Friona residents who may have thought they were seeing a "flying saucer" last Tuesday afternoon probably were seeing a weather balloon which was part of an experiment from Cannon Air Force Base near Clovis.

The balloon, which was visible toward the sun in the early afternoon, was launched from Cannon Air Force Base about 6 a.m. last Tuesday.

According to a story in the Olton Enterprise last week, the balloon which was nicknamed "Pathfinder," was designed to test radar tracking equipment based at Cannon AFB, and measure wind velocity in the area.

. . . . When it reached its pre-determined altitude of nearly 70,-000 feet (almost 14 miles high) the balloon measured 128 feet in diameter and had a volume of nearly one million cubic feet according to the information officer at Cannon AFB, quoted in the article.

Another balloon, more than twice as large as "Pathfinder" was to be launched last Friday. It stood as tall as a 40story building.

Data gathered in these tests will be used to design future balloons for Air Force and defense Dept. atmospheric and aerospace research, it was indicated.







But, can you imagine our surprise upon seeing a car parked near the Aztec Drive In Tuesday morning loaded with Christ-




