
Farmers reported rainfall amounts rangwiped out many crops in the county, with Monday night. Hall reported that Karl Griffith had lost some 2,000 acres in the Griffith community.

The Monday night storms were the most severe in Cochran County of a series of storms that have plagued the plains area for the past week. On Friday, heavy rains accompanied by hail ranging from marble size to golf ball size did much damage in southwestern Bailey County. Many fields were flooded, and Highway 54 west of Enochs was closed Friday night by high water. Field crops,

districts into the Morton Independent School District within the past few weeks was announced by superintendent Bob Travis at the regular meeting of the school board Monday night.

Further transfers on this scale before the transfer deadline of July 15 could have a beneficial affect on the district in the form of a higher average daily attendance and, hence, higher allowances in teachers and money from the state, Travis has indicated.

The transfers included nine from Bledsoe, seven from Whiteface, two from Pep, two from Bula and one from Three Way. The state has extended the deadline for transfers to the July 15 date.

In other business, the board approved the payment of bills for the month of May in the amount of \$45,205.15.

The resignation of Bobby Actkinson, Junior High football coach, was approved by the board. Actkinson, who has completed one year of coaching in Morton, will join his former high school coach in a coaching position in the Spur school system.


Travis gave a preliminary report on estimated costs for re-lighting the high school football stadium and was requested by the board to obtain further estimates by additional electrical contractors and make a report on his findings at the

Houses and other buildings in Enochs, Maple, Goodland, and Stegall were heavily damaged Friday night. More than 120 windows were broken out at Three Way School by the hail.

J. K. Adams, Bailey County agricultural agent, estimated that 25% of the crops in the Three Way area were destroyed by hail. However, Marie Toombs, postmaster at Maple, and farmers in the area reported to the Tribune that the loss was much heavier than Adam's estimate.

The official rainfall recorded in Morton, according to N. H. Steed, was a trace Thursday, .75 on Friday, none on Saturday, .08 on Sunday, and 1.40 on Monday. The amount recorded on Monday night was the heaviest amount reported on the South Plains. The rains have been accompanied by cloudy and unseasonably cool weather. Steed reported a low of 52 degrees on Saturday night.

A check with Cochran County Agent Roy McClung revealed that the fields are still too wet to get into to make a thorough survey of total crop damage but such information will be forthcoming within a short time. He stated that every day now is critical in the decision whether or not to replant hailed-out cotton. It all depends on the first frost and of course there is no way in the world to forecast that, he concluded.

# Hospital board interviews applicants for administrator

The Cochran Memorial Hospital District's board of directors interviewed three applicants for the position of hospital administrator at a called meeting Tuesday night. No decision was reached on filling the post, pending consideration of additional applicants.

The administrative position was vacated last week when Jim McManus resigned after serving about 15 months. McManus declined to explain his reasons for resigning, promising a statement to the press at a later date. Since that time, McManus has been out of town and the Tribune has not been able to contact him

Since McManus' resignation, the hospital board has met in three called meetings, on Wednesday morning, Thursday night, and Tuesday night. Much of the business of the meetings concerned the delegation of administrative responsibility to department heads in order that the hospital might operate as efficiently as possible in the absence of an administra-

Sue Cross, head bookkeeper, has been appointed by the board as acting business manager. Eva Rowden, R.N., Ron Mayberry, and Berta Abbe have been given administrative responsibilities in the nursing, laboratory, and insurance de-

The hospital has serious financial prob-

lems, having had only three and four patients confined in the hospital in recent days. A number of economy measures have been taken, such as dismissing some janitorial help, dropping computer services, and eliminating a number of small services such as payroll guidelines and other types of technical advice subscriptions to which McManus had applied.

The board decided not to cut the professional and trained staff during the slack summer months, because the personnel are all needed during the busier seasons.

No statement has been made officially to the press concerning the resignation of McManus, but a Tribune reporter present in the meetings was told unofficially that McManus lacked the experience and

ball Field was officially dedicated Monday night at the Cochran County Park in ceremonies that were well-attended despite the threatening weather.

The ball park was named in honor of the late son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Hofman, now of Claunch, New Mexico, who died in August, 1966, of injuries suffered in an automobile accident. Hofman played with the Morton Tigers, one of the Frontier Babe Ruth League teams. The Babe Ruth League uses the field.

Harold Drennan, principal of Morton elementary schools, served as master of ceremonies after being introduced by Maurice Lewallen, secretary-treasurer of the Babe Ruth League. Drennan introduced the three Morton teams and teams from Whiteface and Sundown which make up the 1969 league. He also presented two members and the manager of the 1966 Tigers with which Charles Hofman played.

The graduating class of 1969 from Morton High School, Hofman's class, was introduced by Drennan. Finally, the Cochran County Commissioners Court, which officially named the baseball field on May 25, 1967, was introduced. Commissioners Leonard Coleman, T. A. Washington, Harral Rawls, and U. F. Wells were present, together with County Judge J. A. Love.

