Third Morton escapee is captured in Lubbock

The last one of the three fugitives who made a spectacular escape March 29 from the Cochran county jail in Morton has been returned to custody of the police.

Tomas Ramos Ysasaga, 22, a suspect in connection with a large number of robberies over the South Plains, was arrested late Saturday night by FBI agents and sheriff's deputies in Lubbock.

Ysasaga has been the object of an intensive search ever since he and two brothers, Joe and David Garcia, used hacksaw blades smuggled in to them to saw open a steel door to an air-conditioning duct to make their way to freedom. They followed the duct to the second story of the courthouse where they smashed off a grill and dropped to the floor. They then proceeded to the roof of the building and jumped five feet to a large fixed radio antenna and climbed down it to the ground.

The Garcia brothers, Joe, 22 and David, 19, were captured at the home of a relative in Yoakum county near the New Mexico line two days after making the break. They are now in the state penitentiary serving sentences for murder on the charges pending against them when they escaped. Joe received a sentence of 35 years, and David 10 years for the

stabbing murder of Jesus Enriquez, 23, on April 29, 1968.

Ysasaga remained in the Lubbock county jail Tuesday pending disposition of charges against him in several counties and towns throughout the South Plains area.

The federal and county officers went to a residence in north central Lubbock to make the arrest at 11:50 p.m. Ysasaga did not resist, an FBI spokesman said.

Agents recovered a 1965 automobile shortly after the arrest. It was on the parking lot of the Villa Inn Motor Hotel, 5601 Ave. Q.

The FBI spokesman said Ysasaga told officers he had left the car at the motel the night of his escape.

The automobile was taken from in front of Roberts Rest Home in Morton and belonged to a night nurse who was on duty at the time of the escape.

During the search for Ysasaga, his father, Arcadio Ysasaga, 49, of 2210 2nd

Wednesday and Thursday, the western part of town.

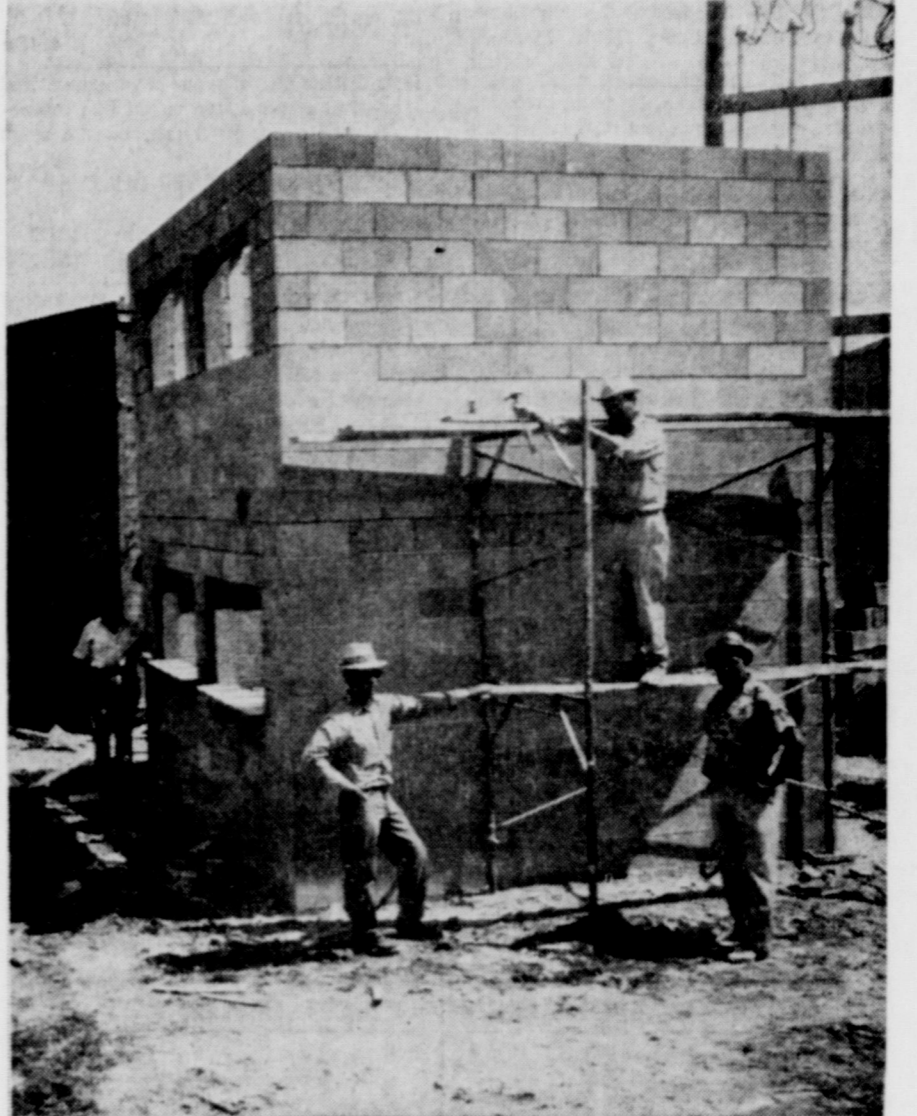
Friday morning, the Slaughter Addition.

