Indians Face Idalou Wildcats

Led by a group of fleet backs, some creditable passing from two different passers, and a lot of overall team experience, the Idalou Wildcats ranked as one of the area's top Class A teams, come to Morton for Friday night's game, definitely favored to win.

Joe Wilbanks and Billy Swan are the speedsters, and fullback Robert Lamm carries the ball well. Halfback Wilbanks and quarterback Tony Rodriguez are the passers.

Experience is the major factor in the Idalou team. They used it in defeating Sundown in their season opener and have chalked up three more victories since. They are rare in a shade above Farwell, according to most dopsters, but the dopsters more often than not, are doing their comparative ratings by scores rather than from actual witnessing the teams in action.

Coach John Paul Jones, after having witnessed a fine scrapping performance by his Indians last week, will gear them to expect the same tough brand of football from Idalou though it appears unlikely the Cats can drive any harder than the Farwell eleven did.

If Morton can continue to generate the fine fighting spirit they did last week, Morton fans could be in for a real football treat. An upset definitely could be in the making, although Idalou is a strong favorite.

Morton's chances, as usual, rest with three important things. Lacking speed, and lacking unusual size or weight advantage, Morton must rely on its passing; diversified play calling, and some breaks. The small Indian squad can't stand injuries, they just don't have the bench for

Half-Inch Rain Fell... HAIL DESTROYS MORE COTTON HERE

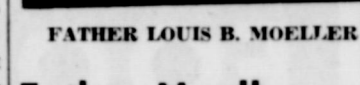
An early morning hail storm east of Morton, Thursday, cost several farmers hundreds of acres of cotton and damaged grain and blackeye pea crops.

Worst hit were D. E. (Gene) Benham and Earl Polvado, whose cotton caught the brunt of the hail and a half inch rain accompanying it.

E. O. Willingham estimated 200 lbs. to the acre of blackeye peas destroyed in addition to a 2c a lb. loss on the remaining peas.

Others hard hit on cotton crops included Haskell Milligan and A. H. Cox. The heaviest hail was nearly adjoining the farms hit the hardest by a hail in mid summer. Milligan also lost a lot of cotton in that storm.

The hail strip was estimated about five miles long.

Wilson Heflin Seriously Injured In 2 Truck Collision Near San Angelo

A 23-year-old Morton trucker, Wilson Heflin, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Heflin, is in Shannon Hospital at San Angelo, with extensive injuries suffered in a vehicle collision a few miles outside of Vanhook 25 miles from San Angelo.

Heflin, according to his family, was driving an empty grain truck, returning from Corpus Christi to load up at Stanton.

His semi collided with a loaded cotton trailer, pinning Heflin in the cab of his truck. When he was finally pulled out of the wreckage and hospitalized, he had suffered a broken hip, a broken knee cap, a chipped shoulder, bruises, and bone chips. He underwent surgery last Wednesday afternoon, following the Tuesday night mishap, to remove the bone chips.

The driver of the truck pulling the cotton trailer, was uninjured.

Heflin is in a cast from the waist down and it will be several more weeks before he can be moved.

TUESDAY IS ELECTION DAY, TOUR DAY FOR SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT

The election is scheduled for 1:30 p.m., Tuesday, on the Hubert Taylor farm one mile south of Whiteface.

And, incidentally, that is where the tour begins immediately following the election.

At the Taylor farm soil-conservation-conscious folks will view fertilizer tests, conservation irrigation practices, and grain sorghum varieties.

PLAY BEST GAME IN 30-8 DEFEAT... Indians Fall Before Farwell Steers

Turning in certainly their strongest effort thus far this season, one that earned them the plaudits of even the officials and the Farwell Coaches, Morton's Indians took a 30 to 8 licking from the Farwell Steers, Friday night, one of the best teams they've faced in several years.

In all around size and ability, the Indians were no match for the hard running, tough blocking, and rugged tackling Farwell 11, but in fight they handled them much more scrap than the Steers bargained for, and were still scrapping for all they were worth when the game ended.

Morton got its share of the breaks, but didn't cash in on them.

They scored their only touchdown through the hands of two Farwell defenders to pluck down a Steve Middleton pass, and looped across the goal on a 54 yard scoring play, Johnny Vandevanter passed to Lester Dupler for the two points, but Morton had been trailing, 22 to 0 at the time, midway in the third period.

