Milner Holds Lead; Two Weeks To Go

Increased interest in state politics during 1968 was assured with the announcement last Friday that Governor John Connally will not seek re-election. Interest has been building all ready for some time on the national level, especially since 1968 is a presidential election year.

Now, with Connally stepping down, there should be hot races in the state Democratic (and perhaps even Republican) primary.

At the time Connally made his announcement, the only candidate who had announced his intentions of running for the governor's chair was Preston Smith of Lubbock.

Since his announcement, other Democrats have indicated they might be candidates in the primary. Included in this group is Ralph Yarborough, leader of the state's liberal Democratic faction.

Should Yarborough decide to try for the state's number one office, that would probably mean a special election to fill his senate post, since he has two years to go on his term.

In the Republican camps, possible gubernatorial candidates who prior to last Friday were more than satisfied with what they were doing, are beginning to crop up.

With Connally out of the picture, there might be a good race in the GOP primary, to see who will carry the Republican standards in the fall general election.

Prior to Connally's announcement, it appeared that there would just be "token" oppositions from the Republicans, since opposing Connally has generally resulted in a hard fight with a short stick, for both Republicans and Democrats alike.

The increased interest comes at what many people consider a big price — the retirement of Connally as governor.

Connally has made the state a fine leader, and whoever succeeds him in 1969 will be on a hot seat, as they attempt to follow up the former Secretary of the Navy, who has been elected to three terms as governor.

One thing's for sure-- those

Voters Okay

Amendments

Friona voters followed the trend of those statewide last Saturday, voting approval of all six proposed constitutional amendments.

A light turnout of 99 voters in Friona made up more than one-third of the total votes cast in Parmer County.

Local voters gave the biggest margin of victory to amendment number three, the Veteran's Land Program, by an 81-18 margin. Friona's American Legion Post helped get out the vote on this amendment.

County voters approved amendments number 1 through 4, but voted against numbers five and six. A total of 276 ballots were cast in the county.

40-Home Project

Underway Locally

Lillard Insurance and Real Estate has announced the opening of Welch Acres Addition housing project in northeast Friona.

Reports of a record grain harvest are coming in from local elevators as most of the

area grain crop has been harvested.

Bill Raybon of Friona Wheat Growers elevator estimated between 95 and 98 per cent of the grain in the local area has been harvested. "This has been a

record year for grain harvest," said Raybon. "And the harvest is still going smoothly." No exact records of grain yield were available.

Sugar beets have an average sugar content of about 14 per cent according to Elmer Margheim, Friona area supervisor for Holly Sugar Crop. Margheim estimated that some 460 railroad cars of beets had been shipped to the Holly plant in Hereford since the start of harvest 31 days ago. He also added that the weather has been ideal for harvesting sugar beets. Yields up to 38 tons per acre

have been reported. Earl Chester, manager of Chester Gin reports cotton harvest to be just beginning. "We have only scratched the surface so far in the harvest, but it should get into full swing next week."

The best load of cotton so far reported is one and three-quarters bales per acre, coming from the Curtis Murphree farm, northeast of Friona. Chester added that the character of the cotton is better this year, and it should be a better than average year.

Water Depletion Refunds Given

Recent information for the Internal Revenue Service, Dallas, Texas, revealed that the IRS had processed 6,218 amended water depletion tax claims for the years 1962, 1963 and 1964. A total of \$1,400,000 was refunded from these claims.

The 1965 and 1966 water depletions claims were handled in a routine fashion, similar to the depreciation schedule allowed for tractors and other farm machinery.

Revenue officials estimated that there were between 5,000 and 5,500 individual claims made for the years 1965 and 1966, which resulted in refunds of \$1,000,000 to \$1,200,000 per year to farmers filing these claims.

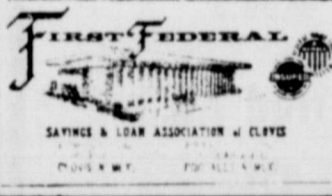

IN FINAL GAME

Memphis Passing Helps Cyclones To 14-0 Win

To say that the Memphis Cyclones were "Long" on passing in their finale against Friona last Friday at Memphis might be considered a bad pun.

