Gib Boatman shows us an article in the current Kiplinger News Letter which states that all war gun trophies must be registered by December 1.

He wonders, like I did, how we were all asleep at the switch because we don't recall legislation on this point. We had thought that the gun registration bill had been stalled. Apparently sponsors pushed through this much of a bill, and it could be a prelude to an all-inclusive bill.

At any rate, all guns which have been kept as trophies from any war must now be registered, and failure to do so may result in a \$200 fine.

We understand that promoters of the \$100 in gift coupons for \$10 are leaving the impression that the Retail Merchants are sponsoring the promotion.

We're very active in the association, and know for a fact that the group has not authorized the promoters to use their name in conjunction with their promotion. There may be some individual members of the Association involved in the promotion, but the organization has not sanctioned it as a project.

In fact, the following letter gives one reaction toward the promotion, so we'll reprint it in its entirety:

Dear Mr. Ellis:

I wonder if you have been one of the "lucky" people to have your phone number selected and given the opportunity to win \$100 in merchandise from local merchants. Of course, the question you must answer before you can "win" is rather difficult. I'm sure few people in this area know that Preston Smith is the governor-elect.

If you are lucky and can answer the question, you earn the privilege of buying for only \$9.95 a coupon book entitling you to approximately \$100 of gifts from local merchants.

This may be well and good. The merchant provides the free gifts and get some free advertising, and the customer supposedly flock to the stores to redeem the coupons and at least theoretically buy something else; a good promotional idea.

My hope is that there are not many coupons for the merchants to redeem, because it upsets me greatly to think of the amount of money taken out of Friona by an out-of-state promoter.

For example, if 500 Frionans pay \$9.95 each for these coupon books, that is \$4,975 which will leave town. The firm distributing the coupon books is out the expense of printing the books and canvassing the town, and paying for the advertising.

At the most, this should not run over \$500, maybe a lot less. This leaves around \$4,475 that someone from out of town takes from Friona.

There is a good possibility that these merchants would get at least part of this money anyway, had the coupon books never been sold -- so they're out the free gifts and some money as well.

I only hope they didn't sell 1,000 or more of the books. Name Withheld.

United Fund Sets Completion Goal

Friona's United Fund Drive kicked off on Tuesday, with a meeting at the Community Room of Friona State Bank, presided over by A.L. Outland, drive chairman.

Outland challenged the workers to finish the drive by Thursday at noon. By Wednesday, 25 per cent of the 1968 goal

of \$6,364 had been raised. Outland detailed what the money would be used for, and gave brief outline of each of the agencies which benefit from the united drive.

Organizations which are in on the 1968 budget include the Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Red Cross, Salvation Army, USO,

Texas United Fund, Foreign Exchange Student and Emergency Fund.

In the pre-drive campaign, A.L. Black, chairman reported with about ten per cent of the 1968 goal. Some 11 businesses were contacted in this drive.

Outland stressed the importance of trying to get employees of Friona businesses to be 100 per cent in giving. The Post Office once again was among the first businesses to be 100 per cent among its employees.

Hollis Horton is municipal chairman for the drive, and Robert Neelley is rural chairman.

In other business, the monthly bills were approved for payment.

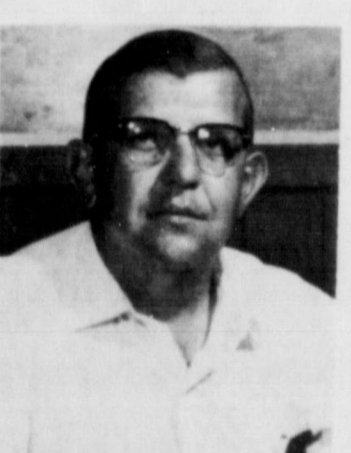
The board accepted the resignation of Larry O'Connor as bus foreman, as of November 27, and hired Alfred Beavers as O'Connor's replacement.

On the return home, Baker celebrated his 88th birthday by sitting behind the wheel of his 1948 Pontiac for 10 hours.

The Bakers started out by visiting their daughter, Mrs. Florence Boyce in Lubbock. Then they drove to Big Spring where they spent the night with their son and family, Mr. and Mrs. Duke Baker.

Leaving Big Spring, the Bakers drove for four hours in what he described as the

"worst driving conditions I've ever seen" - snow and slush which was made worse by passing trucks covering up his windshield. Mr. Baker said he had to stop every so often to clear off his windshield.

