Three Morton gridmen selected All-District

Three of the 1969 Morton Indian footballers captured four of the 22 positions on the district 4-AA all-district gridiron squad. In balloting conducted last week during the district meeting at Frenship, the coaches of the six conference schools elected Morton's Jerry Steed, J. D. Wisely, and M. C. Collins for four positions. Steed made both the offensive and defensive team.

All-district selections are made from candidates nominated by the coaches. However, a coach cannot nominate a member of his own team.

For the first time in several years, Morton placed more men on the district dream squad than did Denver City. The Mustangs captured three positions, two of them going to their talented quarterback Gene Richardson, who made both teams.

Frenship dominated the offensive and defensive squads with three positions on each one. Halfback Johnny Carrizales made both teams as did end Jake Rogans. Post placed three on the offensive team and two on the defensive eleven. Fullback Neff Walker made both squads. Idalou placed two men on the team, and Tahoka, one.

The fact that Morton was third in balloting, in spite of finishing in a tie for last place, is a credit to the outstanding work done by coach Ted Whillock and his staff with the three Morton Indians that captured the honors.

Jerry Steed was elected to the offensive guard and defensive linebacker position. Steed led the Indians consistently in tackles and provided strong blocking for teammates on offense. He also picked up 92 yards in two games as he filled in for the injured Terry Harvey at the fullback position.

Steed hopes to play college football and he may get the opportunity as Texas Tech and Angelo State football officials have both expressed interest and are considering him for scholarship.

Senior J. D. Wisely was elected as offensive tackle. At 247 pounds, Wisely strengthened Morton's offensive and defensive punch this season.

Wisely stated that he was "highly honored" in receiving the award, but he had no definite plans concerning college.

M. C. Collins, a 195-pound junior defensive end, was a unanimous choice for the team, even though the end slots had been filled. The coaches did not want to leave him out, so they awarded him a

defensive tackle position. Collins was the Indians' outstanding defensive leader in Morton's win over Post in the last game of the season. Morton placed six men on the district squad in 1964, five in 1967, and three last season.

Morton Indian basketballers sweep triple header at home

Morton High School teams swept a triple header Tuesday night in basketball action in Indian Gym. The freshmen took a 65-26 win over Sudan's frosh, the B team won handily over Friona B by a 77-38 margin, and the varsity won their second straight over the Friona Chieftains, 52-46.

This Friday's scheduled game with Littlefield was cancelled earlier in the season, and at press time, Morton officials had not been able to schedule a replacement game. Tuesday the A and B teams travel to Levelland for a rematch with the Lobos. The Tribe took a 77-70 win over Levelland in the season opener.

The varsity's 52-46 win over Friona gave the Indians a 7-2 season mark. The Tribe had less trouble in stopping the Chieftain attack than they did at Friona in the final game of their tournament.

Morton took a 13-11 first quarter lead and held on to that slim margin before widening it to 29-24 at intermission.

Friona outscored the Indians 10-8 during the third period to narrow the lead to 37-34, but the Tribe pulled out in front to stay and took the 52-46 win.

Morton hit 34 per cent from the field against Friona.

Three Indians hit in double figures. M. C. Collins got 14 points, Terry Harvey contributed 13, and Stan Coffman pumped in 10. Donny Carthel scored 16 for the losers.

Willie Holland paced B team scoring with 18 points as the Tribe B took their sixth win without a loss over Friona, 77-38. Eddie Lewis and Bryant Lewis scored 16 and 15 points respectively.

Jimmy Harvey led freshmen scoring in their 65-26 win over Sudan.

