

The program committee has not yet reported on a planned program for the first year of operation. They are still in the process of "feeling out" the sentiments of prospective members.

The location committee has not yet reported on a site for the location of a Chamber headquarters.

The managerial committee hasn't yet reported on a prospective manager. Most of these committee actions

ROSE BLACK SPOT CONTROL Black Spot is one of the most ommon diseases of roses. It is ikely to be more serious on susceptible plants in areas of high rainfall, but it is not confined to uch area.

Large, roundish black leaf sp ots with irregular margins are often observed. However, the spots on soft twigs and leaf branches may frequently develop unnoticed. Severe damage results in premature leaf drop. This weakens plants and makes them more sus ceptible to die-back, drought and vinter injury. Too, it also results n smaller flowers which are we

ak in color and fragrance. Black spot is controlled by speying once a week with Dithane M-22, Manzate, or Phaltan. Time between sprays may be longer during periods of little rainfall. Adding a spreader - sticker to he spray will provide better covcrage. It is important that both lower and upper sides of the leaves be sprayed. Hose on spayers or compressed air sprayers re generally satisfactory for a ew rose plants.

Where powdery mildew is a problem, Karathane may be added to Dithane M-22 or Manzate. Most commonly used insecticides can be mixed with the aforementioned fungicides. Combination furgicide - insecticide mixtures are available but are generally more expensive. Dusts generally give very poor control of black spot.
