





On Friday, August 19, three cot Fields were checked with farmers and 4-H Club boys invited to attend. Identification of beneficial and harmful insects and counts, were made. Sixteen farmers and 4-H Club boys attending these meetings.

Mr. John Thomas, Extension Entomoligist, assisted the County Agent in these group meetings. Certain diseases were recognized on the cotton and explained to the groups. As this year has been most favorable for diseases damaging cotton, it was thought wise to point out how these diseases affect grades and yields of cot-

As to what and how much can be done in disease control still remains a big problem. It is planned and requested by the Cotton Sub-Committee to secure the services of competent specialists in this field to assist in educational work with the farmers and businessmen in this county.





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

Chicks Need Varied Minerals For Best Growth

are twelve or thirteen nineral elements which a chick must have if he is to show normal rowth and development, says Dr W. Deyoe of the Texas A&M College System Poultry Science Department. Six of these miner required in concentrations of 0.05 percent or more. The micro, or trace, elements are required in concentrations of 0.03 to 100 parts

Calcium and phosphorus are proably the best known minerals of the macro-element class. The recommendations for calcium content in chick starter rations range from 0.8 to 1.0 percent, with a calcium-phosphorus ratio of approximately 1:1 to 1.5:1, continues Dr. Deyoe. Recommendations for phosphorus range from 0.75 percent with at least 0.45 percent being in the organic form.

Salt, which supplies sodium and chlorine, is also important in feed formulation. The requirements for this ingredient will vary depending on the amount of fish and meat products used in the ration. The salt content in drinking wat-er may also affect the requirements In most areas, from 21/2 to 5 pounds of salt per ton of feed will supply an adequate amount of sodium and chlorine, Dr. Deyoe

Of the trace elements, magnese s probably best known. According o Dr. Deyoe, this mineral is essential for normal bone development and for the prevention of perosis. The recommended level of 55 p. p. m. can be obtained by adding ½ pound of magnese sulfate (technical grade) per ton of all mash ration, the specialist

Zinc, another of the trace elments, is important to normal bone and feather development. This can be supplied by adding 1/4 pound of zinc sulfate per ton of complete ration. Iodine may be a problem in certain areas due to the low levels in the soil and plents. Iodized salt added to poultry feeds will solve this problem, says

In conclusion, Dr. Deyoe says that special attention should be given to the calcium and phosphorus content of a ration, and to the ratio of calcium to phosphorus in the finished feed. Of the trace minerals, magnese and zinc should be considered to be sure that the supply is sufficient meet the chick's requirements


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