Veteran Texas teacher named superintendent at Three Way

A veteran of 20 years teaching in Texas school systems has been named superintendent of the Three Way Independent School District.

Dan F. Rankin, Sr., Gold-Burg High School principal, has been named superintendent of the district, the Three Way School Board announced. He will replace Thomas V. Alvis, who is returning to school to work on his doctorate.

Rankin has 20 years in the teaching profession. He has taught in the Agua Dulce Schools, the San Antonio Schools and the Corpus Christi Schools before becoming Gold-Burg High School principal. In addition, he has taught in San Antonio Junior College and Del Mar Junior College of Corpus Christi.

Rankin did his undergraduate work at Louisiana College, Pineville, La. and has a Master's Degree from North Texas State University, Denton. He has done special work at the University of Texas, the University of Arkansas and Texas A & I University.

Rankin and his wife, a registered nurse, have five children. The oldest is a student at Howard Payne College and one son is stationed with the First Marine Division

and all interested persons may attend. The Levelland Homemaking Department will furnish baby sitting service for children of the mothers who attend the meeting.

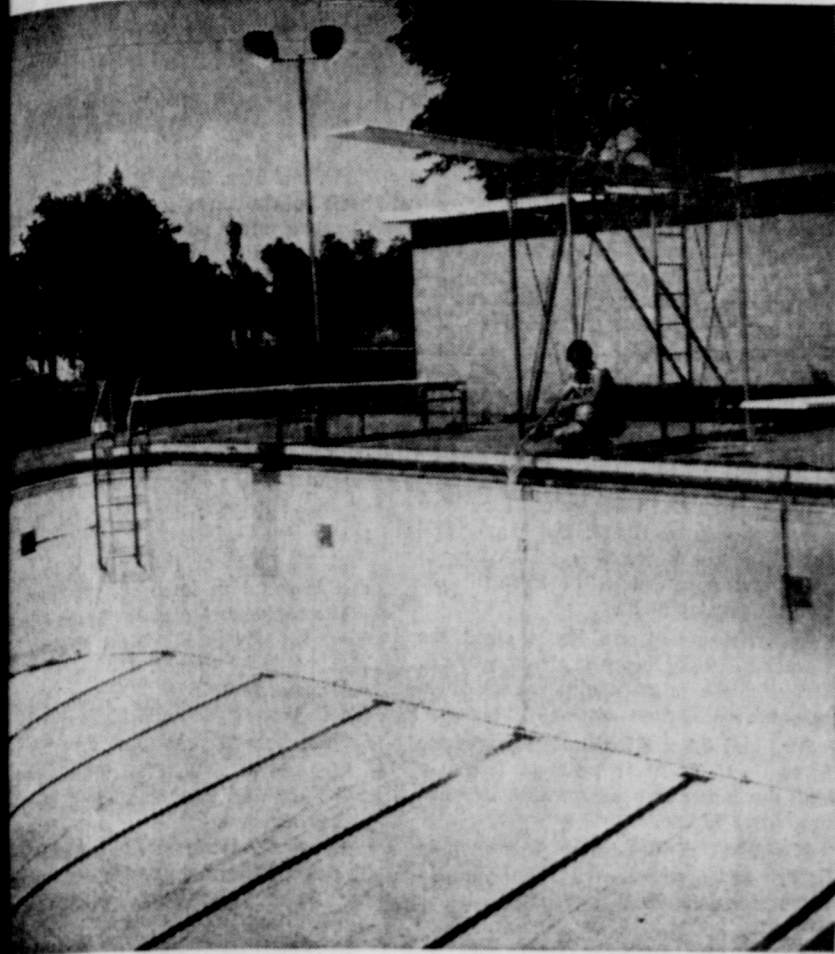
Dr. Bell is an Associate Professor and chairman of the Department of Home Economics Education, School of Home Economics, Texas Technological College, Lubbock.