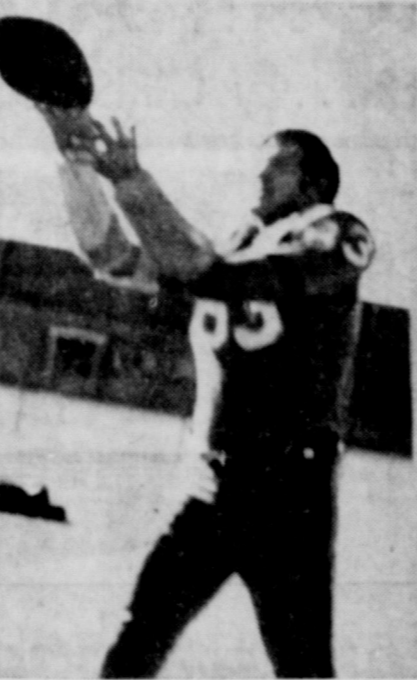

City Council approves three percent raises for twelve employees

Approval of a three percent salary raise for 12 city employees was the number one item on the agenda of the city council at its regular meeting Monday night.

On a motion by new city councilman Bill Wells, which was his first official act in office, the council voted unanimously to grant the raises. The motion was seconded by Councilman Wiley Hodge.

Those receiving the hikes, the amounts of which vary according to the salary scales in the various departments, included Roy D. Hill, D. M. Lewallen, Rex Brown, A. M. Mapes, Lee Belcher, Doyle Butler, Charley Ellis, Richard Horton, J. T. Atkins and Quinton Hill.

In other business the council heard a

police department report which included 12 arrests, 28 traffic citations and warnings, one automobile accident report, four burglaries and one shooting. There were no injuries in the automobile and vehicle damage was estimated at \$175. The burglaries are presently under investigation.

City Gas Department superintendent M. Lewallen gave a report on the status of the entire gas system and outlined the council what repairs were necessary and submitted an estimate of the cost. The council will further study the report and make a decision at a later date.

Pushover' Farwell tops Tribe; knock out tourney title hopes

Morton Indians were forced to swallow their pride last week as they dropped a 53-51 decision to Farwell, a team that had romped over by a 78-42 margin in the first round of the tourney.

Farwell, the second in the season for the Indians, came in the second round of the Friona Tournament and knocked out the Indians in the first round. But, they still have a chance to win the third place trophy with a 45-44 win over Friona Saturday.

The Indians took the tourney opener over Friona Saturday.

The Indians took a 51-50 lead with a minute left in the overtime, and after a missed Farwell free throw, the Tribe got the ball, but after George Pritchett drove the length of the court and was charged with an offensive foul, and then a technical, it was all over for Morton as Farwell scored three points on the free throw and subsequent possession. Trailing 53-51, the Indians got a couple of shots off, but they were off the mark.

Against the Steers, Terry Harvey was top scorer with 16 points. Dean Stovall pumped in 29 for the winners.

M. C. Collins, with 17 points, led the Indians to a 74-31 romp over Bovina in the first game of the tourney. The Tribe jumped in front 20-7 after eight minutes and never slowed down as they rolled to their fifth straight win. Terry Harvey got 15 points.

Saturday's third place win over Friona was the sixth of the year for Morton against two losses. The Indians had to come from behind three times, but outscored the host Chieftains 16-7 during the second period.

Spearman rolled over Farwell's boys to take the championship.

The Indians' next tournament trip will be to Denver City for the big Denver City Invitational that includes most of the top teams of the area, including undefeated Lubbock Christian, recent big winners over the tough Dimmitt Bobcats. LCHS stopped Morton, 68-50, earlier in the season.

A recipe, we are sure you will enjoy for the holiday season, comes from Mrs. Jackie Randolph. Lela's hobbies are cooking and sewing and when a lady likes to cook, she's sure to have lots of special recipes.

Jackie and Lela are new to our area. They came from Lorenzo, where Jackie was a long-time gin manager, to manage the Morton Co-op Gin.

They have three children, Larry, 15, and a sophomore at MHS, Robert, 11, and Connie, 10, both of whom are in 5th grade.

