Absentee vote period opens on Wednesday

Absentee voting in the November 3 general election for candidates for federal, state district and local offices, and on seven amendments to the Texas constitution, began here Wednesday, Cochran

county clerk Lessye Silvers has announced.

Absentee ballots may be cast by making a personal appearance at the county clerk's office in the court house with the voter's registration certificate in hand during normal office hours of 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on weekdays. The absentee voting period extends from Wednesday, October 14 to Friday, October 30.

There will be five columns on the Nov. 3 ballot. First column will list offices sought by candidates. Second column will list Democrat candidates and third column will list Republican candidates. Fourth column is for Independent candidates but none are designated on the Cochran County ballot. Fifth column is for write-in balloting. Proposed constitutional amendments also will be on the ballot.

Eight contested races, between Democrat and Republican, are on the ballot. See ABSENTEE, Page 7a

Three hospitalized as wind flips home

A family of three escaped serious injury early Thursday morning when the mobile home in which they were sleeping was flipped on its back by high, gusty winds.

Jerry Dale Brownlow, his wife Patricia and their one-month-old son Jerry Don, were taken to Cochran Memorial Hospital where they spent the remainder of the night. The mishap apparently occurred at 12:25 a.m. Thursday as that was the time an electric clock in the trailer stopped.

According to information furnished by the paternal grandfather, Luther E. Brownlow, the young couple had some very tense moments immediately following the overturn when they could not find the baby among the displaced furnishings. "He soon began to cry and his voice led them to him in great relief," the grandfather stated.

He said that upon exiting the trailer, the trio took shelter in a nearby storm cellar fearing a tornado was involved. They soon made their way to the Edward Brownlow house, beside which the trailer was parked, and were driven to the hospital by him. Edward is Jerry Dale's father.

No estimate of damage to the mobile home was given. Photo can be found inside.

Power rate increase, police matters receive city council attention

Discussion of a proposed rate increase by Cochran Power and Light and the resignation and hiring of policemen were the main agenda items considered by the Morton City Council Monday night.

The over-all proposed power rate increase amounts to approximately 12 1/2 percent over present rates. A request to raise the rates approximately the same amount in the fall of 1969 was voted down by the council. No action was taken on the proposal at the Monday meeting pending further study by the city fathers. Fred Payne, CPA, gave the council a briefing on the finer points of the proposal.

The council accepted the resignation of Don Butler, city patrolman who has been with the city police department for two years. Butler resigned, effective immediately, to accept an appointment with the U. S. Border Patrol.

Doyle Lee Slack, of Seagraves, was hired by the council to the position vacated by Butler and was to begin his duties today.

In other business, the council held a public hearing on an annexation ordinance concerning the annexation into the city limits of a tract of property lying on the southeast edge of town. There were no witnesses appearing for or against the ordinance.

A first reading on the annexation ordinance was held and received unanimous approval by the council.

Payment of bills in the amount of \$3,544.17 for the month of September was approved, which completed business on the meeting's agenda.



WHERE ONE WAS BADLY BURNED . . .

ALL THAT WAS LEFT was the shell as a butane tank explosion and fire razed the mobile home above last Thursday where it was located at 304 S. Fifth Street in Morton. Demas Lynn Dobson, 33, of Morton, owner of the trailer, received first and second degree burns over much of his body from the blast and fire and was making a satisfactory recovery in Cochran Memorial Hospital at press time Wednesday. He could offer no explanation as to what caused the explosion.

Local man receives burns in mobile home fire here

A local man was making satisfactory progress Wednesday in his recovery at Cochran Memorial Hospital from extensive burns suffered in a mobile home explosion and fire on Wednesday of last week.

Demas Lynn Dobson, 33, of Morton, received first and second degree burns over a large portion of his body when a butane tank exploded and set fire to the trailer house in which he was working. Dobson said he was blowing out the water lines in the trailer in preparation for freezing weather when the explosion occurred. He could give no explanation as to the cause of the blast.

The mobile home, located at 304 S.W. Fifth Street, adjacent to his father's home, was totally destroyed, Dobson, who does custom harvesting, said that the trailer was not going to be occupied during the

winter and that is why he was clearing the water lines.

No damage estimate had been made, but the home was totally destroyed and would probably run into several thousand dollars, Dobson indicated.

