Postal rate hike begins Sunday

All reluctant letter writers take warning: Now is the time to get all that neglected correspondence out of the way while you are still in shape to finance the operation.

he reason? Because Saturday at midnight marks the end of the reign of the six cent and ten cent stamp, that's why. So take pen in hand and write right now!

Morton Postmaster Murray L. Crone said today that increase in most postage rates will take effect May 16 as the new United States Postal Service begins its task of achieving self sufficiency as required by the Postal Reorganization Act. Mr. Crone noted that general postage rates have not been increased since 1967 when Congress passed what was to become its final legislative act in this respect.

He pointed out that, earlier, requests for rate increase were proposed to Congress in 1969 by both President Johnson and President Nixon. In addition, President Nixon proposed an increase again in 1970, although none of the proposed increases was acted upon by Congress.

Mr. Crone explained that the new increases - authorized on a temporary basis until the newly created Postal Rate Commission can make recommendations to the Governors of the Postal Service on permanent changes - will raise first-class letter rates from 6 to 8 cents an ounce, and airmail letter rates from 10 to 11 cents an ounce. Post cards will be from 5 to 6 cents each and airmail post cards will go from 8 to 9 cents each.

The increases will be borne more by business than by individuals, the postmaster pointed out, since about 75 percent of first class and airmail is from commercial mailers.

In addition to increase in first-class rates, second and third class will also go up on May 16. However the full increases See POSTAL RATE, Page 2a

Four persons were injured, three seriously, in a car-pickup collision approximately five miles southeast of Morton on SH116 late Sunday morning.

In an ironic coincidence, this wreck occurred on the morning of Mother's Day, a scant three miles on the same highway from the scene of a car-truck crash that took two lives on Easter Sunday morning. Holidays are appearing to be unkind to vehicle drivers in Cochran county.

proposed by the Postal Service will not be put into effect on a temporary basis. in second and third classn since the postal reform legislation contemplates that such increased be phased over five years - or ten years for nonprofit organization - provided Congress appropriates the necessary funds to ease the transition to full rates. Because of the phasing provision the increases to become effective May 16 for second and third class will generally be only one-fifth of the total increase which has been proposed by the Postal Service No changes are made in the rates for parcel post, which is the principal component of fourth-class mail. However, initial increases will be made in the "book rates" which is classified as fourth class. The new temporary rates also make changes in other postage rate categories and special service fees, such as special

delivery and registered mail. The Postal Service advised the public in February that it intended to make the

- EDITORIAL -

Texans will be going to the polls next Tuesday (May 18). Up for voter decision are four proposed constitutional amendments. One, Constitutional Amendment No. 4, could well be one of the most important measures West Texans will be called to vote on in many a day. The socalled "Clean Water Amendment," besides providing \$100 million in water development bonds for assistance to local governments in construction of sewage treatment facilities, raises the maximum interest rate the state can pay on all water development bonds from four to six percent. This provision alone should insure overwhelming support.

Water development bonds previously approved by Texas voters, almost \$300 million of them, have been unsalable on the bond market, thanks to the unrealistic

four percent interest ceiling rate. A hike to six percent provided in the amendment opens the way for use of the bonds, princi-pally for construction of reservoirs for municipal water supplies. Storage space for surplus waters will be provided in many of the reservoirs, surplus waters that eventually will be used in part to feed a canal across Texas for bringing water to this arid area.

It's not enough to favor or be in agreement with planning for the future, We must back our convictions with action, in this instance by casting our votes for Constitutional Amendment No. 4. Ours is an area in which water is of

temporary increases if the Postal Rate Commission did not make the recommended decision within 90 days of the request by the Postal Service.

Recently the Rate Commission confirmed that it would not be able to make the decision within the 90 days, and Sunday, May 16, was selected as the date on which the rates would become effective.

When the domestic changes go into effect, there will be conforming increases in letter rates to Canada and Mexico.

Crone went on to explain that there will be no 'using up'' of the six cent first class or ten cent airmail stamps that you may have on hand without adding the additional postage. It will be necessary to purchase one or two cent stamps to add to the old stamps. In cases where a person or firm has a large quantity of the old stamps on hand, it will be advisable to trade them in on the new stamps at the place of original purchase, the postmaster concluded.