Mellowscotch Pecan Pie

- 1 c. brown sugar, firmly packed
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 Tablespoons water
- 2 cups cold milk

- 4 Tablespoons cornstarch
 - 2 egg yolk, slightly beaten
 - 2 Tablespoons butter
 - 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 - 3/4 cup chopped pecans
 - 1 baked pie shell
- Combine brown sugar, salt and water in top of double boiler. Boil over moderate heat to a thick syrup (about 5 minutes). Mix 1/4 cup milk and cornstarch to thin paste. Add 1 3/4 cup milk then combine hot syrup to this and cook over hot water until thick and smooth, stirring often. Stir a small amount of mixture into beaten egg yolks, return to double boiler and cook a few minutes longer. Add butter, pecans and vanilla. Cool and pour into baked pie shell and top with meringue.

The Cochran County Community Action Center has received a substantial boost in its activities budget, it was announced here Tuesday.

A regional director for the HEW program from Lubbock announced at a meeting of the county community action board that the Cochran county budget had been raised from \$500 to \$530 per month to carry on the programs now in progress and develop additional activities.

STATE Capital NEWS

AUSTIN, TEX. — January's draft call for Texans is 573. That is up 117 from December's 456.

Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service director, said allocation of the call will be delayed to local draft boards until he receives official instructions on procedures for random selection.

Induction period is January 15-31. Under the new Selective Service rally, men from 19 to 26 . . . born on September 14 . . . whose last names start with the letter "J" will be the first drafted after January 1.

Under the new lottery procedure 365 capsules are dropped into the hopper. Each capsule bears a number representing a day in the year. These are regarded as birth dates.

Order in which capsules are drawn thus determines the order in which men with matching birthdays will be drafted next year. Same sequence applies to those now deferred, or exempt in the future, when they return to "I-A" classification.

Texas' quota for pre-induction physical and mental examination next month is 5,800.

In addition to available men 19-26, all those 18 years and six to 11 months old in January of 1970, may be ordered for examination to fill the call. Oldest will be ordered first.

A 17-member Youth Advisory Committee to Schwartz elected these officers: William C. Sarapalus, presiding officer; Michael J. Shearn, vice chairman and Miss Karen K. Burk, secretary.

This group will evaluate the draft law and its administration and offer advice.

Other members include Rodney E. Donaldson, Austin; Eddie C. Hill, Dallas; Larry L. Long, Austin; Peter S. Cotham, Paris; Jose G. Guerra, Edinburg; James H. Wilkinson, Houston; Robert L. Jones, Corpus Christi; Robert J. Hodges, Austin; Miss Sandra Coachman, Belton; Jay N. Miller, Odessa; Michael L. Riddle, Lubbock; George H. Gould, Beaumont; Frank L. Sullivan, Nacogdoches and Larry L. Freeman, Houston.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES — A Texas law requiring publication twice in a newspaper of political subdivision land up for sale does not repeal the statute requiring commissioner's courts to appoint a commissioner to dispose of county real estate at auction, says Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

Martin also ruled that the new law does not repeal the provision that a taxing unit which purchased property at a tax sale may sell it either at a public or a private sale.

In other recent opinions Martin concluded:

Navigational districts, water districts and river authorities may become subscribers for workmen's compensation insurance for employees.

Councils of government can accept federal grants for water pollution control programs.

Soil and water conservation districts are prohibited by budget bill from using state funds to buy liability insurance.

Counties under the Tort Claims Act do not have to carry workmen's compensation insurance.

Hospital administrators may refuse to furnish to a widow medical records of a former patient who died shortly after discharge from the hospital.

Local school fund assignment credit for federal-owned military posts must be proportionately computed on the basis of total territory in the district, including that resulting from annexation of another school district.

Garden clubs which are institutions of "purely public charity" can be exempt from property tax.

Salary supplements to get doctors and dentists for state hospitals are legal.

Former legislators seeking state retirement benefits must, under a new provision, make application by January 1 and pay prior-year contributions.

Persons who are employees of a participating sub-division the effective date of its joining Texas County District Retirement System automatically become members on the effective date of the agreement.

APPOINTMENTS — Gov. Preston Smith named L. Rumsey Strickland of Dallas to the board of regents of Texas Woman's University.