But the truth of the matter is that the pass-catching of end Roy Long proved too much for Friona, who held Memphis scoreless for three quarters only to see the Cyclones rally for two fourth-quarter TDs and a 14-0 win.

The loss left Friona's season record at 7-3, the third-best in the school's history.

Friona's defense was adequate, but the offense never could get cranked up, as the Chiefs were never able to have a sustained drive for more than three first downs in a row. Fumbles or pass interceptions at critical points stalled four different drives.

However, at the start of the game, the Chiefs came out like "gangbusters." Eddie Barker took the opening kickoff at the goal-line, skirted left end and streaked up the sidelines before being pushed out of bounds near mid-field by the last Memphis tackler who had a shot at him.

Then, on the team's first down play, Johnny Barker threw a "bomb" intended for end Charles Hamilton, but a Cyclone defender deflected the ball away from Hamilton. On fourth down, Lowery Harper punted to the Memphis 10.

The Cyclones threatened to score the second time they had possession, driving from their own 24 to the Chiefs' 13. Big play was a 37-yard pass and run play from Tony Pounds to Long.

Once during the drive, Ricky Hurst had Pounds all but grounded for a 10-yard loss, but the Cyclone quarterback somehow got the pass away and it was caught for a first down. However, the drive, which carried over into the opening minutes of the fourth quarter, fizzled as a fourth-down pass fell incomplete.

The Chiefs appeared ready to move the ball as Johnny Barker skirted right end twice in three plays for 14-yard gains, to push the ball out past mid-field, but a third-down fumble caused a loss, and the Chiefs again had to punt.

An intercepted pass by Harper stopped another potential Cyclone drive, as the half ended scoreless, making fans think back to the teams' similar battle at Friona a year previous. Friona made its most serious bid early in the third quarter. The team put the ball in play following a punt at its own 29. A personal foul against the Cyclones gave Friona a first down at the Memphis 49.

Tony Perea picked up a first to the 38, and Barker again gained good yardage on the rollout, to the Memphis 26. But bad luck struck, as Barker faded to pass on third down. He fumbled the ball and Memphis recovered.

The team got the ball back a play later, at the Memphis 35, but before they could get anything going, they fumbled the ball back to the Cyclones at the 26.

Late in the quarter, Friona again had crossed over into Memphis territory, but this time a pass interception stopped their drive.

This time Memphis decided to do something about the pointless scoreboard. Pounds passed to Long for 10 and 36 yards, the last play ending the third quarter and setting the Cyclones up with a first down at the Chiefs' 12. An 11-yard gain by speedy William Welch placed the ball at the one, and Ronnie McFall punched across the touchdown with 16 seconds gone in the final quarter. Pounds kicked the point.

The aroused Chiefs started a drive at their own 27, which was aided by a pass interference penalty against Memphis. They drove to the Cyclone 42, but Larry Graves' pass was intercepted at the Memphis 29. The Cyclones, who had gained only 36 yards rushing during the first three quarters, then began a 71-yard scoring march, all on the ground. Halfback McFall ran around end for 27 yards for the big play during

the drive. His counterpart, Welch, scored from four yards out, and the point kick made it 14-0 with only 1:24 left in the game.

Memphis' 127 yards passing were the most aerial yards against the Chiefs this year, and their ten completions equalled Abernathy's output, with also the same number of attempts.

The Cyclones must have had Friona well-scouted, since halfback Tony Perea, who gained near 100 yards in almost every game, was held to only 47 yards rushing.

After being stopped for most of three quarters, Memphis ended up with 138 yards rushing, with 105 of the total gained by their two colored halfbacks, Welch and McFall, who alternated throughout the game, and scored the two touchdowns.

Memphis finished with a 7-2-1 record, similar to that posted by Friona. In three games against the Cyclones since 1963, the record reads 1-1-1.

F.G. CROFFORD

Squaw Coach Has Impressive Record

F.G. Crofford, new coach of the Friona High School Squaws brings a personal coaching record to FHS which is in keeping with the success that girls basketball has enjoyed through the years at Friona.

