**Ted Weaver New Chamber Manager**

The new Chamber of Commerce manager is looking forward to meeting everyone in the community, as soon as possible.

Richard Collard, chamber president, said the board of directors was happy to have located Weaver. The board had interviewed several possible managers the last few months, without success.

**BUSINESS REASONS**

**Coach Light Resigns; Owen Replacement**

"The hardest decision of my life," was the way Coach Don Light described the decision that led to his resignation this week as head football coach at Friona High School.

"And if you ask me what the second hardest decision was, it probably was coming to Friona in the first place," said Coach Light, referring to the 27-game losing streak status when he took over at FHS.

However, Light called his stay at Friona "the most enjoyable years of my life," adding that he and his family have come to think of Friona as "home," and that they wouldn't hesitate to have stayed and reared their family here.

As a matter of fact, Light tried to get Friona approved as his "home base" in his new position, but could not do so.

Coach Light this week resigned his position to become associated full time with the Rain and Hall Insurance Bureau, for which he will do underwriting, adjusting and claims work.

Many Friona sports fans were probably like us, in fearing Friona would lose Coach Light's services after he pulled Friona from its quagmire of defeat and into an 8-2 record his very first year, then duplicating the feat the following year.

"Actually, I've never had any ambition to get in a large school system. Friona is the ideal spot, as far as I personally am concerned," Coach Light said.

He indicated that even while still at Stinnett, after some of his outstanding teams there with Donny Anderson, he was contacted by some class AAA and AAAA schools, wanting him to apply for a job, but he wasn't interested.

What was the biggest thrill at Friona? "I suppose that first win over Farwell the night we snapped the losing streak is about as big as any. I remember that game as well as any ball game I've ever coached," Light says.

He added that it was quite a thrill to be associated with the kids on that year's team, especially the senior boys who had never played a winning varsity game, and see them taste victory for the first time.

Coach Light says it kinda surprised the coaches as well as everyone else when the team went 8-2 in his first season here, reversing the 0-27 record it had compiled the previous three years. "We felt we could win some games that year, but even in our wildest dreams we weren't thinking about anything like an 8-2 season," he admits.

The Friona Coach, who has become the winningest in the history of Friona High School in his five seasons here, admits that considering his career as a whole, his association with Donny Anderson ranks high on the list.

Anderson starred for Light at Stinnett, and later went on to gain All-America honors at Texas Tech, and then was signed by the World Champion Green Bay Packers at the highest bonus ever paid any professional athlete.

"It's easy to remember a guy like Donny. However, you also remember lots of other kids — even the ones who don't get to play a lot. They've all meant a lot to us, and are a part of our memories," Light said.

What was his biggest disappointment? "Anytime you mention the word disappointment, the first thing that comes to mind was that Floydada game in 1964."

"We had similar feelings at Hale Center this year, but I suppose for a game with as much riding on the outcome as it had, especially when you outplayed them as badly as we did and still lose, the Floydada game has to rank high," Light says.

Friona sports fans feel pretty lucky that Don Light came Friona's way in 1963, but Light says he thinks he was the lucky one.

"We feel we were real fortunate to have come along when we did. Friona was ripe to change their attitude to a winning one, and we happened to be the lucky one to get the opportunity of being a part of it," he says.

Don Light, head football coach at Friona High School the past five seasons, resigned this week to enter another line of work. Light was replaced by assistant

coach Bob Owen in a meeting of the school board Monday night.

Light will be associated with the Rain and Hall Insurance Bu-

reau as an adjuster and claims agent beginning February 1. The school board accepted Light's resignation with regret, expressing their appreciation

for the things he has done for the school's athletic department.

In serving as head coach for five seasons, Light has been surpassed in tenure at the job by only one other FHS coach, Raymond Cook, who resigned after six seasons to become high school principal, a position he still holds.

Owen has been a coach for nine years, seven of which were as Coach Light's assistant.

Coach Light termed his decision as "the hardest of my life." He appeared before the school board on Monday, and expressed his appreciation for being allowed to serve in his capacity, and for the cooperation he had received.

"I can't express how appreciative I am to have the opportunity to be the new head coach. It is a great opportunity, although quite a challenge to fill the shoes left vacant by Coach Light. I hope I can do half as well as he did," commented Coach Bob Owen on Tuesday.

A graduate of Midwestern University, Wichita Falls, Owen holds from Olney. The school board will allow Owen to have a hand in naming his assistant, although the position most likely will go unfilled the remainder of the school term.