"We had intended to visit relatives in Missouri during our trip, but decided to cut our trip short," said the longtime Friona resident.

Friends Of Library In Membership Drive

A special committee of the Friends of the Library organization met this week to begin the group's first membership drive.

In the short time the group has been organized, it has acquired 107 members and five life members. It has spent \$575 on needed books for the library and has had \$910.50 contributed, according to Friends President, Mrs. Jimmy Mabry.

The purpose of Friends of the Library is to purchase books and research material needed to give the public a really complete library. The group also plans to purchase a projector and record player to be used in the library and to assist in acquiring a permanent building for the Friona Public Library.

"Our present facility will be inadequate by the end of 1969," Mrs. Mabry notes.

The Friends aid in developing public understanding of the library and in making it better known to the citizens of the town. Through informal meetings the group plans to offer opportunities for people who enjoy books to get together and talk about mutual interests and to hear important speakers.

They have established a scholarship-loan program for the library to aid in developing professional staff.

At the recent meeting, Mrs. Sloan Osborn was presented

with the first life membership plaque by the Friends of the Library. The group plans to eventually present all life members with an engraved plaque, according to Mrs. Mabry. "Our library has access to the state-wide Telex service, which makes available any books or films in 14 state libraries," Mrs. Mabry says. "The only cost to the patron is postage on the book or film and the service takes approximately three days."

Membership dues to belong to the organization range from \$1.00 to \$100.00. A one-person membership is \$1.00, family membership is \$5.00, sustain-

ing membership is \$10.00, life membership is \$100.00 and a membership for clubs, businesses or other organizations is \$25.00.

"The Friends are a group of citizens who believe in the library and the importance of its service to the people of Friona, Mrs. Mabry explains. "We urge any and everyone who has an interest in the local library to join this group."

Pause And Reflect

It is, admittedly, far easier to march in a street mob, to crowd into the halls of an institution and vociferously demand "rights" than to be a serious hard working taxpayer who earns his rights by accepting the responsibilities of citizenship. Misguided, unduly influenced, minorities cry out for opportunities -- never realizing that opportunity, like the poor, "we have with us always."

They refuse to accept the obligations of selfhelp which transfers opportunity into success. Possessing rights and opportunities they are derelict in the duty of properly maintaining these two advantages of our civilization.

The existence of minority groups of various colors, creeds, and ethnic origins is nothing new. Nor should it be considered unusual in the great melting pot of American society.

I can recall working on one large construction job where thirteen nationalities were represented.

However, this homogeneous conglomeration of breeding is one of our sources of strength.

It is from their mixture that we obtain the unique characteristics of the pioneer who crossed the plains in a covered wagon and his great-grandson who pilots a space craft.

We are a complex, confusing, and sometimes confused, bunch of people and our problems are compounded because there are so many of us -- over 200 million.

Therefore we should not be too alarmed when a minute percentage of our population gets bent out of shape and begins to act as spoiled children.

Especially since our relief programs have encouraged indolence and brought into being such things as an "Association of Welfare Recipients."

Word comes to me of a Post Office employee (not in Friona) who ran Old Glory, upside down, to the top of the flagpole. It remained there an entire day.

Upon lowering it he let it touch the ground and clumsily stepped on it.

An observant lady reprimanded him for his carelessness and he laughingly remarked "Heck, nobody but you even noticed it!"

Perhaps we parents and grandparents have been so busy providing our offspring with material advantages that we have thoughtlessly overlooked teaching them to appreciate the efforts and sacrifices of their forebears.

With this awesome thought in mind I, with the cooperation of the Star, begin a project whose purpose is to tell the story of Parmer County.

We will need the help of every resident whose family has lived here for any appreciable length of time.

