One comment about last Saturday's runoff election, and then we'll dispense with politics for a while:

Amarillo's large margin for Don Yarborough has been interpreted in many sections as more than an "anti-Smith" or "anti-Lubbock" sentiment than a "pro-Yarborough" vote.

Amarillo has nurtured the reputation for many years as the "conservative capital" of the entire area. However, in last Saturday's election, Potter County was one of only four counties in the High Plains group of 40 or so which voted in the liberal Yarborough column.

If the majority of these voters actually preferred Yarborough, then we have no quarrel with them -- it's a free country, and they voted their preference.

However, if it was as we suspect, a "spite" vote, then we wonder about the calibre of the voters. Wouldn't it be better to consider the merits of the candidates rather than casting a protest vote?

And, now that their voting record is down for all time, we wonder how much ground Amarillo has won with the next (practically) governor of Texas, Preston Smith. If the city was on shaky ground with the lieutenant governor, it certainly did little to improve the situation with last Saturday's vote.

You would have expected better support for the area's candidate, especially in light of the fact that such industrial and usually liberal-voting cities as Pampa and Borger gave Smith a good portion of their votes.

This week is an anniversary of sorts for the Ellis family. It was six years ago this week that we moved to Friona to become editor of the Star, (Seems like only last week, etc., etc.)

Everyone is interested in records, and we're no exception. By the time this month is over, we will have edited more issues of the Star than any of our predecessors, with the exception of -- you guessed it -- "Uncle John" White.

Bert Neelley served as editor of an publisher of the Star for shortly over six years, and it's his longevity record that we'll shortly pass, to claim "runner-up" honors.

# Smith Walks Off With Friona Vote

Preston Smith, who walked away with the state Democratic nomination for governor during last Saturday's runoff primary, was given an overwhelming majority by Friona and Farmer County Democrats.

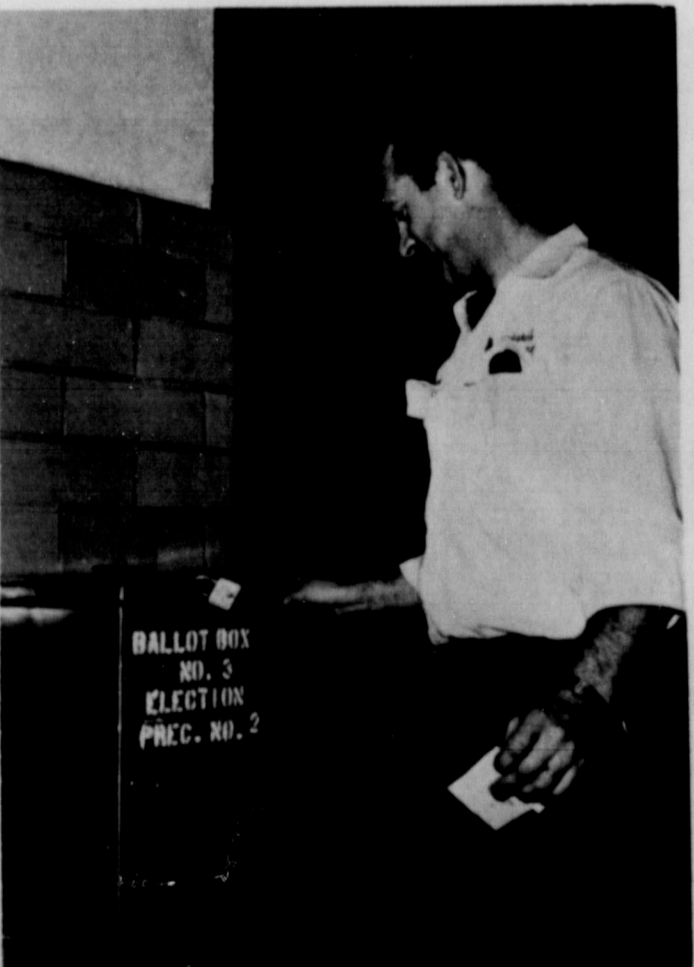
The city and area also joined voters in the Seventh Judicial District by giving their margin to Plainview's James A. Joy, an upset victor over Amarillo's Jack Hazlewood.

Friona went for Smith by better than four to one, giving the conservative Lubbock resident a total of 340 votes, to 79 for loser Don Yarborough. The county went for Smith by about

three and one-half to one, 854-246.

Joy was given the county's margin by virtue of his Friona vote. The Plainview judge got better than a 2-1 margin in Friona, with 280 votes to Hazlewood's 135. Joy carried the county, 599-478, but without the Friona totals, Hazlewood would have been the winner, 343-319.

Hazlewood had carried the county by 167 votes over Joy in May, but Joy had carried Friona, although by only eight votes, with Hereford's Bruce Miller getting 100 votes in the local box.