"The board feels fortunate in having someone of Coach Owen's calibre for the job," said Superintendent of Schools, Alton Farr.

The Rain and Hall Insurance Bureau, with which Light will be associated is a crop hail bureau which represents nine insurance companies. He will do all underwriting, adjusting and claims paying.

Classified as a specialist, Light will call on insurance agents who sell crop hail insurance for the nine companies. This is the type of work he has done during the summer months for the past 10 years. He will move to Amarillo, the company's headquarters, in June.

"Coaching has been real good to us. This was the hardest decision of my life. However, we felt the new position offered a chance for more security and benefits than we could have in coaching and with a family you have to consider these things," Light said.

Coach Light came to Friona in the fall of 1963, when the Chieftain football team was in the midst of a 27-game losing streak, longest such streak in the state at the time.

The team downed Farwell, 26-13 in its opening game, and went on to miraculously win its first eight games enroute to an 8-2 season—not only turning the tide, but winning the most games ever for one season at FHS.

Light's 1964 team also was 8-2 but its 7-6 loss in the final game of the year at Floydada gave Floydada a tie with them for the district title, and the whirlwinds got the playoff rights.

Although dropping to 6-4 the following year, the Chiefs finished strong and finally won the elusive district title.

Coach Light's 1966 team, which finished 4-5-1 was the

**Building Increases By 50% Over 1966 Totals**

Building in Friona for 1967 increased 50 per cent over the previous 12 months, a check of building permit records revealed this week.

Building permits were issued by the City of Friona during the calendar year for construction with an estimated value of \$505,810. This is \$166,480 over the figure for 1966, which stood at \$339,330.

The increased building tempo got things back "approaching normal" as far as the city is

concerned. Two years ago, in 1965, the year's building figures stood at \$599,100.

Spurred probably by the beginning of construction of Missouri Beef Packers' new plant, building gained in each category over that of the previous year.

(The construction figures for the Missouri Beef Packers plant are not included in the city's total, since it is outside the city. Neither are figures for Hi Plains Feed Yard, west of the

city. These two facilities cost roughly \$4,000,000 between themselves alone.)

Residential building was up for 1967, from \$264,780 to \$388,910 — a gain of \$124,130. Included in the 1967 figures are the 10-unit apartments of R.L. Fleming, which boosted the total by \$95,000.

Even without the apartments, residential building would have increased by \$29,130 over the 1966 total of \$264,780.

Commercial building also increased, from \$40,400 to \$57,000 in 1967. Included in the commercial buildings were a new shop for City Body Shop, a new Fina station and a new restaurant begun in December. In addition, a new girl scout building was included in the 1967 totals, not included in the residential or commercial column either.

Additions and alterations increased from \$34,150 in 1966 to \$44,900 the past year.

Although the total building was up by about 50 per cent, the number of permits issued was actually three less than in 1966. Residential buildings increased from 15 to 17 and commercial buildings increased from two to three. Additions and alterations were less in number than the previous year.

The all-time record building year was 1964, when city building stood at \$1,978,040, including the Friona High School building.

Monthly totals were as follows: January -0-; February, \$900; March \$19,800; April, \$30,100; May \$122,000; June \$36,700; July \$22,800; August \$37,350; September \$26,800; October \$110,200; November \$27,500 and December \$71,660.

**Chamber Announces Date; Speaker For Banquet**

The banquet will be held at the high school auditorium. During the annual banquet will be the naming of Friona's "man woman, and teacher of the year" along with the "most courteous employee."

Crossbreeding, cattle futures trading and backgrounding will be subjects discussed on January 11th at a County-wide beef cattle meeting.

