Tuesday's kill figure at Missouri Beef Packers represented a new high for the company, when 1,062 cattle were slaughtered. This was 42 more cattle than was killed on the company's previous largest day, July 5, when 1,020 were slaughtered.

CITY REPORT

July Water Use Sets All-Time Record

Monthly records released by City Manager Jake Outland this week showed that an all-time monthly high of 39,097,000 gallons of water were pumped during July. This is an average of 1,261,200 gallons per day.

Six new water taps were made during the month of July by the City of Friona, bringing the number of active taps as of the month to 1121. Ten new sewer taps were made during the month, bringing the total of active services in this department to 1058.

The previous high usage was just over 31 million gallons of water in one month. The potato shed used over three million gallons of the July total by itself.

Clyde Fields took an examination for city building inspector in Austin on July 17, and received a successful report and his inspector's certificate on July 19.

The city manager turned an account of \$4,200 in delinquent taxes over to the city attorney for collection on July 17.

Sewer records showed approximately 8,877,676 gallons of sewage were pumped during July, an average of 286,377 gallons per day. This is also an increase from the previous month.

Fire Department records during July showed four alarms sounded during the month. Two were outside the city limits for (Continued To Page 7)

Tentative Approval Given To City's 1968-69 Budget

The Friona City Council gave tentative approval Monday night to a \$351,284 budget for 1968-69.

Council members approved the publication of the budget, which will come up for final approval at its next meeting September 9.

In other business, the council approved an ordinance extending the city's maintenance agreement with the state highway department.

After much discussion, the council voted favorably for adding liability insurance coverage for city vehicles. City Attorney Richard Collard interpreted the phase wherein the city is immune to liability in case of accidents, in instances where governmental responsibilities are being performed, but pointed out that the city would be liable in the event of an accident wherein "proprietary" business was being performed.

The council discussed the possible role of the city in locating a rest home in Friona, although no official action was taken. The need for such an addition to the city was recognized, and the extent of the city's participation, and what it would amount to, was debated. The matter was tabled for the time being.

In setting up the budget for the fiscal year beginning October 1, City Manager Jake Outland recommended that the tax rate remain unchanged at \$1.30 per \$100 assessed valuation. "I'm afraid that very soon we're going to have to explore ways of getting additional operating money, if the city is to continue to grow and progress," Outland told the council members.

The city manager stated that a water tap fee for new connections would be a good prospective means of raising additional revenues. He said the most Panhandle cities currently have such a fee, which amounts to from \$70 to \$100.

Increasing the fee for residential trash collection was also discussed as a possibility. Currently the fee is \$1.00 per month for trash collection in the residential areas. Outland pointed out that the approxi-

mately \$14,500 which the fees brought in each year does not pay salaries for those employed in the department.

Finally, and perhaps least desirable method of increasing revenue would be to increase the city's tax rate. Outland

hinted that these other avenues should be explored prior to an increase in taxes. "An increase in trash collection fee, for example, would affect everyone -- while an increase in taxes would affect only property owners," he said.

July Building Slackens, Year's Pace Still Good

Building in Friona slacked slightly during the month of July, but still continues at a record pace for the year, according to figures released this week by City Manager Jake Outland.

Five permits were issued during the month for construction worth an estimated \$50,500. This brought the yearly totals to \$715,800 for the first seven months of the year. The record for one year, exclusive of school projects, is \$1,149,040, set in 1964.

Of the permits issued during July, two were for new residences estimated at \$39,000. One was a move-in office building at \$3,500, another was a move-in residence at \$7,000, and another was an addition to a church for \$1,000.

Twenty-five changes in ownership of city properties were reported by the county clerk's office.

Merchants To Meet Thursday

The Friona Association of Retail Merchants will meet at 1 p.m., Thursday at the Farmer House Restaurant to discuss its local shopper promotion, it was announced this week by president Chuck Everitt.

Also, the organization will further discuss plans for its proposed "employee of the month" award, which it voted to sponsor during its last meeting.

