Construction Tops \$1 Mill

Friona for 1968 set a new record for value and number of new residences in a calendar year, according to figures released this week by A.L. (Jake) Outland, city manager.

Total construction for the calendar year stood at \$1,035,-200, marking only the second time in the city's history for yearly construction to top the \$1 million-mark.

As usual, new residential construction made up the bulk of the year's total, and this figure was a new record, standing at 5936,000. The former mark for new residential construction was set in 1964, at \$818,-

The 1968 total has been beaten only by 1964's all-time record, which stood at \$1,149,040 exclusive of school figures, and \$1,978,040 including the high school permit.

A total of 48 permits were issued for new home construction making up the \$936,000 figure. This compared to 17 permits in 1967 for \$338,910; and 39 permits for \$818,300 in the prevlous record year.







NOTICE TO PARENTS Of School Age Children

The school census is being taken during the month of January this year. All children who are six years old on or before September 1, 1969, but will not be 18 or older on or before that same date should be counted in this census. It is very important that all children six to 18 years be counted in this census. The child should be counted even though he may not be in school and even though he or she may be married.

If you, as a parent, have not received and filled out a school census blank on or before January 31, you are being overlooked and should do one of the following:

1. Phone the school office and ask for a census blank, 2. Call in person at the School Tax Office and get a census blank and fill it out. Remember if your child will be six years old next September 1, he should be counted in the census now, even though he is not in school now. If he is six but not 18 or older next September 1 he should be counted now. All children from six to 18 should be counted. The six year olds who start next September to school are the ones most overlooked in the census. Failure to count them costs the school and taxpayers extra money. Please help us not to overlook anyone.



Second Class Postage To Be Increased

Postal rates for newspapers and magazines and other material mailed at second class rate will be increased January 1, Postmaster Wright Williams reminded second class mailers

The increase results from the postage rate law enacted in December 1967, which raised most second-class rates in three annual steps, Postmaster Williams pointed out, the January 1. 1969, Hike is the second phase of the increase. The first phase took effect January 7, 1968, and the third step will go into effect January 1, 1970.

The second-class rate increase affects general interest, now profit and class room publications.

Rates also will go up January 1. for controlled circulation publications. These are primary trade, technical and industrial journals which generally do not charge a subscription fee and are not eligible for second-class rates. The 1967 postal rate law called for a three-step raise for controlled circulations publications to be effective the same dates as second - class increases.

Except for home countymailings, postal rates for newspapers and magazines mailed second-class are based on the weight of the publication, the amount of advertising it contains, and the distance it is mailed.

Effective January 1, rates for editorial or non-advertising matter in commercial publications will be increased from 3 to 3.2 cents per pound,