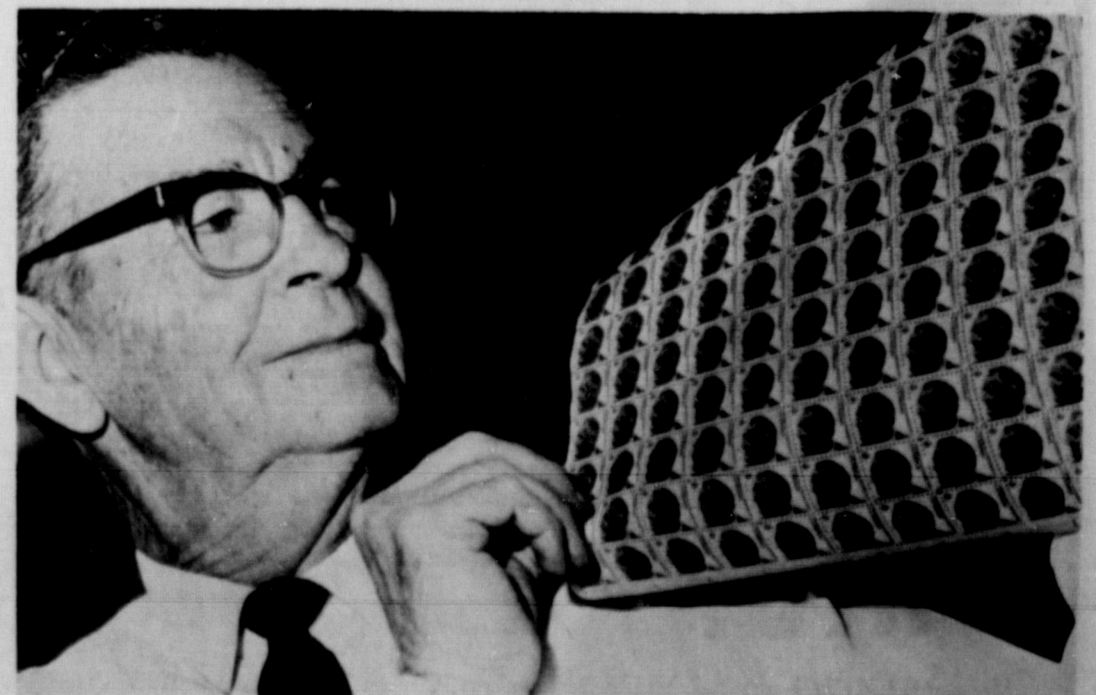
The program will start at 1:30 p.m. and will be held at the Bovina Bank. This program is being sponsored by the Parmer County Livestock Sub-Committee.

Several months ago this column carried the suggestion that some thought be given to establishing a museum in Friona. Except for one phone call the idea was met by a silence so profound that a grain of maize could be heard falling in the Black elevator.

More recently June "Around Friona" Floyd gave the subject a gentle nudge and a check with her reveals that response was something less than enthusiastic.

Well, that's understandable. After all we did have to get our library settled down somewhere and then Christmas and New Years came along. Now that we have a breathing spell before our next national holiday on April 15th - (Income Tax Day) the biggest holiday of the New Society - let's give the museum deal another shuffle.

Perhaps the mention of a museum conjured up thoughts of a fine new building complete with curator, custodian, and confusion. Tain't necessarily so. Here is a plan that may have the saving grace of killing two birds with one stone.

The general public would doubtless enjoy going from place to place to see who had what and "impulse buying" would follow in lots of cases. Nor would such a planned display become stagnant for as public interest became aroused more and more articles would be found to display and fresh items could be mentioned in a firm's advertisements.

Have you seen the collection of irons at Gib Boatman's, the old harness and cook stove in Taylor and Sons the old photographs in Jack Anderson's Barber Shop and in Plains Hardware office? There are doubtless others that we just do not know about -- but would enjoy.

Why not take advantage of our modern arts and crafts? A museum is not only concerned with antiques, many have rooms devoted to the works of students, teachers and plain old John Q. Public.

Now if you are still with us, try this on for size. Friona is famous as an agricultural center so why not an outdoor display of antique farm machinery? Such a collection placed along a highway near town, or better still downtown, and properly advertised, could be the means of encouraging tourists to stop in Friona for a visit, and remember, they have to stop to spend money!

Main items of business was the resignation of head coach Don Light, who appeared in person before the board, and the hiring of Bob Owen as his replacement.

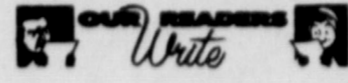
Superintendent Farr reported that a snack bar has been opened in connection with the

It is really past the time most of us think about New Year's resolutions, but it is never too late for any of us to begin a new in the area of maintaining our health or improving it. A release from Women's Medical News Service recently contained some very good advice for any of us.

It was in the form of resolutions. Although the first one doesn't apply to me, since I have never formed the smoking habit, it would be well for everyone to consider it seriously. HEALTH RESOLUTIONS FOR 1968

I will try to stop smoking, if I am now afflicted with the habit. If I don't smoke, I will not begin. The American Heart Association pointed out recently that some one million young people start smoking cigarettes every year. This despite evidence that heart disease, stroke, lung cancer, emphysema, chronic bronchitis and peptic ulcers are triggered or aggravated by cigarette smoking.

