ing to deafness or blindness. Some children develop inflammation of the brain which can leave them mentally retarded. Each year hundreds of children have died as a result of measles.

Service recommend that every healthy infant be vaccinated when he is about one year old. Children over this age who have not been vaccinated and who have not had measles should also be immunized.

Vaccination is especially important for children in day nurseries, kindergartens, or the elementary grades of school, or in other groups where exposure to measles may occur. If one child in a classroom has measles, all the other children who are unprotected usually become infected. They then carry the infection home to younger brothers and sisters who have not been immunized.

So please take your child to the FREE measles, diphtheria, and tetanus clinic Wednesday, October 16, between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. at the School Nurse's Office.
