

The Cochran County Airport may be improved in a joint city-

A delegation of ten local commercial and private pilots met with the Cochran County Commissioner's Court Monday morning. The pilots stated the need for

the improvements, explaining the Cochran County Airport was the only airport in a county scat in the South Plains that did not have paved runways.

Other improvements suggested pilots were longer runways. Present facilities are not adequate for the traffic using the airport.

torney stated the trapper could not place poisoned bait on any pro-perty without being asked by the owner and receiving permission from the owner. It was explained duties of the trapper are determined by the

legislature, not by the county. After discussion, it was determined the trapper was operating legally when the bait was set. Boring asked Mrs. Cunningham

if the dogs were pets. She stated they were. Boring then reported, legally, the trapper had no way knowing pets would stray that far away from the house.

The trapper, paid jointly by the county and the government, works in Cochran County to exterminate coyotes. The trapper has worked in the county about three years, the position created after a delegation of ranchers asked the commissioner's court for assistance in eliminating coyotes and wild dogs harassing and killing cattle.

The trapper has no specified distance from houses to set out poison, but has been instructed by the commissioners to use his discretion and not place the bait where it might kill pets. Never is the poison placed on a ranch without the knowledge and consent of the owner.

After the commissioners reported they did not think it in the public interest to abolish the position of trapper, Mrs. Cunningham reported she would obtain a petition asked that the trapper be removed from the county.

No specific number of signatures are required on such a petition, according to the commissioners They informed Mrs. Cunningham they would take such a petition, when presented, under consideration.

servation Service, in cooperation with Texas A&M University, have compiled a survey of Cochran County land.

According to William M. Koos, Soil Conservation Service Soil Scientist, the soil survey was completed in November 1960. A report has been written on the soils of the county and contains much information about the soils, how tney react, recommended conservation treatment of the soils. predicted yeilds, engineering interpretations, and a discussion of rangeland uses. Considerable informacion on the early history, climate and industry of Cochran County is also included.

This report may be of interest to the rancher, farmer, engineer, student, teacher, tax assessor, land appraiser, banker or the home gardner.


The information below is only a part of the information that the soil scientists obtained during the course of the survey.

"As they traveled over the county," said Koos, "it was fairly easy o see the differences in landscape from place to place". Some of them are shape, sieepness and length of slope, width and depth of draws, kinds of wild plants and in the kind of agriculture. With the more obvious differences there are other less easily noticed variations in the patten of soils. The soils differ along with the other parts of the environment.

The soils of Cochran County are divided into four broad distinct landscapes: mixedlands, deep sands, calcareous soils, and sandyland soil.

Each broad landscape is subdivided into different soil patterns By drawing a line around the different patterns of soils on a small map, one may obtain a General Soil Map like the above map. Each kind of pattern is sometimes called a soil association. The pattern, of course, is not strictly uniform in each association, but the same soils are present in somewhat the same arrangement. Such a map is useful to chose who want a general idea of the soil who want to compare different parts of a county, or who want to locate large areas suitable for some particular kind of farming or other broad.

land use. The four general soil areas or kinds of soil patterns in Cochran County will be discussed separately in conjunction with a three dimensional diagram which shows the soil patterns. Each soil association includes several different kinds or types of soils. Each kind of soil is given a proper name and is named after some prominant land mark or city where the soil was first known to occur. As an example, Amarillo soils were


SCREWWORM REPORT