September Draft Call Smallest In 15 Months

The September draft call for Texas is 683, the smallest monthly quota since June 1967, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Tuesday.

He pointed out, however, that the July 1968 call for the state was little higher than the September quota -- a total of 695. Because of budgetary limitations, there will be no pre-induction physical-mental examinations in August. It was announced earlier there would be none in September, but later a total of 5267 was authorized for that month.

Monthly draft quotas for Texas in 1968 are: January 1959,

February 1165, March 2048, April 2378, May 2223, June 961, August 895, September 683.

1967 monthly calls ranged from a low of 674 to a high of 1421.

The order of selection to fill current draft calls may be from among examined and acceptable men who are (1) delinquents 19 years old and older, (2) volunteers under age 26 in the sequence in which they have volunteered, and (3) nonvolunteers 19 through 25 years old, single and married, oldest first, with those married after August 26, 1965, being selected ahead of those married or before that date.

County Bond Sales Rise

According to a report received today from Frank A. Spring, Chairman of the Parmer County Savings Bonds Committee, sales for the first six months of 1968 in Parmer County were \$72,085. June sales for the county totaled \$52,111 and 55 per cent of the sales goal has been achieved.

Texas sales of E and H Bonds year-to-date reached an all time high of \$90,967,734 -- an increase of 8 per cent over June 1967. June sales in the state totaled \$12,741,809. Nation-wide, the cash value

of Series E and H Savings Bonds outstanding set an all time record of \$51,572 million -- a gain of \$342 million in the first six months. The Treasury reports that June sales of E and H Bonds and Freedom Shares were \$381 million.

Now take your choice of routes back to Texas Panhandle. Southward through the heart of Dixie or due west by way of Dallas and Fort Worth.

The phenomenal growth of the entire Southland will astound you.

It seems impossible that 100 years ago this same Southland was a beaten, burned out, desolate, conquered country.

For 60 of these 100 years I have traveled and lived all over the South and have been privileged to witness the changes that have come about.

Northern industrialists soon recognized the advantages of establishing branches in the South.

The climate was mild, there were natural resources in plenty and there were thousands of people looking for work and these people were not inclined to join labor unions.

So the "Yankees" again invaded the South, this time bringing billions in money and opportunities.

The Phoenix has arisen from the ashes and her gorgeous wings spread wide over a land of plenty.

Truckers Warned Of IRS Check

Owners of trucks and buses in Northern Texas were advised today by District Director of Internal Revenue Ellis Campbell, Jr., that a thorough check will be made to insure compliance with provisions of the Federal Highway Use Tax Law.

Mr. Campbell said that lists of owners of taxable motor vehicles are being compared with Federal Highway Use Tax returns filed, to assure that all taxable vehicles were reported and to determine whether they

were reported in the correct tax categories.

Mr. Campbell pointed out that highway use tax revenue collected by the Federal government is returned to the states to help pay the costs of the Interstate Highway System now under construction.

IRS Publication No. 349, "Federal Use Tax on Trucks, Truck-Tractors, and Buses," can be obtained without charge by dropping a postcard to the District Director, Internal Revenue Service.

SS Benefits Hit New High

A record \$60,843 was paid out in social security cash benefits to 803 residents of Parmer County for February, according to Wayne Klipping, Social Security Field Representative for this area. This was an increase of \$9,611 over the amount paid out for December 1966.

"February 1968 was the first month in which increased benefit rates provided by the 1967 Amendments to the Social Security Act were payable," Klipping noted.

Nationally, the amount of monthly benefits exceeds \$2 billion, an increase of more than \$360 million above the December 1966 figure. More than 24 million men, women, and children, or nearly 1 out of every 8 Americans, are now receiving some type of monthly benefit.

Anyone wishing additional information about the 1967 changes in the law should see Klipping in the Council Room at the City Hall from 9 a.m. until noon on the third Tuesday of each month.

