropriated the money, but the County could not get an agreement on the land needed, from the three landowners. Finally, late this week, the Commissioners went to Bledsoe and reached an agreement with the landowners, signing papers to purchase right of way for the paved road.

Denison was re-appointed as district superintendent of the Brownfield district which includes this area. Rev. Joseph Yeats of Morton was appointed to serve the Hermleigh Methodist Church in the Big Spring district. Rev. Dunn replaces Rev. James E. Harrell, pastor here for the past four years, who announced last week his retirement from regularly assigned pastorate. Rev. and Mrs. Harrell are moving to 1911 49th Street, Lubbock. Rev. and Mrs. Dunn are completing their move from Amarillo to Morton this week. He plans to bring the sermons at the regular services Sunday. JAMES HICKS ... Former Local Law Officer Helps In Arrest of 'Sniper' at Quanah

James Hicks, former City of Morton peace officer, was one of two peace officers credited last week with the capture of the "stormy night" sniper who shot a woman and a child, and terrorized Quanah for weeks. Sheriff Malon C. Owen has filed assault to murder charges against the sniper, a 19 year old Negro handyman who identified himself as Hubert Milton Charles, Jr. A five man team of peace officers tracking a prowler's footsteps through mud, arrested Charles at his aunt's home Saturday night. Charles, County Sheriff Gaylon Smith, his deputy Kenneth Hulen, City Policeman Lee Roy Hicks and Liquor Control Agent James Hicks, all of Childress, participated in the weeks - long investigation at Quanah, it was reported. James Hicks and Chester Ingram a Quanah Deputy were credited with the capture of the Negro youth. Sheriff Smith said the youth, who claimed he was mentally ill, admitted the May 17 shootings of Mrs. Annie Laurie Annis, a 28 year old invalid, and Miss Charlotte Wiseman, 12. Both suffered minor wounds when charges from a .22 caliber rifle hit them as they were undressing in the bedrooms of their homes. Charles, a frail, quiet youth with a reputation for keeping to himself told Sheriff Owen he had been watching the woman and girl on nights prior to the shooting. Sheriff Owen said Quanah was in terror for weeks after the shooting. Prowler's footprints in the mud led officers to the suspect, Sheriff Owen said. The weekly Quanah Tribune-Chief put out a one page extra edition Sunday proclaiming the return of normalcy to Quanah.

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Mrs. Lucy Ann Reese, mother of Worden E. Reese, of a Morton Route, recently passed here 100th birthday at her home at Trenton, Texas, at the Lankford Rest Home.

Mrs. Reese, who professes to have no secrets as to longevity, remains mentally alert though not quite so spry, as she once was. She divides most of her time between a bed and a wheel chair, has trouble with her sight, but has very good hearing.

In honor of the occasion for his eldest and most popular resident, Grady Lankford, proprietor of the rest home, set up a special Sunday dinner and open house, May 8th, Mother's Day. The special table, complete with birthday cake, was reserved in the home's dining room from 2 to 4 p. m. that day, for Mrs. Reese and her five children, all of whom came to observe the occasion. A great many friends also dropped by to wish Mrs. Reese well as she entered her second hundred years.

"Aunt Lucy" as she is affectionately called, is quite a remarkable person according to Lankford

"She's little," he said of her, "but she's as tough as nails."

Having kept busy on the farm until her husband died in 1935, Mrs. Reese felt that hard work was good for people and though she didn't say as much... her intimation was that she didn't care for the modern method of so much play, and the modern method of minding other people's business.

Born May 8, 1860 in Birmingham, Ala., the daughter of John Lewis and Mary Jane Hudson, the centenarian, moved with her family to Texas, near Lubbock, when she was about 15 years old. She married Thomas G. Reese in 1880, and in 1888, they moved to Bells. They reared their family near Trenton and White-wright, moving to that city in 1892. In 1922 they moved to Hamilton.

Mr. Reese died in 1935 and four

of the nine children of the couple are now deceased. Mrs. Reese made her home with the children for many years, and stayed with Worden, on the Sonny Dewhirst farm between Morton and Maple for about four or five years. She moved into the rest home when it was opened in 1959.

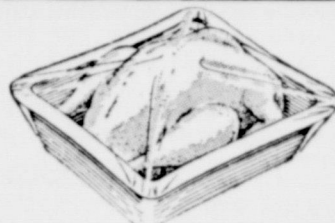

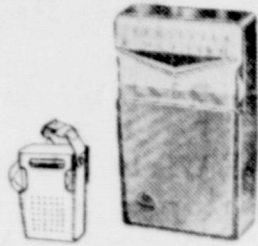

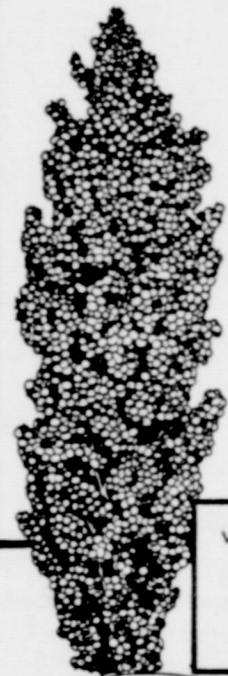

AUSTIN — Gov. Price Daniel's money raising proposals indicate that many of next year's tax battles will be fought on familiar terrain.

