Indians smack Lobos, 79-68; head for Denver City tourney

The rampaging Morton Indian varsity basketball team stretched its season win streak to nine games as they outshot the Levelland Lobos, 79-68, Tuesday in Levelland.

Morton's Tribe will put its 9-2 record on the line as the squad enters action in the tough Denver City Tournament Friday afternoon at 4 p.m.

Denver City and Morton are the only AAA squads participating in the eight-team affair on Friday and Saturday. All games are AAA powers, including top-rated Lamesa, who will bring an 11-1 record into tournament action.

Should Morton take a first round win in Brownfield, the Indians will face the winner of the Lamesa-Slaton game at 7 p.m. Saturday. The finals will be at 8:30 Saturday evening while the game for third place precedes it at 7 p.m.

If the Tribe drops the opener to Brown-

field, they will play at 10 a.m. Saturday morning on the consolation side of the bracket.

Other teams entered include Kermit, Levelland, and Seminole.

The Indians showed basketball fans that they could be as hot-handed on the road as they are at home by banging in 52 per cent of the field goals in handing Levelland the 79-68 loss. Junior Terry Harvey, playing his best game of the year thus far, dumping in 10 points during the first period as the Indians took a 21-18 lead after the first eight minutes. Morton outscored Levelland 23-18 during the second as Harvey continued to sear the nets.

Both teams cooled off during the second half, but the visitors from Morton continued to outshoot the hosts and held a comfortable 61-49 lead going into the final round.

Eight of the Indians got in on the scoring, but Terry Harvey led all of them with 28 points on nine field goals and 10 free throws. M. C. Collins connected for 20 points. Stan Coffman hit five field goals for 10 points.

Charlie Flowers was high for Levelland with 28 points.

The win was Morton's second over the Lobos this season. The Tribe had previously pinned a 77-70 loss on the Hockley County school in the initial game of the season.

Eddie Lewis and Willie Holland led the B team to a 66-60 victory over Levelland's junior varsity. Lewis scored 14 points from the field and added 12 from the charity line for 26 tallies. Holland got 16 points, while Steve Crockett had nine.

Christmas movie

The Morton Ministerial Alliance in cooperation with the Rose Theatre will host a movie for Morton area children Saturday, December 20, at 7 p.m.

Admission will be a can of food or toy to be used by the Ministerial Alliance in the Christmas baskets for the needy.

A Texas A&M University professor who is a recognized authority on community development and human relations has been selected as the speaker for the 1970 Morton Area Chamber of Commerce banquet.

Reagan V. Brown, professor and sociologist with the Extension Service of the University, will deliver the main address.

The banquet which will also be highlighted with the "Outstanding Citizen," "Farm Family of the Year" and the "Conservation Family of the Year" awards, is scheduled for January 15, at the Morton schools cafeteria beginning at 7:30 p.m. Program arrangements, ticket sales and other aspects of the annual meeting were worked out Tuesday morning at a regular meeting of the Chamber board of governors.

Brown is one of Texas' most popular speakers. He holds three degrees from Texas A&M University, and has studied at Cornell, Colorado State, and Utah State Universities.

In addition, he has completed The American Association of Land Grant Colleges and State Universities Communication Training Program held at Michigan State University, Sales and Business Management Course conducted by International Harvester Company, and the National Education Association's Laboratory for Group Development.

He is responsible for the Texas Community Improvement Program sponsored by the electric utility companies and conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He is often called "Mr. Community Improvement."

Brown is past president of the Terrell Chamber of Commerce, Kaufman Lions Club, and the Lockhart Businessmen's Club. He is a veteran of the 69th Infantry Division, was wounded in the Battle of the Bulge, and was discharged with the

rank of captain.

He is a member of the graduate faculty at Colorado State University, and his summer class, "Human Behavior" has attracted students from every section of America and many foreign countries.

Equally at home in academic circles or at rural community meetings, he has received standing ovation on college campuses, sales meetings, conventions, and hundreds of community get-togethers. He was recently chosen by the Former

Students Association of Texas A&M University for the Faculty Distinguished Achievement Award.

Brown is a community builder, ambassador for Texas, Sunday School teacher, father, Aggie, and a champion for the development of a prosperous agriculture, and the acceleration in the industrialization of the state.

He was the recipient of the 1968 "Texas Man of the Year" Award in agriculture, by The Progressive Farmer Magazine.

