





In this country today, we have over 8 million Americans over 65 years of age who can't afford VISITS HERE square meal, can't pay for a warm, dry place to live, can't buy the medical care they need. was in Morton this week, on bu Many of these senior citizens

have never had much of this world's goods. Others have had good livings during some periods of life, but time and circumstances, inflation, sickness, and many other factors have left them penniless and almost hopeless.

One of the great social chalenges of America today is learning how to meet the complex problems of proper care of the ged and aging. As people, we have learned to prolong life through advances in medical science before we have learned how to make that longer life fully enjoyable and productive.

The problem generally falls into two major categories: (1) Senior citizens who still are ble and would like to work at east part time to supplment Soial Security benefits or old age assistance checks.

(2) Those who are ill or so adanced in years that they require special help for medical treatnent and nursing home care.

For those still able and wanting to work, I have introduced ills which would allow them to earn money without being penalzed through loss of either Social Security or Old Age Assistance checks. Those drawing Social Seurity could earn up to \$2,400 per car, twice the present \$1,200 limtation without having their Soc al Security checks cut. All those on Old Age Assistance could earn up to an additional \$50 monthly ithout their checks being cut. At the same time, I'm favoring

egislation to raise both Social Security and Old Age Assistance payments more in line with the all time high cost of living. Also I'm pressing for legislation to build additional low income pub ic housing units for the aged. A number of proposals are now

inder study to help elderly people have the medical treatment they need. None of these plans seem entirly satisfactory to me and it seems likely that a combination of the various medical care pro osals will be the answer. Studies show that the number

one problem of those over 65 ye ars of age is how to meet the high cost of medical treatment and drug bills at a time in life when they are most likely to be sick and least likely to be able to work.

We must work out a prepay lan where folks can pu side in their productive and healthier years to pay for these heavy medical expenses, almost sure come later.