I will have an annual check-up and will make certain that my family receives medical checks. I will be meticulous not only about my children's shots but about adult shots as well.

I will prevent overweight by eating a diet appropriate to my life style. (Obviously, a construction worker needs a different diet from a sedentary desk-bound worker). I will avoid fad diets and diet pills unless prescribed by a physician.

I will take medicines only when prescribed for me. I will avoid self-medication, remembering that barbituates, anti-histamines, sleeping pills, pep pills, sedatives and their relatives can cause serious damage when taken indiscriminately.

I will seek medical advice for health problems and will not rely on neighbors' information, old wives' tales, or other such well intentioned but poorly informed sources.

I will not be embarrassed to ask my doctor questions, remembering that there is no foolish question if you are genuinely seeking information. At the same time, I will help the physician by providing as complete health data as I can. A health history is an important diagnostic aid to the doctor.

I will seek interests that will keep me mentally alert and satisfied so that neither middle age nor old age will be threatened.

I will exercise appropriately and regularly so that my body is kept toned and I can enjoy the sight of a well-kept body, fine skin, and bright eyes when I look in the mirror.

If any of us make and keep most of these resolutions, our neighbors and friends will soon notice a change in us whether we have informed them of our intention to do so or not.

So many people in our town and surrounding area do so very many things for the pleasure and benefit of others that it would be impossible to name all of them. During the Christmas season you see so many beautifully decorated homes just about anywhere you look.

## Dodd All-Conference; Stars On Offense

Doug Dodd, former star full-back for the Friona Chieftains, was chosen to the all-conference team in his junior year at East Central State College, Ada, Okla.

Dodd's team finished 8-2, and tied for the Oklahoma Collegiate Conference's championship, the third straight year they have been in on the conference title.

This was Dodd's first chance to do much ball carrying, and he made the most of it. The former Friona flash scored ten touchdowns, and booted 28 points - after - touchdown, and added a field goal, to account for 91 of his team's points.

Doug's best year in high school was his senior season, when he scored 114 points.

The field goal allowed EC to edge past Central State by 24-21. Dodd has kicked three field goals in three years, and each has won the game for his team. In 1965 as a freshman, he booted one to beat Northeastern, 10-7, and his three-pointed against the same team in 1966 won the game 24-21.

Dodd has made good on three of five field goal attempts in his college career. One of the attempts, in a game the team won anyway, was a 52-yarder. "I had plenty of distance on that one, but it was off to the right," Dodd says.

One of the games of 1967 set a record of sorts, when Dodd's team tangled with Langston University and won, 48-13. Langston, a colored team, did a lot of passing (and missing), and the game was not completed until 11:45 p.m., starting at 7:30.

Dodd had his best yardage total in this game, making 172 yards, although scoring just one touchdown. He averaged carrying the ball about 30 times per game, which was about par when he was toting the pigskin for Friona.

What about next year? "We should have another pretty good team," Doug says. "We lose just four players -- two half-backs and an all-conference guard. I hate to lose the guard, because he blocked for me on our power sweep, which was our favorite play," the former FIS athlete says.

Final figures have not been released, but toward the end of the season, Dodd was 10th nationally scoring and 20th in rushing among all players in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA).

### Bond Sales Reach Goal



During the month of November United States Savings Bond sales in Parmer County totaled \$71,808 according to a report received today from Frank A. Spring, Chairman of the Parmer County Savings Bonds Committee.

This whopping one-month total, one of the largest on record locally, allowed the county to top its 1967 goal of \$130,000. Sales now stand at \$132,950.

During the first eleven months of 1967 Savings Bond sales in Texas totaled \$153,756,962 which is 85 per cent of the 1967 sales goal and a 10.3 per cent increase over sales during the same period last year.

Nationally, the total sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds for the first eleven months of 1967 amounted to \$4,546 million -- 1.3 per cent above a year earlier.

Sales of the new Savings Notes available only to regular buyers of E Bonds totaled \$17.3 million during November, bringing the cumulative total to \$62.8 million since May.

This is part of the County Program Building Committee, and its function is to study county situation and plan programs to assist homemakers in being more efficient in solving problems concerned with family living.

Another title for the Seminar could well be called "Tips -- from Toddlers to Teens," because that's just what it will give to parents who attend.

A changing world, changing human values, and an affluent society has brought about changes that call for guidelines, an awareness of problems and some possible answers.