The program began with Rev. Rex Mauldin of the First United Baptist Church narrating the story of Christmas over the public address system. This was followed by the senior and junior high school choirs singing a number of Christmas carols.

Several carols played by the high school band, with the audience invited to join in for a sing-along, concluded the program.

Preparations for the event were made by the Emla Smith Study Club, whose members decorated the large evergreen tree and by L'Allegro Study Club whose members erected the large nativity scene

under the tree. During and after the program Santa Claus was present in the Western Abstract office where he talked with hun-

dreds of boys and girls and gave them each some candy. The candy was furnished to Santa by the Morton Lions Club and the Chamber of Commerce.

Board of education names textbook selection panel

Appointment of a Textbook Committee was the main order of business at the regular meeting of the Morton Independent School District Board of Education Monday night.

The committee, consisting of 15 teachers and supervisors, will make selections to be used in the Morton system from the various textbooks that will come up for adoption in the future.

Heading the group as chairman is Bob E. Travis, district superintendent. Other members include Lavell Hawkins, Linda Dupler, Etta M. Doty, Mary Ann Asbill, Richard Houston, Beth Whillock, Marilyn Doss, Margaret Masten, David Murrah, Peggy Silhan, Doug Reed, Dennis Howell, Lenora Jackson and Lenave Freeland.

In other business, the board approved payment of bills for the month of November in the amount of \$79,527.14.

Jim Middleton, junior high school principal, made a presentation to the board outlining the philosophies, objectives and programs being used to educate Morton students between the elementary and

high school levels. He advised the board what subjects are being taught and explained the goals he and his teachers are striving for in junior high school.

Travis advised the board that due to passage of the Tort Liability Act, the district vehicle fleet insurance premium increases \$56 this year and \$112 next year. This raises the total annual premium for vehicle coverage to approximately \$1,570 a year, Travis said.

The board discussed the possibility of requiring teachers to attend refresher courses at intervals in order to retain their positions in the Morton school system. No action was taken on the proposal at the meeting.

Mr. Temple Kern presented a proposal to the Board to take over management of the school cafeteria for the balance of See BOARD, Page 3a

Cochran Conservation 'Homemaker of Year' contest is announced

Cochran County Home Demonstration Agent Mary Harbin has announced that competition is now open for a most popular contest that will result in naming the county's top conservation homemaker of the year.

The 25th annual conservation award program for 1970 will again present an award for "Texas Conservation Homemaker of the Year." This award is to recognize achievements of Texas homemakers in its area of conservation of human and natural resources and to inspire others to cooperate in good conservation practices.

Each county may nominate one woman who lives in the county in which she or her husband operates a conservation farm or ranch under a basic soil and water conservation plan developed in cooperation with the local soil and water conservation district. Winners of this award in the past have been Mrs. Wayne Seigler, Mrs. G. C. Keith, and Mrs. E. C. Hale.

Cochran county women interested in this award should pick up suggestions and guidelines for preparation of records in the extension office. A past record will also be in the office. Records must be submitted by February 2, 1970.

Deadline for all news and advertising for the Christmas edition will be 5 p.m. Friday, December 19.

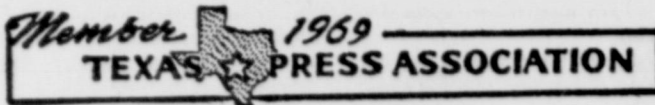

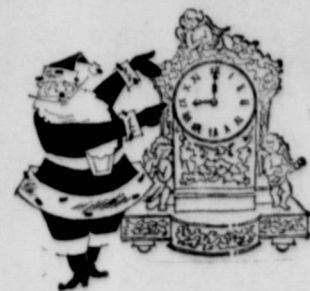
Sewing Club holds Christmas party

cropland into cropland status for the current year, the farm's conserving base shall be increased acre for acre for the land brought into cropland status. Producers are being reminded that the 1969 marketing year under the wool and mohair program ends Dec. 31st.

File your application for incentive payments with your local ASCS Office. Documents should be brought in at the earliest possible date but no later than January 31, 1970.

