



Our news stories during the past three weeks are painting a rosy picture for Friona; construction topping a million dollars; bank deposits, setting an all-time record; postal receipts also setting a record.

Another indication of how Friona has grown can be seen if you compare the increase in utility connections during the past decade.

On January 1, 1959, the city of Friona had 753 water meters and 719 gas meters. The past January 1, ten years later, water meters numbered 1120, and gas meters stood at 1075.

The number of water meters had increased by 47.3 per cent, and the number of gas meters increased by 49.5 per cent.

Currently, the population of Friona is probably around 3,600 as to an approximately 2,000 in 1959. And the only thing that is keeping it from growing even more at the present is the availability of low-cost rent property, or perhaps we should say rent property, period.

But this is at least the type of problem which is nice to have rather than, for instance, having blocks and blocks of empty houses, which is the plight of some cities today.

Beginning next Wednesday, residents of the Friona area should not be surprised if they see SAC B-52 and B-58 jet bombers flying low-level "bombing" missions against simulated targets near Friona and Eunice, N.M.

For several months, Strategic Air Command B-52 Stratofortresses and B-58 Hustlers will fly at subsonic speed along the centerline of a 10-mile-wide corridor at 800 to 1300 feet above the ground during the training missions.

But residents can breathe easy -- the aircraft do not carry bombs on these flights.

Radar bomb scoring equipment at Air Force facilities near Friona and Eunice, N.M., will use radio and radar signals to measure accuracy of the simulated bomb drops.

The mission route starts at a point near Elkhart, Kan., heads southwest and turns southeast near Dalhart, passing between Friona and Dimmitt, then turning southwest again to near Levelland. Next the corridor turns south to near Brownfield, and makes a final turn southwest to a termination point near Eunice, N.M. (See Air Force Map elsewhere in this issue.)

All target and route selections in the mission have been coordinated in advance with the Federal Aviation Administration. Areas of population, poultry farming and heaviest air traffic are avoided whenever possible.

The radar bomb scoring facility is designed to inject realism into SAC training programs by providing crews with a wide range of unfamiliar targets and routes.

Approximately 60 Air Force personnel will man the site at Eunice, N.M., with a smaller detachment at the Friona site. These are radar and electronic technicians, plus personnel needed to maintain the facility and furnish other support.

Governor Smith told the Star in December that among his first acts upon being inaugurated will be to appoint Gen. Ayers to the post of state adjutant general. Smith was inaugurated as Texas' 37th governor on Tuesday.

Gen. Ayers and Gov. Smith were classmates at Texas Tech. The general has commanded the 36th Infantry Brigade of the National Guard since 1963. Gov. John Connally recommended his promotion to brigadier general in 1964.

Ayers lived in Lubbock County 28 years prior to moving to Friona in 1958 to farm.

An artillery officer in the European theater during World War II, he received the Silver Star, Bronze Star and French Croix de Guerre among his three rows of ribbons.

The position is full-time, and Gen. Ayers and his wife would move to Austin.

Friona Area Farmer Awarded Beet Plaque

Harvey Garrison, who farms six miles south of Friona, was one of three sugar beet growers honored at the annual meeting of the Texas-New Mexico Sugar Beet Growers Association last Saturday in Hereford.

Garrison became a charter member in the exclusive "10,000 Pound Club," which was instituted this year to honor top beet growers in the area. Garrison's yield on his 1968 crop was 10,160 pounds per acre.

Only two other growers in the Holly Sugar plant's area made the 10,000-pound plateau in 1968. They were Gary Glasscock of Bovina, with the top yield of 10,444 pounds, and G.E. Bailey of Clovis, whose yield was 10,235 pounds.

Prior to this year, the Association had presented plaques to the top growers in each area.

Jay Boston, president of the association, reported on several aspects of the sugar beet industry. Robert F. Ginn, agricultural manager at Holly Sugar Corp., reported on the

1968 crop, which in some respects was below what the crop has averaged in its short history locally. Average sugar content for the 1968 crop was 14.6 per cent.

Glen Yeager, a Holly vice-president, gave greetings on behalf of Holly president John Bunker, unable to attend because of illness. "Farmers need to improve their image," Yeager told the meeting.

Principal speaker was Dr. Charles Jarvis of San Marcos. Dr. Jarvis said we need to be proud to be living in the best country on the face of the earth, and need to be proud of our jobs.

"If America ever goes down, it will be because the country turned its back on Christianity," said the dentist, who punctuated his remarks with rapid-fire anecdotes.

Awards were presented by James W. Witherspoon, executive secretary of the association.

Some 700 persons attending the banquet, held at the Bull Barn in Hereford.

About a year ago I stood on the brink of the caprock, down near Silverton, and watched a bald eagle.

As he alternately swooped and soared I was frankly envious. This feathered symbol of our nation's spirit of freedom was able to sail in close for an inspection of the entire canyon, while I, earth bound and hampered by a pack, could only hope to view a small part of the area.

Propelled by the varying air currents his wide wings carried him through a series of circles and dives, now so close that he seemed to brush the rocky walls, then up, and away until he became only a speck in the bright blue sky.