Parents in the county have an opportunity to hear well trained speakers on the subject of "Child Development," beginning Tuesday, January 16, at 2 p.m., at the Hub Community Center. It could be the most worthwhile two hours spent during the week. Do plan to be present.

4-H PROJECT WORK -- is

already showing results. A visit in the home of Ute Blacklock of Bovina last week, revealed some nice improvements for her bedroom. A study desk was an added feature, an attractive bulletin board was made for all those souvenirs that girls accumulate, refinished chest and more convenient and attractive arrangement of furniture were results of bedroom project study. Ute has a lot more ideas for improvement to work on but she has made a real good start.

Another group in "bedroom improvement" project has started under the capable leadership of Mrs. Hurshel Harding of Farwell. They have had two meetings in which they studied correct picture hanging techniques and color harmony.

An achievement tour of members accomplishments will be held at the completion of project.

By-the-way 4-H leaders are especially invited to take advantage of the "Child Development Seminar," working with youth calls for this could be very helpful.

### "Beware Of Easy Money," Warns Extension Agent

"Easy Money, - a dollar down and a dollar a week," plan can be the downfall for many young couples starting out to establish homes, says Cricket B. Taylor, Parmer County Extension Agent. Some guidelines to follow are given by specialist in the field of Management that could prove helpful if followed.

Watch for credit pitfalls when you use credit cautions Specialist Joy Arrington at Texas A&M University.

Some of the largest credit pitfalls are:

1. The add-on clause. The seller keeps the title to an entire list of items bought on credit.
2. The balloon contract. The final payment may be many times larger than the preceding month. If the borrower isn't aware of this and isn't prepared to meet the payment, his purchase may be repossessed. Balloon contracts are illegal in some states.
3. The acceleration clause. Default in a single payment makes all other payments due and payable at once.
4. The wage assignment. This may allow the seller to collect part of your paycheck if you are delinquent on a payment.
5. Extra credit charges. These might include life insurance, or processing fees. Borrowers should recognize that these may add substantially to the total cost of borrowing. Borrowers should demand these charges listed so that they may determine whether or not they are excessive.

The special problems of farming have long been recognized in the Social Security Law according to John Troop, Social Security representative for this area.

Farming, as any farmer can verify, is a risky business. Many times outside forces beyond the farmer's control can damage or destroy his crops and cause him to suffer a low return for his investment and labor or even a loss.

"To protect the farmer's stake in social security against low yield or loss years," explained Troop, "an optional method of reporting self-employment income for social security purposes was set up."

"The law now provides that if net earnings after expenses are less than \$1600 in a year, the farmer can still get credit for up to \$1600 social security credit by reporting two-thirds of his gross earnings. He pays social security tax on this amount."

Most farmers know that their social security benefits are based on all their earnings credited under social security. The higher his average earnings are, the higher his retirement benefit will be.

Anyone desiring further information about this method of reporting should contact a representative of the Social Security Administration office, Room 211, Federal Building, in Clovis. The office is open from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Dwain Phipps, adult leader from Friona, will train a senior and junior team to participate in area contests this winter and spring. Phipps presented a set of slides on judging market steers at the meeting. Members will also receive training in judging sheep and swine in the next two months.

### Farmers Home Adm. Loans \$1,665,750

A total of \$1,665,750 was loaned during the past year to farmers and rural residents served by the local office of the Farmers Home Administration at Farwell, according to Billy R. Boling, the local county supervisor.

Operating and Emergency loans accounted for \$1,374,050 of the loans made. These loans were used to purchase stock calves, machinery and to finance the farm and home operating expenses.

Other loans were for Farm Ownership - \$50,000.; Economic Opportunity loans - \$350,000. Nine Rural Housing loans in the amount of \$88,200; and one Association loan in the amount of \$150,000 to construct the Farwell Country Club and Golf Course.

### FOR 1968

## \$17 Million In Construction Announced By Public Service

Power plant additions which will increase the company's electric generating capability by 225,000 kilowatts make up the major investments in a \$17,818,000 construction program for 1968 were announced today by Roy Tolk, president of Southwestern Public Service Company.

"We have invested more than \$200-million in new equipment in the last ten years for just one purpose, meeting the needs of our customers. Our 1968 program is another step in a continuing effort to assure our 45,000 square mile service area of the electric power necessary for it to reach its full growth potential," Tolk said in announcing the electric company's 1968 plans.