In fact, Crofford's record at Claude for the past 11 years is strikingly similar to that posted by the Squaws during the same span of years.

In 11 years at Claude, Crofford's team won the district title seven times. He took teams to the state meet four straight years, 1960 through 1963, winning the title once, finishing second twice, and third the other trip.

His won-loss record for the 11-year period figured out at an excellent 276-82, or a .771 winning percentage.

(For comparison, Friona also won district titles seven times in eleven years, went to state the same number of times and finished first once, second twice and third once, just like Crofford's team. The Squaws during the past 11 years have

fashioned a 285-56 won-loss record.)

Crofford's top year, record-wise was in 1960, when his girls had a 40-3 mark. That was their first trip to Austin, and the team finished second. His squad was 33-4 the next year, and also lost out in the state finals. Claude was 38-3 in 1962, their third trip down, when the state title was won.

Keeping his won-loss record from being even better was one losing season during his stay at Claude, 1964-65, when the team was 7-15. It recovered somewhat to 14-10 the following year and then won the district title last year, after being moved up into Class A from B.

At Claude, Crofford also coached boys basketball. His boys team made it to the state meet in 1958, but the rest of the times they were usually second or third behind the tough Gruver Greyhounds.

The congenial coach laughingly admits that while he had a hard time getting into the playoffs with his boys teams, it was equally as hard on the district schools who had aspirations of winning district girls basketball.