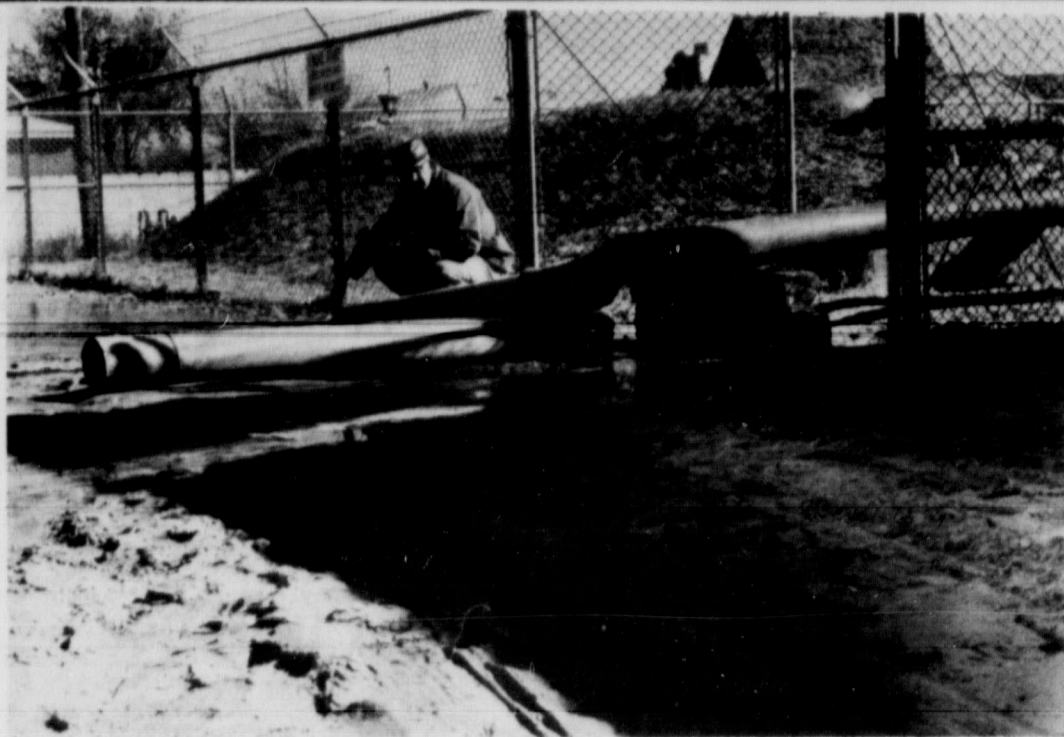

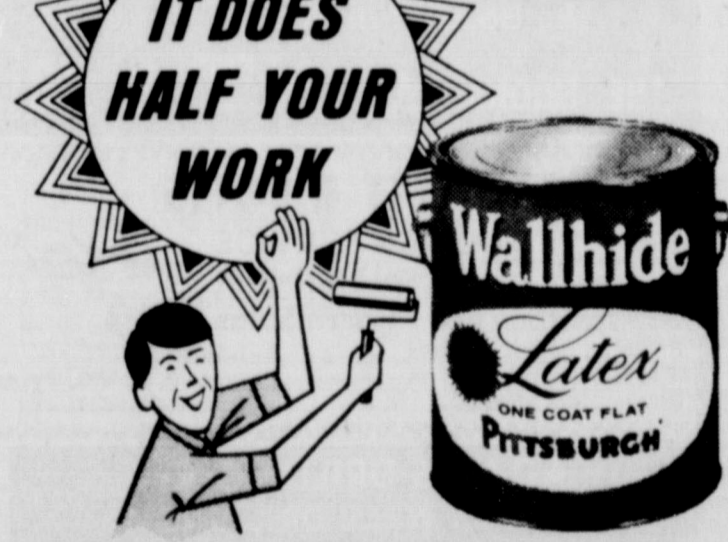

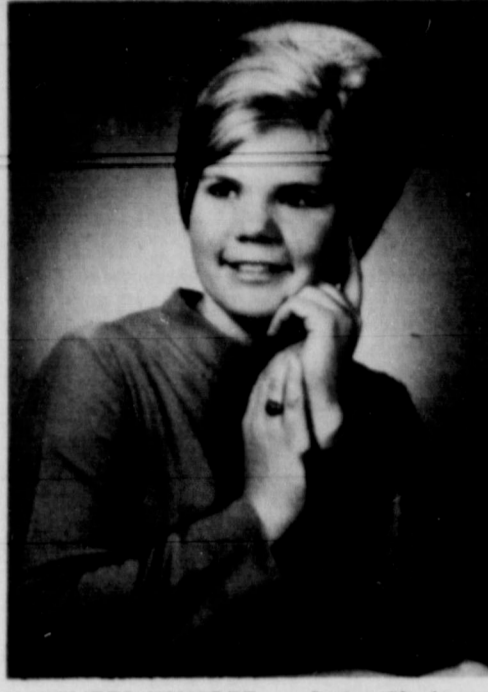

But Friona made the most of the conditions, and actually used the adverse conditions to their advantage. Besides the mud, temperatures were near the freezing mark during the game. The win allowed Friona to finish with a 7-3 record for the year.