Dr. Dean is victim of apparent 'stroke'

Dr. William Dean, physician at Cochran Memorial Hospital, was reported in serious condition in the intensive care unit of Methodist Hospital in Lubbock Wednesday after suffering an apparent cerebral stroke here Monday afternoon.

Exact nature of the attack had not been disclosed by press time Wednesday and reliable sources indicated that further tests were in progress to determine its seriousness.

Hospital personnel stated that Dr. Dean was rushed to Lubbock hospital in the early afternoon Monday after he had collapsed while on duty at the hospital.

Dr. Eva Lee Snead, M.D. of Floydada, has consented to fill in temporarily at Cochran Memorial Hospital during the absence of Dr. Dean. She arrived in Morton Tuesday and began her duties at the hospital Wednesday morning.

Tribe to seek winning track against Dimmitt 'Cats Friday

Jim Carlen said he would settle for a 10-1 record after his team's loss to Texas a couple of weeks ago. Morton's Indians will be willing to settle for a 7-3 record following their bruising loss to Floydada last week.

Nursing a two-game losing streak, the Tribe will attempt to even its season record and break out of the district cellar by traveling to Dimmitt to take on the faltering Bobcats Friday night.

The 'Cats have a three-loss string working against them. Two weeks ago, they forced Floydada to come from behind twice, but lost, 35-16 to the mighty Whirlwinds. Last week, Friona surprised Dimmitt by a 14-0 count.

In other games, Dimmitt bounced Muleshoe, 22-8 and Farwell, 24-0, before being upset by class A Springlake-Earth.

By comparative scores, the Bobcats hold a two-touchdown advantage over the Tribe. Morton bested Muleshoe, 2-1, in a preseason scrimmage, and squeezed by Farwell, 7-6.

Senior Mark Wohlegemuth, quarterback for the Bobcats, may be the man to watch Friday night. The 165-pounder engineers the Bobcats' multiple offense and possesses some speed. The Cats run from a modified-I formation, with split-T variations. The popular triple-option, the "in" thing this season, is very much a part of

the Dimmitt offense. Also, the Bobcats possess a fine passing attack.

The Indians will give away weight at the tackle positions, but pretty well match the Cats pound for pound at the other positions. The two tackles, Pat Barrios, and Robert Woolbright, weight 210 and 199 pounds respectively.

Morton's coaches are treating the Bobcats with a great deal of respect. Head coach Ted Whillock cited that the 'Cats were "an up-and-down team," and anticipates a tough game. He pointed out that his team will miss the services of its outstanding sophomore guard Rocky Dewbre, lost due to a cyst operation. Also he reported that Jackie Watts, senior defensive end, was suffering with a knee injury and may miss Friday's contest.

Indian fans making the trip to Dimmitt might anticipate a stronger passing attack from the Tribe. Last week, quarterback Keith Embry hit four of nine attempts for 77 yards, including two good completions to senior halfback Terry Harvey.

Friday's clash with Dimmitt renews the series with that club after a respite of several years. Game time for the 3-AA clash is set for 7:30 p.m. at Dimmitt.

Morton returns home to face the Lockney Longhorns next week.

Progress toward a program with county-wide participation to maintain an ambulance service for Morton and Cochran county was reported Tuesday night following a meeting of local government agencies at Cochran Memorial Hospital.

The meeting, held in the board room of the Cochran Memorial Hospital District, was attended by members of the city council, county commissioners court, hospital district board and representatives from Whiteface.

A Resolutions passed previously by the Morton City Council outlining a proposal whereby the ambulance would be operated out of the city police department, with drivers provided by the police department,

and at no expense to the city, was presented at the meeting.

Raymon Devours, president of the hospital district board read a resolution previously passed by the board stating that the hospital district would participate in any way that is necessary to continue ambulance service to the people of Morton and Cochran county.