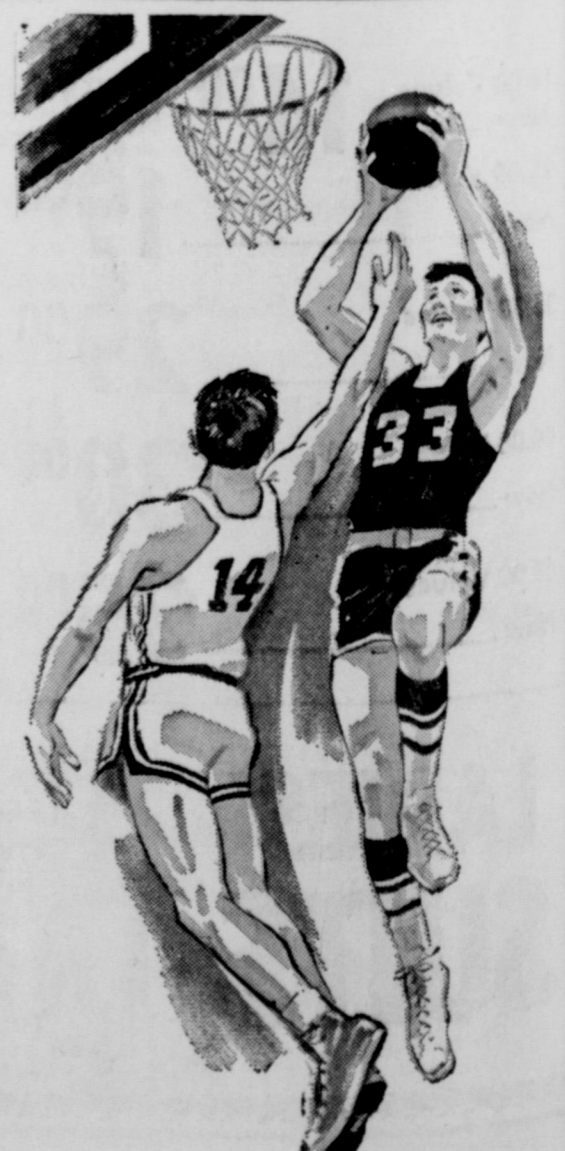

Eighth grade basketball team adds four wins to its streak

Morton's eighth grade basketball team added four wins to their undefeated string in action during the past week and they also walked away with the championship trophy of the Friona junior high tournament.

Morton's seventh, eighth, and ninth grades play at Levelland today at 5 p.m. The eighth grade rolled over Muleshoe, Bovina, and Hereford LaPlata in taking the Friona tourney, and then capped the week's action by downing last year's state champs of junior high basketball in New Mexico in a game Tuesday night. The Indians beat Clovis Yucca 41-30 in Morton's gym.

The seventh grade picked up win number two by downing Clovis Yucca seventh, 25-24, Tuesday. Jimmy Hargis accounted for 20 of Morton's 25 points in leading his team to the win.

Against Yucca, the eighth grade managed only a single field goal during the opening period and trailed 6-2 before coming alive to outscore the visitors, 12-5, during the second stanza. Leading 14-11

at halftime, the Indians stretched that margin to 31-18 after three periods as a good defensive press and top rebounding began to pay off in points. Also, Morton recovered from a cold first half to dump in 48 per cent of their field goals during the second half and ran up a 41-30 victory score.

The loss was Yucca's second of the year against four wins. Larry Thompson paced Morton scoring with 23 points. Mark Fluitt added eight to the Indians' total.

Thompson dumped in 31 points as the eighth grade came from behind to down Hereford LaPlata, 46-29 in finals of the Friona tournament. The Indians trailed 18-17 at the half, but outscored Hereford, 13-2 during the final period.

Jerry Silhan's 16 points led Morton over Bovina in the second round, 48-38. Bovina captured third place.

In the opening round, Morton took a 41-25 win over Bovina as Thompson bucketed 23 points. Bovina captured the consolation crown of the tourney.

Morton Indians top Farwell; avenge Friona tourney loss

Morton's Indians received an opportunity to avenge one of their two losses of this year's basketball season, and they did just that as they pinned a 54-41 loss on the visiting Farwell Steers last Friday in a hastily scheduled game.

The game marked the third time the Indians and Steers have squared off this season. Morton took a 78-42 win two weeks ago, but fell to the Steers 53-51 in the Friona tournament later in the week.

Morton's B team and freshmen squad both remained undefeated as they added wins over Farwell teams to give Morton a sweep of the triple header. The B team took a 64-54 win and the freshmen romped over Farwell, 60-28.

A second and fourth quarter scoring spurge propelled the varsity to their eighth win of the season over the Steers. Morton got off to a rather slow start, and trailed 6-2 with five minutes elapsed in the initial quarter, but a last-minute effort narrowed the margin to 8-7 as the first period ended.