Morton Red Cross chapter's fate hangs on official's visit

An American Red Cross field representative will visit Morton soon, and upon his visit will be determined whether or not the Morton chapter of the Red Cross will continue to exist.

Charles S. Fodor, field representative from the Lubbock district of the Red Cross will visit Morton on Tuesday, June 2. The purpose of his visit will be to rehabilitate and revitalize the local chapter and determine whether or not it will be continued.

Fodor will make his headquarters while here at the county treasurer's office and will meet with any and all interested persons concerning Red Cross matters. He will arrive at 1 p.m. and will be available at the treasurer's office until approximately 5 p.m., according to information released by county treasurer Bill Fode.

Fodor expects to interview and visit with several community leaders, including Mayor Jack Russell, members of the city council and any other local authorities who may be interested in the activities of the Red Cross.

Mr. Fode, who is chairman of the service

to military families committee of the local chapter, expressed vital concern about the fact that if there is no more interest or activity by the local chapter that it could very easily be lost.

"This would deprive Morton of a very valuable service and cause those in need of these services to have to go to Levelland or even Lubbock for the same service we have here at the present time.

Though few Morton residents are closely connected with the military, there are often situations where the Red Cross can be of great assistance. One case in point is the fact that only this week a local soldier serving in Vietnam was on his way home to Morton in less than 24 hours after the local assistance officer requested his presence due to a heart attack suffered by his father. Only the Red Cross can do this. Processing the same case through Levelland or Lubbock would undoubtedly have required an additional 24 to 36 hours.

All who are interested in the Red Cross chapter remaining here will be welcome to meet and hear the views of the district representative.

Local swimming pool will open Saturday

There will be two life guards on duty at all times, both of whom will be fully qualified for their duties, Mrs. Tyson said. A school for beginning swimmers will probably be held beginning in late June to be conducted, as in the past, by Johnny Stockdale, she added.

The pool is owned by the county and leased for the summer by Mr. and Mrs. Buck Tyson who will act as managers.

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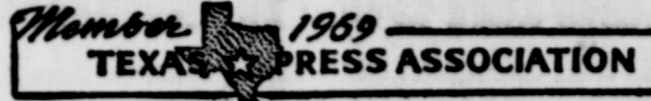
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ASCS Farm News

Terminal and county price-support loan and purchase rates for 1969-crop grain sorghum were announced today by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The county and terminal loan rates are based on the 1969 national average support price of \$1.61 per hundredweight for sorghum grading No. 2 or better except Mixed, announced December 26, 1968.

The general method followed in determining individual county and terminal rates this year is the same as that used previously. It involves subtracting from the appropriate terminal rate the cost of moving grain sorghum from each county to the appropriate terminal market. All terminal rates have been adjusted upward 2 cents to reflect the increase in the loading-out charges effective this year under the Uniform Grain Storage Agreement. This increase is partly offset in the case of Gulf ports by a 1 cent reduction which was made in order to improve rate relationships between areas. County rates based off these terminals reflect this adjustment. Otherwise, the county rates are generally the same as those for the 1968-crop although six counties tributary to Brownsville, Texas, are increased up to 5 cents per hundredweight to more nearly reflect historical prices received by farmers and to achieve a more equitable rate relationship.

Rates will be adjusted by discounts for class, grade and quality to determine rates for individual producers. The discount schedule is unchanged from that in effect for the 1968 program.