This proud free bird was part of a scene that I shall never forget.

The grandeur, the stillness, the sheer beauty of this part of Texas is stamped indelibly upon the screen of memory.

During the President's inauguration my thoughts returned again to the eagle and his symbolic flight.

40 YEARS AGO -- Jan. 25, 1929

J.A. Blackwell was elected president of the Friona Chamber of Commerce at a called session Monday night. Other officers are M.A. Crum, vice-president, John White, secretary; J.M. Osborn, treasurer and M.C. Wilkinson, director.

Report on the condition of Friona State Bank showed that deposits as of December 31, 1928, stood at \$270,356.29 (compared to the almost \$10 million on deposit on the bank's last statement).

Friona Gins will begin operating only three days per week until the current crop is off. Ginnings at the present time total 1200 bales, and the original estimate of 2,000 bales may not be reached.

35 YEARS AGO -- JAN. 26, 1934

30 YEARS AGO -- JAN. 27, 1939

AN EDITORIAL

Building Compares Favorably In Friona

An indication of just what Missouri Beef Packers and the expanding cattle industry means to Friona can be seen in the comparison of Friona's building permits for 1968 with those of other cities in the Gold-En Spread.

For most towns, the year 1968 wasn't particularly a big year; in fact many reported that building was below the previous year. But for Friona, the building totals were second only to the all-time record year of 1964.

Of the cities we have found building totals from, only two, Canyon and Hereford topped Friona in building during 1968. Canyon's total of \$4,052,450 included over \$3,000,000 in construction on the West Texas State University campus.

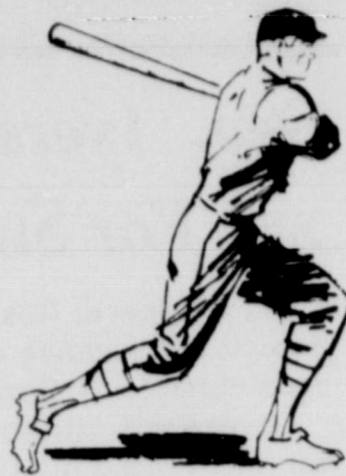

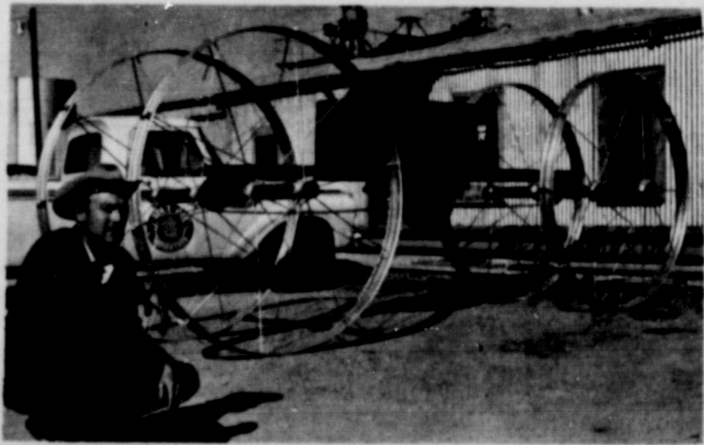

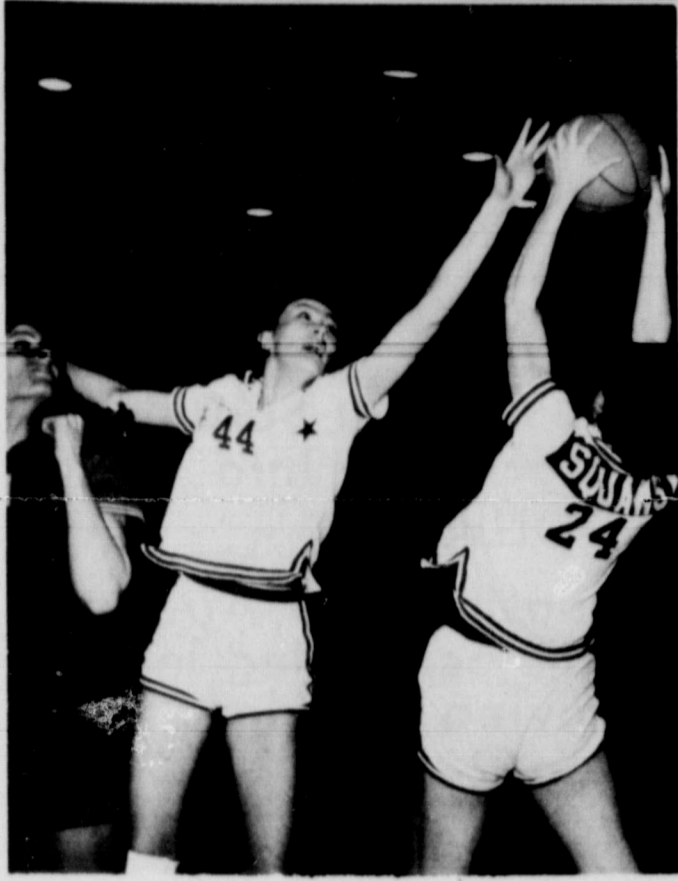

If their Chamber of Commerce asks for nominations for a business man of the year award, I plan to submit the name of Ted Simpson.