## Day Purchases Concrete Plant

Herbert Day announced this week that he has purchased Friona Ready-Mix Concrete from Missouri Beef Packers. MBP bought the cement plant from Woodrow Killingsworth of Dimmitt last year, primarily to do the cement work in connection with their \$3.5 million packing plant.

Lewis Lee, former manager of the plant, has been employed by Day as his manager.

"We look forward to supplying cement, sand and gravel to the people of the Friona area for many years, and invite their patronage," said Day.

## New Nursery Opens Here

Jimmy Maynard announces this week that he will open a nursery and garden supply business in the former Soil Builders building about a mile east of Friona north of Highway 60. The new business will be open on Friday.

Name of the business has been chosen as Friona Nursery and Garden Center.

Maynard will feature complete landscaping service, grass seeds, trees, evergreens, garden supplies and insecticides.

## POSTMASTER SAYS---

# City Mail Delivery To Begin In Friona June 29

Postmaster Wright Williams received notice this week from the Dallas Office that City Delivery Service would be inaugurated in Friona on Saturday June 29th.

This will be motorized service with two carriers. House delivery will be by curbside in boxes positioned 3 1/2 to 4 feet above the roadway. Boxes may be of the rural type or a type similar in size which will afford protection to the mail and convenience to the carrier when making delivery from his vehicle.

The owner's name must be on the box along with street address if it is not located directly in front of the residence. Houses should be numbered also. Parcels too large for the box and mail that must be signed for will be delivered to the door of the residences.

Business places are not required to provide a mail receptacle. Carriers will deliver mail to a convenient location inside the business house if it is open. If it is not open a mail receptacle or slot must be provided. Carriers will collect

letters placed in curbside boxes for mailing if the flag is raised on the box.

A post Office form 3575 is available at the post office for change of address. "If you plan to accept city delivery service to your residence or place of business, please furnish the post office with one of these forms as soon as possible so that preparations may be made and delivery can begin with the first day of service," Postmaster Williams said. "You should also begin now advising your correspondents of your

correct street address. Your ZIP CODE will remain the same 79035," he added.

"We are happy to bring this service to the people of Friona and ask that you give us your full cooperation in getting the service started. Get your boxes set, with name and address before time to start this first delivery and be certain that you have signed this form 3575 and returned it to the office," says Postmaster Williams.

The city office will have aluminum house numbers available free of charge.

The advisory board for Friona's Headstart Project met Monday night and approved 19 of 26 applicants for the Summer program. The nineteen children accepted are from Friona's low-income families and are due to receive many social benefits from this federally financed program.

Class teacher, Mrs. O.J. Beene, and teacher's aide, Sally Perez, have been in Hale Center this week attending training sessions prior to assuming their duties when classes start on Monday, June 10.

Among other business attended to by the board Monday night was the official hiring of Ruby Lee as the cafeteria aide and Mrs. Frances Davis as the bus driver.

Parents of the children who have been accepted will be notified this week as to when the bus will pick up the children on Monday morning.

The children will have classes and meals in the Junior High Cafeteria which is air conditioned.

Dr. and Mrs. Robert Alexander will be giving the children their medical examinations and necessary shots during the first week of school. Seminars for the shots have been given free of charge by the State of Texas. Dr. Alexander and his wife, who is a registered nurse, are donating their time for the project. Shots which will be given are DPT, polio, measles, smallpox vaccination and tuberculin test.

The next meeting of the advisory board will be on Monday, June 17.

## Pause And Reflect

The neighbors called her "Mad Meg." Her given name was Margaret and when she first came to live in the valley she was as sane as anybody, but the years of pioneering in the mountains and the Indian raid, had taken their toll.

Her husband had built the cabin, a foursquare, one room and loft affair, of hewed white oak logs. He split the "shakes" for the roof shingles and halved the straight pine logs for the puncheon floor.

He and Margaret were married in the settlement and moved, as bride and groom, into the new cabin.

A swift-flowing mountain creek (they called it a "crick" - out here it would be a river!) formed a crescent around the south and east of the cabin.

He planted a weeping willow in the arch of the stream, and in his youth, laughed at the fable at some member of the family dying when the tree grew as tall as the house.

One evening in late March, when the Virginia woods were white with dogwood, Margaret kept the corn pone hot and the buttermilk cold, but at twilight he still had not come to supper.

Walking across the stumpy, rooty, new ground, she found him lying face down in the dirt, a Cherokee arrowshaft protruding from his back.

Terror stricken she ran the two miles, through the dark forest to the nearest neighbors. Collapsing on their door step she gasped out her story.

They buried him in the churchyard and during the ceremony Margaret sat strangely quiet, her eyes vacant and staring.