Price support to participants in the 1969 feed grain program will be carried out through loans on farm and warehouse stored grain sorghum and by purchases. Price support loans will be available in Oklahoma and Texas from time of harvest until May 31, 1970, and until June 30, 1970, in all other States. Loans mature in the two States on June 30, 1970, and on July 31, 1970, in all other States.

Grain sorghum producers participating in the 1969 grain program will be eligible for price-support payments on up to 50 percent of the projected production on their feed grain base acreage.

Individual farm photos will not be mailed to farmers for this crop year, however any farmer desiring a photo of his farm may obtain one by request at the Cochran County ASCS office.

Conservation District News

From the Office of BUDD FOUNTAIN

At the present time, more and more farmers and ranchers are turning their thoughts toward cattle. The main reason is, of course, money. Cattle prices are higher now than they have been in years.

If a farmer or rancher is interested in getting into the cattle business his first hurdle to overcome is having something to feed the cattle. Establishing a good pasture requires several things. First of all a suitable piece of ground should be chosen and then find the right kind of grass or grasses on mixtures to plant. Water is needed also in order to get a good pasture established but a good pasture can be established with or without water if careful planning is done before starting.

Grasses to be established in pastures need to be seeded in a dead litter cover such as cane or milo stubble whether the grass is to be irrigated or not. The dead litter cover is there to prevent the soil and grass seed from blowing away and washing away from rains. The cover will afford protection to the newcoming seedling until it is big enough to "weather the storm" itself.

The dead litter cover is just as important if not more as the clodding done to keep young cotton or land itself from blowing away. Dead litter cover for pasture planting is the only sandfighting or cultivation we have for establishing new pastures for grazing.

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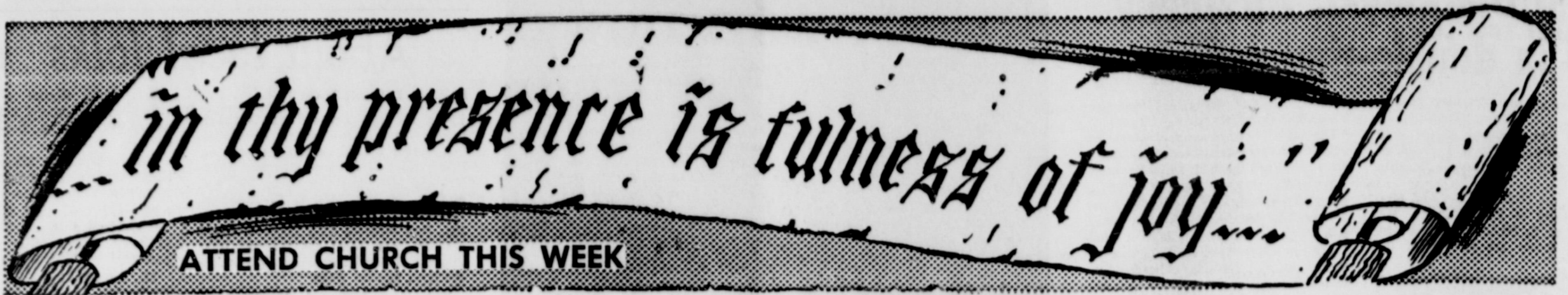