The company's generating capability will go to 1,717,000 kilowatts, twice what it was ten years ago, with the completion of a 210,000 kilowatt addition to Nichols Station, northeast of Amarillo, and the installation of a 15,200 kilowatt gas turbine in the Guymon, Oklahoma area.

The Guymon installation will be used principally for peaking purposes during periods of high usage, but will also provide area protection, complementing transmission line power sources

in the Oklahoma Panhandle. The plant will be operated by remote control from Guymon and can be brought up to full production in a matter of minutes.

In view of the concern about reliability of service which is prevalent in some areas of the nation and in political circles in Washington, Tolk pointed out that Southwestern Public Service Company will have adequate reserve capabilities in 1968.

Water and electricity will begin combining forces for efficiency and economy in 1968 with the beginning of the utilization of the Sanford Dam Project by the 11 member cities of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority. The major pumping on this system will be done electrically on a controlled peak system supervised at the Southwestern Public Service Company's dispatching center in Amarillo, with the most efficient generating units being utilized, thus keeping production costs as low as possible.

Other improvements planned in the 1968 program will strengthen the electric company's 4200 mile transmission system which interconnects 10 major power plants and provide for additions to distribu-

tion facilities in communities throughout the service area.

"1967 was a year of decision on the High Plains and this is the basis of our optimism for 1968 and other years to come. The thoughtful consideration and financial support which has been given this year to plans and programs to bring imported water to this area typifies the initiative of the people of this region. This 'It can be done' spirit benefits the world and the nation - as well as this region, for no other area is better suited to agricultural development. With supplemental water, this territory will play a major role in feeding the world, and the diversified development of agriculture and industry will make it one of the most productive areas of the nation," Tolk concluded.