Smith also named six to the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners. They are Mrs. Minnie B. Otto of Needville, Mrs. Billie Jo Woodall of Grand Prairie, Mrs. Arnie Fowler Spence of Houston, Dr. Robert Wells Shirey of Hillsboro, Harry H. Miller of Baytown and Mrs. Melba Jo Thomas of Naples.

Humberto Silex Jr. of Austin and El Paso is the new administrative assistant to James W. Griffith, Southwest regional director of the Office of Economic Opportunity.

COURTS SPEAK — Texas Supreme Court refused to change its rule that the Sunday closing law is constitutional. However, it granted a motion by challengers to stay its mandate pending appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Federal district court here threw out atheist Madalyn Murray O'Hair's suit to prevent broadcasting of prayer and Bible readings by astronauts from outer space.

She said she will appeal. State Supreme Court agreed to send back for retrial a medical malpractice suit brought by a farmworker against an Ennis doctor.

High Court was asked to reconsider its finding that a young Army Sgt., Albert Buckman Wharton II, is sole heir to Electra Waggoner's \$45 million estate located in six North Texas counties. A foster sister challenged the will.

Supreme Court ordered a new trial of a suit resulting from a three-car collision in Collin County.

Court of Criminal Appeals reversed itself and upheld the life sentence of a man convicted of having narcotics paraphernalia.

DISASTER TAG URGED — Governor Smith has asked that 27 counties in East Texas be declared as disaster areas due to the prolonged drought this summer and fall.

Counties are Anderson, Angelina, Bowie, Camp, Cass, Cherokee, Franklin, Gregg, Harrison, Henderson, Hopkins, Houston, Marion, Morris, Nacogdoches, Panola, Rains, Red River, Rusk, Sabine, San Augustine, Shelby, Smith, Titus, Upshur, Van Zandt and Wood.

Clifford M. Hardin, U.S. Secretary of Agriculture, promptly announced the counties are eligible for emergency assistance under the livestock feed program.

SMALL TOWN SAFETY VALVES Interest in developing the small town as a safety valve of galloping urbanization is gaining momentum.

Governor Smith started the new-interest in small town development when he announced his "Texas Communities Tomorrow" plan, which offers a program of self-help for the state's decaying rural communities.

Texas Municipal League devoted an entire issue of its magazine, Texas Town & City, to the problems — and the solutions.

Governor Smith has said "if we continue to worry about urban problems in a relatively exclusive way, without attending to the plight of small towns, we

will have only rural wastelands and urban slums."

EX-LEGISLATORS WORK FOR STATE — At least eight former lawmakers have been given state jobs to help them complete their eligibility for state retirement pay. Three are registered as lobbyists.

Added to the payroll recently were these former Senators: James E. Taylor of Austin; Weaver Moore of Houston; Jimmy Phillips of Angleton; William Fly of Victoria and Vernon Lemens of Waxahachie.

Three former House members also were added: Jack Bryan of Buffalo, Henry Lehman of Giddings and Fred Niemann of Austin (elected from Yoakum).

WEATHER CONTROL — A "hail suppression" program proposed for six West Texas counties around Lubbock is feasible, a report to the Texas Water Development Board shows.

Tom Henderson of Atmospherics, Inc. of Fresno, Calif., made the study for the state board, as part of its job of developing interest in weather modification projects.

But John Carr, assistant chief engineer for the board, said the agency has no money to go further into the program. Technique employed is a modification of "seeding" practices. A "bomb" made with silver iodide is dropped into clouds with hail potential. The nuclei of the chemical "compete" with other nuclei in the cloud for what water is available. Goal is to prevent hailstones from forming, or at least reduce them in size. Cost of the program is estimated at \$100,000 a year.

SHORT SNORTS — Attorney General Martin announced he will run for a third term.

Bob Shannon of Austin, formerly of Brownwood, said he will run for the Third Court of Civil Appeals, the Austin appellate court which reviews virtually every appeal involving a state agency.

Cigarette tax revenues jumped nearly \$2 million from November, 1968, to last month — due to the 4.5 cent-a-pack increase which became effective October 1.

Sen. Jack Strong of Longview announced

ced he will not seek re-election to District 2 Senate seat.

