It was also announced that there will be no sign up this fall of additional land or contracts under the Bank Conservation Reserve, and that existing contracts will remain in effect, and payments will continue to be made under them for the remainder of the term. The local Department of Agriculture appropriation bills provide money which to meet obligations already on books.

There are 97 Conservation Reserve contracts in effect in Cochran County, involving a total acreage of 2,364 acres, and annual rental payments for 1960 amount to \$222,500. Annual rental payments for 1961 are expected to be about the same.

The contracts are checked and controlled by the local office of the Soil Conservation Service, which is in charge of the program. The local office is located in the county agent's office.

### WATERWAY CONSTRUCTION ON FARM IS STEP TO HALT EROSION OF RAINS

The purpose of one of the Soil Conservation Service practices most needed in Cochran County last spring and early summer, that of building waterways, was graphically shown when the skies opened up and water poured into all areas of the county.

Until that time a lot of folks around the area had forgotten it really can rain in this normally dry county. Merlin Roberts, a soil conservationist, in cooperation with the SCS, has constructed a waterway to direct runoff water from his land to safe points of release with a minimum of erosion.

He has seeded the waterway with switch grass and the sides of the waterway will be constructed after the grass has been firmly established . . . probably this fall or early next spring, according to Gordon Houghton of the SCS. The accompanying picture shows the area in which the water way is being constructed. When the heavy rains came, runoff water began to run toward natural lakes. On many farms in the county, farmers were not even sure where some of the natural lakes were, because it had been so long since they had received enough water at one time to create or fill-up these natural lakes.

In the case of Roberts' farm, the problem in mind was to divert the heavy runoff waters into the natural lake, along a specified waterway, without covering too much territory. The land was basically flat and runoff water covered huge areas as it made its way toward the lakes. Along its path, the runoff water not only destroyed a lot of potential crops, but also caused a lot of needless soil erosion. Some of the washes created were knee deep on Roberts' farm . . . and on some farms they were deeper.

The water way being constructed on Roberts' farm will be 3500 feet long and 80 feet wide. In all it will help direct water some 1600 feet into either lakes, streams or areas of good grass land where the water will be well received and will not cause erosion.

**No Registration Is Required Here**

Although there is lots of talk nationally, regarding voter registration, Texas voters are not required to register.  
 The following information came from Mrs. Otha Denny, Cochran County tax-assessor, this week.  
 In order to vote in the General Election, Tuesday, Nov. 8, the voter must hold a 1959 (not a 1960) poll tax receipt, an exemption, or be entitled to an exemption.  
 Any voter who was 60 on or before Jan. 1, 1959, may vote in the Nov. 8 election by signing an affidavit as to his or her age.  
 As to exemptions, this is the rule: any person becoming 21 since Feb. 21, 1960, or who will be 21 on or before Nov. 8, may apply for and receive an exemption certificate enabling him to vote on Nov. 8, provided he does so on or before Oct. 8, which is 30 days before the date of the election in which he or she expects to vote.

For those paying poll taxes, a \$960 poll tax may be paid on and after Oct. 1, 1960, but it does not entitle the holder to vote in the Nov. 8, 1960 General Election. Only a 1959 poll tax does this.

It's the LAW... in TEXAS

Before a contract arises someone must make an offer and another must accept it.  
 Without an offer, no acceptance with no acceptance, no agreement. But there is often a time within which you can accept the offer. And if not, the offer ends anyhow within a "reasonable time" which is determined by circumstances and the parties' intentions.  
 Smith had a set of books which Brown wanted. Brown wrote and offered him \$200 for the set. Smith didn't answer for six months, and meantime Brown bought a similar set. One day Brown got a letter from Smith saying "I accept your offer of \$200 for the set of books."  
 Brown told Smith he'd bought the books elsewhere, but Smith still claimed that his belated "acceptance" had nevertheless sealed the contract with Brown.  
 Was there a contract? No, the offer had lapsed because it had not been accepted in the circumstances within reasonable time.  
 There are many ways to end an offer. You may withdraw it, you may say that the offer expires at a given time, or you may die, or the other party may turn it down directly or by making a counter offer.  
 Here Smith had failed to accept Brown's offer within a reasonable time which ended it just as though it had been withdrawn.  
 What is a reasonable time? It varies. The offer could expire in a few minutes in the stock market or last for quite a while, depending upon what court would think is a reasonable time.  
 But in Smith's case six months was unreasonable.

**EAT ENOUGH BREAKFAST**  
Two out of three Americans eat too little breakfast. . . How about you? Breakfast should supply about one-third of the total daily food needs. . . Studies show that a protein rich breakfast can starve off fatigue hours longer than a breakfast with little protein. Eggs are a good source of protein and can be prepared in many different ways. . . Give your body the proper fuel to start the day off right.