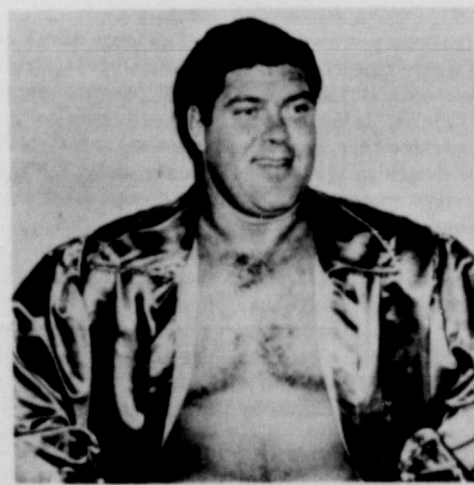

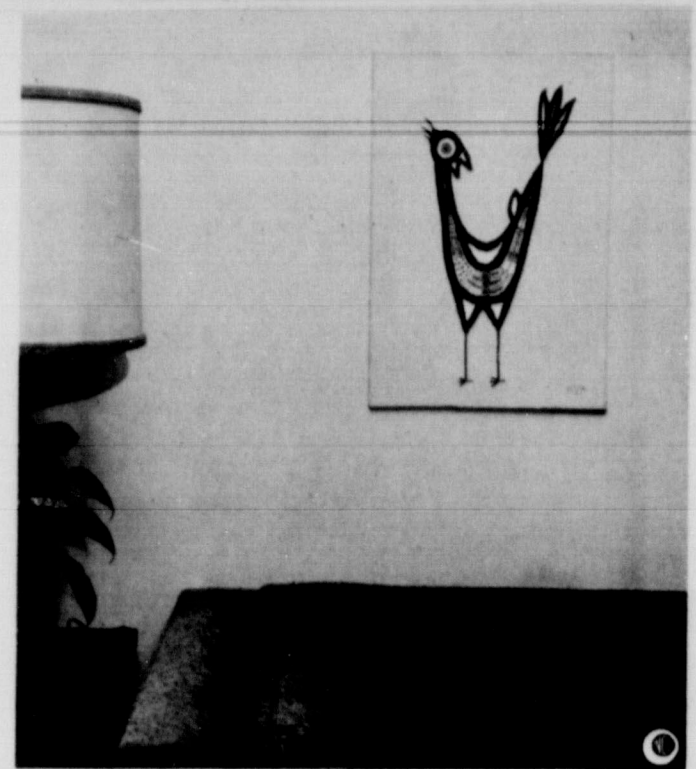

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day in December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Buske Gives Report On European Tour

(Editor's Note: B.K. Buske, son of Mr. and Mrs. G.B. Buske, of Friona, has just returned from a six-week tour of Europe. In the following article, he gives his impressions of the tour.)

Early on June 6 (12:30 a.m.) we departed John F. Kennedy Airport in New York for London, England. Just seven hours later (around noon London time) the Boeing 707 jet touched down among the grassy British hills.

London and the surrounding cities in England seem to have more meaningful sights than any other area in Europe. Buckingham Palace, Westminster Abbey, Parliament, and the Tower of London are but a few of the attractions which we managed to see in our first couple of days in England. After mastering the currency system and teaching a few Englishmen to speak "Texan," it was off to another country.

Our next stop was Paris, France where the feeling toward Americans was less than friendly. Sensing this animosity, we took the first train to Spain.

We arrived in Madrid just in time to see the bullfights in the largest outdoor bullfight arena in the world.

After a few days of leisurely sightseeing in Madrid, we traveled through the beautiful Spanish countryside to Barcelona and to the coast. The Spanish people were friendly and hospitable as well as patient as we attempted their language.

From Barcelona we journeyed around to Nice, France and the French Riviera. The sun, the beaches, and an inability to speak a word of French constituted a pleasant and relaxing atmosphere. As nice as Nice was, we held true to our motto of "gathering no moss" and we boarded a train to the City of Seven Hills, Rome.