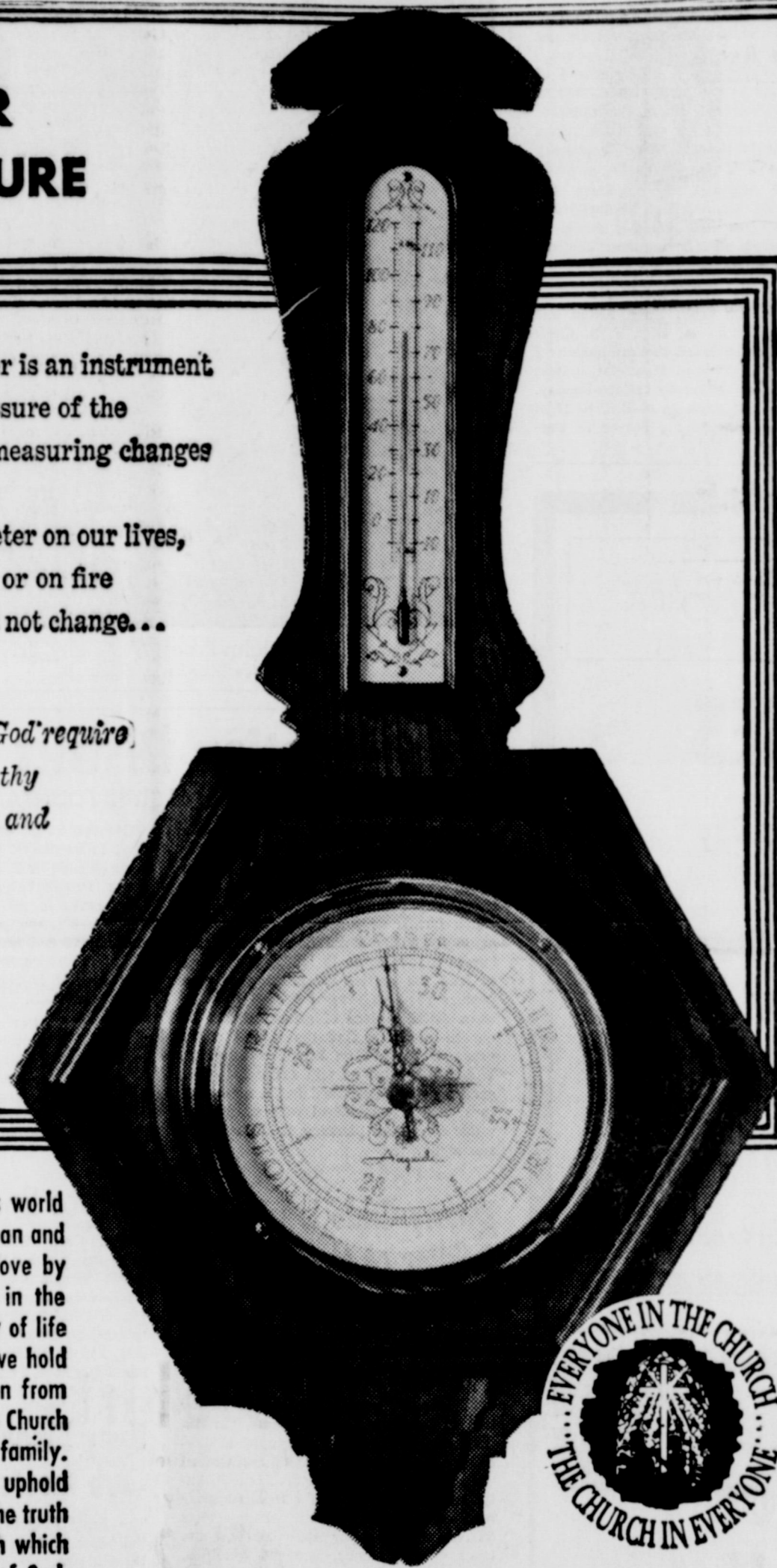

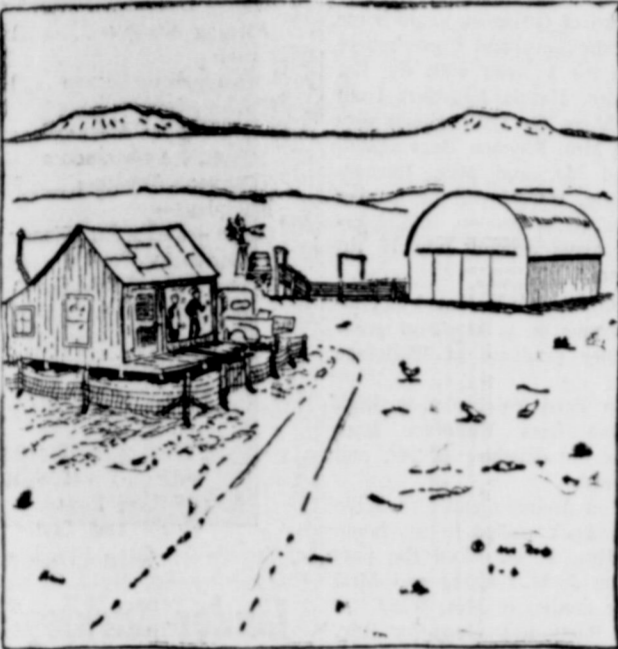

New Telex at Cochran County Library

The Telex (Western Union telegram transmitter) hookup with Texas State Library in Austin and ten libraries in major cities throughout Texas, enables the Librarian to locate material requested by patrons. This material may consist of books, government documents, magazine articles and answers to reference questions.