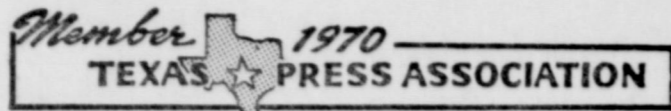
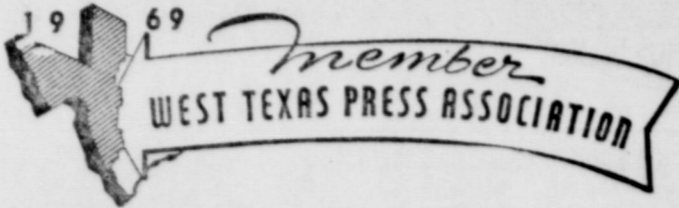

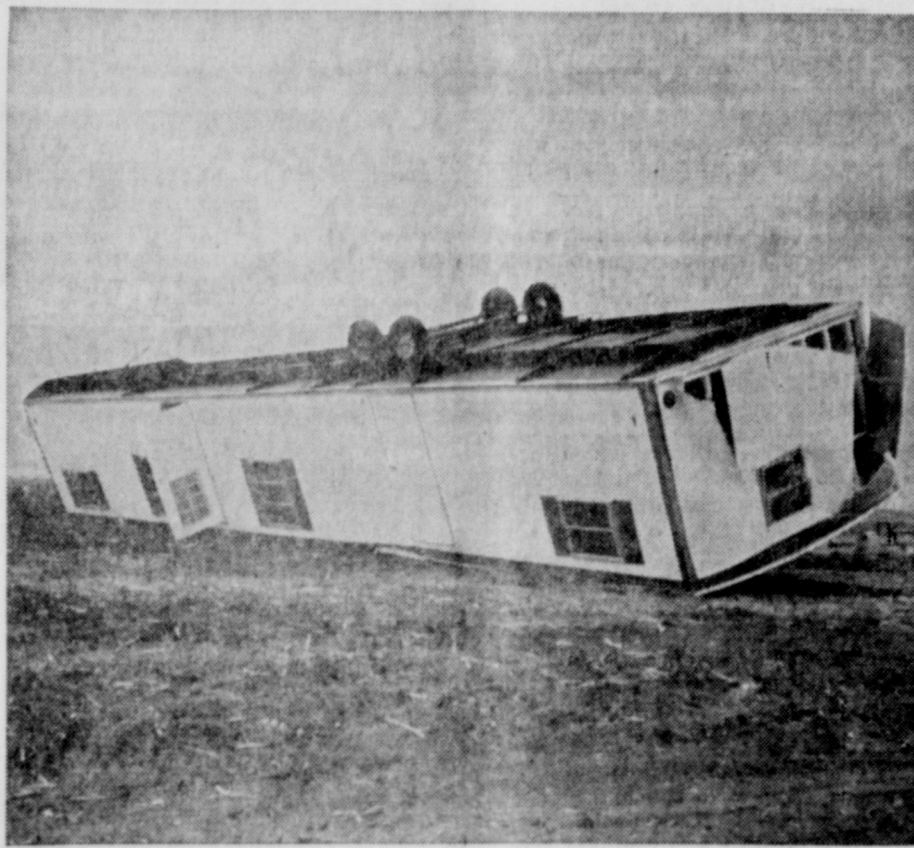

IN THE WAKE OF THE WIND . . .

THE FORCE OF THE WINDS that struck Morton in the middle of the night last Wednesday is graphically illustrated by the plight of the mobile home above which was flipped on its back as the first heavy gusts arrived. 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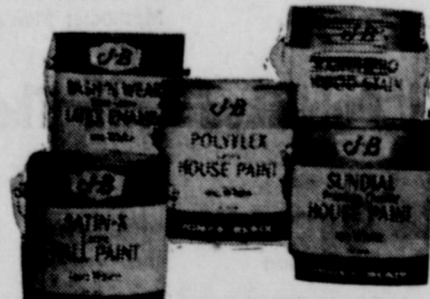

Floydada Whirlwinds' rating for real; drop Indians 54-0

Floydada's Whirlwinds lived up to their nickname, the "Mean Green," by going to a 54-0 win over Morton's Indians last Friday at Floydada.

The loss was the worst defeat for a team in three years. Denver City's offense racked up the Tribe by a like margin. The loss was Morton's third of the season during the past ten days of play.

Floydada's talented offensive eleven went up to its state ranking quite well as the unit scored every time it had the ball. Quarterback Andy Hale set the pace for the first offensive play by romping for 30 yards to the Morton three. Two plays later, less than a minute elapsed in the game, fullback Van Mitchell scored on the rout had begun.

