Plainview Has Five Cases of Diphtheria

There is no cause for panic—and this certainly is not being written with the thought of creating one—but certainly preparedness is the best guard against any eventuality.

Morton Elementary Principal Jim Middleton cautioned this week that all parents whose children have not received the required inoculations before entering school, should see that those children are protected at the earliest possible time.

Middleton, in checking school records, noted that 131 students in the first 5 grades show no record of immunization for one or more of the diseases mentioned; and 89 others, as far as current records show, are due booster shots of some kind as soon as possible.

Cause for the announcement came when Middleton received word that in Plainview this past week-end, five cases of diphtheria were reported. This is a very serious disease that had lost its sting in recent years because of nationwide school children's vaccinations against the disease. But evidently folks have gotten a little lax, and probably in this community as well as in others.

Middleton reminded that even though state law requires certain inoculations for children before they can enter public schools, it is almost impossible to force adherence to this law. It must come through co-operation of parents.

Under Morton school regulations, first graders are supposed to have whooping cough, diphtheria, small pox and polio shots before they enter school. But because under the present set-up, the school cannot provide the administration of the shots, often youngsters don't get them through parents just putting it off, or neglecting to pay heed to the need.

"Please," Middleton said this week, "protect your child and others in the community, by seeing to it that all of your children have the necessary shots . . . as soon as possible."

MEETING TO BE HELD HERE TUESDAY TO DISCUSS POTENTIAL SUGAR BEET CROP FOR THIS COUNTY

A meeting has been called for Tuesday night at 8 p.m. at the County Auditorium, for businessmen and farmers interested in the possibilities of raising sugar beets in this county.

Willard Cox, in discussing the proposed meeting, said this week that interest was high. He emphasized that the meeting will not bring nest speakers. "This is our meeting, to discuss among ourselves what can be done, and decide if we want to do anything about it," Cox said.

At the meeting, if enough interest is shown, Cox hopes to see formed a local organization or at least a committee appointed to check further into the possibilities. He urged that "we need to get started soon" . . . if Cochran County is going to get in on the ground floor.

The two main interests, he said, were to assist in securing legislation favorable to sugar beet planter and to secure prices for

farmers that will allow them a good return per acre on beets, as sugar beet producers have been receiving in the past.

Businessmen and farmers are urged to give their time this one evening to hear the possibilities discussed. "It could be," Cox reminded, "very important to Cochran County."

VOTERS WERE CONFUSED . . . 185 Ballots Were Mutilated, Thrown Out. In County Balloting Last Week

A total of 185 mutilated ballots in the General Election for this county were cast last week — considering all ballots improperly marked as mutilated.

In some cases only the presidential portion of the ballot was improperly marked, and the remainder of the ballot was counted.

A breakdown of the ballots discarded, by election boxes, showed a total of 157 in Precinct 1; 1 at Townsend's Gin; 2 at Lehman; 15 at Neely Ward; 2 at Whiteface; none at Bledsoe; and five in the absentee box.

The complete unofficial tabulations may be found on page four of this issue. Monday's canvassing of returns by the board showed the following discrepancies from that table, which changes were officially made:

For President Nixon, three additional votes (646); for Governor, Daniel, five more votes (1513); for Attorney General, McDonald, nine less votes (13); for District Attorney, G. D. Edgar, a write in vote (1); for County Attorney, Max Hamilton, 9 more votes (33); and G. D. Edgar, seven more votes (29) for Commissioner of Pet. 3, Rawls 50 additional votes (180) — the 50 votes in box six were left out of the original total; for Constable of Pet. 1, H. T. Golden a write-in vote (1); and for Amendment One, one less vote (448).

AT FRONTIER LANES, 2 p.m. . . . MIGHTY MOUSE OF BOWLING WILL APPEAR HERE SUNDAY

You might not expect to find "Mighty Mouse" at a bowling establishment.

At any of the big tournaments, however, that's where he is—calling himself Stan Gifford.

There are slightly smaller men in bowling—Buzz Fazio, for example—but Gifford, who will be appearing at Frontier Lanes, Sunday, Nov. 20, from 2 to 5 p.m. is the man bowling chose to call "Mighty Mouse."

And that he is.

At 5-7 and 152 pounds, Stan packs one of the top powerhouse deliveries in the game. Much of his steam is produced in an unorthodox six-step approach, two steps more than most pros take.

The fireballer has achieved great results with his powerhouse. After being lured to Chicago by Buddy Bomar in 1955-56, Gifford won \$5,000 for throwing a perfect game on TV and captured the ABC Doubles with Bill Lillard.

Also, his team finished on top in the team and all events competition of the 1955-56 ABC Tourney and Stan, individually, placed second in the all events.

During his appearance at Frontier Lanes, Gifford will roll an exhibition match and give free instruction to local bowlers. He is one of more than 100 big leaguers who promote bowling with nationwide appearances.