Drennan next read in its entirety the petition which was presented to the Commissioners in 1967 requesting the naming of the baseball field, which is the property of Cochran County. The petition was submitted by Rev. Bill Hobson and others.

Mr. and Mrs. Hofman, parents of the deceased honoree; Donna, his sister; and Mrs. Lessve Silvers of Morton, his maternal grandmother, were introduced to the audience by Drennan. Drennan then presented the Hofmans with a plaque which honored Charles Hofman as the batting champion of the Frontier Babe Ruth League of 1966, with an average of .381.

Rev. Rex Mauldin, pastor of the First United Methodist Church, after a prayer, presented the Morton High School Band, under the direction of John Stockdale. The band played a medley of three hymns,

"Holy, Holy, Holy," "Fairest Lord Jesus," and "Now the Day is Over."

Drennan re-read a part of the petition, symbolically requesting that the Commissioners Court name the ball field for Hofman. Judge Love granted the permission on behalf of the Court, Mauldin then pronounced the dedication and led

in a prayer of dedication. Concluding the ceremonies was the playing of the national anthem by the band while Boy Scout Troop 601 raised the flag.

In the games which followed the dedication ceremonies, the Whiteface Cardinals defeated the Sundown Yankees 5-4 in a five-inning game, and the Morton Tigers were leading the Morton Indians 6-3 in the bottom of the fourth inning when the game was called on account of rain.

### Water rights filing deadline September 1, commission announces

The Texas Water Rights Commission announced today that final notice of the recording deadline under the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 has been given. Everyone who is using water from a public stream who does not claim under a certified filing or a permit from the State must record his claim by September 1, 1969.

Users of water for domestic and livestock watering purposes are exempt from this requirement

Failure to timely record the claim will "extinguish and bar" the claim of water right according to Section 4 of the Adjudication Act. All affected water users who have not already filed their claim are urged by the Commission to do so as soon as possible.

Valid claims will be recognized to the extent of maximum use of water without waste during any year between 1963 and 1967. Where the user was in the process of constructing a system or had facilities to use a larger amount of water on the effective date of the Act than he had actually used, use from 1968 to 1970 may be recognized.

Annual influx of insects poses threat to cotton and grain sorghum

The yearly influx of cotton and grain sorghum insect infestations have been detected in Cochran county fields recently by county agent Roy McClung.

While the number of some of the pests is still light, others, mainly the greenbug, are already becoming a real threat to this year's crops.

Light to medium infestation of aphids in the young cotton is causing some damage in spotted areas in the county. Generally, so long as the terminal growth looks good, treatment will not be needed for the aphid infestations.

If after serveral days of close observation, the field reveals that terminal growth is being held back by the aphids then control measures may become ne-

There is a medium infestation of thrips in the county. If thrips are present and leaf buds between the cotyledons are affected, treat at once. Applications on four-leaf or older cotton should be based on the extent of plant damage. Silvering of the lower leaf surface is commonly observed; followed by wilting, deformed and bronzed or blackened leaves.

Greenbugs are becoming a problem in some of the older grain sorghum in the county. Corn leaf aphids are very common in practically all fields, with low numbers of greenbugs occuring also. Producers are encouraged to inspect their fields frequently for any increase in the infestation

The hard rains and hail did not seem to stop the greenbugs in the older sorghum. All of the heavy infestations have been found in the older sorghum where the plant is close to forming the boot where large numbers have been found down in the whorl of the plant. Heavy numbers of the insects down in the whorl could possibly cause some problems with the sorghum in head exertation.

Producers interested in finding out more details about the greenbugs, insecticides, etc. are encourged to pick up a copy of a new publication L-819 "Greenbugs on Sorghum and Small Grains" at your local County Extension Office. These bulletins are in detail and are free for the

### **VA loans substantially** boost Texas' economy

The economy of Texas has been boosted more than \$4,272,914,412 in the past quarter of a century by the GI Bill loan program, according to Jack Coker, manager of the Waco Veterans Administration regional office.

This is the value of more than 441,212 loans guaranteed or insured for Texas veterans by the Veterans Administration since the World War II program started on June 22, 1944, he said.

Nationwide, the VA has guaranteed or insured more than 7.4 million loans amounting to nearly \$75 billion in the past quarter of a century. Nearly 7.1 million of these loans in the amount of approximately \$71 billion were for homes, Coker

Of the Texas loans guaranteed by VA, 10,370 amounting to \$167,393,540 were obtained by Vietnam era veterans.

Throughout the country, Coker pointed out, nearly 150,000 loans amounting to almost \$2.6 billion were for Vietnam era veterans. All of these were home loans, he said, since the present Post-Korean GI Bill does not provide for business loans to veterans whose military service began after January 31, 1955.

Texas veterans have proved to be responsible home owners, Coker said, citing the fact that 157,360 loans in the amount of \$1,043,020,016 have been repaid in full.

Nationwide, more than 3.6 million loans in the amount of \$27.2 billion have been repaid in full.

Currently, Coker said, nearly nine out of every 10 loans being guaranteed by VA are for veterans who served after January 31, 1955.