Hard running, good speed and brute force were Farwell's offensive key. After Morton had recovered a Farwell fumble and drove to the 25 yard line early in the game, only to fall one yard shy of a first down, the Steers lost no time in showing their heels. On the 3rd play from play, lateraled off to scabbard Tom scabbard, quarterback Benji Dial rolled out to the right on a keeper my Williams as Dial was about 69 yards for a score.

With fullback Wilburn Zuber leading the way, Morton then drove to the Farwell 4 yard line, and again was stopped one yard short of a first down. They scrapped rugged defense for every yard in the march that netted four first downs but no score.

Farwell then ate up the rest of the first quarter and half of the 2nd period driving to the Indian 27 yd.

Gov. Price Daniel, keynote speaker, told the convention, "I'm supporting the national nominees, John Kennedy and Lyndon B. Johnson."

"No one should interpret support of these nominees as support of the platform written at Los Angeles," said the Governor, according to a report in the Dallas Morning News.

He urged that the convention express its principles through the state platform, and not through delegates.

Suburban models also feature improved comfort for second and third seat passengers as a result of seat modifications giving more foot room and more third seat headroom.

Included in the 1961 line are three new 4-wheel drive models for light-duty, maximum traction application. The 127-inch wheelbase, 1/2-ton vehicles are available as cab-chassis, wide-box pickup and conventional box pickup models rated from 4900 to 5600 pounds gross vehicle weight.

All Chevrolet 4-wheel drive units for 1961 feature a new 10-inch diameter clutch, standard 3-speed transmission, and 7.10x15 inch tires on the 1/2-ton models. Thus equipped, they meet the majority of light-duty maximum traction requirements.

Identifying styling refinements for all except tilt-cab models highlight a new front appearance, new group classification nameplates and new seat trim design. Eight new exterior colors are offered buyers in addition to the seven previously available.

Higher net engine power, fast warmup, and increased economy result from a new, optional temperature-controlled hydraulic fan drive for light-duty models with the V8 engine. The fan is disengaged unless it is actually required by radiator air temperature.

Williamson, volunteer Cochran county chairman for the bond program in Texas, said that nationwide holdings of Series E and H Savings Bonds stood at \$12.8 billion as of August 31, according to official word sent him from the Treasury Department in Washington. Of this total, Texans own about \$1,570 million.

the form of a congratulatory letter from William H. Neal, Assistant to the Secretary of the Treasury and National Director of the Savings Bonds program. In it, Neal said that the new \$12.8 billion total tops the World War II peak of E Bond holdings by some \$12 billion, pointing out the steady growth which has characterized the bond program throughout the peacetime years since 1945.

Williamson said that one of every four Cochran county residents is a bond owner — the national average.