She insisted upon returning to the cabin and with the help of neighbors, continued to work the place.

As time passed it became apparent that she was "tetched in the head."

The spasmodic Indian raids kept the area on guard and it was on one such occasion that the neighborhood women and children fled to the sanctuary of the stout oak cabin while the men and older boys defended the perimeter of the settlement.

The accurate rifle fire coming from the besieged women in the cabin prevented a frontal assault by the marauding redmen so they resorted to fire arrows shot into the wooden shingled roof.

To leave the burning cabin meant death or humiliation to the women and girls.

Mad Meg, as she was now known, lifted an iron bound bucket, of water from the low shelf beside the door and strode boldly into the yard.

A rustic ladder leaned against the eaves and up she went the bucket of water swinging in her left hand.

Creeping across the roof she yanked away the flaming arrows and doused the burning shingles.

The hail of arrows stopped immediately.

Margaret's mental condition was well known up and down the valley and to the Indians a crazy person bore a charmed life and there was no happy hunting ground ahead for the person who killed one so afflicted.

Having driven off the main body of the war party the men returned and the settlement relaxed into its normal state of armed truce.

Mad Meg's valiant deed was performed about 150 years ago.

Twenty four years ago today at Normandy on the north coast of France 250,000 allied soldiers landed despite the best efforts of the entrenched German army. Within two weeks over a million were ashore and the vanguard was well on the way to liberate Paris.

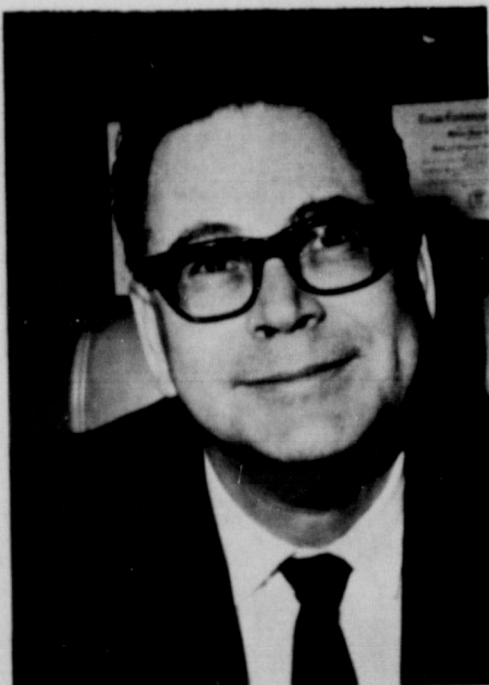

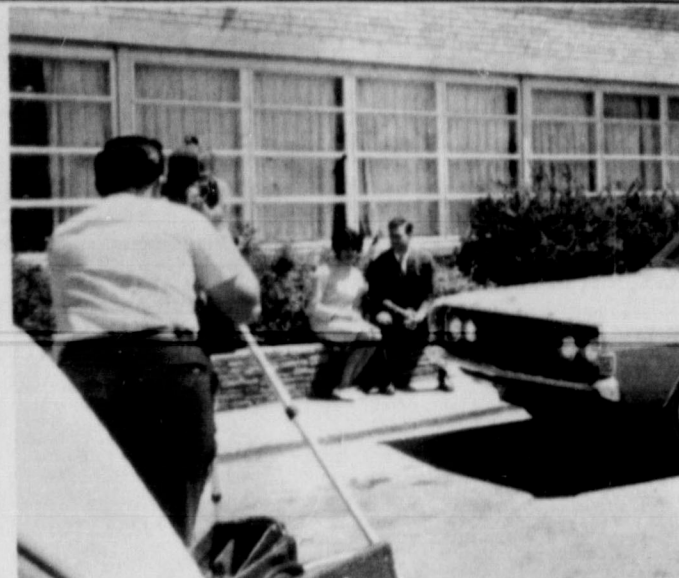

The Texas Industrial Commission states that for each 100 factory workers that make

residence in a community, 296 more people are added to the population, 112 more households, 174 total additional workers employed, 107 more registered passenger cars, four more retail establishments, \$360,000 more in annual retail sales, \$270,000 more in bank deposits, and \$590,000 additional personal income in the community.

Also for each 100 factory workers, we have 100 new children in school, 60,000 more gallons of water are needed per day, one new hospital bed etc., etc.

These figures are for factory workers that live in the community. Housing must be available in a community and this of course is necessary before the benefits mentioned can be realized.

Friona needs housing -- very badly. Every day sees people moving to area towns because housing cannot be secured in Friona. These people want to live in Friona because it is close to their work. Isolated instances of rent increases and house price increases have alienated some but the potential at present is virtually untrapped as newcomers arrive daily.