A state regional planning assistance grant of \$18,400 went to the 17-county West Central Texas Council of Governments, with headquarters in Abilene.

No quick recovery is seen from the recession in house construction, according to University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Texas economic expansion in general is slowing and hopefully the inflation pace will slow also, says UT B.B.R.

U.S. Department of Agriculture placed Houston County under a hog cholera quarantine which does not allow ferret pigs or breeding swine to be moved interstate.

For the first time since the Aeronautics Commission began certifying intra-city airlines, two cities — Corpus Christi and Wichita Falls — have been given permission to intervene in a hearing on proposed service to their towns in the interests of their citizens.

Internal Revenue service reports the stores are no longer required to keep records of ammunition sales since Congress changed the requirement this year.

ASCS Farm News

By John W. Hall

Applications for transfer of cotton allotments for the 1970 crop must be filed no later than December 31, 1969.

Farm allotment and projected yield notices have been mailed to farm operators so they are now able to make production plans for next year.

In Cochran County, growers voting in a special referendum last May failed to approve transfer of cotton acreage allotments, by sale or lease, out of the county. So transfer of allotments locally may be made from one farm to another only within the county. Cotton can be bought or leased and transferred to Cochran County. Cotton allotments may not be transferred across State lines.

Transfers of allotments between farms within the county and from a farm owned to another farm owned or operated by the same individual are not subject to referendum approval. However, such allotment transfers must be filed with the ASCS county office before the December 31 deadline.

The December 31 deadline therefore applies to all transfers of 1970 cotton allotments for Cochran County farms — whether by sale, lease, or by the owner.

Wool producers are reminded that the 1969 marketing year under the wool and mohair program ends December 31. Payments for the current marketing year — 1969 — are based only on marketings

completed during the year. Marketings completed after December 31, 1969, will be in the 1970 marketing year and not eligible for payments until early 1971.

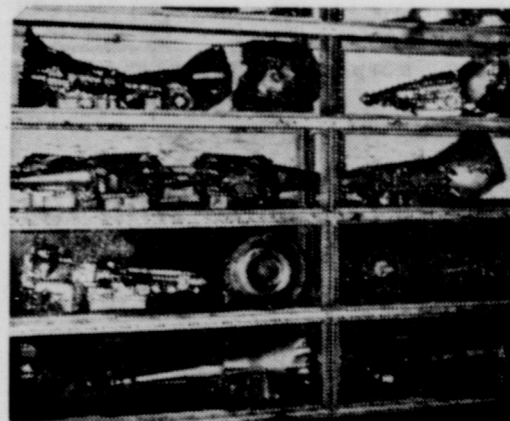
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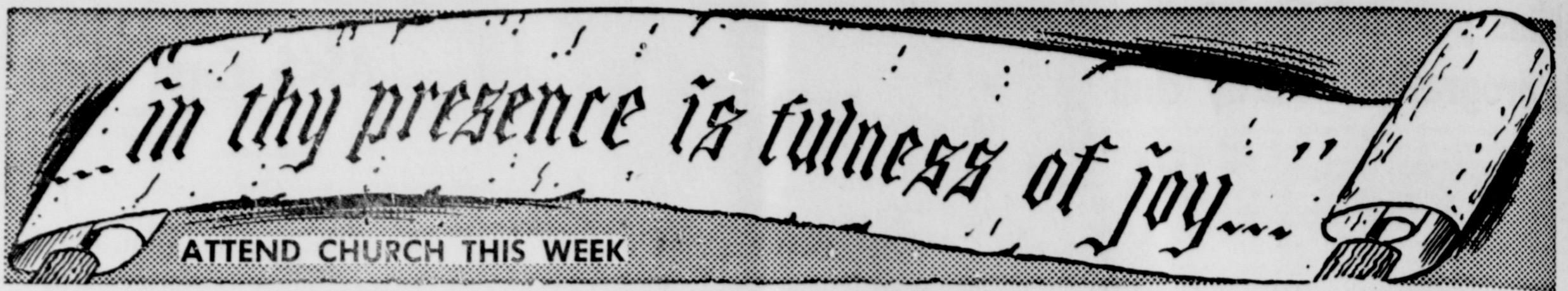

