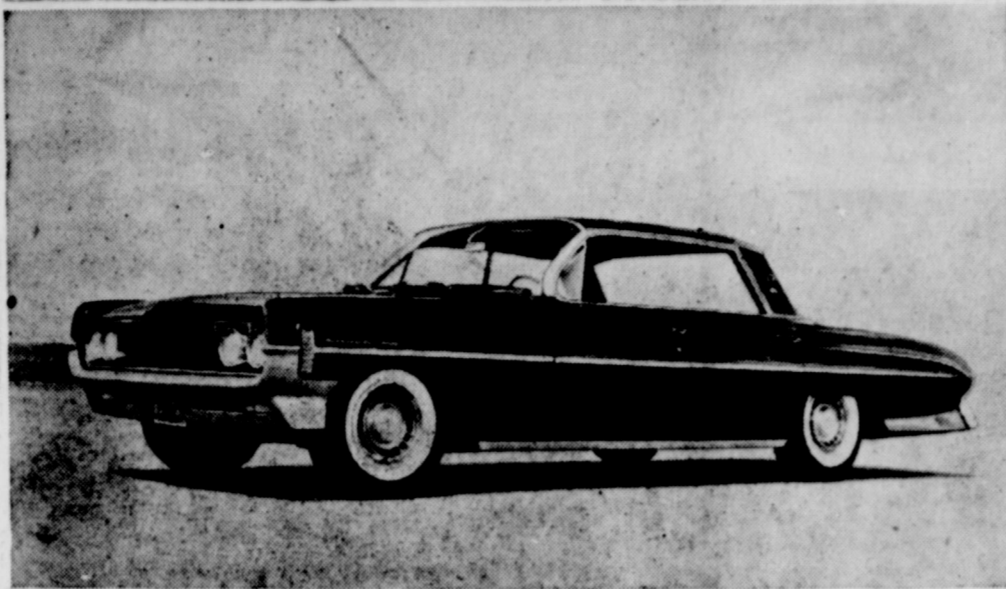

Highlighting the styling motif, the sculptured sides of the Dynamic 88, Super 88, and 98 sweep back from the distinctive, alert-looking front end with the profile tapering at the rear — styling that is unmistakably Oldsmobile. Interior fashions of sensational decor — utilizing, brighter, newer, more modern fabrics, color-harmonized with exterior finishes and patterned for utility, glamor and elegance.

"Even in the economical Dynamic 88, the new interiors compare with those available only on high price class cars a few years back," Wolfram stated. "Interior trims for the Super 88 are even more smartly fashioned while the 98 interiors are the most elegant of all.

"The bodies for the Dynamic 88 and Super 88 have been completely redesigned," he continued.

President Eisenhower has proclaimed National Fire Prevention Week, October 9 - 16, 1960. In the proclamation he calls upon "our people to promote programs for the prevention and control of fires" and urges State and local governments, public service and farm organizations to participate.

In the last decade, fires have killed more than 100,000 persons and disfigured many hundreds thousands more. Each year over 11,000 people in the U.S.A. die — needlessly — in fires, and more than twice that number are severely burned or disfigured for life, records show.

Property losses are high too. Most frequent causes of fires in farm homes are — Defective heating equipment, faulty chimneys and flues, defective and overloaded wiring systems and matches and smoking.

Keep your home free of fire hazards by regular inspections. One out of every two dwelling fires start in either the kitchen or livingroom. Bedrooms and basements are next.

Do not allow trash or oily rags to accumulate in farm buildings. They may be the starting place for a fire, and may help a fire to spread. Keep attics, lofts, cellars, and other storage places clean of trash and accessible for firefighting.

Remove grass, weeds, and dry vegetation from around buildings and along fence rows.

Burn trash regularly in small quantities, in a safe place, and at a safe distance from buildings, preferably in good receptacles.

JOHN DEERE 1961 TRACTORS TO SHOW SAT.

Saturday, Oct. 8, the all new 1961 John Deere goes on display at McAlister-Huggins, Morton.

