It's rodeo time in Morton!

A host of admirers of all things western are expected to assemble in downtown Morton this afternoon as the 21st Last Frontier Rodeo gets off to a rousing start with a giant rodeo parade,

The festivities will begin with the parade and follow with the colorful "Grand Entry" at the county rodeo grounds prior to the kickoff performance tonight of the three-day celebration. Friday and Saturday's performances will also begin at 8 p.m.

There are two centestants for the title of rodeo queen this year. They are Leslie Holden, 10, of Morton and Sherry Claunch, 17, of Bula. The winner of the contest will be the one that sells the most \$1 tickets for a chance on a \$350 shop-made saddle that will be drawn for just prior to the last rodeo performance on Saturday.

The new queen will be announced during the last performance and will reign over the 22nd Last Frontier Rodeo to be held in 1972. Each year the queen is selected for the following year's rodeo rather than for the year in which she competes,



Bank observes 30th anniversary

The First State Bank of Morton ths week is celebrating the thirtieth anniversary of its founding.

The bank, whose thirty years of operation has seen it climb from a very modest beginning on August 2, 1941 to a major financial institution with total assets of close to \$8 million, is gratefully blaming its success entirely upon its loyal customers over the years, states bank president Gene Benham.

The original state bank charter was delivered to its charterer W. W. Williamson at the county courthouse in 1941, its total assets were \$69,628.35. At the close of business on August 2, 1971, the assets totaled \$7,974,478.15.

Other comparable figures for the two dates that gives an insight into the growth of the institution include:

Following its early beginning at the courthouse the bank moved into a building constructed for it where Cochran Power and Light is now located. The new brick and steel building where the bank is now located was occupied in May, 1957, with the grand opening ceremonies held

Know the drug threat

(Eighth in series)
Today's Subject: More
Mind-Afecting Drugs Now in Use

To classify any one group of drugs as "mind-affecting" would be a truth, but only half true, because this would lead one to believe that some drugs in use do NOT affect the mind. The hallucinogenics, (those which cause "trips" of the mind), are generally referred to as mind-affecting, but in reality all drugs have their effect on the mind whether direct or indirective.

Some of the other drugs we have not mentioned thus ar are MESCALINE, PEYOTE, PSILOCYBIN, DMT, STP and MORNING GLORY SEEDS.

Mescaline is hallucinogenic in nature, a chemical found in the buttons of certain small cactus plants — peyote or mescal

— and these are also available illegally in powder and liquid form. The effects, for the most part are milder than from LSD, often last 10 to 12 hours. Being bitter to the taste it is often mixed with a drink to make it go down easier. American Indians have used this drug in religious rites for hundreds of years, so its use is not what could be termed new.

Peyote itself, coming from cactus, is a milder form of Mescaline. Sometimes it is referred to as "the button," "cactus," or just the letter "P." To this day it is still used in sacrament rites by the Native American Indian Church.

Psilocybin is from the Mexican mushroom and usually comes in crystal, powder or liquid form. Influence of the mind lasts from 2 to 6 hours generally and



effects are similar to those of Mescaline. DMT, (dimethyltryptamine), causes effects similar to LSD, when taken in large doses. Reaction comes quickly and the effects last an hour or two. It is made synthetically and is a natural component of seeds from plants growing in the West Indies and South America. For hundreds o years natives have used this drug by sniffing a powder from the seeds.

STP. (also known as DOM), is relatively new on the drug scene. It is a synthetic chemical related to Mescaline and the Amphetamines. Reportedly it is very mind-distorting, but not nearly so powerful as LSD.

Morning Glory Seeds of some varieties have an active principle closely related o LSD, but much less potent. The seeds are most usually chewed or made into

Then there is the "thing" called "68"; like banana peel, "68" or, as it is sometimes called "sex juice," may be a hoax so say the specialists of the American Pharmaceutical Association. Users have reported that it produces wild, short trips as compared to LSD or STP. There are conflicting reports on the chemical makeup and over all effects. Our Food and Drug Administration says that "68" is simply oil of peppermint.

So, in summary today, you may ask yourself why it is important to know all of these minute details about all of the drugs we have discussed. Much of the information you may never have an occasion, it is much better to know facts than fiction, hearsay and the like.

The major point of this entire series is to better understand the drug misuse problem and to do this we must know basic knowledge and basic facts. Only through truth about the drug problem can we hope to combat it. Only through openmindedness can we save our children from the horrors of drug misuse. WE are the adults - the solution to the problem is up to US - this is OUR responsibility! Be with me next week, won't you?

STEP SAVER - To save steps while housecleaning, wear an apron or smock with large pockets. You can carry needed cleaning items as well as have pockets for items you pick up as you clean, explain home management specialists for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

appreciatin for the abundance, quality and value of food and fiber."

In addition to Slaughter and Scruggs, the other charter directors of the Council include Dr. H. O. Kunkel, dean of agriculture, Texas A&M University; Dr. Wayland Bennett, vice president for academic affairs, Texas Tech University; and Don Blacketer, Home Grove farmer. The latter three serve as vice chairmen, James L. (Curiy) Hays, Abilene, West Texas Utilities Co., is treasurer of the Council.

A large number of professional people in agriculture-related businesses, organizations, state and federal agencies, news media, and educational institutions are working in the Council.

The first orgnizational meetings of the council were held in February in Fort Worth and Austin. Task force committees met in April in Austin, and the finance committee held its first meeting June 29 in Houston. Money to finance news releases, films for television and tapes for radio will come from voluntary contri-

Community action association receives large federal grant

Governor Preston Smith today announced his approval during the past week of a community action grant of \$50,000 in new federal funds to South Plains Community Action Association, Inc. in Levelland for CAA Administration.

The grant is funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act, and is effective July 1, 1971, through Feb. 29,

This program will focus on the development of manpower programs for rural areas in West Texas, including five state planning regions - Panhandle, South Plains, North Texas, Permian Basin and Upper Rio Grande. The agency will work with local governments and resources, state government and agencies and federal agencies to improve coordination of manpower planning.

The immediate activities to be handled

under this program are dealing objective ly with those unable to accommodate manpower training because of low or formal educational achievement, special ly in the matter of literacy, and working toward resolving the problem of geogra-phic dispersion of those needing man power training. Also, introducing nonace demically oriented vocational training in to the rural areas whereby the unempio able labor force being created by agricu tural technology can be trained to come productive members of the new mechanized rural community, as well working toward providing manpower com ponents which will provide intensifie counselling, job orientation, assessmen placement and other supportive service to the hard-core uemployed.

Telephone negotiations entering ninth week

Negotiations between General Telephone Company of the Southwest and the Communications Workers of America were confining of the eighth week of negotiations in San Angelo.

The contact which expired June 27 has remained in effect under an "ever-green" clause while the company and union seek to reach accord on a new contact.

The company has indicated it is willing to modify is proposal in both wages and bonelits. The company offered a proposal July 13 but the union rejected the iffer the following day. The company said the modifications of the proposal would include additional wages, additional benefit improvements and upgrading several towns where living expanses have rised above assemble infla ignory figures.

The union has refused to change its demands and has stated it must have vaction improvement above the offer of three weeks after eight years service, another hobiday in addition to the eighth holiday proposed by the company, double time after 49 hours, time and a half on a holiday, improvements in sick benefits and 10 per cent night differential.