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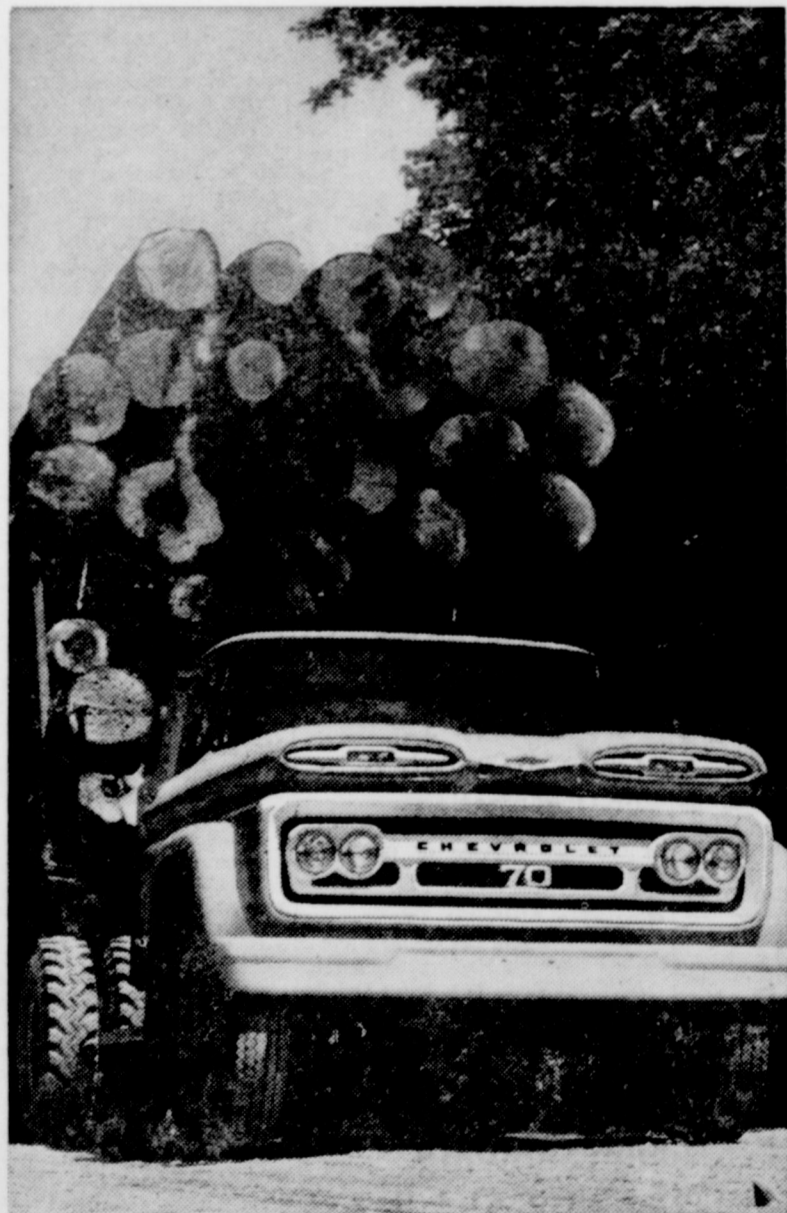

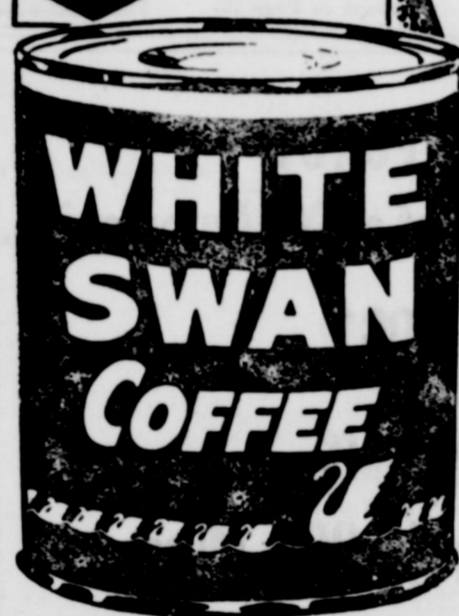

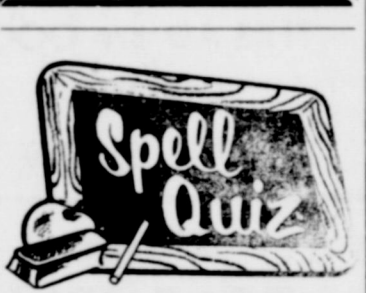

convenience to Falcon owners. 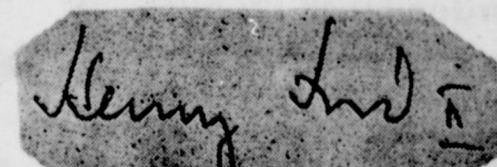

bate on the national document.

Not a single roll call vote was taken during the convention, an unusual procedure for Texas Democrats, reports the Ft. Worth Star-Telegram.

In slaps at the national platform, the convention favored continuation of the right to work law, elimination of which is one of Kennedy's strongest talking points in the North and East labor centers.

Retention of the 27 1/2 per cent oil depletion allowance also was advocated as another national platform slap.

Retention of the Connally amendment was favored.

Opposition to federal aid to education also was expressed. This too, in opposition to the national platform.

State-wide, the convention followed Governor Daniel's every request. The new state Democratic Executive Committee is believed friendly to the governor.

And, the convention adopted a number of points covering state legislation advocated by Governor Daniel.

These included recommendation of adoption of laws to implement present laws on escheat or abandoned property.

The reorganization of fiscal and governmental departments to curb unnecessary spending.

The pledging of support to the governor, Legislature, and members of Congress for matters covered in the platform.

Improved support for water engineers.