As one might expect, sightseeing Rome took several days. Viewing her ancient ruins takes one back to the days of King Arthur. It is truly a fascinating city. Other Italian cities which we visited were Naples, Pompei, Florence, Pisa, and Venice. Italy is a haven for history and art enthusiasts.

From Italy we went to what must be the most scenic country in Western Europe; Switzerland. The towering snow-covered Alps with the blue lakes in the foreground is a picture come to life. We spent several days visiting with the Swiss and admiring their fairy tale country. Interlaken, Lucern, and Zurich are the cities in which we stayed.

Next on our "flexible" (non-existent) agenda was Germany, then Austria, and once again we mustered our courage and

decided to brave France. By this time the political turmoil had lessened and our stay in Paris was lengthened accordingly. We visited such sights as the Louvre, Notre Dame Cathedral, and the Eiffel Tower before going to the Netherlands.

We traveled to Amsterdam via Belgium. In the "land of the tulips and wooden shoes", we discovered the friendliest people in the world, excluding Texans.

As our six weeks excursion drew to a close, we headed for London. With that same anxiety we experienced before our departure from the United States, we waited the plane which would return us to the mainland.

Our emotions concerning our trip stated succinctly -- glad to have traveled, happy to have seen and experienced, and thankful to be Americans.

Grazing Associations Are Gaining In Popularity

Farmers and cattlemen are acquiring needed land resources by forming grazing associations and obtaining financial assistance from the Farmers Home Administration, the agency's Farmer County Supervisor, Billy R. Boling, said this week.

A grazing association is composed of a group of family farmers and ranchers who join together to acquire and develop land to provide seasonal grazing for livestock belonging to its members. The nonprofit association is owned, operated, and managed by its members.

"Small farmers," Boling said, "can increase their incomes, make better use of land and water resources, and develop large equity in land through use of a grazing association. This program often provides small farmers with their only opportunity to remain in farming on a profitable basis."

Other advantages of an association include providing opportunities to improve livestock quality, gain bargaining power in the marketplace, build more stable operations and strengthen the rural community.

"Results benefit the entire community," Boling said, "because associations accomplish better use of land and water resources and provide expanded tax bases and more local buying power."

The grazing associations now in operation in Texas range in size from four to 43 members, depending on the number of livestock to be supported and dimensions and quality of the land.

Eligible to form associations are neighboring farmers and ranchers who operate family size units. Financial and technical assistance is provided by the Farmers Home Administration. Additional aid often is provided by the Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, and the Extension Service.

Loans are available to qualified borrowers for periods up to 40 years at an interest rate of 5 per cent. Interested individuals should contact Billy R. Boling County Supervisor at 401 3rd Street in Farwell, form a steering committee, and begin looking for suitable acreage.

Land Bank Has New Slogan

Ernest Kerr, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Muleshoe, announced this week that the Federal Land Bank System has adopted as a permanent slogan, "Serving America's Farmers: Providers of Plenty." The local association is a part of a national network

of twelve regional banks and 695 local associations. The Land Bank, which last year celebrated its 50th anniversary, is moving ahead into the second half-century of operations with renewed dedication of purpose to meet the essential long term financial needs of the nation's farmers and ranchers.

"Our System has coped with a variety of great demands made upon it during the past 50 years, all the while maintaining a dependable loan service to farmers and ranchers. As agriculture continues to increase its productive capacity through technology, it will be our purpose to continue to serve the changing credit needs of farmers and ranchers," Kerr stated.