**ORANGEGG - A "QUICKIE" BREAKFAST**  
Getting family members to eat an egg for breakfast may be pretty hard to do when each one is in a hurry to get to school or on the job. Orangegg, served in a frosty cold glass is a fine way to get not only egg, but also orange juice.

It's easy! Simply beat one egg thoroughly. Mix well with eight ounces of fresh or frozen orange juice and serve immediately in frosted glasses.

**DO YOU HAVE HOUSEHOLD INSECTS?**  
It is next to impossible to observe a home and its surroundings without finding some form of insect life. This is not strange because insects and related species constitute the largest number of animals found in the world.

Some insects feed on fabrics, contaminate food, attack dwellings, bite humans, carry diseases, cause secondary infections and make themselves generally obnoxious. On the other hand, some insects are very beneficial to mankind. But, generally, the control of insects in and around the household is a very real problem.

Certain pests may be found and controlled outside but some live entirely within the home. The only way to control these house-dwellers is to apply insecticides, either sprays or dusts, inside the home. Fumigation is seldom necessary, but in case it is, the homeowner should rely on a professional exterminator.

Chemical control should be supplemented with sanitation and good housekeeping if it is to do its job properly. Insects live in cracks, under bits of wood and other debris, in the walls and beneath the floors of homes, and in almost any dark, quiet place. Hiding places such as these should be cleaned, but even the most spotless homes may occasionally become infested.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has prepared a leaflet, L-311, "Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects," which contains

the latest recommended controls for 24-pests. In addition to the controls, the leaflet contains a section on insecticidal formulation and one on equipment needed for application. A copy of this guide may be obtained from this office.

Another important section of this leaflet is a list of cautions. Anyone using insecticides should read, learn and observe the do's and don'ts contained in this list. Remember, insecticides are poisonous to species other than insects.



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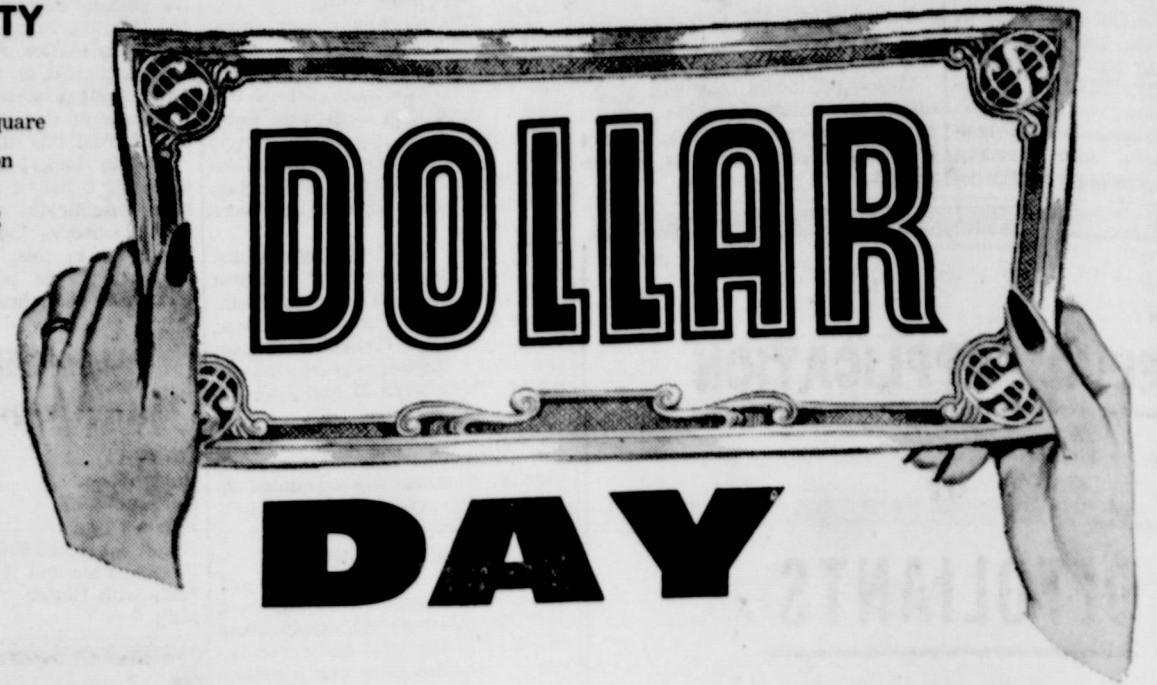

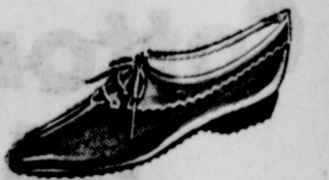