Adequate financing for a full-time State Board of Insurance.

Enlargement of the highway patrol and "adequate salaries" for safety on the highways.

J. Ed Connally of Abilene was elected chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee, a position he has held since Jim Lindsey, the 1958 choice, resigned.

Mrs. F. T. Baldwin of Houston, mother-in-law of Governor Daniel, was named vice-chairman of the state committee.

The convention also approved the selection of all 62 members of the state executive committee as chosen in the 31 senatorial district caucuses. This, it was reported, was the first time in modern history that all caucus recommendations had been accepted.

Following Governor Daniel's keynote plea for "harmony without fighting," delegates apparently refrained from fighting, but the convention was reported one of the most unruly ever conducted.

Neither Herbert Petry of Carrizo Springs, temporary chairman, or John Redditt of Lufkin, permanent chairman, could control the shouting delegates, it was reported.

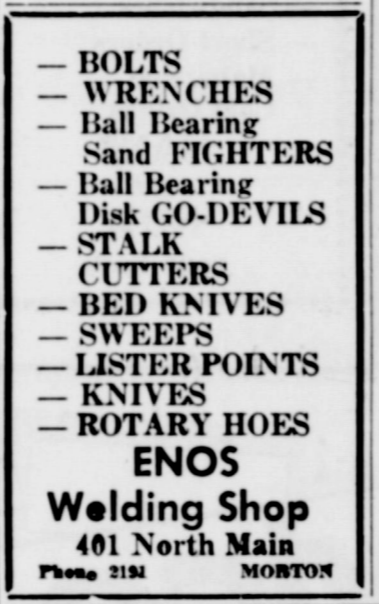

James O. Wright, Ford Motor Company vice-president and Ford Division general manager, said the new Ford, nearly four inches shorter and two inches narrower than in 1960, will offer "a completely new, fresh appearance in the classic Ford tradition of straight-line design."

Wright also announced the 1961 Ford styling has been recognized for its "functional expression of classic beauty" by a world-renowned fashion authority. In Rome, Italy, again, a backdrop of the new fashion center of the world, the Centro Per l'Alta Moda Italiana recently presented Ford Motor Company with a special medal honoring the 1961 Ford.

All six station wagon models, from the two-door Ranch Wagon to the nine-passenger, four-door Country Squire, with simulated wood paneling, have a new roll-down rear window in the tailgate. The tailgate itself is seven inches wider than in 1960. The front-facing third seat in nine-passenger station wagons has been improved and, when not in use, folds quickly into the floor.

A power operated rear-window is standard on the Country Squire models and the 9-passenger Country Sedan and optional on others.

Ford introduces a new 390-cubic inch Thunderbird Special V-8 engine in 1961 that is designed for effortless performance. The Thunderbird 352 Special and the Thunderbird 292 V-8's, as well as the Mileage Maker Six, all are designed to deliver greater economy on regular grade fuels.

Ford has improved all four transmissions for 1961 — the manual, overdrive, two-speed Fordomatic and dual-range Cruise-O-Matic. The Cruise-O-Matic Transmission is equipped with a new vacuum control throttle valve linkage which provides smoother, more precise shifting; ten ever before, and elimination of "pedic adjustment."

The classic Ford look of the high-styled 1961 model features the traditional, crisp, straight-line styling graceful front fenders bowed above widely-spaced headlights, full-width aluminum grille, and the famous Galaxie roof-line. Tobacco Plants Doing "Right Well" In Mrs. M. L. Doyle's Flower Beds

Who said tobacco wouldn't grow in Cochran County? The M. L. Doyles of Morton have proven tobacco grows in Cochran County.

They've found a way to get that "real tobacco taste" without filters, menthol, recessed tips, or other gadgets — grow your own.

Doyle hasn't said what he plans to do with the tobacco — chew it, smoke it, or just save it for future proof.

Mrs. Doyle, who works at the Eastside Cafe, reports that while in Weston, Missouri, near Kansas City, Missouri, last June, they picked up six plants from Roy Burns, a brother-in-law of Doyle.

The plants were set out in the Doyle yard here in Morton on June 5.

Their location is in Mrs. Doyle's flower bed on the southside of the house.

Three of the plants took root and grew. Today, two are about five feet in height.

They have leaves that are 24 inches in length, and 14 inches in width.