Morton's first offensive display lacked in gaining ten yards on the first play. Terry Harvey and Kevin Kuebler picked up three each, but on third down Harvey was dropped inches short of the 15. M. C. Collins' first of eight plays backed the Tribe out of the hole for a minute. The Winds needed two plays to score from the Indian three. Mitchell rambled 35 yards for the first play. The attempted run was stopped, but the Winds led, 12-0, with minutes of football left in the game.

Morton fumble on the play following kickoff set the Mean Green up at the 30, and five plays later, Andy was raced in from 12 yards out. Floydada's kick made it 19-0.

The Indians could not move, Floydada drove in from 63 yards out in 13 plays. Then, as the first quarter elapsed, the Mean Green tacked their twenty-fifth point on the board, had amassed 218 offensive yards in just 12 minutes, and had held the Tribe to 17 yards.

The score was 33-0 before Morton picked up its first down. Indian quarterback Keith was connected with Willie Holland for a yard gain to the Morton 47, but two plays later, an interception killed the first and only serious threat.

Floydada's first unit returned to the field after taking a second quarter break and cranked up the Mean Green offensive machine once again. A 63-yard pass and a 67-yard run put 14 points on the board in less than two minutes. Then the first team exited for another respite, and the Tribe exchanged blows with Floydada's second team until only three minutes were left in the game. A blocked punt gave the Winds possession at Morton's 24, and apparently desiring to break the 50-mark once again, the Mean Green first unit returned to add the crowning blow. But the Tribe did not give up that easily. Floydada punched the ball to the Morton eight, but two plays gained only three yards. On fourth and goal Andy Hale hit his end Walter Harris for the final score.

Keith Embry paced Morton's offense with 77 yards passing — hitting 4 of 9 tries Embry left the game in the late minutes with a back injury and was replaced at quarterback by Ted Thomas.

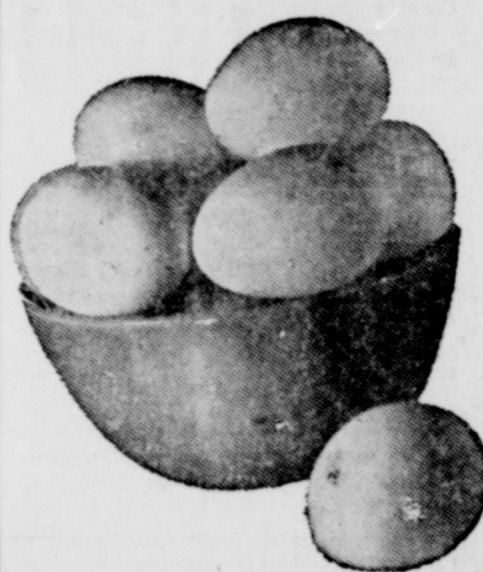

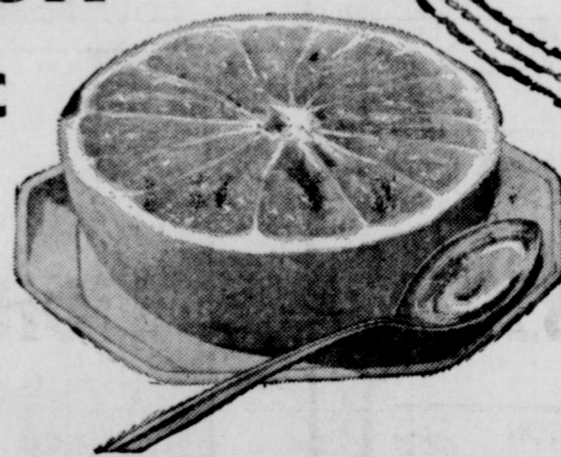
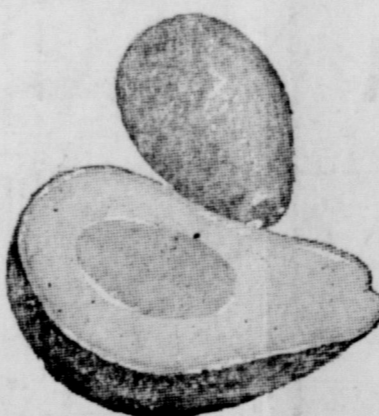