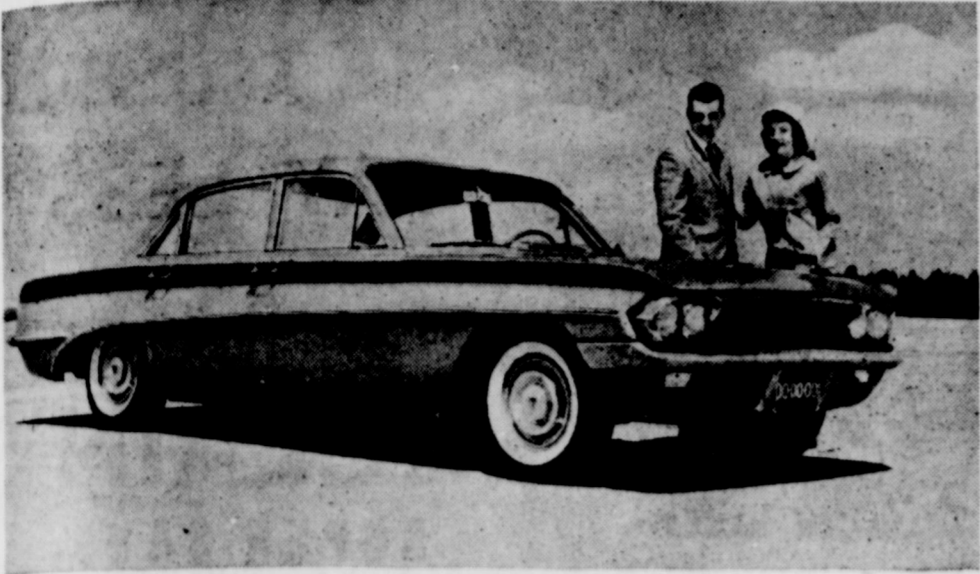

**Farmers Production Efficiency Climbs
Far More Rapidly Than Industry's**

In spite of being caught in one of the most drastic cost-price squeezes in history — lower prices for what they sell, higher prices for what they buy — American farmers have increased their production efficiency at a rate far ahead of workers in industry.

One hour of farm labor in 1960 produces four times as much food and fiber as it did in 1920. Crop production is 56 percent higher per acre. The output per breeding animal is 81 percent greater.

Productivity of the American farmer is now increasing at a rate more than twice as high as the productivity of workers in industry. Since 1950, the output per man hour in non-agricultural industry has risen two percent per year. In agriculture the increase has been at the rate of five percent per year.

In Russia, one agricultural worker produces for four or five people. More than 40 percent of the total labor force of the Soviet Union works in agriculture and forestry.

If American farmers were no more efficient than those of the

Soviet Union, 22,500,000 Americans who now work in manufacturing, construction, mining, the trades, transportation and other non-farm business would be required to produce the essential needs in food, clothing and forest products.

In spite of all this efficiency, the average per capita income of the farm population is still less than half the income of the non-farm population.

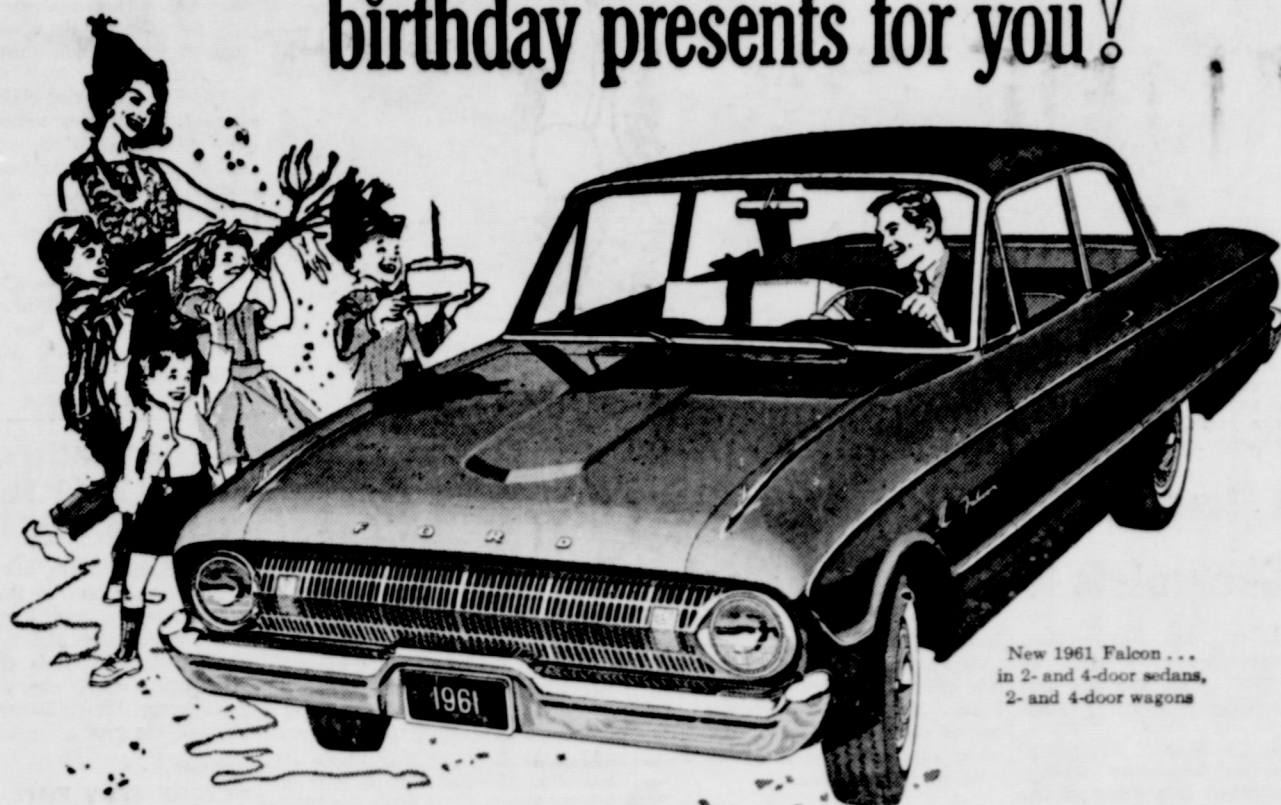
The average income per capita of those who live on farms in the United States in 1959 was \$965 for the year — \$644 from farming plus \$321 from non-farm population was \$2,216.