Born Feb. 22, 1932, in Emmett, Idaho, he now resides in Abilene, Texas. He started bowling in 1944.

Home Demonstration Agent

HOW MUCH TURKEY

Homemakers shopping for turkey often ask how much to buy. Here are some suggestions on this problem.

Small turkeys have a larger percentage of bone than do the larger

birds. Allow $\frac{3}{4}$ to 1 pound of ready-to-cook turkey for each serving—if the bird weighs less than 12 pounds. Allow $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{3}{4}$ pound per serving if the bird weighs 12 pounds or more.

For each serving of roasted turkey quarter or half, or braised drumsticks or thighs, cut from large birds, allow $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{3}{4}$ pounds of ready-to-cook weight.

If you are expecting your family and guests to have big appetites, you may need to allow more than one serving per person.

Too, you may want planned leftovers to take care of some extra holiday meals. If so, make allowances as you shop.

ROASTING TURKEY

(Ready to cook weights)
5-7 pounds, 325 degrees for three hours;
8-11 pounds, 300 degrees for 3½ to 4½ hours;
12-15 pounds, 275 degrees for 5 to 6 hours;
16-20 pounds, 250-275 degrees for 6½ to 7½ hours.

The turkey may be greased with softened fat and placed breast down on rack in shallow pan. Do not add water and do not cover. Baste with fat that accumulates in bottom of pan. Turn turkey several times during roasting.

Or, cover the top and sides of bird with a loosely woven cloth that has been moistened in fat. Moisture from bottom of pan as cloth dries

out during cooking.
FROZEN TURKEY
Thawing frozen ready-to-cook turkey before cooking saves cooking time. If not thawed first, allow 1½ times as long as usual to cook. There is no better place than the refrigerator for thawing whole birds or parts. For thawing in the refrigerator follow this guide:

Large whole bird—about 2 days.
Small bird, half, quarter, half breast—at least overnight.

Cut-ups (legs, thighs, drumsticks)—3 to 9 hours.

Large parts or small whole birds may be thawed at room temperature (around 70 degrees F.) if cooked immediately after thawing. This method takes at least an hour per pound of bird, and so is not advisable to every large birds.

It is sometimes convenient to combine room temperature thawing and thawing at about 40 degrees to 45 degrees F. Allow a large turkey to stand in a cool kitchen (around 70 degrees) for a day. Then put it in the refrigerator overnight and roast the next day.

USE OF FERTILIZER AIDS NATURE TO RECHARGE SOIL WITH ENERGY

Autumn is Mother Nature's time for recharging the soil with energy for the germination of the seeds and growth of the plants for the coming season.

For at this time of year the soil is drained of nitrogen. It has been used for the growth and fruiting of the various varieties of vegetation. Much of it, transformed by the plants into other forms, remain in the plant tissues, a representative of Allied Chemical Company announced this week.

Nature's fertilizing method is the process known as the "Nitrogen Cycle." The plants died and decayed in the place where they grew. Thus the nitrogen and other nutrients contained in them is returned to the soil, the representative said.

The progress of man was made possible only by man's ability to adapt the natural scheme of things in order to provide more fully for his expanding needs, he said.

That is why farmers now supplement the natural nitrogen supply source for crops by use of nitrogen chemically produced. Much of the random plantings of nature now are replaced by systematically seeded, carefully cultivated crops. Never are the plants allowed to decay totally in place. Part or all above ground are removed during harvest. Also, the development of modern seed makes possible yields far in excess of any nature could achieve, or needed to. The greater growth and yields increase the demands for plant foods.

But the residues of any crop, be it stalks or stubble, still provide a vast natural storehouse of soil nu-

MOVE TO MORTON

Nitrogen supplies the spark that triggers this natural fertility factory into action. Except possibly on very sandy soils, no appreciable amount of nitrogen applied in the fall is lost by leaching. It immediately becomes tightly integrated with the soil particles and plant fragments. The soil's powerhouse hums with activity. Throughout the fall, winter, and spring, the decomposition process goes on. When planting time comes again, no visible trace of the residues remain. The soil is vibrant with growth energy. This is the modern adaptation of nature's nitrogen cycle, made vastly more efficient.

When no nitrogen is applied in the fall, microbial life cannot flourish. With only a skeleton crew of workers surviving, the soil fertility factory must virtually close down. Consequently, the residues disintegrate and decompose very, very slowly. Exposed to the air, they become tougher, and some of their nutritive value may be destroyed by oxidation. At planting time, the residues are still there, now more a bane than a benefit.

For most soils, for most crops, for most farmers, fall is the ideal time to apply nitrogen fertilizers, the company quotes. And aside from the agronomic benefits, it has many practical advantages. At this time of year the ground is in good condition for application, time is more plentiful, and materials more generally available. And, the farmer who buys his fertilizer in the fall enjoys a substantial profit in the form of seasonal price discounts, it is reported.

