Indians capture consolation crown in Caprock basketball tournament

Morton's basketball Indians won the consolation championship of the Caprock cage tourney held in Lubbock last week end, by downing Lubbock Christian, 59-58.

The Indians dropped a 78-60 decision to Stanton in the tournament's first round, but bounced back to nail Lorenzo, 68-52, to put them in the consolation finals.

Morton fired in 14 points in the final period to overcome LCHS. Indians trailed 50-45 going into the fourth quarter, but a well-balanced scoring attack salted away the victory. Four Morton starters hit in double figures, led by sophomore M. C. Collins with 16 tallies, Bryon Willis hit 13, Terry Harvey 11 and Stan Coffman 10.

Seniors Willis and Wayne Thompson led the Indians to their victory over Lorenzo. Willis canned 24 points, and Thompson came through with 22. The locals held a 17-16 first period lead and were in front 38-30 at the half. The third quarter count was 56-41, Morton.

Stanton knocked off the Indians for the third time this season in the first round. The winners jumped to a 23-11 first period lead and were out in front 35-24 at the half. A big third quarter gave Stanton a 62-38 bulge going into the final stanza. Willis led the Morton scoring with 13, while Thompson added 12. Coffman and Harvey had ten apiece.

Next court action for the Indians is Friday night, when they entertain the Seminole Indians. Saturday night, the local team travels to Brownfield.

Formal dedication of Morton post office delayed by equipment

Formal public opening of Morton's new post office building has been delayed by slow shipment of some ten items of equipment, Murray Crone, postmaster, reported this week.

As soon as the equipment is received, a formal dedication date will be set by the regional post office.

Postmaster Crone also praised Morton citizens for their cooperation during the Christmas mailing rush. Most post office patrons mailed early, thereby spreading the normal holiday pile-up of mail over about a 30-day period.

Outgoing mail hit its peak on Monday, December 16, while incoming mail peaked between Tuesday, December 18, and Saturday, December 21. However, by December 23, the post office was caught up. More space and equipment in the new postal facilities, plus the fine cooperation of Morton citizens meant that the local post office used only substitute personnel and part-time boys in addition to regular employees to handle this year's holiday mail.

1968 has good side, but is year of tragedy for many in area

The year of 1968 was a year of excitement, joy, disappointment, and tragedy for Morton citizens. Following is a rundown of the activities of 1968 as taken from the Tribune files.

JANUARY

Arthur B. Watkins, office manager of Hemphill-Wells, in Lubbock, was announced as speaker for the fifth annual Chamber of Commerce banquet to be held January 12. H. L. Coon announced his candidacy for County Commissioner of Precinct 1. Sheriff Hazel Hancock formally announced his candidacy for reelection to his sheriff's post. Cecil Williams was elected as president of Morton Little League. Weldon Newsom announced as candidate for County Commissioner of Precinct 1. Morton Indians lost their initial district basketball game, falling to Stanton 65-57.

District Judge M. C. Ledbetter was

named Morton's Citizen of the Year for 1967. Farm family of the year honors went to the L. T. "Short" Lemons family. J. H. Chesshir was named outstanding Conservation Farmer for 1967. All honorees were announced at the fifth annual Chamber of Commerce banquet. Morton school superintendent Ray Lanier was given a contract extension and a pay raise. Farm income estimate for 1968 is down \$2 million over 1967, according to an estimate by Deryl Bennett, vice president of First State Bank. It was announced that the Texas Plains Trail would include three stops in Cochran County area.

FEBRUARY

Mrs. Elra Oden was named Mother of the Year by Morton Federated Clubs. Also honored were Mrs. Ruth McGee, clubwoman of the year; Mrs. A. E. Sanders, teacher of the year; and Mrs. Elwood Harris, clubwoman of the year with over

10 years service. M. C. "Lefty" Hall announced his candidacy for County Commissioner of Precinct 3, and Frank Davidson entered the race for county sheriff. Mrs. E. C. Hale was named conservation homemaker for Cochran County. L. T. "Short" Lemons announced in the race for County Commissioner, Precinct 1.

Morton's city council purchased a new posting and billing machine for use with city water and gas bills. R. E. Thompson withdrew from the race for Cochran County Attorney. Two Morton area students, J. Wayne McDermott of Morton and Patricia Grusendorf of Bula, won trips to Washington, D.C., as winners in an oratorical contest, sponsored by Bailey County Electric Co-op. Jeanette Cooper of Morton was named runner-up in the South Plains College homecoming queen contest. Benton C. (Cleon) Davis officially announced his candidacy for county commissioner,

precinct 3. Cochran County's annual stock show opened a three-day run, with 4-H'ers and FFA'ers exhibiting animals. The Cochran County Museum dedication was set for February 29.