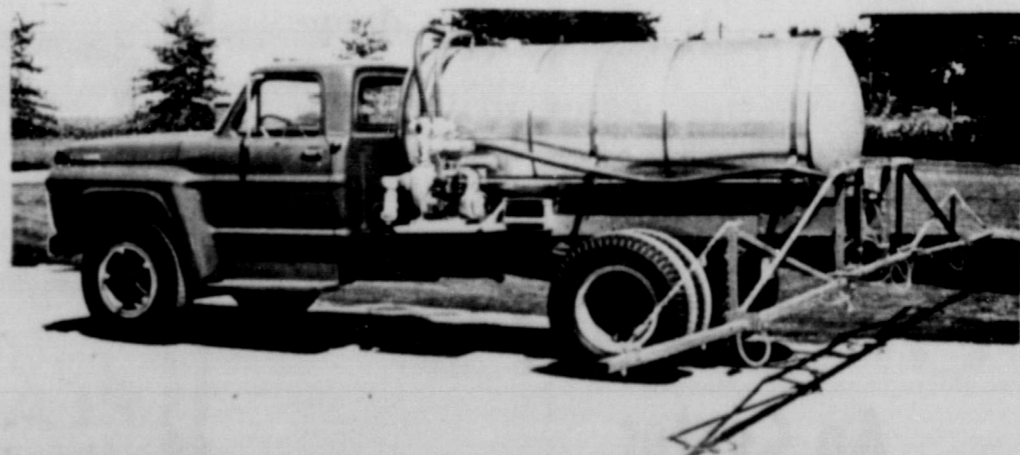

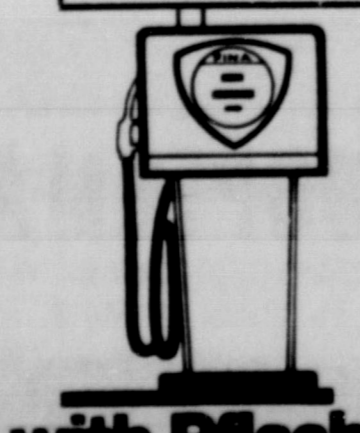

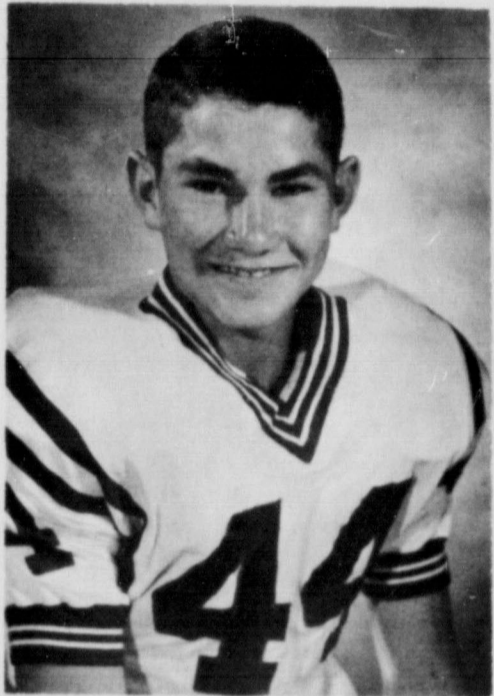

On The Farm In Parmer County

Soybean Demonstration Results:
A.E. Redwine, came by the office this past week and gave me the yields on his soybean variety and fertilizer demonstration. The demonstration

was located 1 mile south and 1 mile east of the Oklahoma Lane Community Center.

Listed below is agronomic data concerning the demonstration. This is a sandy loam soil and this plot was planted to soybeans in 1966. The test was planted May 20 at a rate of 75 lbs. per acre. It was irrigated 3 times and also received a treflan application and was hoed once. The fertilizer test was fertilized according to soil test recommendation.

Below are the results on these tests:

Variety Test
Hinn - 27.7 bushels/acre
Hill - 30.7 bushels/acre
Lee-25.1 bushels/acre
Patterson-26.8 bushels/acre

The Patterson was harvested October 2nd, and the other varieties were harvested October 25.

Fertilizer Test
0-0-0 yielded 27.7 bushels/acre
30-0-0 yielded 27.7 bushels/acre
0-40-0 yielded 28.5 bushels/acre
30-40-0 yielded 29.4 bushels/acre

Figuring 8 cents a pound cost for nitrogen and 10 cents a pound cost for phosphorus, fertilizer did not pay for itself this year. Under the above conditions, under different circumstances, for example soybeans following grain sorghum, or cotton, fertilizer might have caused an increase above cost.

Attend Meeting

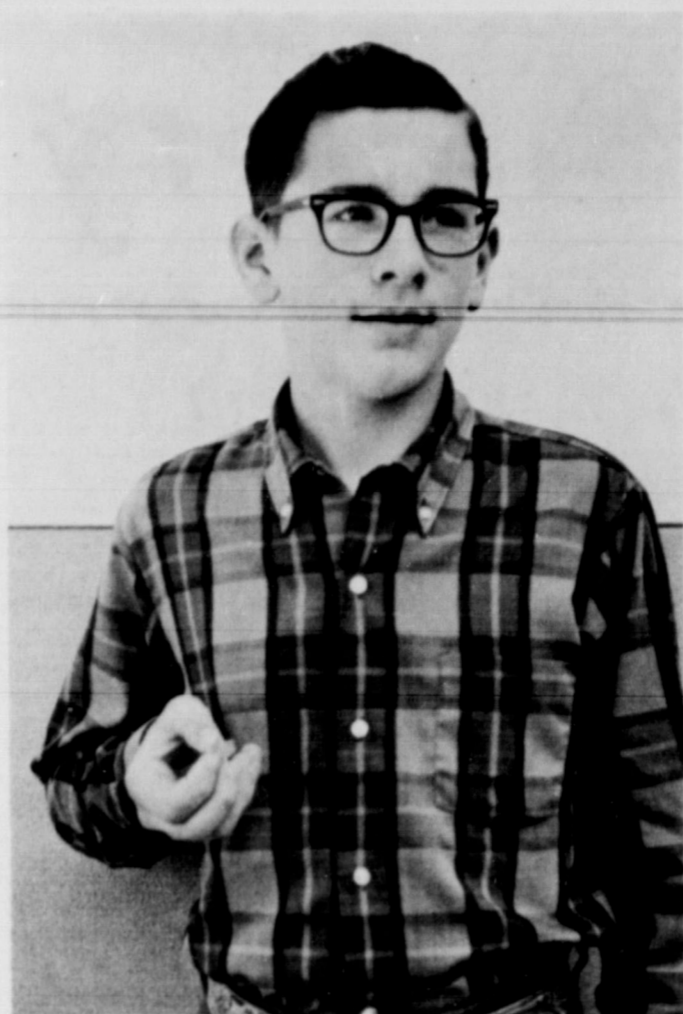
Several members of the Friona Future Nurses attended an area meeting and luncheon at Farwell High School, Saturday, November 4.