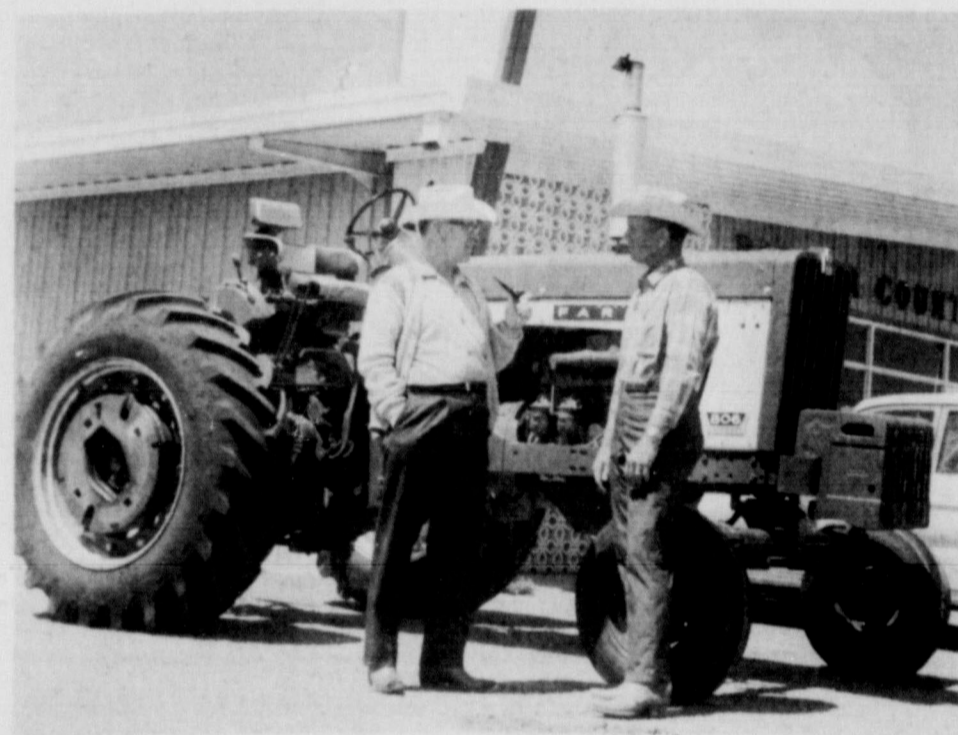

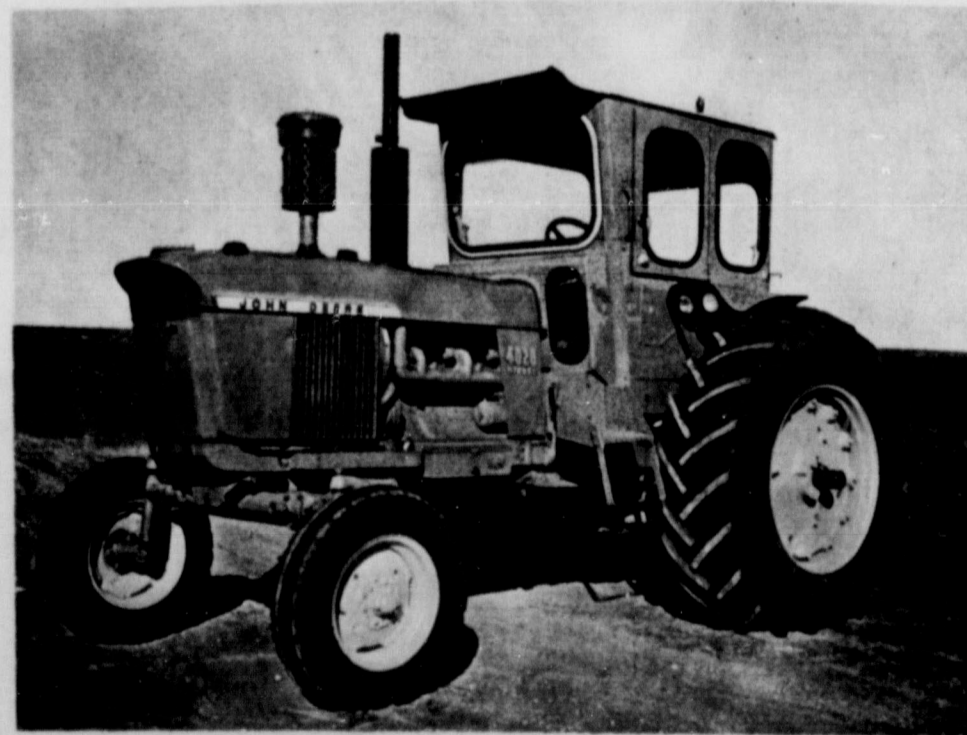

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

Despite a valliant second-quarter comeback, the Friona High School Squaws suffered their first District 3-AA setback here Tuesday night, falling to Dimmitt, 67-58. The win clinched a tie for the first half title for the Bobbies.

Dimmitt thus became the second team in 12 years to hand Friona girls four defeats in a season. Floydada did it last year in winning the championship.

In the boys game, the Bobcats also rolled along in district play with a 75-51 winover the Chieftains.

The Squaws showed a lot of character in the second quarter, after falling 13 points behind in the early stages of the game, when it looked as though Dimmitt would make the game "no contest."

## New Military Airmail Rate

Packages up to 30 pounds for American military personnel served by Army and Fleet Post Offices overseas now can be sent by air transportation at special low rates, Postmaster Wright Williams pointed out today.

"Area residents using this new airlift service will get much faster delivery on parcels to military personnel overseas," Postmaster Wright Williams said.

Postal patrons can get the airlift service on packages mailed to all military personnel at APO and FPO addresses overseas, and in Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico. Postmaster Williams noted that the new airlift also applies to parcels mailed back to the States by servicemen from these military post offices.

Parcels on which the \$1 fee is paid get air transportation all the way -- from here to the port of embarkation, and from there to the overseas base. Postal patrons formerly had to pay air parcel post rates to get similar service, Postmaster Williams said.

## Drive Begun For Voter Registration

This week marked the opening of a statewide newspaper campaign organized by Secretary of State John L. Hill to promote voter registration in Texas. One feature of the registration drive is the publication of an application form which voters may cut out and mail to the county tax assessor-collector, who acts as the registrar of voters. The form is printed above, and publication will be repeated each week during January. The deadline for registration is January 31.

Hill has organized the registration drive in his capacity as chief election officer of the state, a title which the Texas legislature conferred on the Secretary of State last year, along with placing upon him important new responsibilities in the administration of the state's election laws. In commenting on the drive, Hill said that one of his purposes is to publicize new laws affecting voting rights, which otherwise might go unnoticed by the average citizen.

One of the new laws enacted

in 1967 makes registration necessary, for the first time in Texas history, for persons over 60 years old who live in rural communities and towns under ten thousand population. Heretofore, persons over 60 were required to register only if they lived in a city having more than ten thousand inhabitants. Many tax assessor-collectors have expressed a far that lack of information concerning this new requirement will bring about disfranchisement of many elderly voters through their failure to register.


