

One comment about last Saturday's runoff election, and then we'll dispense with politics for a while:

Amarillo's large margin for Don Yarborough has been interpreted in many sections as more than an "anti-Smith" or "anti-Lubbock" sentiment than a "pro-Yarborough" vote.

Amarillo has nurtured the reputation for many years as the "conservative capital" of the entire area. However, in last Saturday's election, Potter County was one of only four counties in the High Plains group of 40 or so which voted in the liberal Yarborough col-

If the majority of these voters actually preferred Yarborough, then we have no quarrel with them -- it's a free country, and they voted their preference.

However, if it was as we suspect, a "spite" vote, then we wonder about the calibre of the voters. Wouldn't it be better to consider the merits of the candidates rather than casting a protest vote?

And, now that their voting record is down for all time, we wonder how much ground Amarillo has won with the next (practically) governor of Texas, Preston Smith. If the city was on shaky ground with the lieutenant governor, it certainly did little to improve the situation with last Saturday's vote.

You would have expected better support for the area's candidate, especially in light of the fact that such industrial and usually liberal-voting cities as Pampa and Borger gave Smith a good portion of their votes.

We've written about a fillion words, several thousand stories and had hundreds of fine headlines since we began our duties back in 1962. (As a sportswriter friend of ours once said -- "If every column I ever wrote were stacked end to end -- it would make a heck

of a bonfire.") We wonder what sort of headline stories we'll be able to write concerning Friona in the future. Every year we think, boy, we sure won't have as many top - notch stories to report on this year as we did the last -- but we always do.

And the past year may be the hardest yet to duplicate, but we're betting that the best stories and headlines are yet to be published about Friona,



The neighbors called her "Mad Meg." Her given name was Margaret and when she first came to live in the valley she was as sane as anybody, but the years of pioneering in the mountains and the Indian raid, had taken their toll.

Her husband had built the cabin, a foursquare, one room and loft affair, of hewed white oak logs. He split the "shakes" for the roof shinkles and halfed the straight pine logs for the puncheon floor.

He and Margaret were married in the settlement and moved, as bride and groom, into the new cabin,

A swift-flowing mountain creek (they called it a "crick" out here it would be a river!) formed a crescent around the

south and east of the cabin. He planted a weeping willow in the arch of the stream, and in his youth, laughed at the fable at some member of the family

dying when the tree grew as tall as the house, One evening in late March, when the Virginia woods were white with dogwood, Margaret kept the corn pone hot and the buttermilk cold, but at twilight he still had not come to supper. Walking across the stumpy, rooty, new ground, she found him lying face down in the dirt, a Cherokee arrowshaft protruding

from his back. Terror stricken she ran the two miles, through the dark forest to the nearest neighbors. Collapsing on their door step she gasped out her story.

They buried him in the churchyard and during the ceremony Margaret sat strangely quiet, her eyes vacant and staring. She insisted upon returning to the cabin and with the help of neighbors, continued to work the place.

As time passed it became apparent that she was "tetched in

The spasmodic Indian raids kept the area on guard and it was on one such occasion that the neighborhood women and children fled to the sanctuary of the stout oak cabin while the men and older boys defended the perimeter of the settlement.

The accurate rifle fire coming from the beseiged women in the cabin prevented a frontal assault by the maurading redmen so they resorted to fire arrows shot into the wooden shingled

To leave the burning cabin meant death or humiliation to the

Mad Meg, as she was now known, lifted an iron bound bucket, of water from the low shelf beside the door and strod boldly

A rustic ladder leaned against the eaves and up she went the bucket of water swinging in her left hand,

Creeping across the roof she yanked away the flaming arrows

and doused the burning shingles. The hail of arrows stopped immediately. Margaret's mental condition was well known up and down the

valley and to the Indians a crazy person bore a charmed life and there was no happy hunting ground ahead for the person who killed one so afflicted. Having driven off the main body of the war party the men re-

turned and the settlement relaxed into it's normal state of armed

Mad Meg's valiant deed was performed about 150 years ago. Twenty four years ago today at Normandy on the north coast of France 250,000 allied soldiers landed espite the best efforts of the entrenched German army. Within two weeks over a million were ashore and the vanguard was well on the way to liberate Paris.



Baby Girl Adopted By Dale Houlettes



Black Attends Meeting Of Water, Inc. Directors

A.L. Black, a member of the so of A&M for their work in deboard of directors for Water, veloping this report. Inc., attended a meeting of the directors on May 30.

The May, 1968 progress remeeting to be held February 18, port on West Texas and Eastern New Mexico import project investigations was reviewed. This was considered a major milestone in the water import program, as the report confirms the presence of some surplus water in the Mississippi River.

Included in the conclusions of the study is the statement: "It is physically feasible to transport the projected year 2020 requirements of 16,5 million acre-feet per year from the lower Mississippi River system to West Texas and Eastern New Mexico if it is determined that there are surplus waters in the Mississippi River to meet these requirements."

The Bureau of Reclamation is continuing the study in coordination with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Mississippi River Commission of Vicksburg, Mississippi.

A study of Agricultural Resources Related to Water Development in Texas, prepared Water Resources Institute was reviewed. This study is very valuable as it contains data which points up the economic justification for the water import plan.
