## Light vote turn-out returns all councilmen to positions

Exceptionally light turnouts of voters marked the municipal and school elections held in Morton Saturday.

The city council election was so light as to be almost non-existent with only 30 votes being counted.

Herman Bedwell, Wiley Hodge and Walter L. Taylor, all running without opposition were returned to their positions.

The Morton Independent School District Board of Trustees election also experienced an exceptionally small number of votes. There were 76 regular and nine absentee ballots cast in the school race.

With four candidates running for the two regular three-year terms and one candidate running for the special one year term that was open, there was considerably more competition in the school board contest. C. E. Dolle and David T. Rozell finished

one and two for the two regular term posts and John Fincannon, running unopposed for the one-year term, were elected. Robert Greener, who placed number

three in the vote total, and Oley W. Youngblood, who placed fourth, were defeated.

The order of finish in the school board vote was as follows:

C. E. Dolle, 50 votes, number one. David T. Rozell, 45 votes, number two. Robert Greener, 34 votes, number three. Oley W. Youngblood, 21 votes, number