The Indians outscored Farwell, 21-12, during the second period to take a 28-20 halftime lead. Morton hit 13 of 31 field goals during the first half.

Farwell narrowed the margin to 39-34 as the third quarter expired and then roared from behind to tie the game at 41-41 with 4:47 remaining in the last period. But that was all for the visiting Steers as the Tribe displayed some hot shooting and good ball handling. Successive baskets by Stan Coffman, Elton Patton, and Keith Embry, put the Indians ahead 47-41 with three minutes left. From that point Morton tacked on seven insurance points while holding Farwell scoreless.

Morton hit 40 per cent of their field goals and four out of five free throws. Stan Coffman and Elton Patton led Indian scoring with 14 points each. Keith Embry dumped in 12. Dean Stovall was high for Farwell with 10.

The Morton B squad won their seventh in a row without a loss with their 64-54 win over Farwell. Morton never trailed as the team took a 13-3 first period lead. Bryant Lewis was high for Morton with 16. Dee Woolam got 13, and Willie Holland scored 12.

The freshmen's win was their sixth without a loss as Phillip Graves scored 13 points in leading the ninth graders to their 60-28 romp over Farwell. Ted Thomas scored 12 and Willie Harrison, 11, for Morton.

Murrah is charged with the responsibility of previewing new educational films in the elementary area and making recommendations on which films the ESC should purchase.

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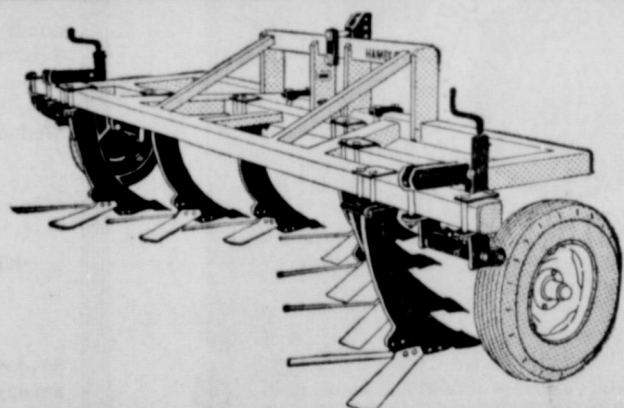
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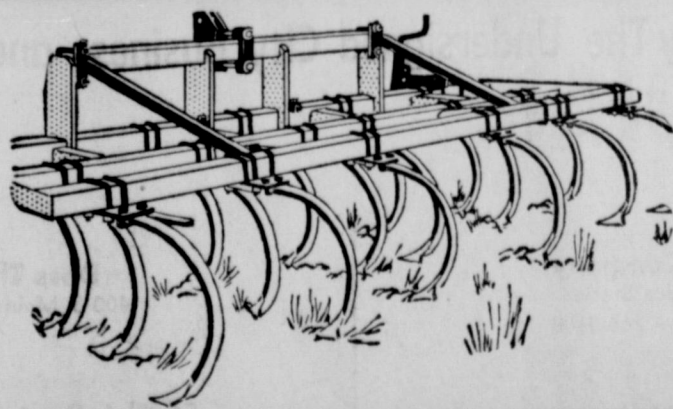
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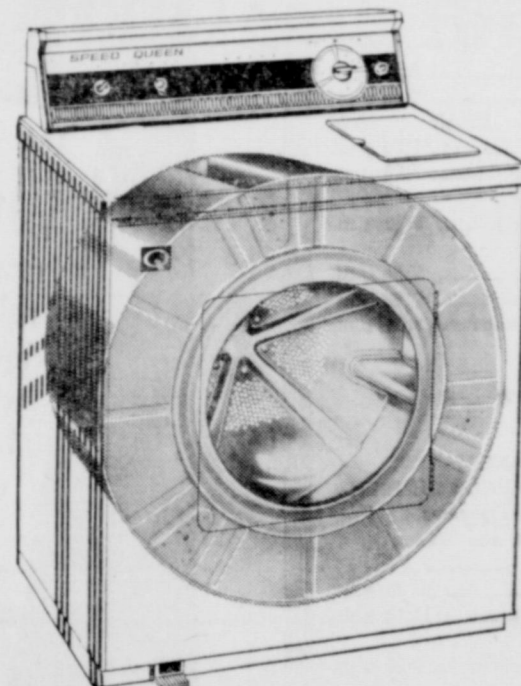

Hospital taking applications for vocational nursing course

Mrs. Deryl Bennett, acting director of nurses, at Cochran Memorial Hospital, has announced applications are now being taken for the LVN Nurses Training Program which will start January 12.