Abernathy lost the ball on fumbles four times during the first half, and Friona turned three of the turnovers into scores. All of the scoring came in the first half.

With the game less than three minutes old, Abernathy fumbled the slippery ball at its own 11-yard line, and Ted Procter recovered for Friona. The Antelopes almost held the Chieftains, but on fourth down, Perea vaulted over the line for the TD from the four. Joe Bogges kicked, and it was Friona 7, Abernathy 0, with 4:34 gone in the game.

The Chieftains almost gave the ball back on a third down play, but an off-sides penalty on Abernathy rubbed out a lost fumble.

Lowery Harper, who punted all night like the conditions were perfect, booted the ball to the Abernathy seven late in the first quarter, and the punt turned out to be a big gain for Friona.

On the second play, Abernathy fumbled, and Joe Bogges recovered for the Chiefs at the Antelope two-yard line. Perea responded by scoring on the first play. The kick was partially blocked, but Friona led, 13-0 with 1:22 left in the opening period.

Another fumble set up yet a third Friona score. Forced to punt from their own 34, Abernathy got a bad snap to the punter, and Friona took over on the Antelope 28. Nine plays later, the Chiefs lighted up the scoreboard again.

Perea gave the team first downs at the 17 and a first-and-goal at the one. From there, quarterback Johnny Barker, playing despite an injured ankle, scored on a rollout. He used the same play to score two extra points, and Friona led, 21-0 with 5:54 left in the half.

Abernathy's Larry Williams fielded the kickoff on his 15, edged through the charging Chieftains, and went 85 yards for his team's only TD. The Antelopes' try for two points failed, and Friona still led by 21-6.

Friona's only touchdown which started on their own end of the field took ust one play to consummate. Following an Abernathy punt, a penalty moved the ball back to the Friona 18. From there, Perea did his stuff.

The Friona Flash was stalled at about the 30 but never was completely stopped. He finally bust out from a gang of would-be tacklers and went 82 yards for the TD. Bogges' kick made it 28-6 as the clock showed 3:09.

Friona fans were wishing the game would be called at half-time, especially the band, which had to march in all of the mess. However, such was not the case. But there was no further scoring.

The Antelopes, who were kept in their own end of the field during the first half by Harper's punts, were limited to only 41 net yards and three first downs by the Chieftain defense.

The home team had its best drive of the contest to start the second half, but it fizzled on a pass interception at the Friona 20. After Bogges boomed the second half kickoff out of the end zone, Abernathy put the ball in play on its own 20.

Quarterback Otro Klatt paced the team to three first downs to the Friona 35. However, his third down pass was intercepted by Procter at the 20 to end the threat.

It really wasn't much of a passer's night. Barker failed to connect on two attempts. The Abernathy passer hit only one of six, and the completion was for minus two yards. And two of his passes were picked off.

A fumble recovery and a 15-yard penalty against Friona gave Abernathy another scoring opportunity as the final quarter opened. The An-

telopes had a first down at the Friona 25. However, a wild pitchout was recovered by James Weatherly to halt the threat.

Forced to gamble, the Antelopes went for the yardage on a fourth down on their own 32, and Friona took over the 38. Perea almost got his fourth TD of the game at this point, breaking away to the Abernathy 10 before being caught.

At this point, in the last four minutes of the game, Coach Bob Owen inserted his reserves, and the clean-uniformed boys got some experience. That is, until lineman Ramey Beene and Joel Osborn got their chance to carry the ball in the last minute to play.

Perea had another 200-yard-plus game, gaining 220 net yards of the Chieftains' 249. The Antelopes were held to 139 net yards.

The total gave Perea a fabulous 1,761 yards for the season, by far a new school record. His 18 points gave him 110 points for the season, five below what Doug Dodd scored in 1964. Perea was the district scoring champion.

On The Farm In Parmer County

Under what conditions can fertilizers be applied in the fall or winter for spring planted crops? A valid answer to this question requires that each of the three major plant nutrients be examined separately.

It is generally agreed that phosphorus and potassium can be applied well ahead of planting with little reduction in availability as compared with the same application at planting. Phosphorus in fertilizers is soon converted to new forms in the soil and does not move unless the soil is disturbed by plowing or disking. Potassium is also held by soil particles and does not move except in sandy soils low in clay and organic matter. Therefore the latter group of soils would be an exception with respect to applying potassium too far ahead of the time it would be used by a crop.