This appears to be a constant factor in the future of Friona. The demand appears to be sizeable enough to last well into the foreseeable future. So if we want Friona to grow, housing for the newcomers is a must.

## Social Security Rate Is Same For 1968 As 1967

"The social security contributions rate is the same for 1968 as it was for 1967. If an employee's pay is unchanged, the amount deducted each pay-day for social security will be the same this year as it was last, Wayne Klipping social security Field Representative for this area, reported today. But, if he earns more than \$6,600 in 1968, he will pay the deductions for a longer time than he did last year so his total contribution will be higher. This is because the first \$7,800 of his earnings for this year count toward social security, instead of the first \$6,600 has in 1967.

An employee who will pay social security contributions on the higher earnings will have substantially more protection through social security than be-

fore. For example, a person who will be age 50 this year and will earn \$7,800 or more a year until he is age 65 (and had maximum earnings under the law in earlier years), under the new law will get a retirement benefit of \$188.80 at age 65 -- nearly 22 per cent more than he would have received under the previous law.

The higher earnings that count for social security also mean greater protection to a man and his family if he should become disabled, and to his widow and children if he should die.

Anyone wishing to file a claim for any kind of social security benefits should see Klipping in the Council Room at the City Hall from 9 a.m. until noon on the third Tuesday of each month.

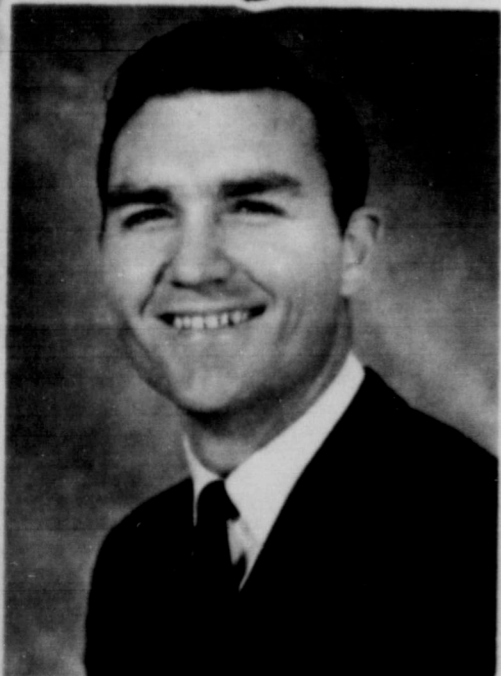

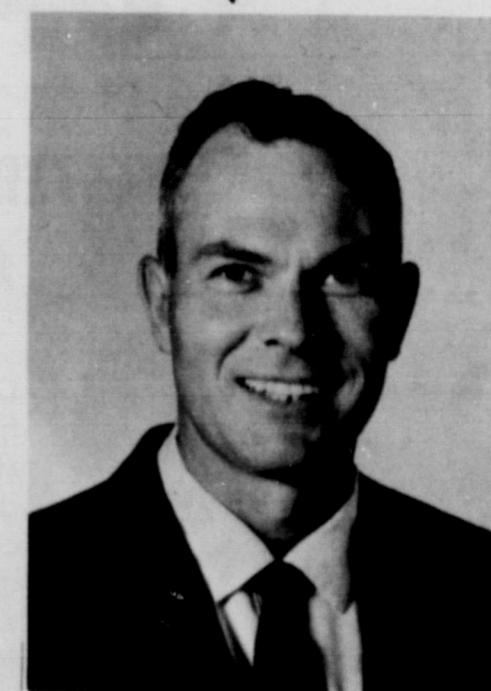

**Black Attends Meeting Of Water, Inc. Directors**

A.L. Black, a member of the board of directors for Water, Inc., attended a meeting of the directors on May 30.

The May, 1968 progress report on West Texas and Eastern New Mexico import project investigations was reviewed. This was considered a major milestone in the water import program, as the report confirms the presence of some surplus water in the Mississippi River.

Included in the conclusions of the study is the statement: "It is physically feasible to transport the projected year 2020 requirements of 16.5 million acre-feet per year from the lower Mississippi River system to West Texas and Eastern New Mexico if it is determined that there are surplus waters in the Mississippi River to meet these requirements."

The Bureau of Reclamation is continuing the study in coordination with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Mississippi River Commission of Vicksburg, Mississippi.

A study of Agricultural Resources Related to Water Development in Texas, prepared by the Texas A&M University Water Resources Institute was reviewed. This study is very valuable as it contains data which points up the economic justification for the water import plan.

The Board of Directors voted to express their appreciation to Dr. R.E. Patterson, Dean of Agriculture, Texas A&M University and Dr. J.R. Runkles, Chairman of the Committee al-

so of A&M for their work in developing this report.