A new law enacted in 1967 permits voters who move from one Texas county to another within the period of six months preceding an election to vote on statewide offices and issues if they have lived in the state for a year. Formerly, a voter was totally disfranchised for a six-month period following removal to another county unless the county from which he moved was in the same congressional, legislative or judicial district as the county to which he moved. A constitutional amendment adopted in 1966 au-

thorized enactment of the new legislation.

Friona voters may apply at Ethridge-Spring Agency if they wish.


Texas voters must register annually. The 1968 voting year will begin on March 1, 1968, and will end on February 28, 1969. The registration period for the 1968 voting year began last October 1 and will end on January 31, 1968. Any citizen of Texas who now possesses the necessary qualifications for voting or who will attain them by February 28, 1969, may register during the current registration period.

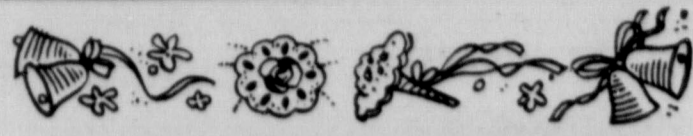

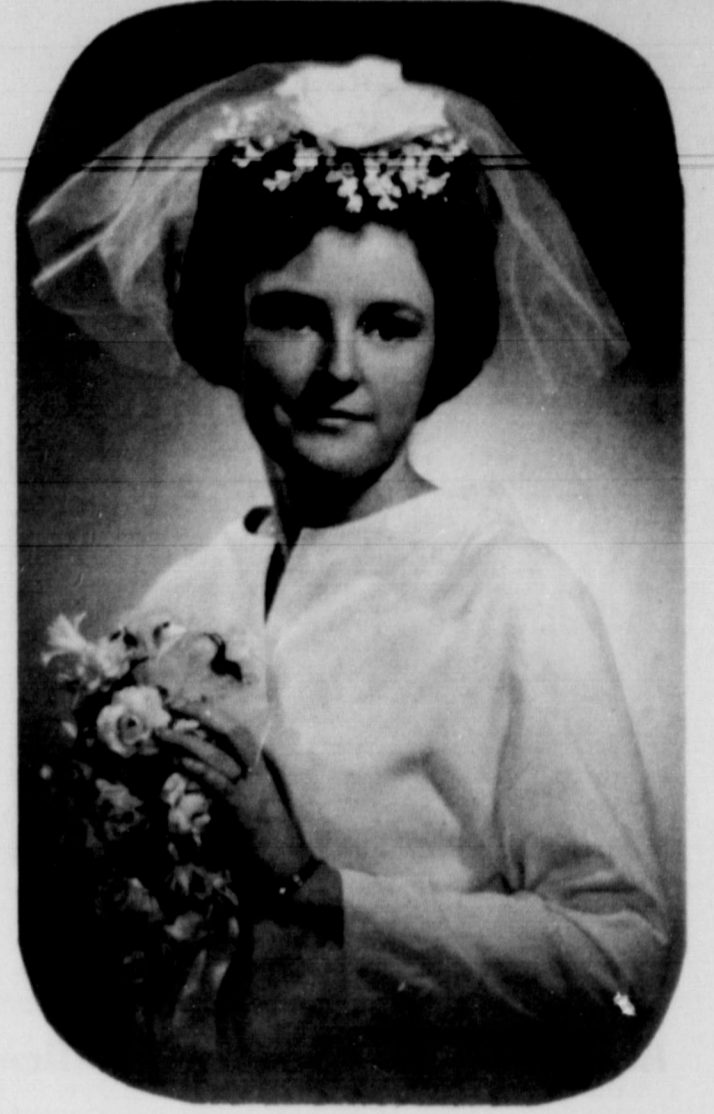

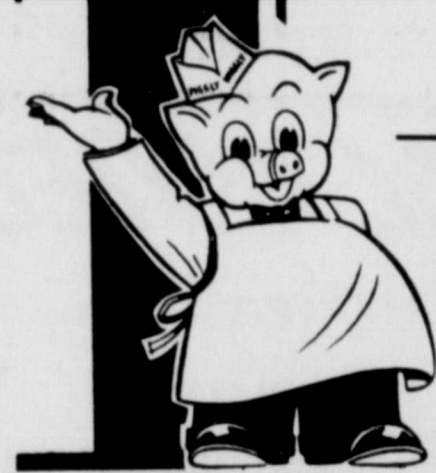