The big question about fall and winter fertilization concerns nitrogen. Can nitrogen be stored in the soil? What about losses and reduced efficiency? Answers to these questions will vary with soil properties, temperature and moisture conditions.

Ammonium nitrogen is held by clay particles and generally remains near where it is placed in the soil. Therefore the objective in early nitrogen fertilization would be to use ammonium and keep this form throughout the storage period. It is known that bacteria converts ammonium to nitrates, once in the soil. This rate of conversion is influenced by a number of factors, especially temperatures. It is important to wait until soil temperatures are below between 50 and 55 degrees Fahrenheit so that a minimum amount of the ammonium applied will get into the nitrate form until the soils warm up prior to planting time.

What happens to nitrate nitrogen in soil? Nitrates are mobile and move with soil water. This means they can leach from a very sandy soil in areas of heavy winter rainfall. Another possible loss of nitrate nitrogen is through denitrification. This takes place in soils that stay extremely wet for long periods. When water fills the soil pores, air is excluded. When such a condition develops, a special group of bacteria can remove the oxygen from nitrate (NO₃) allowing the nitrogen to escape as a gas. Therefore the objective of fall nitrogen fertilization would be to use and keep the ammonium form during the winter.

Each set of soil and management conditions needs to be evaluated where applications of nitrogen for spring planted crops are being considered this

Research & Extension Center at Lubbock consider the soil test values along with the information supplied such as cropping history, past yields, fertilizer used, irrigation available, the next crop to be grown and expected yield. The fertilizer use suggestions are considered adequate to supply the plant nutrients needed for the designated yields but cannot, as examples, compensate for moisture stress wrong planting date weed problems, disease, insect damage or poor varieties.

The soil test report from the Soils Testing Lab at Lubbock shows the actual values found in the laboratory. The nutrients are rated as very low (VL); low (L); medium (M); high (H); or very high (VH).

These ratings do not refer to the capacity of the soil to produce yields, but indicate the relative availability of the plant

nutrient and whether crops are likely to respond to applications of this nutrient. For example, with a very low level of a nutrient, a good response is expected; if the level in the soil is high or very high, little or no response is expected. Fertility research conducted over a number of years on Experiment Stations and off-station locations throughout the area, and fertilizer result demonstrations conducted by County Agricultural Agents are the basis for evaluation of soil test levels, according to Valentine. Without this knowledge soil tests have limited value. All of this information is considered in arriving at the fertilizer use suggestions shown on your report.

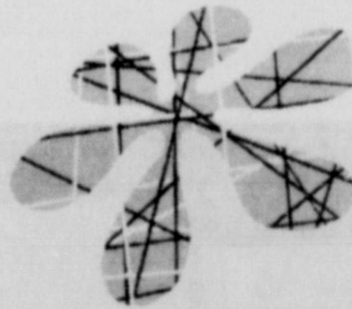

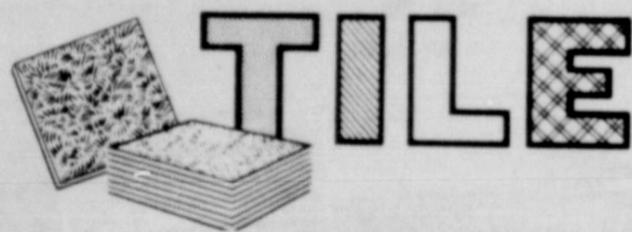

Tips On Turkey Given

By County Home Agent

Harvest days and turkey time just go together. There are several ways of cooking a turkey. Two favorite ways include roasting and baking. Broiling is becoming more popular with the modern equipment available. There seems to be some confusion about roasting and baking a turkey. To clarify this, ROASTING is done uncovered in a shallow pan equipped with a rack. There are two ways to Roast a Turkey.

1. BREAST-UP METHOD: Place prepared turkey breast up in a shallow roasting pan. Cover breast and tops of thighs loosely with aluminum foil or a double layer of cheesecloth that has been saturated with melted butter. This keeps turkey from becoming too brown

and aids in keeping meat moist. Brush with melted butter or drippings.

BAKING is another method. This is baking the bird in a covered pan or wrapped completely with foil. A steaming process which draws the juices from the bird results in a great deal of stock. Many prefer less "turkey-stock" and meat that is more moist as the roasting process where the meat retains the juices.

If you are one who has never been fond of turkey, check your method of preparation. Try roasting instead of baking.

