Shooting victim still reported as 'critical'

Mrs. Odel Fulton, of 601 East Hayes Street in Morton, was still listed as critical Wednesday afternoon after suffering multiple gunshot wounds at her home late Sunday.

Her alleged assailant and step-son, Ray-

faul Fulton of Odessa, is being held in the Cochran county jail under \$25,000 bond charged with attempted murder.

Mrs. Fulton remained in the intensive care unit at the Methodist Hospital from the time of her arrival there at approximately 7:30 p.m. Sunday until Wednesday morning when she was moved to a private room. Sources close to the family indicate that her condition is improving slightly.

The shooting took place between 5:30 and 6 p.m. Easter Sunday when the younger Fulton was reported to have entered the home and fired at least four and possibly six shots from a .32 caliber revolver at Mrs. Fulton. Observers could not be certain of the number of shots, but all agreed there were at least four.

Morton Police patrolman Don Butler, on routine patrol at the time of the shooting was dispatched to the scene by the county sheriff's office and arrived only minutes after the shots were fired.

"As I entered the dining room through

Warehouse thieves get rich haul here Sunday

A Griffith Equipment Company warehouse was the scene of a burglary of over \$5,000 worth of Treflan either late Sunday night or early Sunday morning, police chief Charley Ellis reports.

Fifty one five-gallon cans of the concentrated herbicide were taken in the theft. The thief, or thieves, entered the building, located in the 200 block of N.W. First Street, by breaking the glass on the front door and unlocking it, Ellis said.

The break-in was discovered Monday morning and reported to police at 9 a.m. Investigation into the incident is continuing, Ellis stated.

Free immunization clinic here Saturday

A free immunization clinic for all adults and children in Cochran county will be held Saturday in the county courtroom.

The serums used in the clinic, which will be held between the hours of 10 a.m. and 3 p.m., are furnished by the state department of health and there will be no charge for any of the shots.

Dr. Fenella Frey, county health officer, and Cammie Jackson, Morton school nurse, will conduct the immunization program. The clinic is being sponsored by the Emlea Smith, Jr. Study Club.

Immunization will be given for Smallpox, Measles, DPT and Polio.

The clinic was originally scheduled in the county commissioners court room, but the Tribune was informed Wednesday that it will be held instead in the meeting room in the basement of the courthouse.

We urge all adults and those children who have not received immunizations at their schools to come in and take advantage of these free services. We are especially interested in the adults taking DPT shots, which many of us have neglected in the past," Mrs. Rodney Franklin, study club president, stated.