Applicants must be 18 to 55 and have completed two years of high school or pass the equivalent aptitude examination, be in good physical and mental condition and have an interest in nursing. An aptitude examination will be given December 17 at South Plains College at 1 p.m.

The first eighteen weeks period will be

spent in classroom work at South Plains College and upon completion, the students will receive their caps and begin working a thirty-six hour week in Cochran Memorial Hospital with four hours of classroom instructions each week.

Classes to be given the first eighteen weeks will include: Anatomy and Physiology, Mental Health & Mental Illness, Disease Control and Prevention, Vocational Nursing Skills, Pharmacology, Personal and Vocational Adjustment, Nutrition, Normal Growth & Development and Geriatrics. The remaining thirty-four weeks are classified as Clinical. The courses in this period include: Medical and Surgical Nursing, Obstetrics and Pediatric Nursing.

Satisfactory completion of the twelve month program of training entitles the student to a certificate from South Plains College. The certificate qualifies the graduate to take the examination given by the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners. Those passing the state examination will be issued a license qualifying them to practice as a Licensed Vocational Nurse (LVN).

Cochran Memorial Hospital pays the tuition at South Plains College and a nominal salary for trainees. The trainee must buy their books and uniforms. Mrs. Bennett stated that loans were readily available for anyone interested in becoming an LVN who might need financial assistance.

Four ladies are now receiving training and will graduate in January. They are Thelma Turney, Artie Kelley, Caroline Gladden and Betty Pierce.

"There is a place for you in the ever growing field of Vocational Nursing," Mrs. Bennett concluded.

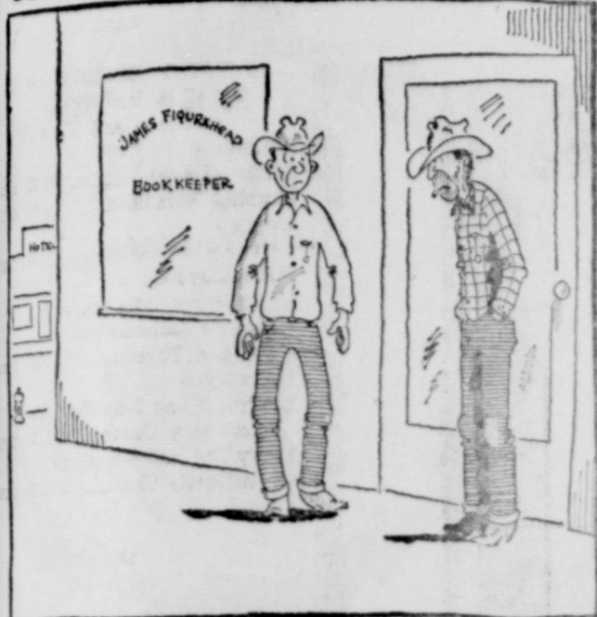

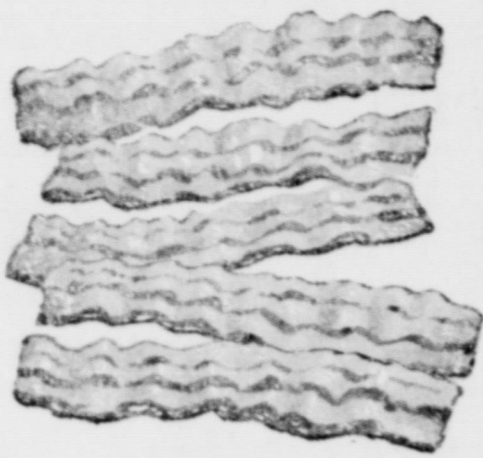

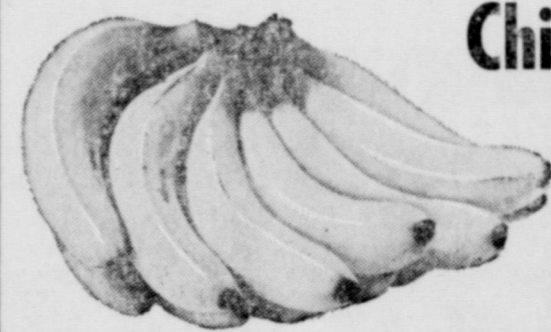