Basic program submitted by the governor to the State Finance Advisory Commission is the same as the one he submitted in 1959. Even the total goal is nearly the same.

In 1959 the Legislature passed a bill aimed at raising \$185,000,000 in new money. Governor Daniel estimates 1961 new money needs at \$193,000,000. This is to cover an expected deficit of about \$68,800,000 and increased annual spending of about \$62,527,000.

To raise this money, the governor suggests revising the corporation franchise tax formula and increasing the liquor tax, gross receipts tax on utilities and the auto sales tax. He also suggests passing the abandoned-property act (allowing the state to take over unclaimed bank accounts, property, etc.) and putting a tax on beer and cigarettes sold on milkery bases.

Governor Daniel also told the Commission of four other tax ideas which he said had been suggested by others.

These include:
1. A 10 percent increase on all items in the Omnibus Tax Bill except cigarettes, tobacco and franchises.

2. A 1 cent a gallon increase in the gasoline tax.

3. A tax of 1 cent per thousand cubic feet on the processing of natural gas.

4. A 3 percent tax on gross receipts of gas pipeline companies.

Governor Daniel said he knew his proposal would be criticized as "riding the same old horse." But he said the affected tax sources would not be taxed any heavier than those in neighboring and competing states.

Finance Commission is to begin committee work this month and hold another joint session of its 34 members — all leaders in their fields — in June.

TAX EXEMPT SALES JUMP — Texas apparently is losing some tax revenue through sale of tax exempt cigarettes on military posts, reports State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert.

Calvert told the State Finance that since the state tax increased to eight cents a pack last year, cigarette sales at federal installations have jumped almost a million packs a month.

He said sale of tax exempt cigarettes in March, 1960, was up by 1,500,000 packs over what it was in March, 1959. Military officials denied that non-taxed cigarette selling privileges had been abused.

DEMO HOUSING PROBLEM — Austin hotel and motel facilities will be stretched beyond capacity when an estimated 5,000 come here June 14 for the State Democratic Convention.

It's more people than Austin can accommodate. To ease the prob-

lem a little the State Democratic Executive Committee has ruled that no room reservations will be made for persons living within 75 miles of the Capital City.

Also in preparation for the big day, SDEC has named a credentials committee, whose job will be to decide which delegates shall be admitted.

Four counties had "rump" conventions and will send two rival delegations to Austin. Governor Daniel, pool-poohing the "rump" groups, said they were all too small to be a threat to the official delegations.

"There is more harmony in the Texas Democratic Party now than ever before," said the governor.

BEAUTIFUL MAPS READY — Texas' new 1960 official highway map, illustrated with 11 dramatic full color pictures, now is available for the asking.

It's not only handsome, but informative. It shows the 1,933 miles of multi-lane divided highways not completed. Also, 26,378 miles of state and U. S. Highways and 20,000 miles of farm to market roads.

Lakes, state parks and roadside parks are indicated. Texas' history, geography, and present opportunities are summarized.

In line with the state's tourist-seeking policy, it is headed, "All of Texas Welcomes You." To get the map, write the Tex-

as Highway Department, Austin 14, or drop by a highway district office and travel bureau. County tax offices have cards on hand to request maps.

OIL ALLOWABLES UP — Texas Railroad Commission retained the eight day producing pattern for the Texas oil industry for June but because June has one day less than May, daily permissible production will be slightly higher.

Statewide allowable for June will be 2,643,516 barrels a day, a 47,108 barrel a day increase from May.

Several major oil companies asked the Commission to set nine producing days in June, indicating they expected an increase in demand for Texas crude oil within the next month.

REPAIR FUNDS OKAYED — Legislative Budget Board has approved transfer of \$75,000 for repair work at the Big Spring State Hospital, Abilene State School and Mexia State School.

Board also heard a report that a state job classification study, detailing requirements for 1,225 different jobs, is nearing completion.

MED SCHOOL MONEY SOUGHT A new money request awaiting the Legislature next year will be that of the University of Texas for \$100,000 for the planning of a

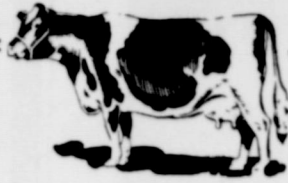
new medical branch in San Antonio. With this information the UT Regents said the money would be used to get specialists in medical center planning to estimate what would be required.

With this information the Regents could draw up plans and a request for funds for the center itself from a later Legislature.

**Johnson Urges
Calm Approach to
Summit Failure**

Senate Majority Leader Lyndon B. Johnson called this week for a cool, calm and objective assessment of the recent summit conference.

In a weekly report, made to weekly newspapers in Texas, Johnson said, "We are not trying to push anything under the desk; we want the American people to have all the information that can be given them in the national interest. At the same time, we are not trying to find scapegoats and to play politics with such an important national matter."