MARCH

A newly-hired administrator of Cochran Memorial Hospital, Robert Jodi Minnick, of Dimmitt, resigned the position before assuming the job. Byron Willis was named to the District 4-AA all-district basketball team. Grant Teaff, end coach at Texas Tech, was to speak at the annual Morton Athletic Banquet March 15. Jim McManus was named administrator of Cochran Memorial Hospital. Office furniture and library and courtroom furnishings for the newly-modeled county courthouse were purchased by the commissioners court.

No agreement was made between directors of the Cochran County Hospital district and Morton doctors, although they

met for some four hours. Morton Tribune announced a circulation contest, with numerous prizes to be awarded to youngsters of the area.

APRIL

Final rites were held Tuesday, April 2, for L. T. Doss, long-time Morton resident. Edith Anne Jennings was named valedictorian of Whiteface High School, and Renita Gail Evans was named salutatorian. Contract for building the new post office in Morton was awarded to Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Roberts of Plainview. Absentee voting got underway in the 1968 Democratic Primary election. Three arson suspects, picked up by Cochran County sheriff's office, were released with instructions to pay for damages suffered in three recent blazes.

Henry Williams was elected president of Morton school board. Cochran County Hospital District began search for new

medical doctors after Dr. W. B. McSpadden and Dr. E. C. Fernandez announced they would soon leave Morton. A drive to clean up Morton was started by the chamber of commerce.

MAY

Murder with malice charges were filed against six area youths, in connection with the knife slaying of Alvarez Jesus Enriquez, 23, of Morton. Morton High School's band won its second straight outstanding rating at the Enid, Okla., Tri-State Band Festival. Hazel Hancock won race for county sheriff.

Run-offs were set in races for County Commissioners, as Leonard Coleman will meet H. L. Coon in Precinct 1, and Haral Rawls will meet M. C. "Lefty" Hall in Precinct 3. Margaret Ledbetter was named valedictorian of Morton High School.

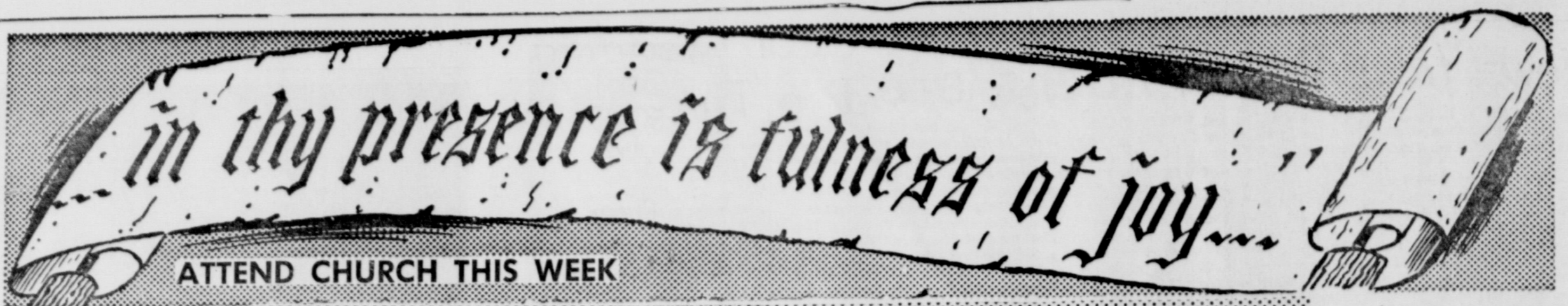

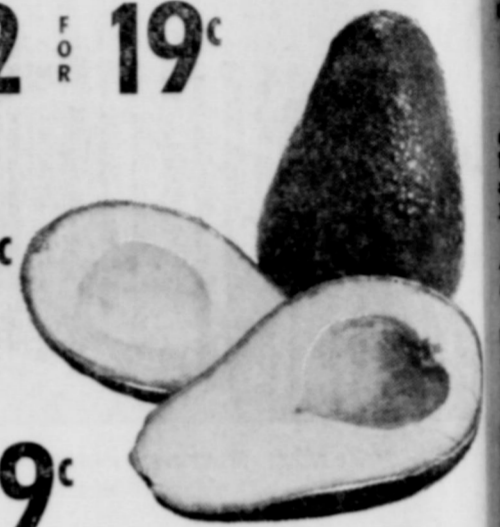

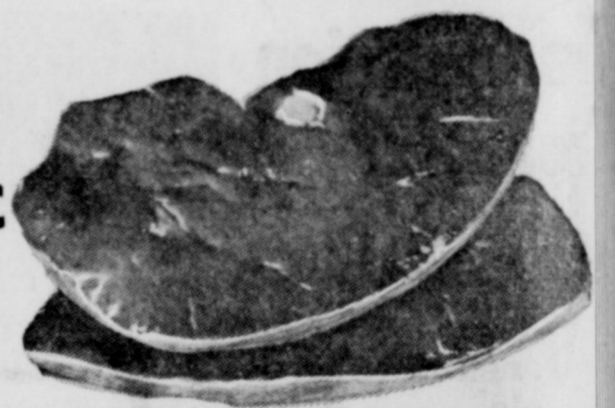