Cochran County Library is one of the libraries in the 26 county area served by Lubbock City-County Libraries, Lubbock. A Major Resource Center, according to William Stewart, director of the Lubbock Library. Requests are telephoned to the Lubbock library and filled if possible. If the request cannot be filled in Lubbock, it is relayed via Telex to the State Library. If this library is unable to fill the request, a search is made with other libraries, including university and special libraries throughout the United States.

When the material is located, the library housing it sends it to the library originating the request and it is checked out in a regular manner. Many of the books are received by requesting libraries within six days.

In making a request for books unavailable in the Cochran County Library, Mrs. H. B. Spotts, Librarian, explained that the patron should give the author's name, book title, publisher, and copyright date; however, a request is taken without complete information.

The patron is asked to pay the postage of the book or the cost of photocopying if the information desired is found in books or magazines which are not circulating. The Telex system of inter-library loan is provided for under Title 111 of the Federal Libraries Service Act.

"Any book being circulated by major libraries is available to any patron by a telephone request," the librarian said.

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Texas Education Agency tells new law for school transfers

Texas parents who wish to transfer their children from one public school district to another — without changing their place of residence — have been given a new route by the State Legislature. This new plan is outlined in detail by the Texas Education Agency in a letter mailed to school superintendents throughout the state Monday (May 26).

The act, passed by the 61st Legislature and signed by Governor Preston Smith on May 9, repeals transfer methods which have been in effect since 1925 and 1935. Parents will no longer apply for transfer to the county superintendent. Instead, they will now go directly to the superintendent of the school district they wish their children to enter. The parent or guardian of the child must apply in writing at the receiving school superintendent's office. If the district agrees to receive the non-resident student, the parents or guardian will be notified in writing. The old June 1 deadline for filing transfer applications will be extended, probably several weeks, when the State Board of Education meets in Austin June 7, Agency officials explain. The board is also expected to adopt policies for implementing the new law.

Parents who have already applied for transfer to the county superintendent will be notified in writing to contact the receiving school district. If their applications have already been sent to the county office, they will be forwarded to the receiving school district.

Parents who transfer their children into another district may be required to pay tuition if the grades are taught in the home district. If, however, the grades are not taught, the home district pays the tuition.

The fee paid by parents may not exceed the difference between what it costs the school district to support a student

and the state funds received. This amount will be based on the per student costs during the 1968-69 school year. The state per capita funds for each child transferred out of his home district will travel with him. Average daily attendance, if any, recorded in the home district during the previous year will also be transferred. The new law, which goes into effect immediately, applies to all Texas school children over six and under 21 years of age who are not high school graduates.

Dr. Fred Harvey Harrington, president of the University of Wisconsin, will deliver the principal address at the 8 p.m. exercises in the Lubbock Municipal Coliseum.

First Scout forestry camp set for Tres Ritos June 1 to 7

The first Forestry Camp of the South Plains Council of Boy Scouts will be held at Camp Tres Ritos in New Mexico from June 1 to 7.

The camp is located in the Carson National Forest and U.S. Forest Rangers will aid scout leaders in conducting the camp program. They will teach the multiple use of the forest and will supervise the Scouts in re-planting a blighted area. They will lead in the construction of a new nature trail for the camp, and will teach the laws of the forest, timber cruising and tree measuring.

The New Mexico Fish and Game Department will provide the program one afternoon.

Dr. John Brand, a professor in the Geology Department at Texas Tech, and a local council Scout leader, will teach

the Scouts a camp course in geology and assist them with this merit badge.

The Camp Tres Ritos staff will teach cooking and the skills of mountain trail camping.