Fall application of nitrogen on pastures, too, will stretch out the late grazing season, and get grass off to a quick, strong start in spring, making the pasture usable weeks earlier, the representative said.

Slight Financial Improvement Shown In Latest Report on Hospital Condition

The Cochran County Auditor's report presented the Memorial Hospital Board of Managers at their regular meeting Monday night showed a slight financial improvement over the previous month's report.

The October operating deficit was \$2,061.66 as compared to \$4,883.02 in September.

For October the number of patients were listed at 46, patient days 159, new born 3, and nursery days 3.

The board also heard a breakdown of revenue and expenses as presented by Jack Sisk, accountant.

Charles Lewis, the administrator, advised the board that in accordance with the board's request in October "that he work diligently toward reducing expenses" he had reduced the hospital staff.

Reduction in staff included the anesthetist, one office employee, one LVN, two cooks, one part-time

cook, and one housekeeper. The anesthetist's work, he said, was to be done through a plan worked out with the doctors.

The salary of the lab-x-ray technician was given approval for an increase in accordance with plans made at his hiring some two months earlier.

J. C. O'Brien, board president, and the administrator reported on last Wednesday's visit to the hospital of Dr. Phil R. Russell, executive secretary-treasurer of the Texas Association of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons.

Other discussion centered on state requirements for hospitals and a request that the administrator have bids regarding such ready to discuss at the board's next regular meeting.

All board members were present: O'Brien, L. W. Barrett, L. E. McDonald, Arvel Snodgrass, J. C. King,

and Bill Glassford. Visitors included Mrs. Art Wall, manager of the local Retail Merchants Association; Fred Wallace, hospital lab-x-ray technician; and Leonard O. Coleman, commissioner-elect.

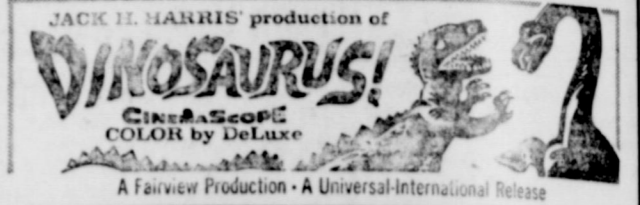

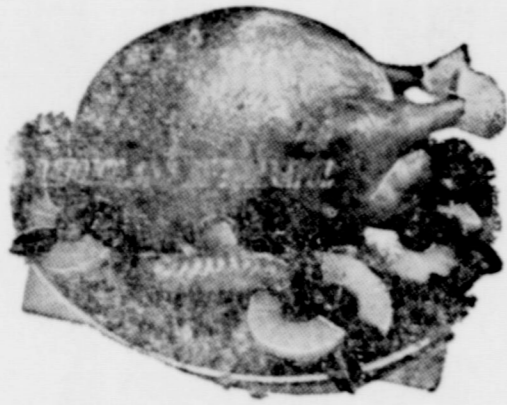

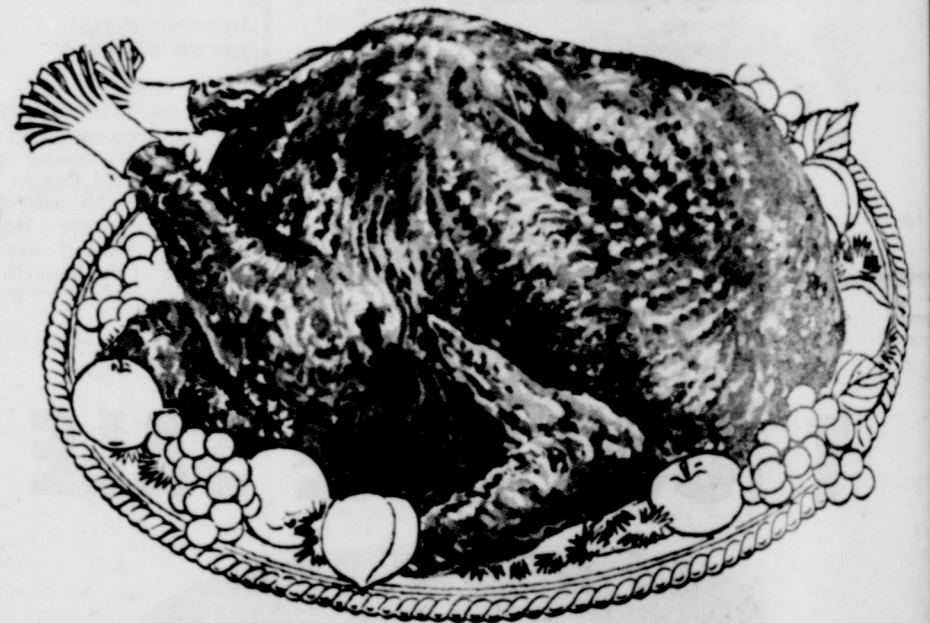