A small booklet entitled "Harvest-Holiday Turkey", will soon be available free from the County Extension Office in Farwell. This could be the

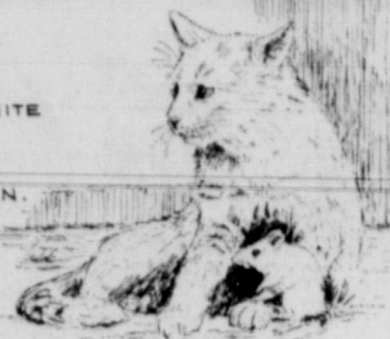
Our apologies to members of Friona Woman's Club for omission of reports of a couple of their meetings. Apparently some information got misplaced during our recent move.

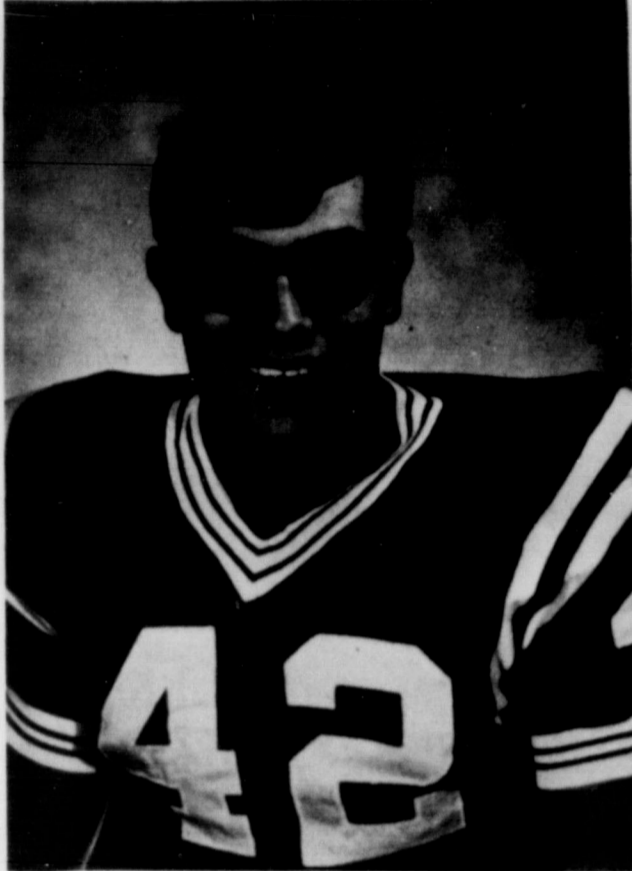

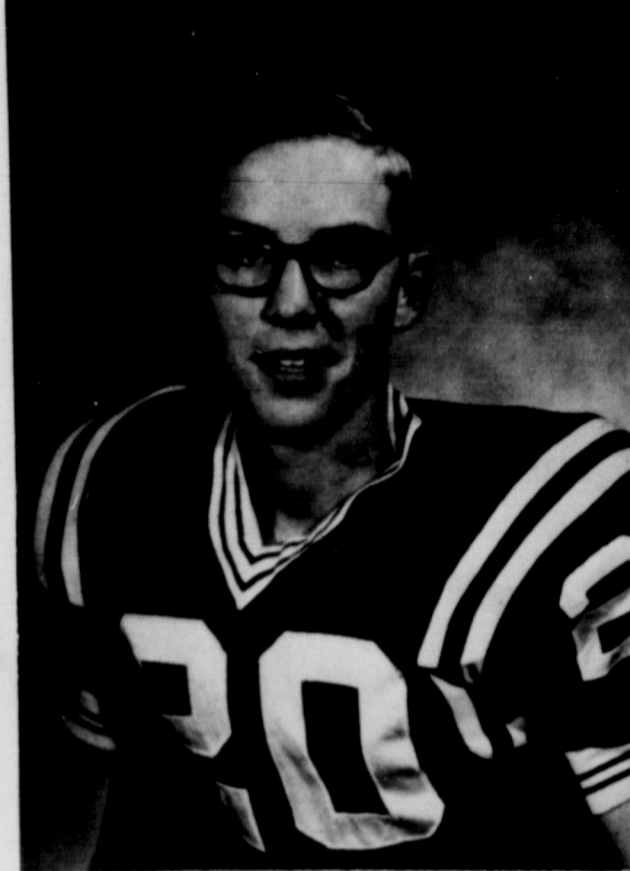