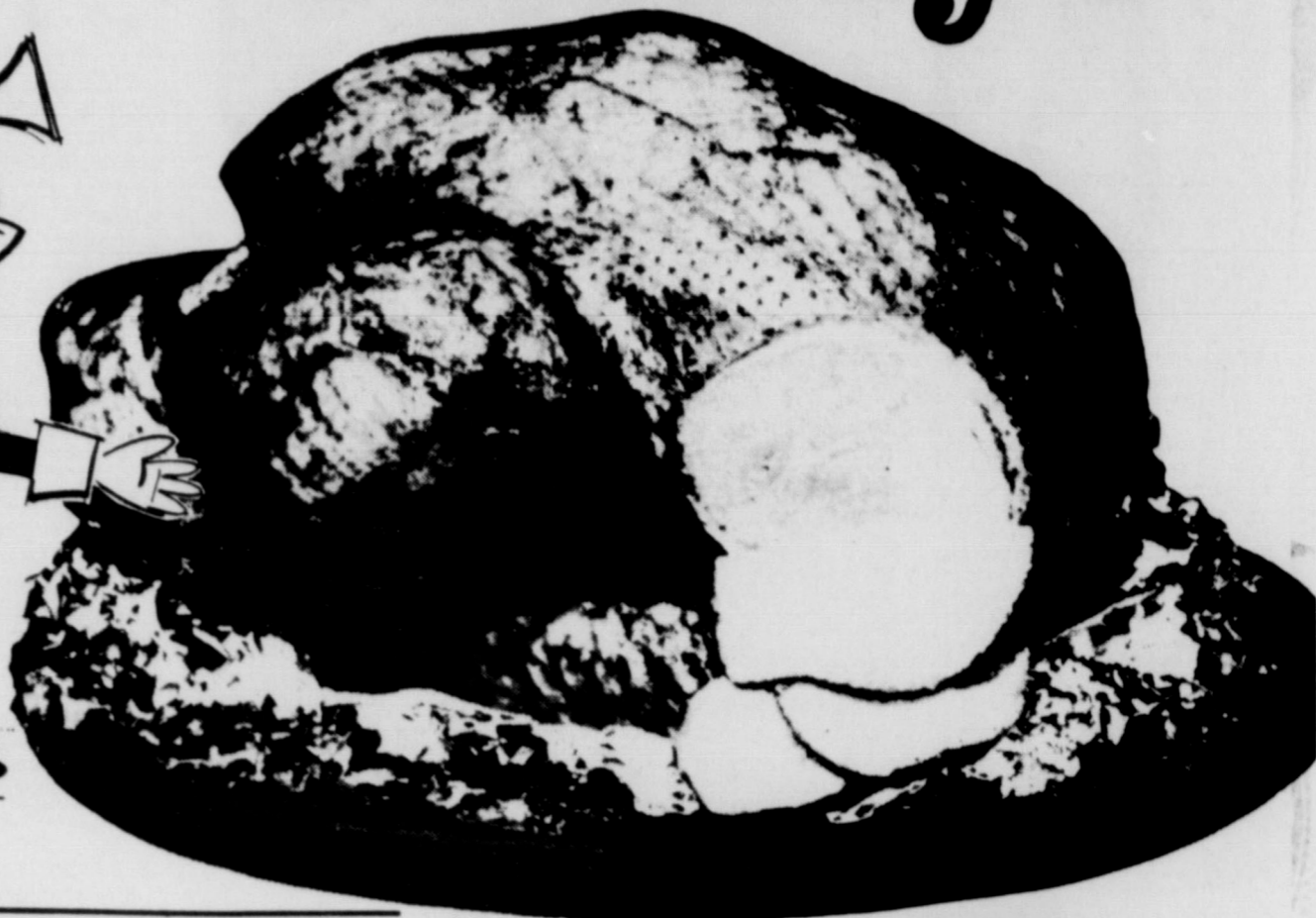