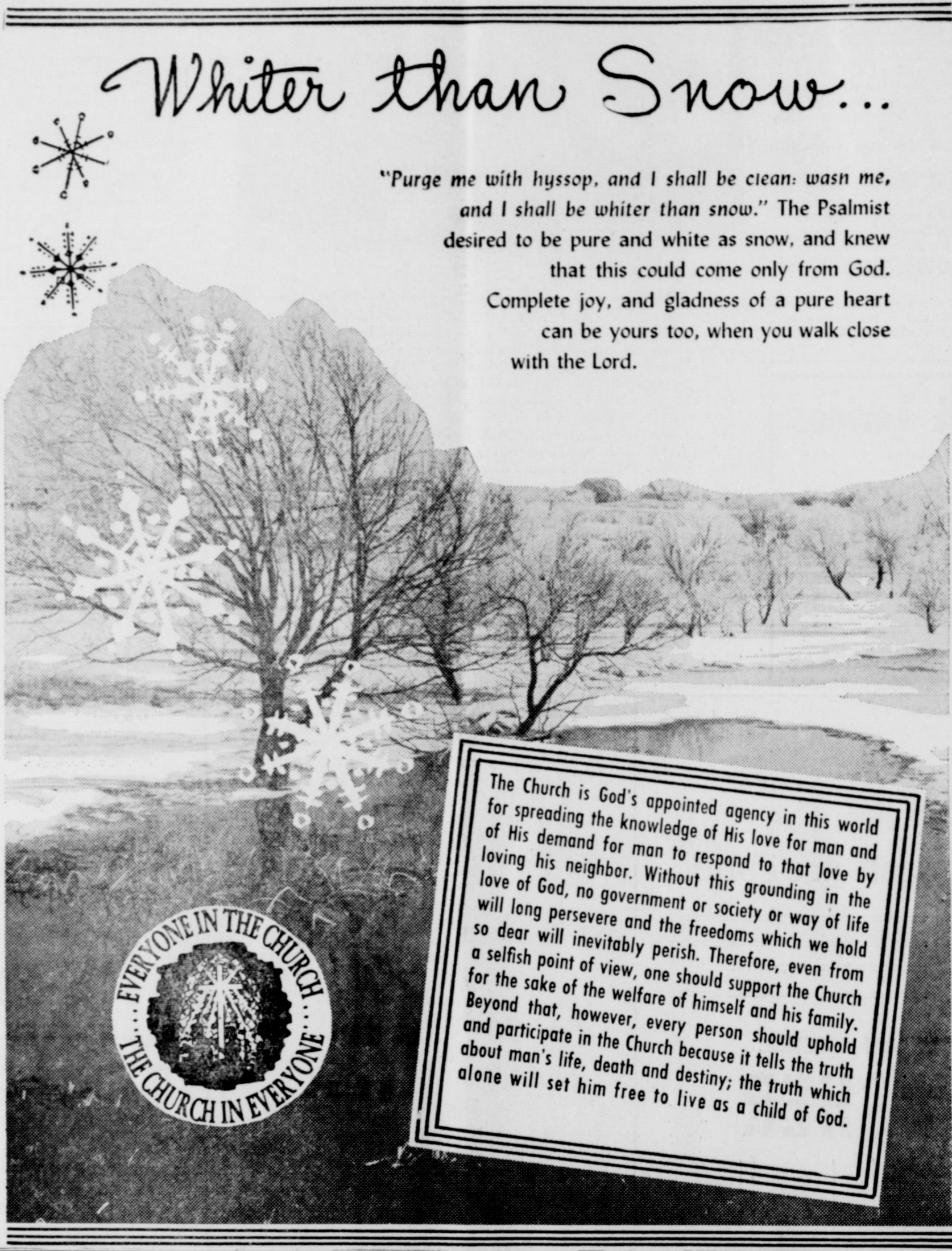
