#### What About the Other Tax Payers?

A little over a year ago the Morton School system began work on compiling a card classification system on all taxable property in the school district.

The purpose of this was to institute a system by which a more accurate value could be placed on the properties, thus having a more equal tax system.

The major reason was not to raise more tax money; at this time the school budget was being met by the amount of money being collected, and state aid. But, because of the low values being placed by some individuals on their properties, the school district's valuation was ex-

Without more valuation, the district could build no nore classrooms . . . and a need for more classrooms in e future, was clearly indicated.

To put a blanket evaluation raise on everything, woald be merely to extend the present inequality.

Equalization was needed along with a valuation ra-With higher values, and a lower tax rate, the money to operate with would be kept about the same, but in case of the need for building, a bond election could be

Recently, work on the system was completed. Plans vere readied to put the new tax system in operation.

A Board was appointed to check the information on he cards and to assign classifications to the property. Another Board, an Equalization Board, was named, because, by law, the tax payer had a right to appeal any mistake or error which had been made in computing his ax. His rights could be executed by meeting with an eqalization board, which had full authority to change the value. But neither of these boards was to figure out the asic land values. This was up to the school board, this, and the duty of setting the tax rate.

The school board spent sessions of a two month period studying varying values which could be placed on types of land. After deliberations, they decided upon a set of values per acre of land, values on a type of building and values on a type of home.

By applying the information on the card to the set of classifications and multiplying the figure for that type f property, by the amount of property, the tax departnt was able to fix individual property values. A tax qualization board meeting date was set. Notices were

Here the carefully laid plans hit a snag.

Some persons said the values placed on the types of and were too high.

Some said values placed on houses were out of kilter.

Some alleged favoritism had been shown.

This group had one idea in common . . . their taxes, hey felt, were too high.

Temper flared, chages flew. A number of dissatisfied taxpayers called on the school board, individually, and in a body.

So loud was the clamor of protests, that a suggesof a committee of three taxpayers, that the plan be talled off another year, for further study, was adopted. he Board reasoned, something must be wrong.

But there were those who were not dissatisfied. here were those whose taxes had always been high enbugh. The new system showed no raise for them . . . even ome cases it offered a lesser tax. These persons, natrally did not "march upon the school board." These perons, with the "flip-flop" taken by the harrassed school oard, suddenly became the goats.

Perhaps the values were set too high.

Perhaps further study is needed.

But by what law of mankind, should an individual has paid his fair share of taxes, be further penalized the profit of those who have not, while we wait, and re-

It is possible that a check of the past values on propties owned by those whose valuations suddenly incre-400 percent and more, would show that their values deed, had been four times lower than they should have ten. Why then let this occur another year?

If all persons are not attempting to pay their fair ire, or even by accident or through ignorance do not e their values high enough, someone is carrying more his share of the burden.

And that someone . . . or those someones . . . are because of pressure, and the sudden decision of a board to reverse itself, asked to carry the load just