Large lumber companies from throughout the country are sending training aids and films to be used in this camp.

A few spaces are still available for Scouts who would like to take advantage of this special opportunity, according to camp director, Warren Green. They must make their reservations at the Scout Service Center in Lubbock.

There is also room for a couple more men, dads or Scout leaders, who can spend the week and provide cars or station wagons for transportation at the camp, he said.

Tech center receives grant for area feedlot waste study

Texas Tech's Water Resources Center (WRC) has been notified of the award of a \$74,965 grant from the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration to be used to study the problem of feedlot waste.

WRC Director Dan M. Wells was notified of the grant by Congressman George Mahon. Working with Dr. Wells on the research project will be Chairman George F. Meenaghan of Chemical Engineering, Agricultural Engineering Prof. Walter Grub and Animal Science Prof. Robert C. Albin.

"The production of cattle on large commercial feedlots is a rapidly expanding industry in the Southwest," Wells pointed out. "Pollution from these lots is extensive and information on the characteristics of wastes is needed as a basis for

developing economically feasible means of waste stabilization and disposal to prevent unnecessary pollution."

He said the researchers will conduct complete analyses of wastes produced by feeder cattle raised under specific feeding and management regimes and various climatic conditions. They will correlate the data obtained and from this data develop guidelines for the construction and operation of cattle feedlots to minimize water pollution.

At Texas Tech two multiple-unit feedlots designed and operated for experimental research will be used as well as environmental chambers, specialized feeding pens and laboratories for the physical, chemical and biological analysis of waste materials.

The researchers also expect to study nearby feedlots which, they stated, have an annual production of 1.4 million fed cattle.

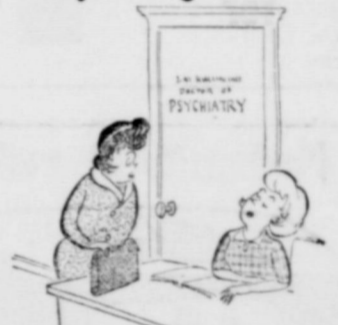
Stockdale School presents "Production"

St. Lubbock, was arrested and charged with aiding in the jailbreak.

The elder Ysasaga has remained in the Cochran county jail since his arrest shortly after the break in lieu of \$10,000 bond set at the time of his arraignment. His case is expected to go to the Grand Jury which opens here Monday, June 2.

U. S. Commissioner Frank R. Murray set bond at \$25,000 for Ysasaga on a charge of unlawful flight to avoid prosecution. There was some information that Ysasaga had spent part of his time in Ohio since the escape, the FBI said.

Crosby County Sheriff Fletcher Stark asked the FBI to help find Ysasaga, the spokesman said. Beside the charge of unlawful flight, the federal government has a charge of post office burglary against Ysasaga.

State charges of burglary also are on file against Ysasaga in connection with a break-in on Feb. 11 at Roark Jewelry at Sudan.

When he was arrested, Ysasaga is said to have been in possession of a 1968 GTO automobile that was recently reported stolen in Dallas.

At the time of his escape he had been in the Cochran county jail for two weeks and had been indicted by the Grand Jury during a late March session on two counts of burglary.

Of all the law enforcement officials involved in Ysasaga's escape and recapture, probably the most relieved of all was Cochran county sheriff Hazel Hancock. "I hate to see them escape, especially when they escape from me," he said in expressing relief and satisfaction at the news of the capture.

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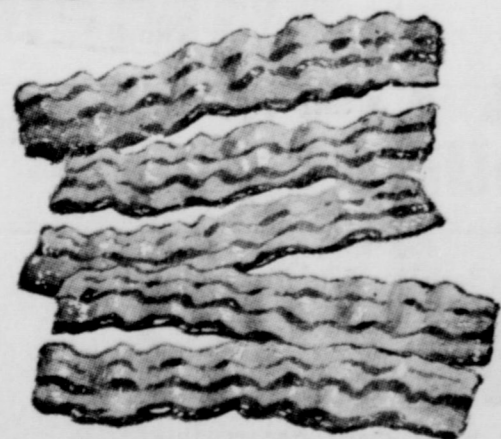
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