After spending more than an hour in Shamrock at a repair shop which had been recommended to us drove on west without tail lights. By the time we reached McLean it was beginning to get dark and had it not been possible for us to get repairs there, we would have spent the night.

Clayton's Committee To Present Water Bills

The House Interim Water Study Committee, chaired by Representative Bill Clayton, after holding hearings regarding water resource development and related State water problems in various parts of the State, is prepared to present to the Legislature several bills and proposals.

The following are some of the recommendations that will be made:

1. That a constitutional amendment allowing three and one-half billion dollars of revenue bonds for use in water development by the Water Development Board be proposed. Under the provisions of the amendment, these bonds cannot be issued except when they have been approved by a 2/3's vote of the legislature in stipulated amounts.

2. That the power of eminent domain be given to the Water Development Board in order to allow the purchase of lands for reservoirs.

3. That the Water Develop-

ment Board be allowed to lease land acquired for reservoir sites to individuals and corporations; and that a method of payment to the local government entity be provided in such an amount that it will equal their present ad valorem taxes.

4. That certain types of inactive water districts be dissolved.

5. That the State, through the Water Rights Commission have control of ground water to the same extent that underground water conservation districts presently have, but only in those areas where there are no districts.

6. That there should be closer coordination of personnel, data collecting and assimilation, and equipment for the various water agencies; and that a new State Office Building be constructed to house all State water agencies.

7. That various types of Districts and River Authority be given the authority to issue revenue bonds to build parks.

8. That a Master Water Authority be created with powers to contract with the United States Government, State of Texas, and other parastates; and the power to levy a tax on issue bonds. Such authority territory to be designated by the people in a given import area.

9. That the Texas Water Quality Board be designated as arbitrator when needed in settling disputes over the cost of treating sewage.

Representative Clayton and the Committee fully endorse and support the economic input, out-put study being conducted by Doctor Herb Grub of the Planning Division of the Governor's Office. The Committee also urges full support and speedy implementation of the Texas Water Plan as presented by the Texas Water Development Board.

Clayton stated that he felt the Committee's work has been very fruitful, and that most of the recommendations presented by the Committee will prove acceptable to the Legislature. Representative Clayton also stated that he believes the incoming administration will give top priority to water resource development and implementation of the Texas water plan.

Just another reminder of the Beef Cattle Educational meeting to be held Thursday, January 23rd. The program will begin at 7:00 p.m. and will be held in the Bovina High School Auditorium.

The program will be of interest to everyone. Gene Frye, president of Missouri Beef Packers, Inc., will discuss the need for cattle feeding in the 1970's. The discussion will be of interest to all segments of the beef cattle industry.

Of interest to sorghum producers and feedlot people will be a discussion by Dr. Lowell Schake, Area Extension Livestock Specialist from Lubbock. Dr. Schake will present information on the latest research being done on sorghum preparation for feeding.

Another topic of discussion which should attract much interest is "Cattle Futures Trading." Foster Whaley, Gray County Agricultural Agent from Pampa will speak on this subject. Whaley will discuss ma-

ny of the practical aspects that should benefit local livestock producers.

Dr. R.O. Dull, Supervisory Veterinarian Meat Inspector, USDA Consumer and Marketing Service, will round out the program with a talk on "Slaughter Condemnations - Reasons and Prevention."

Everyone in the county and surrounding counties is encouraged to attend this meeting which is being sponsored by the Parmer County Extension Service and County Livestock Committee.

COUNTY SOIL MOISTURE SURVEY MADE
On Wednesday, January 15, Oliver Newton, Advisory Agricultural Meteorologist, with the South Plains Research and Extension Center, was in the county making a soil moisture survey.

The purpose of this survey is to obtain an estimate of subsurface moisture in soil from two to six feet below the surface. This survey is designed primarily as a guide to farmers in determining the amount and timing of preplant irrigation.

Mr. Newton probed the soil and made moisture readings in 8 different locations over the county. This information gathered from the survey will be compiled by Newton and made available to the County Agent.

Enough copies of the survey will be available through the County Agent in Farwell, for each county farmer.

30,000 Head Feedlot Announced At Hereford

Construction of a new 30,000 head capacity feed lot east of Hereford was announced last week by Southwest Feed Yard, Inc.

Announcement of the feed lot, to be constructed four miles east and one-half mile north of Hereford, was made during a press conference at the Hereford Country Club.

Directors are shooting for a September 1 completion date for the new feedlot, which is the second within a month of comparable size for the Hereford-Summerfield area.

To cost in excess of \$1 million, the new lot expects to employ 30 persons. Manager and vice-president of the enterprise is Charles Hoover, who was raised north of Friona in the Bootleg community.

Hoover states that the feedlot will have a lot of "eye appeal." He said that a feedlot

can look attractive without increasing the expenses too much and that he believes this will become an important factor.

Hoover farmed near Walcott for several years, and operated a small feedlot there. He also ran a herd of registered Angus cattle.

Twenty-eight men, all of the Hereford area, are stockholders in the venture.