The net income for one hour of farm work in 1959 was \$1.29. One hour of work in a factory averaged \$2.22. Hourly earnings of food marketing workers, those engaged in food processing, wholesales trade and retail food stores, averaged \$2.10.

Farm incomes have continued to go down steadily during most of the period since World War II, while non-farm workers have had an almost steady increase in income. Since 1945, the farm value of food has risen only 16 percent, but the marketing margin — after processing, packaging and distribution — has increased by 93 percent.

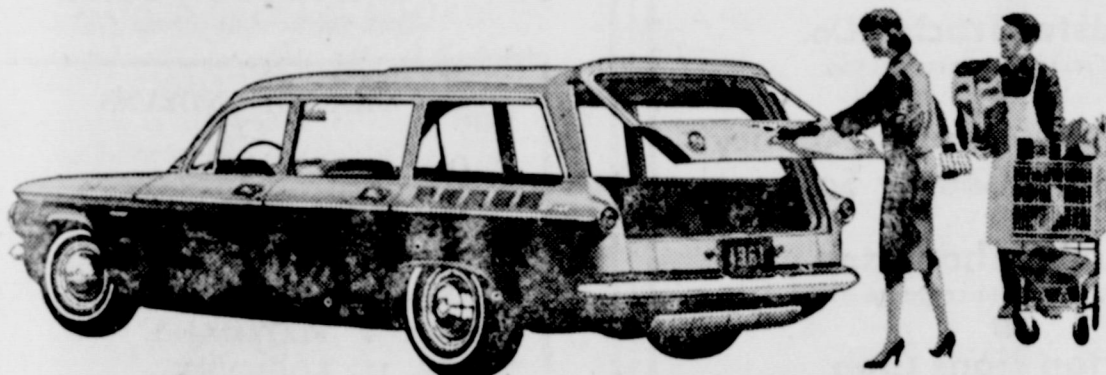

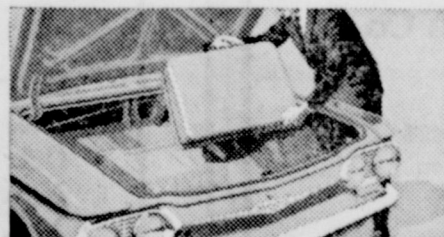

It's the LAW . . . — in TEXAS

Thousands of school children recently trooped back to school throughout Texas. Many of them will be transported by school buses. Most people are careful when approaching a school bus which may be standing beside the road or school to pick-up school children or allow them to alight. However we have already had some bad accidents this year because a child or a motorist or both, were careless at that very time.

Texans are aware of the law which requires a driver to make a complete stop when overtaking from the rear a school bus which has stopped to receive or discharge school children. After stopping immediately behind the bus, he is then allowed by law to proceed past same at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children.

What many persons do not realize is that the very same rules apply when MEETING a stopped school bus. While everyone is interested in protecting our children, unthinking violators of this simple safety rule greatly outnumber those who comply. Failure to follow the law in this case can lead to fines up to \$200.00 even when no accident occurs. Following an accident in which some child is injured or killed, the penalties are naturally much more serious.

Although the above rule does not always apply when passing a stopped school bus in a business or residential district of a town, the necessity for extreme caution even in those locations is obvious.

When it comes to overtaking and passing moving vehicles, exercise of ordinary common sense will generally keep a driver within the law. For instance, when passing a car it is only common sense to proceed on past it a safe distance before cutting back to the right side of the highway. Also any driver would realize the danger of increasing his speed while another is attempting to pass him.

In the same category is the prohibition against passing on the right side under most ordinary conditions. Of course, you may legally pass on the right in a few specific instances, such as when the vehicle overtaken is making or about to make a left turn, or upon a one-way street with two or more lanes, or upon a four-lane highway.

However, our traffic laws state that even when passing on the right is allowed, it shall be done only under conditions permitting such movement in safety. And, in no event should such passing be accomplished by driving off the pavement or main traveled portion of the roadway.

Familiar to all are the no passing zones designated by dash lines placed to one side of the center stripe on our highways. Not so well known are the restrictions against crossing the center line when approaching within 100 feet of or when traversing any intersection or railroad grade crossing.

A driver should never cross the center line of a highway when the left side of the road is not clearly visible and free of oncoming traffic. Generally speaking, when not engaged in passing another vehicle, one should not drive to the left of the roadway.