The Senator had as his guest Harry Provench of Waco, prominent Texas newspaper executive.

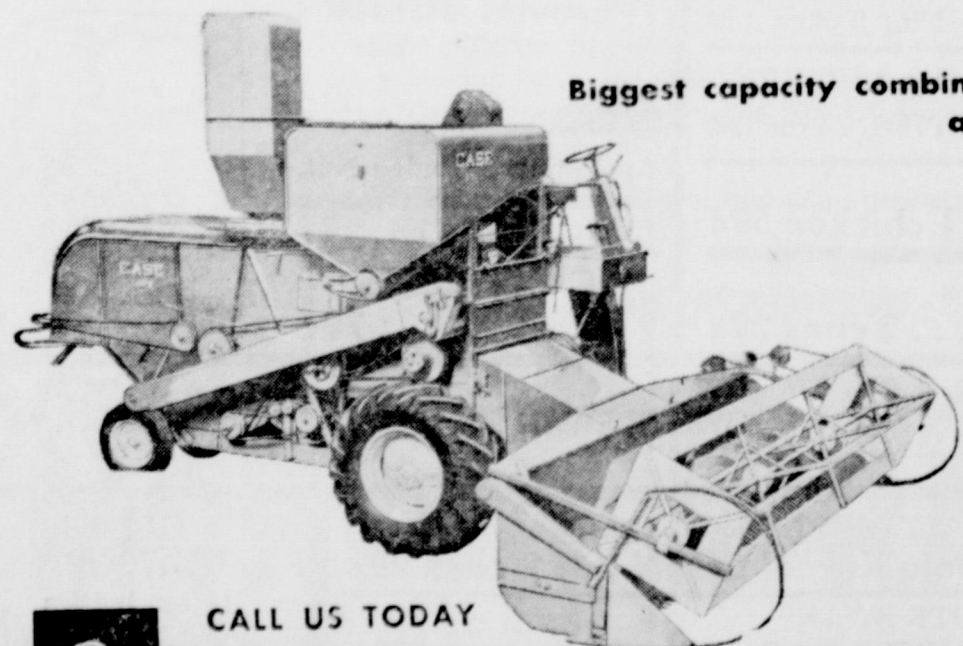
In their question and answer discussion, Johnson expressed belief that "Premier Khrushchev did not intend for the summit to be a success when he went there, and he used the U-2 incident to break it up and now, unless we are very careful, he will use it to try divide our country."

Johnson voiced confidence inquiry into the collapse of the summit conference by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, headed by Senator William Fulbright, would be conducted "with the usual high standards with which he performs his public service."

Earlier, Johnson referred to Fulbright as "one of the ablest members of the Senate."

JUNE IS DAIRY MONTH

Milk drinks served as a between meal snack will help in getting the required amount of calcium needed each day. Dry, fresh or canned milk can be made into delicious drinks. Keep a supply of these on hand and the children can do their own mixing.

(A) MAPLE MILK

- 1. Ingredients for one serving: 4 tablespoons dry milk 1 teaspoon sugar 1/4 teaspoon maple flavoring 1 cup fluid milk
 - 2. Ingredients for six servings: 1 1/2 cups dry milk 2 Tablespoons sugar 1/2 teaspoon maple flavoring 1 1/2 quarts fluid milk
- Add dry ingredients and flavoring to milk. Beat, stir, or shake until smooth.

(B) BANANA MILK SHAKE

- (Evaporated Milk)
- 1 tall can evaporated milk 2 cups water 2 cups ripe banana pulp (4 to 6 bananas)

Few grains salt
Milk and water should be cold. Press bananas through a course sieve or mash with fork. Add other ingredients and stir well. Makes 6 servings.

(C) BANANA MILK SHAKE

- (Liquid Milk)
- 1 ripe banana 1 cup cold milk Dash of salt

Mash or beat banana until smooth and creamy, or press through a sieve. Add milk and mix thoroughly. Chill. Serves two.

Variation: Place scoop of ice cream in tall glasses. Add banana milk shake.

ROSE BLACK SPOT CONTROL

Black Spot is one of the most common diseases of roses. It is likely to be more serious on susceptible plants in areas of high rainfall, but it is not confined to such area.

Large, roundish black leaf spots with irregular margins are often observed. However, the spots on soft twigs and leaf branches may frequently develop unnoticed. Severe damage results in premature leaf drop. This weakens plants and makes them more susceptible to die-back, drought and winter injury. Too, it also results in smaller flowers which are weak in color and fragrance.

Black spot is controlled by spraying once a week with Dithane M-22, Manzate, or Phaltan. Time between sprays may be longer during periods of little rainfall. Adding a spreader-sticker to the spray will provide better coverage. It is important that both lower and upper sides of the leaves be sprayed. Hose on sprayers or compressed air sprayers are generally satisfactory for a few rose plants.

Where powdery mildew is a problem, Karathane may be added to Dithane M-22 or Manzate. Most commonly used insecticides can be mixed with the aforementioned fungicides. Combination fungicide-insecticide mixtures are available but are generally more expensive. Dusts generally give very poor control of black spot.