The Land Banks and associations comprise a system which is operated entirely on private funds and is owned by its 394,000 member-borrowers whose elected directors formulate its

policies. The Board of Directors of the local association are as follows: Gordon Duncan, president, Morris Douglass, vice-president, A.L. Hartzog, Jim Claunch and James Glaze.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR39)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 39 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the state, so as to create an agency of this State the Employees Retirement System of Texas, vesting the general administration and responsibility of the proper operation of said system in a state board of trustees to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, authorizing said Board to invest assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and such other restrictions as may hereafter be provided by law; providing that contributions of members and the state shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state; providing that such Amendment shall be self-enacting; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication; and declaring legislative intent that the adoption of this Joint Resolution shall constitute repeal of Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, previously adopted by this 60th Legislature, so that the proposition as set forth in this Resolution may be submitted to the voters of this state in lieu of the proposition contained in Senate Joint Resolution No. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the state, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this state as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the state who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the state, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of judicial districts of this state as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the state to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state.

an agency of the State of Texas, the Employees Retirement System of Texas, the rights of membership in which, the retirement privileges and benefits thereunder, and the management and operations of which shall be governed by the provisions herein contained and by present or hereafter enacted Acts of the Legislature not inconsistent herewith. The general administration and responsibility for the proper operation of said system are hereby vested in a State Board of Trustees, to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, which Board shall be constituted and shall serve as may now or hereafter be provided by the Legislature. Said Board shall exercise such powers as are herein provided together with such other powers and duties not inconsistent herewith as may be prescribed by the Legislature. All moneys from whatever source coming into the Fund and all other securities, moneys, and assets of the Employees Retirement System of Texas shall be administered by said Board and said Board shall be the trustees thereof. The Treasurer of the State of Texas shall be custodian of said moneys and securities. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, hold, manage, purchase, sell, assign, trade, transfer, and dispose of any securities, evidences of debt, and other investments in which said securities, moneys, and assets have been or may hereafter be invested by said Board. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to invest and reinvest any of said moneys, securities, and assets, as well as the proceeds of any of such investments, in bonds, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued, or assumed or guaranteed in whole or in part, by the United States or any agency of the United States, or by the State of Texas, or by any county, city, school district, municipal corporation, or other political subdivision of

the State of Texas, both general and special obligations; or in home office facilities to be used in administering the Employees Retirement System including land, equipment, and office building; or in such corporation bonds, notes, other evidences of indebtedness, and corporation stocks, including common and preferred stocks, of any corporation created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any of the states of the United States, as said Board may deem to be proper investments; provided that in making each and all of such investments said Board shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as probable safety of their capital; and further provided, that a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may now or hereafter be provided by law. Unless investments authorized herein are hereafter further restricted by an Act of the Legislature, no more than one per cent (1%) of the book value of the total assets of the Employees Retirement System shall be invested in the stock of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid cash dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its

successors; and provided further, that not less than twenty-five per cent (25%) at any one time of the book value of investments of said Fund shall be invested in Government and Municipal Securities as enumerated above. This Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall become effective immediately upon its adoption without any enabling legislation."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 5, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-j to read as follows:

"Section 1-j. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1 of this article, the Legislature may provide for the refund of the tax paid on the first sale of cigars and tobacco products in this state which are subsequently sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texarkana."

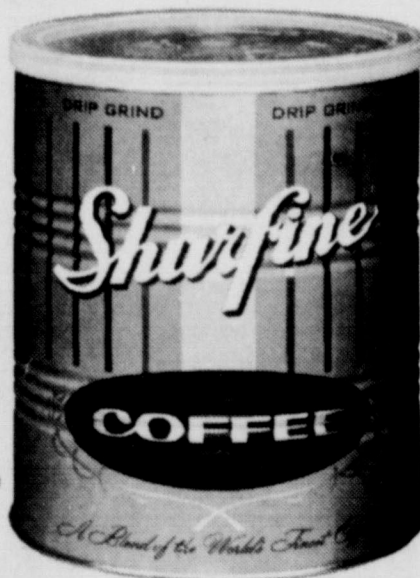

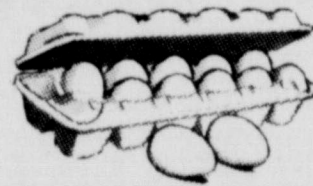
